ACTION PLAN FRENCH AS A FIRST LANGUAGE AND FRENCH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE REGULAR FUNDING AND ADDITIONAL FUNDING

Province of Saskatchewan

(2005 - 2009)

PREAMBLE

Background

The province of Saskatchewan currently offers three different French programs: French as a first language in minority schools, French as a second language in French Immersion schools, and Core French and Intensive French. In 2004-2005, French was offered in 12 Francophone schools, 67 French Immersion schools and approximately 463 schools with Core French programs.

Over the past few years, registration in French programs has decreased, with the exception of schools for the Francophone minority where student numbers have averaged about the same. The province wishes to continue its current initiatives in support of existing programs in Saskatchewan schools. As well, the province would like to improve and increase programs and increase student enrolments by the implementation of new initiatives, especially at the secondary levels but also at the post secondary level. Our four-year action plan covers the 2005-2009 fiscal years. During this time, the province intends to move in this direction. Therefore, several measures in the action plan are showing middle and long term initiatives. The action plan includes initiatives for existing programs and for additional strategies under the Canada Action Plan. Accordingly, two areas of funding are identified: regular funding and additional funding.

<u>Objectives 2005-2009</u>

Regular Program

- 1. Provide members of the French minority language community with the opportunity to be educated in their own language and to develop their cultural identity.
- 2. Provide residents of Saskatchewan an opportunity to learn French as a second language and to be initiated to the French culture, thereby enriching their own culture.

Additional Strategies

- 1. Develop and improve the quality and increase the quantity of French minority language programs and increase the enrolments in Francophone schools.
- 2. Develop and improve the quality and increase the quantity of French second language programs and increase the number of students with a working knowledge of their second language.

Complementarity

The action plan for the additional funding identifies projects that are completely separate from the action plan for the regular funding. These are targeted projects where the objectives are to improve the infrastructure and the programs by introducing new initiatives, with the goal of increasing student enrolment at the Kindergarten to Grade 12 and the Post-Secondary levels. In addition, the additional funding are aimed at improving programs, recruiting and retaining students, and supporting and training teachers. These projects attributed to the Institut Français as presented in the description of both regular and additional funding are different from those described in the Auxiliary Canada-Saskatchewan Agreement which provided funding for the implementation of the Institut français at the University of Regina. However, the projects in question are tied to and are complementary to the other projects, since their specific purpose is to ensure enhanced outcomes at the post-secondary level, given the available resources.

Consultations

Saskatchewan's action plan is the result of numerous consultations. The following groups have been consulted: the *Conseil scolaire fransaskois*, Anglophone school divisions, the *Assemblée communautaire fransaskoise* (ACF) along with a number of other Francophone associations, and Canadian Parents for French. The province used two methods of consultation: written and oral. Letters were sent out in order to identify needs and priorities, and to request project proposals. In addition, several meetings were held, specifically with the *Conseil scolaire fransaskois*, the ACF, Canadian Parents for French and a number of Anglophone school divisions.

<u>Investment</u>

The province is committed to providing fifty per cent (50%) to match the contribution from Canada for both the regular and additional funding. Provincial expenditures for French education are very close to \$20 million.

Assessment strategies

The province will assess the results by using the indicators identified in the action plan. The province will use several strategies of measure: questionnaires, meetings, etc.
