


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Message from the Deputy Attorney General

This is a most appropriate time for the Court Services Division to have undertaken to publish an Annual Report on its activities. The Division has made an ambitious commitment to change and has put in place a multi-year planning process to map out how change will be implemented. The Division's first Five-Year Plan is included in this Report. The Plan will be reviewed and updated every year, in consultation with the judiciary, our partners and with court users, and the updated Plan will be published annually in this Report.

I am delighted that the Division has undertaken this change process. I think that the initiatives identified for implementation over the next five years are the right ones to fulfill the goals and standards that the Division has set for itself and that they are achievable given the resources at our disposal.

Bringing about successful change in the public service is much more complicated than in the private sector. This is due to a number of factors. Government is bigger than most businesses and it has to manage a much more diverse array of activities. Further, it

operates in the public eye. However, I think that the most important reason that change is so complicated for us lies in the difficulty of quantifying our bottom-line concerns.

The public service does, of course, have bottom-line concerns, but they are complex. Governments must consider a wider range of interests and constituencies and sometimes these interests and constituencies are in conflict with one another. I think this is particularly true for us in the justice sector. Our bottom line involves not only effective use of resources but also the integrity of the justice system itself. That is, we have a qualitative bottom line, not just a quantitative one. We have to resist the impulse to substitute the measurable for the desirable: a fixation on quantification obscures the qualitative. This is not a trivial challenge.

Further, while the bottom line is there, the means to get there are not fully within our control. Not only must we weigh different, and perhaps conflicting, priorities, we are also in no position to unilaterally impose the priority concerns that we identify. We do not own the justice system. The concerns of the bench, the bar, victims of crime, the police, social agencies and others arise out of the different and discrete roles that they each play. We have our own particular concerns as well, but our priorities must be negotiated carefully with the other independent yet interdependent institutions that make up the system. We must be conscientious about addressing the concerns of those others while at the same time not appearing to interfere in matters that are beyond our authority. It's a fine line to walk, given that we are also accountable to central agencies, the Legislature and the public generally for sound fiscal management and for our program and policy choices. We need to be very careful and thoughtful about how we approach change in this complex environment.

In light of these challenges, my advice to the Court Services Division has been twofold. First, I think we need to focus on change initiatives that are modest, small in scale and incremental. I'm all for thinking big, but we have to start small. I believe that a series of small steps can get us to our goals more surely than radical, systemic upheaval.

Second, I advised the Division to identify initiatives that build on what we already do well. Initiatives that reflect our existing infrastructure and interfere minimally with our normal way of doing things are more likely to be successfully embraced by our staff and those with whom we work in the courts.

I congratulate the Division on developing a Five-Year Plan that incorporates this approach to change and on the work it has successfully completed in the first year of the Plan. I will be very interested to see how this change process unfolds. And since the primary goal of the Court Services Division is to support the provision of high quality justice services to the public, I would welcome the views of those who read this Report and who have an interest in our work as it progresses.

We provide public information and filing services at court counters, maintain court records, provide courtroom support for the judiciary, manage juries, deliver civil and family mediation programs and enforce court orders, among other services.

Ontario's justice system has many strengths but its key feature is the calibre of men and women who labour every day in the administration of court services. Ontario's knowledgeable and fair-minded judiciary and its highly skilled and dedicated bar continue to offer the Ministry leadership and guidance. The excellent working relationships between the judiciary, the bar and the Ministry are key to maintaining one of the best court systems in the world. The Court Services Division is pleased to support the co-operative efforts of these independent, yet interdependent, participants in the justice system.

There are, of course, challenges in administering court services across Ontario's huge distances. Public concerns about access, delays and complexity in the justice system are our concerns too. We are taking

action to improve our planning processes and manage these challenges in order to build a more effective, efficient and accessible Ontario court service.

Our Division has developed a detailed business planning process to keep our activities focused on results. Our new Five-Year Plan outlines the problems and prospects for the Division, establishes service standards and lists the initiatives we will implement to meet those standards. Our Plan reflects the goals of Ontario's local court managers and was developed in consultation with the judiciary. Key needs identified in the Plan include professionalizing our workforce, expanding access to court services through technology, and physically maintaining and improving our current system of courthouses across the province.

The Annual Report is part of our ongoing commitment to improve the accuracy, scope and accessibility of information on Ontario's Court Services Division and the operations of Ontario's courts. I trust you will find this report an informative overview of the programs and initiatives we are pursuing to provide a modern and professional court service that supports accessible, fair, timely and effective justice services.

Introduction to the Court Services Division

Mission

The Ministry of the Attorney General is responsible for administering justice in Ontario. Within the Ministry, the Court Services Division (CSD) is responsible for the administration of the courts. CSD's mission is to provide a modern and professional court service that supports accessible, fair, timely and effective justice services.

Core Services

CSD operates the largest and busiest court system in Canada, and one of the largest in North America. Our core services include:

Court Office Services

CSD provides court office services in more than 250 communities across the province. Court staff schedule court cases at the direction of the judiciary, maintain court records and files, provide information to the public, and facilitate the delivery of key justice programs including the Victim/Witness Program, the Bail Program, Domestic Violence Courts, and Legal Aid.

Judicial and Courtroom Support

CSD provides administrative support to all judges of the Court of Appeal, the Superior Court of Justice and the Ontario Court of Justice and to justices of the peace. The Division also manages the jury system and provides courtroom support through court registrars, clerks, reporters, monitors and interpreters.

