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Message from the **Deputy Attorney General**

The Court Services Division is a large, operational Division within the Ministry of the Attorney General, with a broad and important mandate. The Division provides courts administrative services to the largest and busiest court system in Canada. At 183 court locations across the province, court staff provide public information and filing services at court counters, maintain court records, provide courtroom support for the judiciary, manage juries, deliver civil and family mediation programs and enforce court orders, among other services.

Quality customer service is a high priority for the Division, and this year the Division implemented an annual survey to assess client satisfaction with court counter services. The survey results consistently indicated high levels of client satisfaction across the province. Details on the survey are outlined in this report.

This success is attributable to the staff and management of the Division who are dedicated to serving the public by ensuring the high quality of Ontario's court services.

It is also founded on the strong collaborative working relationships that have developed between the Division and the judiciary, the bar and many other participants in the justice system. The Ministry is committed to respecting and building on these relationships.

The following pages provide details on the Division's achievements over the past year and outline the Division's commitments for the future. Forward by the Assistant Deputy Attorney General

I am pleased to present our Annual Report on the operations of the Court Services Division for the fiscal year April 1, 2004 to March 31, 2005. The Court Services Division is mandated to provide a modern and professional court service that supports accessible, fair, timely and effective justice services. The following pages outline some of the initiatives that the Division has undertaken this fiscal year to meet this mandate.

A central theme this year has been improving access to justice in Ontario. CSD introduced a fee waiver process in civil, small claims and family court matters, to ensure that low-income litigants are not denied access to justice due to their financial circumstances. Family Law Information Centres were expanded province-wide to improve access to information. The Division actively participated on Chief Justice McMurtry's Accessibility Committee and made investments to accommodate persons with disabilities. The use of video technology was expanded to ensure access to justice in remote communities, especially in Northern Ontario. Jury deliberation rooms were renovated to provide comfortable, ergonomic facilities for jury members as they perform their essential public service and new courthouse signage was installed to increase the visibility of court locations.

The Division also concentrated on identifying and modeling best practices and good management. The 2004 Divisional Learning Event provided an opportunity for court managers to share best practices for the criminal courts, and CSD began implementing new best

practices as part of the Criminal Case Management Protocol. The Division has been working in consultation with the judiciary and court users to develop measures by which to judge our performance, and has implemented our first annual customer satisfaction survey to help us better meet the needs of court users.

Effective communication was identified as essential to the Division, particularly given the large number of interdependent justice system stakeholders that interact with the courts on a daily basis. Our Divisional Management Committee met in October 2004 for a planning session on how to improve internal and external communications and this topic will be the focus of the next Divisional Learning Event planned for 2005.

Details of these, and many other Divisional initiatives, are outlined in this report. This report also includes our Five-Year Plan setting out our commitments for the future and detailed statistics on court activity for the past five years. I trust you will find this an informative overview of the various ways the Court Services Division is working to ensure high quality court services are provided to the public, the judiciary and our many stakeholders.

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Chapter 1

Introduction to the Court Services Division

Mission

The Ministry of the Attorney General is responsible for administering justice in Ontario. Within the Ministry, the Court Services Division (CSD) is responsible for the administration of the courts. CSD's mission is to provide a modern and professional court service that supports accessible, fair, timely and effective justice services.

Core Services

CSD's core services include:

Court Office Services

CSD provides court office services at 183 court locations across the province. Court staff schedule court cases at the direction of the judiciary, maintain court records and files, provide information to the public and facilitate the delivery of key justice programs including the Victim/Witness Program, the Bail Program, Domestic Violence Courts and Legal Aid.

Judicial and Courtroom Support

CSD provides administrative support to all judges of the Court of Appeal, the Superior Court of Justice and the Ontario Court of Justice and to justices of the peace. The Division also manages the jury system and provides courtroom support through court registrars, clerks, reporters, monitors and interpreters.

Mediation Programs

CSD manages the delivery of mediation services in the family and civil courts. Mandatory civil mediation is now part of the civil court process in Ottawa, Toronto and Windsor. As well, the Family Court branch of the Superior Court of Justice offers family mediation services on a voluntary basis across the province.

Enforcement Services

CSD administers the filing of writs of execution, enforces civil orders and manages the collection of fine and restitution revenues from the prosecution of criminal offences.


