CANADA-ALBERTA AGREEMENT ON FRENCH LANGUAGE SERVICES

1. General Orientation, Objectives and Priorities of Alberta

The Government of Alberta wishes to cooperate with the Government of Canada to both support and further develop Alberta's official language minority community. The Government of Alberta has put together the 2005-2009 Action Plan, to meet this objective.

The 2005-2009 Action Plan promotes a coordinated approach to maximize the effectiveness of the initiatives undertaken to enhance the vitality and further support the development of Alberta's French language community. The 2005-2009 Action Plan will also be instrumental for the development of partnerships in support of the general direction and objective.

Since 2001, following the signing of the first Canada/Alberta General Agreement on the promotion of Official Languages, the Alberta Government maintained very close links with the Francophone community through participation in a number of planning activities and membership on numerous committees. The Francophone community's most recent *Plan de développement global 2004-2009* includes requests for availability of services in French in priority sectors such as Health, Economic Development, Justice, Social Services, Early Childhood and Immigration. The 2005-2009 Alberta Strategic Plan focuses on the needs and priorities identified by the Francophone community in their *Plan de développement global*.

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2. Strategic Objectives

Alberta's 2005-2009 Strategic Plan will enable Alberta to increase its capacity to support Alberta's Francophone community. By strengthening collaboration with Ministries, Departments and Agencies, the 4-year strategic plan strives to increase the availability of services to the Francophone community in the priority areas: Justice, Health, Early Childhood, Heritage preservation, Economic Development, Immigration, Arts and Culture, Youth (Sports and Recreation) and Visibility.

This Strategic Plan is consistent with the general purpose of the 2005-2009 Agreement which is to provide multi-year funding through a mechanism for coordination and joint planning of initiatives and activities aimed at contributing to the development of Alberta's Francophone community.

In developing this Strategic Plan, the needs of the community, the priorities of the Alberta Government and the priorities of the Federal Government Action Plan on Official Languages were taken into consideration. The Strategic Plan describes the initiatives and activities that the Alberta Government intends to pursue over the life of the Agreement and indicates the expected results of these undertakings. The Strategic Plan includes planning, implementation and assessment of various initiatives and activities.