Mediation Programs

CSD manages the delivery of mediation services in the family and civil courts. Mandatory civil mediation is now part of the civil court process in Ottawa, Toronto and Windsor. As well, all unified family courts across the province offer family mediation services on a voluntary basis.

Enforcement Services

CSD administers the filing of writs of execution, enforces civil orders and manages the collection of fine and restitution revenues from the prosecution of criminal offences.

Highlights from the Opening of Courts

The annual Opening of Courts Ceremony provides an opportunity for everyone in the legal community to pause and reflect on the daily work done in the courts. On January 6, 2003, Chief Justice McMurtry presided at the province's Opening of Courts Ceremony at the Metropolitan Toronto Courthouse at 361 University Avenue. Representatives from the judiciary, the bar, the federal and provincial governments, the police, the clergy, the media and social service agencies were in attendance. Attorney General David Young's address to the Chief Justices emphasized Ontario's commitment to an accessible justice system "Let us redouble our efforts — within our specific roles and working together — to expand access to justice in our province. Let us accept and act on our responsibility to make the law and the justice system work for all the people of Ontario."

Role of the Assistant Deputy Attorney General, Court Services Division

The Assistant Deputy Attorney General, Court Services Division, has overall responsibility for the administration of the courts in Ontario. The Assistant Deputy Attorney General reports to the Deputy Attorney General, who in turn reports to the Attorney General.

Regional Structure

For the purpose of providing court services, Ontario is organized into six administrative regions.

Each region is responsible for:

- Delivering local criminal, civil and family court services
- Providing public information and filing services
- Maintaining court records, files, exhibits and databases

- Providing judicial support services, including courtroom and administrative support
- Managing juries
- Delivering civil and family mediation programs
- Enforcing court orders
- Managing fines, fees and trust funds
- Managing regional financial and human resources
- Identifying and co-ordinating regional facility plans
- Managing regional stakeholder communications
- Exchanging information and documents with external agencies
- · Recruiting and training staff
- Implementing Divisional initiatives

Regional Directors

Each region is managed by a Director of Court Operations who reports to the Assistant Deputy Attorney General, Court Services Division.

Regional Profiles

Central East

Located geographically to the north and east of Toronto, the Central East Region serves many of the communities of the Greater Toronto Area. The population growth rate in this area is among the highest in Canada.

Central West

Serving over 2.6 million residents, the Central West Region has the highest population of the six CSD regions. The Central West includes Pearson International Airport and numerous communities in the Greater Toronto Area.

East

The East Region is the second largest geographic region in Ontario, and has a significant francophone population. CSD in the East provides many services in French.

North

The North Region comprises 70 percent of Ontario's land mass and 10 percent of its population. The remote locations, winter travel conditions and unique population demographics present many program delivery challenges. To provide community-centred service in remote locations, court staff and members of the judiciary and the bar must travel extensively.

There are significant francophone and aboriginal populations in the North Region. Court services are regularly provided in French, Ojibway and Cree.

Toronto

The Toronto Region serves the City of Toronto. With a population of approximately 2.5 million people, the Toronto Region has the highest population density of the CSD regions. One in four immigrants to Canada settles in Toronto and the region is ethnically diverse.

The Toronto Region includes many high volume courts and houses many key justice system participants, including: the Court of Appeal for Ontario at Osgoode Hall; the Offices of the Chief Justices for the Court of Appeal, Superior Court of Justice and Ontario Court of Justice; the Provincial Legislature; the offices of the Provincial Law Society; and many large law firms.

Since the majority of Ontario commercial cases are heard in Toronto, the region has significant resources committed to civil case management, including a complement of Case Management Masters. Toronto also manages Ontario's first electronic courtroom for commercial and other non-jury civil matters.


West

The West Region crosses three judicial regions and includes Sarnia and Windsor, both major border crossings between Canada and the United States. The volume of traffic fom trucks and cross-border commuters generates a high number of traffic charges in this region.

The West Region also houses Ontario's Central Jury Office, which is responsible for managing the selection of jury panels for courts across the province.

Corporate Support

In September 2001, CSD formalized a new head office structure to reflect the Division's expanded policy, project, legal and program development responsibilities. The head office was restructured to create three branches that share responsibilities as follows:

The **Corporate Planning Branch** is responsible for:

- Divisional planning
- Managing financial and human resources
- Developing information technology plans
- Collecting and reporting court statistics
- Establishing Divisional performance measures and monitoring compliance with operational policies and business standards
- Co-ordinating public communications
- Developing and distributing Divisional directives, operational manuals and staff training guides
- Managing Divisional facilities
- Supporting the appointment process for judges, justices of the peace, commissioners and notaries public
- Acting as a liaison with municipalities for Provincial Offences Act matters
- Establishing policy project teams to respond to justice system challenges

The **Criminal Policy & Programs Branch** is responsible for:

 Developing, implementing and managing legislative, regulatory and administrative initiatives with respect to the criminal justice system

- Providing policy and program support to criminal court staff
- Providing legal support and advice to senior management on criminal court issues
- Providing support to initiatives from the Ministry's Criminal Law Division
- Providing support to backlog initiatives in the criminal courts
- Managing the Justice of the Peace Review Project

The Civil/Family Policy & Programs Branch is responsible for:

- Developing, implementing and managing legislative, regulatory and administrative initiatives with respect to the civil and family justice system
- Providing policy and program support to civil and family court staff
- Providing legal support and advice to senior management on civil and family court issues
- Developing, implementing, and managing civil justice reform strategies to reduce cost and delay in the civil justice system
- Managing family mediation and information services
- Participating on Federal/Provincial/Territorial Family Law Committees and the Family Rules Committee
- Negotiating and monitoring federal family justice funding

Corporate Directors

Each branch is managed by a Corporate Director based in the CSD head office in Toronto. Corporate Directors report to the Assistant Deputy Attorney General, Court Services Division.