Highlights from the Opening of Courts

On January 5, 2005, Chief Justice McMurtry of the Court of Appeal presided with Chief Justice Smith of the Superior Court of Justice and Chief Justice Lennox of the Ontario Court of Justice at the province's Opening of Courts ceremony at the Superior Court of Justice at 361 University Avenue in Toronto. Attorney General Michael Bryant stressed the importance of strengthening public confidence in the justice system through transparency. As a step towards this goal, Minister Bryant announced the creation of a Panel on Justice and the Media, to bridge the gap between the media and the justice system and to discuss areas of mutual concern.

Regional Structure


For the purpose of providing court services, the Ministry of the Attorney General is organized into seven Court Services Division administrative regions. Each region is responsible for:

- Delivering local criminal, civil and family court services
- Maintaining records, files, exhibits and databases

- Providing judicial support services, including courtroom and administrative support
- · Managing juries
- Delivering civil and family mediation programs
- Enforcing court orders
- Managing fines, fees and trust funds
- Managing regional financial and human resources
- Identifying and coordinating regional facility plans
- Managing regional stakeholder communications
- Implementing divisional initiatives

Regional Directors

Each region is managed by a Director of Court Operations who reports to the Assistant Deputy Attorney General, Court Services Division.

Central East Regional Profile



A/Director of Court Operations Central East Region Lynn Wagner

Located geographically to the north and east of Toronto, the Central East Region serves the communities of York, Durham, Simcoe, Muskoka, Haliburton Northumberland, Peterborough and the City of Kawartha Lakes. The population growth rate in this region is among the highest in Canada.

In 2004/05, Central East conducted a review of computer

support within the Region. As a result, Court Services entered into a unique partnership with the Criminal Law Division, resulting in a more efficient distribution of workload and resources, as well as enhanced technology service for the judiciary and staff in CSD, the Criminal Law Division and the Victim/Witness Assistance Program.


A number of infrastructure improvements were completed in the Central East Region in 2004/05 to enhance service delivery. The construction of two new

courtrooms in Oshawa, the amalgamation of counter services in Newmarket, along with security enhancements to the Barrie courthouse are just a few examples of the improvements.

In April 2004, the Honourable Michael Bryant, Attorney General, inaugurated the opening of the Midland courthouse at a special sitting of the court. In December 2004, the Attorney General announced that the Durham Consolidated Courthouse Project would proceed with an expected completion date of winter 2008/09.

Several new additions were made to the Court Services management team and the Superior and Ontario Court benches over the last year including: a new Director of Court Operations, a new Manager of Court Operations in Simcoe/Muskoka, a new Supervisor in Bracebridge, three new Superior Court judges, two new Ontario Court judges and one new justice of the peace.

The Region also hosted the first Superior Court and Ontario Court Judges' Secretaries Conference in the fall of 2004.



Central West Regional Profile



Director of Court Operations Central West Region Joanne Spriet

The Central West Region has the highest population of the seven CSD regions, and includes the western Greater Toronto Area, Pearson International Airport and the communities around Lake Ontario and north of Lake Erie. The Region has a diverse multicultural population.


Courthouse renovations have been undertaken in Brampton and Orangeville to accommodate

caseload growth in the Region. In 2004/05, blitz courts were held in Brampton, Brantford and Milton to reduce court case backlog. In addition, Brantford was one of the pilot sites for CSD's Child Protection Backlog Initiative. During the past year, video remand courts and Weekend and Statutory Holiday (WASH) courts in Hamilton, St. Catharines and Brampton successfully handled bail matters on weekends for all locations in the Region. The Division's new case tracking system was successfully implemented in all court locations.

Also in 2004/05, the Region developed a succession management plan to ensure that capacity is available to deliver on the goals in the Division's Five-Year Plan. During this same period, the local management structure at the Peel courthouse was reorganized to meet growing operational needs.

As part of our continuing effort to promote public understanding of the justice system, Brampton and Milton hosted mock trials. Participants included law students from local high schools, members of the judiciary, lawyers and court staff.

The Director of Court Operations for the Region also serves as President of the Association of Canadian Court Administrators (ACCA). ACCA exists to promote innovation and foster collaboration, the sharing of knowledge and best practices to improve the Canadian court system and enhance the administration of justice.



