An overview of the Greater Toronto Region (GTR) Statistics Canada Economic Region 530 - It consists of the City of Toronto plus the surrounding regions of Durham, York, Peel and Halton (excluding Burlington). This area includes the municipalities of Ajax, Pickering, Whitby, Oshawa, Clarington, Uxbridge, Scugog, Brock, Georgina, East Gwillimbury, Whitchurch-Stouffville, Newmarket, Aurora, King, Vaughan, Richmond Hill, Markham, Mississauga, Brampton, Caledon, Halton Hills, Milton and Oakville.

OVERVIEW

Employment normally rises in the 2nd quarter of the year, and in the Greater Toronto Region (GTR), employment rose by 2.7% in the April to June period. The number of new jobs slightly exceeded growth in the labour force. This reduced the number of unemployed people by almost 4,000 compared to the 1st quarter. The unemployment rate in the GTR decreased to 6.3% from 6.6% in the January to March quarter.

Since the 2nd quarter of 2005, employment in the GTR increased by 47,000 (+ 1.6%) to 2,966,000. Over the same period the population aged 15 and over increased by 101,000 but the labour force (those working or looking for work) increased by only 14,000. This is due to a drop of just over one percentage point in the labour force participation rate from 70.1% in the 2nd quarter of 2005 to 68.9% in the 2nd quarter of 2006. Given a working age population approaching 4.6-million in the GTR, a drop of this magnitude makes a large difference in the available labour force. The number of unemployed people in the Region declined by 33,000 over the past year, improving the unemployment rate to 6.3%, from 7.4% in the 2nd quarter of 2005. Over the past year, employment rose in the services-producing sector of the economy while employment fell in the goods-producing sector.

Labour Market News

Highlights of industry activities that have an impact on the local labour market are derived from several sources including local newspapers, news releases and various other publications.

The Conference Board of Canada expects economic growth in the Toronto Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) to improve slightly in 2006 with stronger growth ahead in 2007 according to its Spring Metropolitan Outlook Report. The Conference Board of Canada's April report extends a positive economic outlook to the Oshawa CMA. The Oshawa economy remains strong as the population continues to grow. The report, which takes into account the uncertainties surrounding General Motors, forecasts a stable economic future for Oshawa. The service industry has provided the highest rates of economic growth in recent years. (durhamregion.com: Apr. 13/06)

Head offices

Statistics Canada reports that Toronto retains its position of being Canada's leading centre for head offices. From 1999 to 2005 the number of positions in head office employment in Toronto grew from 49,649 to 59,163. Domestic companies bought by foreign firms tended to maintain their level of head office employment. Although Calgary's share of head offices rose from 7% to 11% during this period, Toronto's share rose from 31% to 34%. Construction

Housing Starts

Housing starts in the Toronto Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) for the first six months of 2006 were 6% lower than in the first six months of 2005. The decline was due to fewer single and semi-detached starts, while the number of apartment and row house starts actually increased by 4%. The Oshawa CMA saw a 14% increase in housing starts for January to June 2006 over the same period in 2005. The increase was entirely due to higher apartment and row house

New Home Sales

New home sales in the GTA are down by 5% compared with the first half of 2005. High-rise condominium sales increased by 2% compared to the first half of last year, while low-rise sales have fallen by 10%. (Greater Toronto Home Builders' Association: July 19/06)

Non-residential

Investment in non-residential building construction in the Toronto CMA declined by over 4% in the second quarter of 2006 compared to the previous quarter. Investment fell in all three components: commercial, industrial and institutional. In the Oshawa CMA, non-residential building construction decreased by over 13% in the second quarter of 2006. Projects

The provincial government announced a five-year highway improvement plan. The following projects fall under this plan:

- high occupancy lanes on the QEW from Oakville to Burlington
- extension of Hwy. 410 to Hwy. 10 in Brampton
- extension of Hwy. 404 from Green Lane to Ravenshoe Road

The provincial government plans to improve energy efficiency standards in homes. The new building regulations will be fully implemented by 2012. Most skilled trades people will need to re-train to work with the new building codes and regulations. (Toronto Star: June 30/06)

Cadillac Fairview Corporation and FRAM Building Group will redevelop the *Don Mills Centre* into a mixed-use residential neighbourhood and shopping centre. A town square, retail space accessed from streets rather than an enclosed mall and residential and office areas are planned. The new centre is projected to be completed in August 2008. A Dominion store and Post Office will remain open. (Cadillac Fairview, news release: June 9; National Post: Apr. 14/06)