Introduction to Ontario's Courts

Ontario's *Courts of Justice Act* creates the framework for the province's court structure. The Act establishes the jurisdiction of each of the province's three courts: the Court of Appeal for Ontario, the Superior Court of Justice and the Ontario Court of Justice.

The Court of Appeal for Ontario

The Court of Appeal for Ontario is the highest court of record in the province. The Court of Appeal hears:

- Criminal appeals of indictable offences
- Civil appeals of final decisions of the Superior Court of Justice
- Appeals involving young persons
- Some appeals of decisions of the Divisional Court
- Inmate appeals (heard in Kingston, Ontario)

The Court of Appeal sits in Toronto at Osgoode Hall. The court is composed of a federally appointed Chief Justice of Ontario, an Associate Chief Justice of Ontario and 20 other judges. The Court of Appeal sits with either one or three judges depending on the appeal. Decisions of the Court of Appeal may be further appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada. (Note that the Supreme Court of Canada is administered by the federal government according to ss. 91(27), 92(14), 96-101 of the *Constitution Act*).

The Superior Court of Justice

The Superior Court of Justice hears:

- Criminal prosecutions of indictable offences
- Some criminal prosecutions involving young persons
- Summary conviction appeals from the Ontario Court of Justice
- · Bail reviews
- Civil suits (Note that civil suits under \$10,000 are dealt with in Small Claims Court, a branch of the Superior Court.)
- Family law disputes involving divorce or property claims, child and spousal support, and custody and access claims (In areas where the Family Court branch of the Superior Court of Justice exists, the Superior Court hears all family matters, including child protection issues.)

The Superior Court of Justice sits in 49 permanent court locations in Ontario. The court is led by a federally appointed Chief Justice of the Superior Court of Justice, an Associate Chief Justice, and Regional Senior Justices who oversee scheduling and judicial issues in their regions. Most of the judicial locations in Ontario also have a Local Administrative Justice who oversees the judicial administrative issues at that specific location.

Family Court Branch

In some jurisdictions in Ontario, the Family Court Branch of the Superior Court of Justice has been established to provide a single court for all family matters, including divorce, division of property, child protection, adoption, child and spousal support and child custody and access matters. Special services provided by the Family Court Branch include Family Law Information Centres, Supervised Access Centres, Mediation Services and Parent Information Sessions.

The Family Court Branch has been established in 17 municipalities across the province. Where the Family Court Branch does not exist, jurisdiction over family law disputes is divided between the Superior Court of Justice and the Ontario Court of Justice.

Divisional Court Branch

The Divisional Court Branch of the Superior Court of Justice hears:

- Appeals and reviews of decisions by government agencies, tribunals and boards
- Some civil appeals under \$25,000

The Divisional Court sits in various locations throughout the province in panels of three judges. The court includes the Chief Justice of the Superior Court of Justice, the Associate Chief Justice of the Superior Court of Justice and other judges appointed from the Superior Court of Justice.

Small Claims Court Branch

The Small Claims Court Branch of the Superior Court of Justice hears civil actions for claims up to \$10,000. While there are some permanently appointed Small Claims Court judges, the court is usually presided over by senior lawyers who are appointed to act as deputy judges.

The Ontario Court of Justice

All criminal cases are commenced in the Ontario Court of Justice, and over 95 percent of such cases are completed in this court. Ontario Court judges and justices of the peace sit in over 200 locations across the province.

Judges of the court hear:

- Criminal prosecutions of indictable and summary conviction offences
- Most criminal prosecutions involving young persons
- *Provincial Offences Act* appeals from decisions of justices of the peace
- Child protection applications, family law disputes involving custody, access and support, and adoption applications, in areas where the Family Court Branch of the Superior Court of Justice does not exist

Justices of the Peace hear:

- Bail hearings
- Prosecutions of provincial offences

The court is led by a Chief Justice of the Ontario Court of Justice, an Associate Chief Justice, an Associate Chief Justice/Coordinator of Justices of the Peace, Regional Senior Justices and Regional Senior Justices of the Peace. Most of the judicial locations in Ontario also have a Local Administrative Justice who oversees the judicial aspects of the court at that specific location.

2002/03 Court Activity

Five-Year Trends

Statistical data about court activity is extracted from the Integrated Courts Offences Network (ICON), which is CSD's operational system for Ontario Court of Justice criminal proceedings, and from the Courts Input Statistical System (CISS), which is the case tracking systems for civil and family matters and Superior Court of Justice criminal proceedings. The scope of data available from CISS is much narrower than that available from ICON.

CSD has developed a new case tracking system for civil and family cases as well as for Superior Court criminal, Small Claims and Divisional Court proceedings. This system is currently being piloted at four court locations. Provincial implementation is expected later this year. The new system is explicitly designed to meet CSD's management information and operational needs and will provide extensive data about case processing. In developing the system, CSD has captured all of the information that is currently available from the SUSTAIN case management system in Toronto, Ottawa and Windsor, including time-standard tracking and case-aging data. The new system also includes some additional, important data elements, including detailed event information.


