# Single-Detached Starts On Pace for New Record in 2006

espite another record month for new single-detached home builders, total housing starts slipped across the Capital Region in April due to a slow-down in multi-unit construction. Total housing starts in the Edmonton Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) fell by 9.6 per cent from April 2005 to 1,358 units. Even with the April slowdown, total new home construction so far this year is 23 per cent ahead of activity reported over the first four months of 2005.

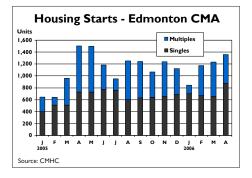
After achieving a historical high for single-detached starts in each of the first three months of the year, local builders maintained their momentum by setting another record for the month of April. Single-detached home builders commenced work on 876 units in April, representing a 20.5 per cent increase over levels reported in April 2005. Large year-over-year improvements were reported in Beaumont, Ft. Saskatchewan, Leduc City, Spruce Grove and Sturgeon County. In Edmonton City, singles increased by 9.6 per cent over April 2005.

To the end of April, single-detached starts remain on a record-setting pace thanks to continued robust demand and limited supply in both the new and resale home markets. Should this tempo be maintained for the remaining eight months of 2006, single-detached starts

will easily eclipse the record 7,623 units started in all of 2005 across Metro.

Single-detached completions increased by 25 per cent year-over-year in April to 533 units. Absorptions in April reached 575 units, representing an increase of 22.6 per cent over the same month in 2005. With absorptions outpacing completions in April, inventories of completed and unoccupied new units (including show homes) declined from 545 in March to 503 in April. Inventories in April ended up 21.2 per cent below levels reported a year earlier.

Meanwhile, multi-family starts which consist of semi-detached, row and apartment units saw a decline from 776 units in April 2005 to 482 units in April 2006, a reduction of 38 per cent. While significant, it is important to view this reduction in context. April 2005 was the strongest April in history for multi-family starts thanks to a record level of apartment starts. With a decline from 654 apartment starts in April 2005 to

315 units in April 2006, it may appear that activity in this sector is slowing down. Nevertheless, April 2006 was still the seventh strongest April on record for apartment starts. In contrast, semi-detached starts improved by nine per cent over April of last year to 120 units while row starts increased almost four-fold to 47 units.

On a year-to-date basis, multiple starts are 6.7 per cent ahead of activity reported in the first four months of 2005. While apartment starts have slowed 14.4 per cent so far this year, both semi-detached and row starts have increased year-to-date by close to 50 per cent. Multi-unit absorptions also outpaced completions in April, driving inventories downward. The total count for multiple dwellings completed and unoccupied stood at 855 in April, down by 39.4 per cent from April 2005.