East Regional Profile



Director of Court Operations East Region Tom Fagan

The East Region provides court services to 10 counties/united counties in eastern Ontario. The Region has a significant francophone population and regularly provides services in French. The East Region office is located in Canada's capital city, Ottawa.

During the past years, the East Region has experienced higher than average increases in court


activity, especially in the criminal practice area. These increases are partly attributable to population growth in the Ottawa area. The population in Ottawa continues to grow at a faster rate than the provincial average and is expected to be over one million by 2011.

In 2004/05, the Division's case tracking system was successfully implemented across the region. The Ottawa and Cornwall courthouses received additional judicial appointments, court services and Crown resources as part of the Justice Delay Reduction Initiative. Over the

next two years, court facilities in these communities will be upgraded.

In August 2004, the Ontario and Superior Courts of Justice moved into the consolidated Brockville Courthouse, and in December 2004, Pembroke Ontario and Superior Courts of Justice staff moved to an interim facility as part of the final Pembroke Consolidated Courthouse plan.

The Director of Court Operations for the East Region continues to serve as the elected chair of the Eastern Interministerial Council (EIC). The Council is comprised of Ontario Public Service (OPS) regional directors and senior managers who work together to achieve excellence in the delivery of public services within the East Region. One of the priorities in the EIC Business Plan for 2004/05 was Emergency Management and Business Continuity Planning through the Emergency Management Committee. OPS-wide initiatives such as Habitat for Humanity Ottawa Build, Dragon Boat Festival and United Way/Centraide Campaign continue to capture the commitment of staff.



Northeast Regional Profile



Director of Court Operations Northeast Region Paul Langlois

The Northeast Region includes some of the major urban centres in Ontario's north, as well as some of the smaller communities near James Bay. The Region comprises 40 percent of Ontario's land mass but is home to only 5 percent of its population. There are significant francophone and aboriginal populations in the Region and court services are regularly provided in French, Ojibway and Cree.

The video assessment hearings pilot project that was initiated in 2003/04 continued to be implemented in the Region during 2004/05. The aim of the project is to improve access to justice in remote areas, decrease scheduling wait times and reduce travel for hearings officers. Management and the judiciary are reviewing the possibility of expanding the use of video courts to the coastal community of Moosonee and enhancing video court capacity in Timmins.

In 2004/05, facilities projects were undertaken across the region. The cells upgrade project in Cochrane was completed; an intake office was created in North Bay; the Haileybury courthouse elevator project commenced with a scheduled completion in 2005/06; and renovations were completed to the Sudbury Video Remand court and intake office.

In 2005/06, the Northeast Region will participate in the Northern Recruitment Pilot Project, a government-wide human resources initiative that will provide northern managers with recruitment services. It is expected that this pilot project will significantly reduce the administrative burden associated with the recruitment process, allowing managers to focus their attention on the delivery of services and programs. The project will also be testing a new electronic human resources recruitment tool.

Northwest Regional Profile



Director of Court Operations Northwest Region Robert Gordon

The Northwest Region comprises 48 percent of Ontario's land mass but is home to only two percent of its population.

There are significant aboriginal populations in the Northwest Region, and court services are regularly provided in Ojibway and Cree.


The Region delivers court services at five base court locations, three

staffed satellite court locations and 32 un-staffed satellite court locations. Twenty-three of the satellite court locations are in communities that are accessible only by air. To provide community-centred services, court staff and members of the judiciary and the bar must travel extensively.

The Region's vast geography, remote locations and winter travel conditions present many program delivery challenges. The Northwest Region has been using video technology to help meet these challenges and to ensure that court services are accessible.

The completion of court video infrastructure has allowed the region to use video in new ways. Video conferencing is most frequently used for video bail remands. The Ontario and Superior Court judiciary have also used video technology in child protection matters, case conferences and motions.

The Region has also successfully connected the Kenora court to Keewaywin, a remote northern community, for a sentencing matter via video. This connection allowed the family, the community and the Chief to participate in the sentencing process. This successful demonstration will form the basis of future First Nations video partnerships to help resolve issues of access, particularly in family court matters.