CSD is also examining options for an improved criminal case management system, including options to enhance the accuracy and scope of data available from ICON. In addition, other measures are being put in place to enhance the accuracy, scope and accessibility of CSD's management information.

The following discussion outlines some of the trends that CSD is currently tracking for all practice areas. More detailed statistical information and definitions are included in the Appendix.


New Proceedings Received

Over the past 10 years, Small Claims Court and civil matters have declined as a proportion of total court activity while family and criminal matters have increased.

The Criminal Courts

Charges and Indictments Received

Over the past five years, the number of charges received in the Ontario Court of Justice has increased by 13 percent and the number of charge dispositions has increased by 6 percent. The number of charges received has increased in all regions. Charge dispositions have increased in all regions except Toronto and the North. In the Superior Court of Justice, indictments received have decreased by 14 percent and dispositions have decreased by 23 percent

Number of Events

Overall, the number of events heard in criminal proceedings has increased by 29 percent over the past five years. The increase in the number of events exceeds the increase in the number of new charges received. That is, on average, more events are required to process a case than in previous years.


In the Ontario Court of Justice, events overall have increased by 29 percent. Events have increased sharply in the Central East (44 percent), Central West (49 percent) and East (43 percent) Regions. Events in the West and North Regions have increased by 35 percent and 30 percent respectively. In the Toronto Region, the number of events has increased by 8 percent.

In the Superior Court of Justice, events have decreased by 1 percent. The number of events has decreased in the North (9 percent), Toronto (17 percent) and West (22 percent) Regions, and has increased in the Central East (4 percent), Central West (23 percent) and East (46 percent) Regions.


Pending Charges and Indictments

There has been an overall increase in pending charges and indictments over the past five years. The number of charges pending in the Ontario Court of Justice has increased by 36 percent and the number of indictments pending in the Superior Court of Justice has increased by 4 percent.


Charges Received and Disposed in the Ontario Court of Justice, Criminal 1998/99 to 2002/03




Indictments and Appeals Received and Disposed in the Superior Court of Justice, Criminal 1998/99 to 2002/03

The Civil Courts

New Proceedings

The number of new civil cases commenced in the Superior Court of Justice has decreased by 2 percent over the past five years. This decrease is due in part to the June 1998 transfer of residential tenancy matters under the *Landlord and Tenant Act* from the Superior Court of Justice to the Ontario Rental Housing Tribunal. Other civil cases have increased by 11 percent over this period, due in part to the inclusion of Toronto Region bankruptcy and commercial data, starting in 2001. In fiscal year 2002/03, claims under Rule 76 of the *Rules of Civil Procedure* (Simplified Procedure) comprised 23 percent of all civil claims filed in the Superior Court.

Defences Filed

The number of defended claims as a proportion of new claims filed in a given year has increased from 36 percent in 1998/99 to 56 percent in 2002/03. Most notably, there was a 76 percent increase in defences filed in the Toronto Region over the five-year period. This increase was likely due to the full implementation of Rule 77 of the *Rules of Civil Procedure* (Civil Case Management) in the Toronto Region.

Number of Events


The total number of events in civil proceedings has decreased by 1 percent since 1998/99, with a dramatic decrease of 46 percent in the Central East and 51 percent in the West. Data for Toronto shows an increase of over 50 percent, which is likely due to the inclusion of bankruptcy and commercial matters in Toronto Region data starting in 2001/02 and to the full implementation of case management in July 2001.

The trial rate has remained stable at 2 percent since 1998/99, although the Toronto Region saw a sharp increase in trial activity in 1999/00 as a result of a strategy implemented in that fiscal year to bring forward trial dates.


Mediation Settlement

Mandatory mediation is a feature of civil case management in Toronto and Ottawa (and Windsor, as of 2003). In Toronto and Ottawa, full settlement rates for mandatory mediation have remained stable at approximately 40 percent.


New Proceedings in the Superior Court of Justice, Civil 1998/99 to 2002/03




Defences Filed in the Superior Court of Justice, Civil 1998/99 to 2002/03

The Family Courts

As discussed earlier, family matters are heard in both the Ontario Court of Justice and the Superior Court of Justice. In some locations, a Family Court Branch of the Superior Court of Justice has been established to hear all family matters. Family Court Branches have been established in all locations in the Central East Region, in most locations in the East Region and in a small number of locations in the Central West and West Regions. The most recent expansion of the Family Court Branch in 1999, together with the introduction of the new Family Law Rules that same year, has had a significant impact on court data. These changes affected the volume of incoming cases at various locations as well as family court procedures and coding practices.

New Proceedings

Overall, the number of new family proceedings has increased by 4 percent over the past five years.

Family matters heard in the Ontario Court of Justice have decreased by 28 percent. In the Central East Region, family proceedings are now heard exclusively in the Family Court Branch of the Superior Court of Justice. New proceedings in the Ontario Court of Justice have decreased in the East (69 percent), Central West (36 percent) and Toronto (29 percent) Regions. In the North and West Regions, the number of incoming family matters has increased by

37 percent and 15 percent respectively.

The Superior Court of Justice has experienced a 37 percent increase in new family proceedings, due in part to the Family Court Branch expansion in 1999. There has been a 96 percent increase in the East Region and over 50 percent increases in both the Central East and North Regions. Only the West Region experienced a decrease in new proceedings (down 7 percent).


Number of Events

Overall, the number of events in family matters has increased over the five-year period by 48 percent.


