In the NWT ...

- In 2004/05, the Government of Canada contributed \$968,000 toward French-language instruction in schools through the Canada-Northwest Territories Agreement.
- 58 youth experienced another community, language or culture in 2003/04 through our Youth Exchanges Canada program.
- To increase participation in quality sport activities at all levels in the territories, the Government of Canada is contributing more than \$500,000 over three years to support programs offered under the Pan-Territorial Sport Strategy: Northwest Territories Program.
- The Canada Council for the Arts granted \$158,000 to six arts organizations and 13 artists in 2003/04.