Toronto Regional Profile



Director of Court Operations Toronto Region Susan Lee

The Toronto Region serves the City of Toronto. With a population of almost 2.5 million, the Toronto Region has the highest population density of the CSD regions. One in four immigrants to Canada settles in Toronto and the region is ethnically diverse.

The Toronto Region includes many high volume courts and key justice system participants, including: the Court of Appeal for Ontario; the


Offices of the Chief Justices; the Provincial Legislature; the offices of the Provincial Law Society; and many of the province's largest law firms. The Region also manages Ontario's first electronic courtroom for commercial and other non-jury civil matters.

In 2004/05, the Region made improvements to support timely and accessible justice services at the Court of Appeal. A review was initiated to update and improve

the *Criminal Appeal Rules* and the court developed a protocol in cooperation with Pro Bono Law Ontario to provide counsel to unrepresented litigants in civil appeals.

The Ontario Court of Justice family courts at 47
Sheppard Avenue East and 1911 Eglinton Avenue East began planning for their 2005/06 consolidation.
Substantial renovations to the facility at 47 Sheppard are underway to support the consolidation. As part of the family initiatives program, the courts have also established a pilot court and community liaison committee that is reviewing child protection issues.

Technology within the Region was upgraded in 2004/05 to provide capacity to support multiple counsel in large commercial matters. Enhancements to the electronic civil courtroom at 393 University Avenue were also completed.



West Regional Profile



Director of Court Operations West Region Len Griffiths

The West Region crosses three Superior Court judicial regions and is comprised of both large urban centers and rural farming areas. The region includes Sarnia and Windsor, both major border crossings between Canada and the United States. The volume of traffic from trucks and cross-border commuters generates a high number of traffic-related charges in this region.


The West Region also houses Ontario's Central Jury Office, which is responsible for managing the selection of jury panels for courts across the province.

Video technology is used extensively in the majority of court locations in the West Region, especially at the London courthouse where Weekend and Statutory Holiday (WASH) court matters are handled for the entire region.

Substantial renovations were undertaken in 2004/05 at the Superior Court of Justice courthouse in Windsor to improve general public areas and create a new small claims courtroom.

Also in 2004/05, the Justice Delay Reduction Initiative (JDRI) was fully implemented in the Kitchener courts to enhance criminal court capacity. Best practices were implemented to make the administrative processes more efficient and effective.

New Family Law Rules and the new Divisional case-tracking system were fully implemented in all court locations within the West Region. With the new case-tracking system, the court will be better able to govern the timeframes associated with the new Family Law Rules and will be able to track the progress of cases through the system.



Corporate Support

The CSD corporate offices are located at 720 Bay Street in Toronto. The corporate offices include the offices of the Assistant Deputy Attorney General, the Corporate Planning Branch, the Criminal Policy and Programs Branch, the Civil/Family Policy and Programs Branch and the Business Solutions Branch.

The Corporate Planning Branch is responsible for:

- Strategic planning
- Financial and workforce planning
- Providing management information, including court activity statistics
- Facilities planning
- Establishing Divisional performance measures and monitoring compliance with operational policies and business standards
- Coordinating public communications
- Acting as a liaison with municipal partners on *Provincial Offences Act* matters
- Establishing policy project teams to respond to justice system challenges

The Criminal Policy & Programs Branch is responsible for:

- Developing, implementing and managing legislative, regulatory and administrative initiatives with respect to the criminal justice system
- Providing policy and program support to criminal court staff
- Providing legal support and advice to senior management on criminal court issues
- Providing support to initiatives from the Ministry's Criminal Law Division
- Supporting the appointment process for judges, justices of the peace, commissioners and notaries public

The Civil/Family Policy & Programs Branch is responsible for:

- Developing, implementing and managing legislative, regulatory and administrative initiatives with respect to the civil and family justice system
- Providing policy and program support to civil and family court staff
- Providing legal support and advice to senior management on civil and family court issues
- Developing, implementing, and managing civil justice reform strategies to reduce cost and delay in the civil justice system
- · Managing family mediation and information services
- Participating on Federal/Provincial/Territorial Family Law Committees and the Family Rules Committee
- Negotiating and monitoring federal family justice funding

The Business Solutions Branch is responsible for:

- Developing, implementing and managing the CSD Strategic Information Technology Plan
- Developing, implementing, managing and supporting courts information technology systems
- Managing the acquisition of CSD information technology hardware and software
- Liaising with CSD branches and Justice Technology Services on new system requirements and enhancements to new systems

Corporate Directors

The Corporate Planning Branch, the Criminal Policy and Programs Branch, the Civil/Family Policy and Programs Branch and the Business Solutions Branch are managed by Corporate Directors who report to the Assistant Deputy Attorney General.