The number of events in Ontario Court of Justice family matters has increased by 6 percent. The West and North Regions have seen the largest increases in events (109 percent and 189 percent) over the five-year period, while events in the other regions decreased. Events in the Central East Region have dropped to zero, consistent with a transfer of caseload to the Family Court Branch of the Superior Court of Justice. Events have declined by 65 percent in the East, 24 percent in the Central West and 31 percent in Toronto.

Overall, the number of events in Superior Court of Justice family matters has increased by 70 percent. Central East Region events have increased by 140 percent and East Region events have increased by 88 percent, as a result of Family Court Branch expansion. The only region to experience a decrease in events

Events Heard in the Ontario Court of Justice and the Superior Court of Justice, Family 1998/99 to 2002/03




Child and Family Services Act Proceedings

The volume of court activity under the *Child and Family Services Act* has been increasing since 1995 – there have been more cases (78 percent), more orders issued (177 percent) and more hearings scheduled (360 percent). The largest increases in activity have occurred in the Superior Court of Justice, due in part to the shift of cases from the Ontario Court of Justice as a result of the Family Court Branch

expansion in 1999. However, the Ontario Court of Justice has also experienced increases in the number of orders issued and hearings scheduled.

The time to disposition for *Child and Family Services Act* cases has increased steadily over the period, with the longest times to disposition occurring in regions where there is a Family Court Branch of the Superior Court of Justice and in the Toronto Region.


Child and Family Services Act Court Activity in the Ontario Court of Justice and the Superior Court of Justice 1991/92 to 2002/08

The Small Claims Court

45 percent of all civil cases commenced in 2002/03 were Small Claims Court claims.

New Proceedings

The number of Small Claims cases commenced has declined by 9 percent over the five-year period. The largest decline was in the North Region (18 percent). The number of defended claims as a proportion of new claims filed in a given year has increased from 27 percent to 33 percent over the five-year period. The rate of default judgments (judgments obtained where no defence has been filed) has increased from 37 percent to 39 percent. In 2002/03, 15 percent of cases went to trial.

Number of Events

The number of events heard has declined by 9 percent. Once again, the largest decline in events occurred in the North Region (20 percent). The number of pre-trial hearings scheduled has decreased by 7 percent over the five-year period. Pre-trials are hearings held before trial to ensure full disclosure, help parties settle issues and assist them in preparing for trial.

The Court of Appeal

Court of Appeal data is collected by calendar year.


Criminal Appeals

The number of criminal appeals filed has declined by 24 percent from 1998 through 2002. The number of criminal appeal dispositions has declined by 22 percent over the same period. The number of appeals pending at the beginning of each calendar year has dropped by 21 percent.


Civil Appeals

The number of civil appeals filed has declined by 24 percent from 1998 through 2002. The number of civil appeal dispositions has declined by 35 percent over the same period. The number of appeals pending at the beginning of each calendar year has dropped by 46 percent.


New Proceedings in Small Claims Court 1998/99 to 2002/03




Events Heard in Small Claims Court 1998/99 to 2002/03

2002/03 Operational Overview

The Criminal Courts

Backlog Reduction Initiative

The Backlog Reduction Initiative is a joint project between CSD, the Criminal Law Division and the judiciary of the Ontario Court of Justice. This initiative directs dedicated resources towards reducing the backlog of criminal cases in particular courts in the Greater Toronto Area. Each court involved in the initiative receives additional Crown attorneys and judges, with accompanying court support staff, for up to six-months. In 2002/03, backlog reduction resources were directed towards Brampton, North York, Oshawa and Scarborough. Resources will be directed towards Newmarket, Ottawa and Brampton in 2003/04.

Youth Criminal Justice Act

The Youth Criminal Justice Act (Bill C-7), proclaimed on April 1, 2003, created significant changes in the youth justice system. The Actemphasizes the rehabilitation of young offenders within the community, expands the criteria to be considered at bail hearings, introduces new types of sentences and transforms the procedure for seeking an adult sentence.

POA Transfer

The *Provincial Offences Act* (POA) governs non-*Criminal Code* offences, such as parking, traffic and liquor licence violations and offences under the *Ontario Health and Safety Act* and the *Environmental Act.* The POA Transfer Project transferred to municipalities the responsibility for administering all, and prosecuting selected, POA offences. The province retained responsibility for the quality of the justice system as a whole and continues to prosecute serious POA offences.

The POA Transfer Project was completed on February 25, 2002. The streamlined system provides municipalities with revenues from POA fines, gives municipalities authority over matters that have local community impact and allows the province to focus its resources on more serious criminal matters.

Justice Summit: Criminal Backlog Initiative

The Deputy Attorney General and the Chief Justices of the Superior and Ontario Courts of Justice co-hosted a Justice Summit in early 2002 to address growing backlogs in criminal and child protection cases. The meeting included representatives from the judiciary, the bar, the Ministry of the Attorney General, the Office of the Children's Lawyer, Legal Aid Ontario, Children's Aid Societies and the Ministry of Community, Family and Children's Services. As a result of this meeting, committees were established to investigate bail and remand issues and to address possible criminal case scheduling improvements.

The Summit reconvened in February 2003. The Committee on Bail and Remand Issues reported on its initiatives and was directed to develop implementation plans. The work of the Criminal Case Scheduling Committee is underway.

The Civil Courts

Civil Justice Reform Strategy

Case management and mandatory mediation are two components of the Ministry's civil justice reform strategy to reduce unnecessary delay and cost in the civil justice system.