Developers, Westbank Projects Corporation and Peterson **Investment Group Inc.**, plan to build a 65-storey tower at Adelaide and University. The hotel and residential





condominium will be managed by Hong Kong-based **Shangri-La Hotels and Resorts**. (*National Post: May 10; Canadian Architect: June 27/06*)

Construction of a **Loblaw**'s warehouse will begin in August. It will be located at Bayly Street and Audley Road in the town of Ajax. The warehouse will be open 24-hours per day and have 850 people on staff. It is expected to begin operation in September 2007. (durhamregion.com: May 18/06)

The **Remington Group** and the **Town of Markham** announced the development of a downtown core along Hwy. 7 from Hwy. 404 to Warden Avenue. It will start with condominiums and townhouses, to be followed by more residential, retail and office development. The whole project will take 20 years to complete. (*Toronto Star: Apr. 1/06*)

Education Services

The provincial government is increasing funding to Ontario schools. The funds will be used to:

- add 1,200 primary teachers
- add 980 specialist teachers for elementary music, physical education and the arts
- add 300 secondary school teachers to help at-risk students stay in school
- increase funding for computer software, books and other resources in school libraries

Special education programs will increase training for special education teachers and teaching assistants of autistic students. Increased funding will reduce wait times to access programs. (*Toronto Star: June 9/06*)

Adult Education

The Canadian Policy Research Network released a report, *Too Many Left Behind: Canada's Adult Education and Training System*, on adult education. It found that 42% of adult Canadians have some type of literacy skill level below workplace requirements. People with low levels of education tend to work in low-wage jobs and are not able to participate in continuing education or upgrading. (*Globe & Mail: June 9/06*)

Residential Real Estate

In the April to June second quarter, there were 26,500 sales of existing homes in the Toronto region. In the first six months of 2006 sales were about 2% higher than in the first half of 2005. Commercial Real Estate

Brookfield Properties Corp. announced the construction of a 50-storey office tower in downtown Toronto. The *Bay Adelaide Centre West* is the first part of a three-phase project. **KPMG LLP** will be the anchor tenant, occupying 250,000 of the building's 1.1-million square feet when it is ready in 2009. Nurses

The provincial government will guarantee full-time employment to all Ontario nursing graduates beginning in 2007. Film and Television Production

Publishing

CanWest Media Works Income Fund laid off 50 people when it stopped publishing its free commuter youth newspaper, *Dose*, due to competition and a lack of advertising. Dose will continue to exist online. (*National Post: May 18/06*)

Torstar Corp. stopped publishing *Weekly Scoop*, after eight months. The magazine could not compete against similar celebrity magazines. Torstar also plans to contract out call centre work done by 18 full-time and 45 part-time people. (*National Post, Globe & Mail: June 13/06*)

Gartner Inc. expects the market for enterprise content management software (ECM) to grow 19% per year until 2008. Companies use ECM software to create, store and retrieve corporate information. Symphony Technology Group and Open Text Corp. are rival bidders for Hummingbird Ltd., a Toronto-based maker of ECM software. A merger of Open Text and Hummingbird would create the world's largest seller of ECM. Competitors include

Automotive

Honda Motor Company Ltd. will build a \$154-million engine plant near Alliston. The engine plant will begin operations by 2008 and will employ 340 people at full production. (*Globe & Mail: May 17/06*)

Linamar Corp. announced that it will spend \$1.1-billion and create 3,000 new jobs at up to six new auto parts plants and at a major research centre in the Guelph area during the next five years. Linamar will start hiring almost immediately for the expansion. The company employs about 6,000 people in its head office and factories in the Guelph area and over 10,000 worldwide. Canac Kitchens announced that it will close its current plant in Thornhill and relocate to a more modern facility in the GTA. The workforce of about 1,000 people will gradually shift business over an eight-month period. (*National Post: June 21/06*)

Transcontinental Inc. will move its commercial printing operation from west-end Toronto to its Etobicoke direct marketing location. About 23 jobs will be lost. (*Transcontinental Inc.*, *news release: May 16/06*)

The provincial government approved legislation which allows Certified Management Accountants (CMAs) and Certified General Accountants (CGAs) to practice public accounting. Previously only Chartered Accountants (CAs) could practice

Engineering

The federal government's \$16.4-billion budget allocation to infrastructure, such as roads, public transit, border security and utilities, should increase the demand for engineers. Engineers are currently in demand in Northern Canada and Alberta as a result of the oil sands boom. Canada is the fourth largest exporter of engineering services because of global demand for its engineering expertise.
