#### In Quebec ...

- With support from Telefilm Canada, the growing success of the Quebec film industry is raising the bar for Canadian cinema at home and abroad, highlighted by an Oscar win in 2004 for Denys Arcand's *Les Invasions barbares*.
- The Canada Council for the Arts granted \$39 million to 686 arts organizations and 716 artists in 2003/04.
- 2,487 youth experienced another community, language or culture in 2003/04 through our Youth Exchanges Canada program.
- Information on 519 Quebec museums, including virtual exhibits, is available online at www.virtualmuseum.ca.
- 316 amateur athletes were funded through our Athlete Assistance Program in 2004.
- The National Film Board in Montreal is one of the most innovative distribution and consultation centres in the world due to its state-of-the-art technologies and the unique nature of the services it offers.

#### Multiculturalism

The Action Against Racism Week and Black History Month are two of the most important multicultural and anti-racist events supported by Canadian Heritage in Quebec. The Multiculturalism Program funded 45 projects in Quebec for a total amount of \$1.4 million in 2004/05.

number of high-quality artistic experiences. In total, 158 projects presented in more than 60 cities in all regions of the province received funding.

Canadian Arts and Heritage Sustainability Canadian Heritage encourages the modern management and financial stability of arts and heritage organizations. In 2004/05, we funded 88 projects in Quebec. Among the organizations that received support are the Black Theatre Workshop, the Canadian Centre for Architecture and the Réseau des organisateurs de spectacles de l'Est du Québec.