Civil Case Management

Under case management, the court supervises the progress of cases to promote timely resolution. Timelines for the occurrence of key litigation events are set out in Rule 77 of the *Rules of Civil Procedure*. Case management under Rule 77 has been in place in Ottawa and Toronto since 1997. In July 2001, case management in Toronto expanded from 25% to 100%. In Windsor, case management has been in place under a different rule since 1990. Rule 77 came into effect in Windsor in December 2002.

Mandatory Mediation

Established under Rule 24.1 of the *Rules of Civil Procedure*, Ontario's Mandatory Mediation Program is designed to help litigants settle their cases early in the litigation process, thereby saving litigants time and expense. Under Rule 24.1, participants in most civil, case-managed, non-family cases are referred to a mediation session within 90 days after the first statement of defence is filed.

Mandatory mediation was introduced in 1999 as a pilot project in Toronto and Ottawa. It became permanent in July 2001, after a two-year independent evaluation confirmed the positive impact of mediation on the speed, cost and outcome of civil litigation. As of January 2003, mandatory mediation has resulted in a full and partial settlement rate of 50%, exceeding the Ministry's target of 40%. The program came into effect in Windsor in December 2002.

Changes to the Civil Rules

The Civil Rules Committee is a statutory committee composed of representatives from the judiciary, the bar and the Ministry of the Attorney General. The Committee has the jurisdiction to make rules regarding procedure in all civil proceedings in the Court of

Appeal and the Superior Court of Justice. In 2002/03, the Civil Rules Committee approved changes to expand case management and mandatory mediation to Essex County (Windsor), to expand the range of motions which a registrar may hear, to clarify provisions regarding costs and to reduce the number of documents that must be filed in an appeal.

Simplified Procedure Rule

The Simplified Procedure Rule (Rule 76 of the Rules of Civil Procedure) is designed address the problems of cost and delay for civil cases involving relatively smaller claims. The streamlined procedure reduces the number of pre-trial procedures, uses mandatory timelines and eliminates oral and written examinations for discovery. The Simplified Procedure Rule was introduced in March 1996 as a pilot project for cases up to \$25,000. Following a positive evaluation, it was made permanent in January 2001. The monetary limit was increased to \$50,000 in January 2002.

Small Claims Court

As of April 2, 2001, the monetary jurisdiction of Small Claims Court was increased from \$6,000 to \$10,000. The new jurisdiction is consistent with both British Columbia and Nova Scotia. The Ministry continues to monitor the impact of the jurisdictional increase. Ministry representatives also participated on the Small Claims Court Rules Subcommittee of the Civil Rules Committee. The Subcommittee is engaged in a review of the Small Claims Court Rules, including consideration of province-wide mandatory settlement conferences and automatic dismissal timelines.

Discovery Reform

The Government of Ontario and the Superior Court of Justice appointed a task force to review the effectiveness of Ontario's discovery process, identify problems and make recommendations for reform. In carrying out its mandate, the task force has consulted with representatives of the judiciary and the bar across the province, gathered quantitative and qualitative data and reviewed approaches to the discovery process in jurisdictions outside Ontario. The task force is expected to submit a final report by spring 2003.

The Family Courts

Family Mediation Services

Family Mediation Services provides voluntary mediation of issues arising on family breakdown. Family mediation results for 2002/03 show a 78% settlement rate, with 62% full agreement and 16% partial agreement. New mediation contracts were entered into with family mediation and information service providers.

Client Satisfaction With Services

Client Satisfaction Surveys for 2002/03 indicate a 99% satisfaction rate with Family Mediation Services, a 98% satisfaction rate with Family Law Information Centres and a 100% satisfaction rate with Parent Information Sessions.

Justice Summit: Child Protection Backlog Initiative

In addition to addressing criminal court backlogs, the 2002 Justice Summit was convened to address growing backlogs in child protection cases in Ontario. Co-hosted by the Deputy Attorney General and the Chief Justices of the Superior and Ontario Courts of Justice, the meeting included representatives from the judiciary, the bar, the Ministry of the Attorney General, the Office of the Children's Lawyer, Legal Aid Ontario, Children's Aid Societies and the Ministry of Community, Family and Children's Services. Working groups were established and reported on child protection issues and best practices and enhanced technology for managing child protection cases.

The Summit reconvened in February 2003, at which time these working groups reported on their initiatives and were directed to develop implementation plans.

Changes to the Family Rules

The Family Rules Committee is a statutory committee composed of representatives of the judiciary, the bar and the Ministry of the Attorney General, with jurisdiction to make rules regarding procedure in Ontario's family courts. In 2002/03, the Family Rules Committee approved changes to reduce delay in processing child protection cases, to introduce less complicated financial statement forms, to clarify processing of adoption cases and to implement the *Interjurisdictional Support Orders Act*.

Amendments to the Divorce Act

In December 2002, the federal government introduced amendments to the *Divorce Act* to remove the terms custody and access. CSD will participate in the federal/provincial/territorial implementation of these changes, once they are passed by the federal parliament. Ontario is also considering whether similar amendments should be made to the *Family Law Act*.

Potential Expansion of the Family Court Branch

In 2002, the federal government announced 62 new judicial appointments to unified family courts across Canada. CSD is working with the judiciary and the federal government to consider further expansion of the Family Court Branch of the Superior Court of Justice to new locations in Ontario.