Chapter 2

Introduction to Ontario's Courts

Ontario's *Courts of Justice Act* provides the legislative framework for the province's court structure. The Act establishes the jurisdiction of each of the province's three courts: the Court of Appeal for Ontario, the Superior Court of Justice and the Ontario Court of Justice.

The Court of Appeal for Ontario

The Court of Appeal for Ontario is the highest court of record in the province. The Court of Appeal hears:

- Criminal appeals of indictable offences
- Civil appeals of final decisions of the Superior Court of Justice
- Appeals involving young persons
- Some appeals of decisions of the Divisional Court
- Inmate appeals (heard in Kingston, Ontario)

The Court of Appeal sits in Toronto at Osgoode Hall. The court is composed of a federally appointed Chief Justice of Ontario, an Associate Chief Justice of Ontario and 21 other judges. The Court of Appeal sits with either one or three judges depending on the appeal. Decisions of the Court of Appeal may be further appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada.

The Superior Court of Justice

The Superior Court of Justice hears:

- Criminal prosecutions of indictable offences
- Some criminal prosecutions involving young persons
- Summary conviction appeals from the Ontario Court of Justice
- Bail reviews
- Civil suits (Civil suits under \$10,000 are dealt with in Small Claims Court, a branch of the Superior Court.)
- Family law disputes involving divorce or property claims, child and spousal support, and custody and access claims (Where the Family Court branch of the Superior Court of Justice exists, the Superior Court hears all family matters.)

The Superior Court of Justice sits in 49 permanent court locations in Ontario. The court is led by a Chief Justice, an Associate Chief Justice, and Regional Senior Justices who oversee scheduling and judicial issues in their regions. Most of the judicial locations in Ontario also have a Local Administrative Justice who oversees the judicial administrative issues at that specific location.

Divisional Court

The Divisional Court is a branch of the Superior Court of Justice. The court hears:

- Appeals and reviews of decisions by government agencies, tribunals and boards
- Some civil appeals under \$25,000

The Divisional Court sits in various locations throughout the province in panels of three judges. The court includes the Chief Justice of the Superior Court of Justice, the Associate Chief Justice of the Superior Court of Justice and other judges appointed from the Superior Court of Justice.

Family Court

In some areas, the Family Court branch of the Superior Court of Justice provides a single court for all family matters, including divorce, division of property, child protection, adoption, child and spousal support and child custody and access matters. Special services provided by the Family Court include Family Law Information Centres, Supervised Access Centres, Mediation Services and Parent Information Sessions.

The Family Court has been established in 17 municipalities across the province. Where the Family Court does not exist, jurisdiction over family law matters is divided between the Superior Court of Justice and the Ontario Court of Justice.

Small Claims Court

The Small Claims Court is a branch of the Superior Court of Justice. The court hears civil actions for claims up to \$10,000. While there are some permanently appointed Small Claims Court judges, the court is usually presided over by senior lawyers who are appointed to act as deputy judges.

The Ontario Court of Justice

All criminal cases are commenced in the Ontario Court of Justice, and over 95 percent of such cases are completed in this court. Ontario Court judges and justices of the peace sit in over 175 locations across the province. Judges of the Court hear:

- Criminal prosecutions of indictable and summary conviction offences
- Most criminal prosecutions involving young persons
- Provincial Offences Act appeals from decisions of justices of the peace
- Child protection applications, family law disputes involving custody, access and support, and adoption applications, in areas where the Family Court branch of the Superior Court of Justice does not exist

Justices of the Peace hear:

- · Bail hearings
- · Prosecutions of provincial offences

The court is led by a Chief Justice, an Associate Chief Justice, an Associate Chief Justice/Coordinator of Justices of the Peace, Regional Senior Justices and Regional Senior Justices of the Peace. Most of the judicial locations in Ontario also have a Local Administrative Justice who oversees the judicial aspects of the court at that specific location.

