Legionella Outbreak in Toronto Nursing Home

Dear Colleagues:

The following is being provided to update you on the outbreak at a Toronto nursing home:

- Laboratory tests have confirmed Legionella as a causative agent of the outbreak. Legionellosis is a respiratory infection causing pneumonia, presenting 2-10 days after exposure.
- Currently 70 of 249 residents, 18 of 290 staff and 9 visitors are included in the outbreak; 42 people are being treated in hospital. There have been seventeen deaths among residents. Some patients are improving and are now afebrile, and some have been discharged.
- Legionella bacteria are found naturally in the environment, usually in water. The bacteria grow best in warm water, like hot tubs, hot water tanks or parts of the air-conditioning systems of large buildings.
- People get Legionnaires disease when they inhale contaminated aerosols from devices such as cooling towers, showers, and faucets, or aspirate contaminated water.
- Legionellosis does not spread from person to person. Routine precaution should be followed.
- Routine precautions are for ALL patients when care is given and include:
 - o Hand hygiene
 - Glove use when contact with any moist body substances, mucous membranes or non-intact skin is anticipated
 - Gowns are recommended during routine patient care activities in which splashing and soiling with body substances is likely to occur

Highlights:

- Legionella bacterium is confirmed causing the respiratory outbreak at Seven Oaks Home for the Aged
- Legionellosis does not spread from person to person, it is caused by environmental contamination
- Routine precautions should be followed when providing care for patients/residents
 - Mask and eye protection are recommended for activities that are likely to generate splashes or sprays of blood, body fluids, secretions or excretions.
 - There is no restriction on patient transfer or staff working at multiple facilities.

Residents and staff of the facility will be offered preventive antibiotic treatment.

A thorough environmental investigation is underway to reveal the source of the contamination at the home.