2002/03 Corporate Initiatives

Modernizing Service Delivery

Model Electronic Courtroom

In 2002/03, CSD established a model electronic courtroom at the 393 University Avenue Superior Court of Justice in Toronto. The courtroom will test the use of in-court technology in commercial and other non-jury civil matters. The technology will support:

- Digital evidence and argument presentation
- Remote video and teleconferencing appearances by counsel, witnesses and interpreters
- Simultaneous cross-border hearings

Testing of the facility will continue over the spring of 2003.

In February 2002, CSD also became an affiliate with Courtroom 21, an advanced technology testing court developed by the U.S. National Centre for State

Courts and the College of William and Mary. Affiliate status will help CSD access knowledge and experience gained by other jurisdictions regarding the use of advanced technology in the court environment.

Display Boards Project

Visitors to the courts often require assistance to locate the proceeding they wish to attend. The Display Boards Project will foster user self-service by displaying courtroom schedules on large display boards in courthouse lobbies.

Display boards will be installed in 18 courthouses across the province, in the cities of Barrie, Brampton, Cornwall, Hamilton, Kitchener, London, Milton, Newmarket, North Bay, Oshawa, Ottawa, Owen Sound, Sarnia, Sault Ste. Marie and Toronto. As of March 31, 2003, development and testing is complete. Implementation is scheduled for spring 2003.

New Court Case Tracking System

To modernize the management of Superior Court criminal, civil, family and small claims cases, Divisional Court cases and Ontario Court family cases, CSD has recently developed a new electronic court case tracking system. The system tracks timelines, allows staff to electronically schedule judicial officials and courtrooms, creates an electronic information database and improves reporting.

As of spring 2003, CSD is piloting the new system in Brantford, Sudbury and Oshawa/Whitby. Province-wide training and phased implementation will continue in 2003/04.

Video Remand

A high proportion of preliminary criminal court appearances are remands; the accused is "remanded" (sent back) to custody to await trial. The Video Remand Project allows an accused person to appear in court by video conferencing from a police station or correctional institution. Video remand reduces the number of prisoners transported to court and results in cost savings for police services and reduced pressure in court holding cells.

The Video Remand Project has completed the third year of its rollout. As of March 31, 2003, 96 installations have been completed in courthouses, correctional facilities and Ontario Provincial Police detachments. Six installations are scheduled for 2003/04. The project is continuing to work with Ontario Provincial Police and First Nations Police Services to coordinate POTS (Plain Old Telephone Service) videophone installations, with the goal of providing video services in Ontario's remote locations.

Telecom Modernization

The Ministry of the Attorney General Telecom Modernization Project was initiated to address the need to upgrade antiquated telephone infrastructure throughout the province, in order to improve Ministry adherence to Ontario's Quality Service Strategy.

During 2002/03, telecom enhancement work continued at the Barrie, Ottawa, Sault Ste. Marie, St. Catharines, Peterborough, L'Orignal, Dryden, and Sioux Lookout courthouses.

Improving Staff Support and Internal Communications

The Court Services Division Intranet

In 2001/02, the Corporate Planning Branch developed and launched a new CSD intranet. This site is the primary means of communication between the CSD corporate head office and the regions. The site consists of over 1,800 web pages, including Divisional directives, up-to-date manuals, electronic forms, and other CSD communications. The site receives over 25,000 hits per day.



Procedural Manuals

The Corporate Planning Branch began the Manual Writing Project in 2001/02 to address deficiencies in resources for staff in the field, deterioration of common service standards and variances in court procedures across the province. The project is undertaking to rewrite or create over 30 court procedural manuals.

Distributed to staff on the CSD intranet site, the new manuals:

- Present information in a clear and readable format
- Provide electronic links to forms and legislation required for legal authority
- Incorporate all CSD directives
- Remain current, by allowing for updates on a realtime basis as policies and procedures change
- Illustrate step-by-step instructions in diagrams

The manuals are being developed through collaboration between professional writers, designers, business line experts, focus groups and review committees.

Electronic Forms

The Corporate Planning Branch is also in the process of making available over 1,500 court forms in electronic format. The forms will allow court staff to:

- Use the most current version of forms
- Fill out the forms electronically
- Save the contents of the forms for future reference
- Produce the forms in-house, on an as-needed basis, with considerable cost savings

The forms are linked to the procedural manuals on the CSD intranet site, to allow for easy access by court staff.

Working with Our Justice Partners

Improving Public Legal Education

In 2002, the Ontario Justice Education Network (OJEN) was established with Chief Justice McMurtry, Chief Justice LeSage and Chief Justice Lennox as its founding directors. Arising from the activity of the Public Legal Education Task Force, OJEN is a collaborative venture with the objective of fostering public understanding of the justice system.

Members of CSD have been key in moving this justice outreach initiative forward. Local committees have been established in many Ontario courthouses to facilitate and improve public education and outreach by justice system volunteers. Through the "Courtrooms and Classrooms" program, over 30,000 students across Ontario have had an opportunity to engage in interactive sessions with various justice system participants.

In August 2002, OJEN presented the first Summer Law Institute for high school teachers. Conducted in Osgoode Hall, the successful two-day program included in-court sessions and provided teachers with materials to convey the values underlying the justice system to grade 10 civics students.

Ontario Justice International

Ontario Justice International (OJI) is the Ministry of the Attorney General's international consulting service. By drawing upon the Ontario government's experience operating one of the largest justice systems in North America, OJI helps client governments design and operate fair, impartial, accessible and efficient justice systems.

As part of OJI, CSD has begun preparing customized international training programs on courts administration. The modular programs will build sequentially from the fundamentals of legislation and policy to the practical skills of records management, case management, financial management, audit practices, labour relations and courtroom support.

