In Alberta ...

- Over 900 youth experienced another community, language or culture in 2003/04 through our Youth Exchanges Canada Program.
- The Canada Council for the Arts granted \$7.8 million to 132 arts organizations and 106 artists in 2003/04.
- 181 amateur athletes were funded through our Athlete Assistance Program in 2004.
- The film and television industry injects more than \$150 million a year into the economy.
- The National Arts Centre is hosting a two-week Alberta Scene festival in 2005, showcasing 600 of the province's top performing, visual and culinary artists in the nation's capital.
- 25,960 students enrolled in French immersion in 2002/03, nearly four times the number in the late 1970s.

Alberta Centennial Celebration
Canadian Heritage is contributing
\$3.5 million toward the Centennial
celebrations tied to Canada Day events
in Alberta, and to assist non-governmental
organizations with other activities
commemorating the province's Centennial
in 2005.

Strengthening Arts and Heritage
The Rosebud Theatre in Rosebud, the
Aerospace Museum of Calgary, and the
Catalyst Theatre Society in Edmonton are
just a few of the provincial arts and
heritage organizations that are benefiting
from a \$640,000 investment from the
Canadian Arts and Heritage Sustainability
Program.

Indigenous Women in Leadership
Aboriginal women have always played
a significant role in their communities.
Through the Aboriginal Women's
Program, Canadian Heritage has supported
the Indigenous Women in Leadership
Forum, empowering Aboriginal women
leaders in Alberta with the skills needed to
address economic, social, political and
legal realities in their communities and
organizations, as well as to implement
plans for sustainable change.

Arts Touring

Funding over three years has enabled the Arts Touring Alliance of Alberta to upgrade its support services with a database of resources, a mentorship program and an enhanced Web site. These and other improvements have led to the recruitment of more than 25 new presenters from rural, Aboriginal, ethno-cultural and Francophone communities all over the province.

Multicultural Brokers

Our diversity is a national asset. Through the support of our Multiculturalism Program, the Ethno-Cultural Council of Calgary has established a "Multicultural Brokers Team" to promote the interests and meaningful participation of Calgary's visible minority communities in all aspects of Canadian life.

meet the expanding needs of a culturally
diverse francophone community in
Alberta.