Management Information

CSD statistics, collected by court staff across the province, comprise the largest source of statistical data used by the Ministry of the Attorney General. CSD is continuously developing its management information systems to:

- Improve the accuracy, scope and accessibility of court statistics
- · Present court statistics online
- Generate standard statistical reports
- Permit the production of customized reports
- Provide the basis for informed and strategic decision-making across the Ministry
- Provide data to assist courts in managing their caseloads

Managing Court Facilities

Investing in Court Facilities

Since 1996, Ontario has committed \$269M to the Courts Construction Program, which focuses on the consolidation of Superior and Ontario Courts of Justice. Court construction projects have been completed in Brampton, Cornwall, Hamilton, Owen Sound, Toronto (Civil/Family), Welland and Windsor, and are underway in Chatham, Brockville and Pembroke.

The Ministry's other capital investments have been smaller in scope and have focused on the rehabilitation and repair of existing court facilities to manage health, safety and security issues.

2002/03 Courts Construction Projects

Brockville: Consolidation of the Ontario and Superior Courts of Justice into a renovated five-courtroom heritage courthouse with an estimated cost of \$14.1M. Costs of \$5.3M were incurred in 2002-03.

Chatham: Consolidation of the Ontario and Superior Courts of Justice into a renovated six-courtroom facility with an estimated cost of \$12.9M. Costs of \$6.7M were incurred in 2002-03. Construction is scheduled for completion in spring 2003, with occupancy planned for summer 2003.

Owen Sound: Consolidation of the Ontario and Superior Courts of Justice into a newly constructed five-courtroom facility with an estimated cost of \$16.5M. Costs of \$5.6M were incurred in 2002-03. The new consolidated courthouse opened February 3, 2003.

Pembroke: Planned consolidation of the Ontario and Superior Courts of Justice into the existing historic courthouse at 297 Pembroke Street East. The anticipated cost of renovating this five-courtroom facility is expected to be over \$15 million.

Toronto: Closure of 80 The East Mall and opening of a new courthouse at 2201 Finch Avenue West. The new, 11-courtroom facility opened July 29, 2002, with improved in-custody security services added March 3, 2003. The total cost of construction was \$29M, with \$14.3M invested in 2002-03.





- Multi-Year Priorities
- Resource Needs
- Implementation Plans

The plan reflects the goals of front-line court managers and is a systematic approach to address identified areas for improvement with results-oriented strategies.

The Plan addresses human resources needs related to staff complements and staff training, and presents a basic facilities strategy for maintaining courthouses across the province. In addition, the Plan outlines CSD's specific technological commitments to support efficient case processing, to provide accurate management information and to contribute to the resolution of backlogs in criminal and child welfare proceedings.

The Planning Process

As a first step towards the development of the Plan, CSD convened a Strategic Planning Session for the Divisional Management Committee (DMC) in early January 2002. At this session, DMC explored two important preliminary issues: the role of efficiency and other values in determining court service standards and the relationship between CSD and other participants in the justice system.

The Strategic Planning Session was followed by a meeting of CSD managers, members of the judiciary and the bar and other experienced justice system participants, in May 2002. At this meeting, Divisional priorities and service standards were established and the key elements of the Five-Year Plan were developed.

Further consultation with the judiciary and CSD stakeholders was undertaken throughout 2002/03, and has resulted in the following edition of the Five-Year Plan. This Plan will be reviewed and amended annually, in consultation with the judiciary, the bar and other court users.

Appendix: Five-Year Trends in the Courts

Statistical Data 1998/99 – 2002/03 This set of data is different from that previously published annually by the Division. It reflects the trends which the Division is currently tracking and the questions most frequently asked by those who rely on our data.

The data previously published is currently being updated for the fiscal years 2001/02 and 2002/03. A revised version of this report will be available on the Ministry's Internet site by October 2003.

The Division has a number of initiatives under way to improve the quality, scope and accessibility of court statistical data and we look forward to being able to provide enhanced information as these initiatives are implemented.

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Appendix Glossary

CISS The Courts Input Statistics System (CISS) is a desktop computer system that reports monthly on

activities in the Superior Court of Justice (including Small Claims Court and the Family Court Branch)

and family cases in the Ontario Court of Justice.

Civil Civil data includes proceedings for all Motor Vehicle Act, Construction Lien Act and estates

proceedings and other civil proceedings in the Superior Court of Justice. It excludes small claims and

family matters.

Criminal Criminal data includes all offences under the Criminal Code, the Controlled Drugs and Substances

Act / Narcotics Control Act / Food and Drug Act and other federal offences by adults and young persons. (Note: In May 1997 the Narcotics Control Act and parts of the Food and Drug Act were repealed and replaced with the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act.) Ontario Court of Justice criminal data is collected by charge, whereas Superior Court of Justice criminal data is collected by indictment. On average, over the last five years, there were approximately 3.5 charges on each

Superior Court of Justice indictment.

Family Family data includes all Family Law Act, Children's Law Reform Act, Divorce Act, Child and Family

Services Act, Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Orders Act and other family cases.

ICON The Integrated Courts Offences Network (ICON) is an operational system that tracks charges filed at

the Ontario Court of Justice.

Small Claims Small Claims data includes all cases which fall within the jurisdiction of the Small Claims Court (i.e.

civil claims of \$10,000 or less, excluding claims under the Construction Lien Act and any other matter

within the exclusive jurisdiction of the Superior Court of Justice).