To address delay in the most critically backlogged sites in Ontario, CSD, the Criminal Law Division, the Ontario Victim Services Secretariat, the judiciary, Legal Aid Ontario, the Police and Correctional Services began implementing the Justice Delay Reduction Initiative (JDRI) in 2003.

In 2004/05, CSD completed the hiring of over 116 new full-time court staff to support the 15 new Ontario Court of Justice judicial appointments created under the project. The Division continued an intensive review of administrative practices at the 10 JDRI sites, to ensure that criminal court administrative processes are consistent, efficient and effective. Best practices have been implemented and their impact is being closely monitored.

Blitz Courts

CSD also works with the Criminal Law Division and the judiciary to establish blitz courts across the province to reduce the backlog of criminal cases in the Ontario Court of Justice. Each participating court receives additional Crown attorneys and judges for up to six months. In 2004/05, improvements were seen in Barrie, Halton, Peterborough, Coburg, Lindsay and Brampton. Additional sites for 2005 may include North York, Scarborough and Ottawa.

Best Practices in Criminal Courts

In 2004/05, CSD focused on best practices in criminal courts. This issue was central to the Divisional Learning Event in May 2004, attended by court managers and senior staff from across the province. Speakers included Associate Chief Justice Wake, Deputy Attorney General Murray Segal and John McMahon, then the Assistant Deputy Attorney General for Criminal Law.

Criminal Case Management Protocol

A Criminal Case Management Protocol was approved by the 2004 Justice Summit and is now in the process of implementation. The protocol is a compendium of best practices intended "to promote efficient movement of cases through the court while preserving and promoting the rights of all persons charged with criminal offences to due process in a timely manner." (For more information on the Justice Summit, see page 20.)

Electronic Warrants

The Division is working collaboratively with the Court on the development of a proposal for a new electronic warrant process. This process could expedite access to a justice of the peace for search warrant purposes and would remove many of the cumbersome aspects of the current fax-based telewarrant process.

Justice of the Peace Reform

The Division is currently reviewing the appointment process for Justices of the Peace, to ensure that the best candidates with the best qualifications are appointed in a fair and transparent manner.

Training and Support for Criminal Court Staff

CSD continually develops staff support materials in response to new legislation and legislative amendments. In 2004/05, the Division prepared instructional materials for court staff in response to the new *Sex Offender Information Registration Act* and *Criminal Code* amendments regarding preliminary inquiries. The Division is also finalizing revised administrative procedure manuals for criminal court staff, which will be posted in 2005 on the Divisional Intranet site.

The Civil Courts

Changes to the Civil Rules

The Civil Rules Committee is a statutory committee composed of representatives from the judiciary, the bar and the Ministry of the Attorney General. The Committee has jurisdiction to make rules regarding procedures in all civil proceedings. In 2004/05, the Committee introduced a new venue rule prescribing where proceedings and interlocutory motions are heard and made Rule 75.1 permanent prescribing a system of mandatory mediation for estates, trusts and substitute decisions cases in Toronto and Ottawa.

Civil Case Management

Also in 2004/05, the Civil Rules Committee introduced Rule 78 governing civil case management in Toronto. Under case management, the court supervises the progress of cases to promote timely resolution.

Case management under Rule 77 has been in place in Ottawa and Toronto since 1997, and in Windsor since 2003. As of December 31, 2004, Toronto cases are now subject to the new Rule 78, under which case management procedures have been modified as follows:

- New mediation session timelines have been set. In general, mediation must occur within 90 days once the case is set down for trial.
- Case conferences can only occur in limited situations.
- The registrar will not automatically schedule a settlement conference. Parties must file a trial record to set the matter for trial.
- New processes for status notices and hearings have been developed.

Mandatory Mediation

Ontario's Mandatory Mediation Program is designed to help litigants settle their cases early in the litigation process, thereby saving them time and expense. As of January 2005, mandatory mediation has resulted in a full and partial settlement rate of 49 percent, exceeding the Ministry's target of 40 percent.

Small Claims Court

In 2004/05, the Small Claims Court Rules Subcommittee of the Civil Rules Committee completed its review of the *Small Claims Court Rules*. The Subcommittee also considered province-wide mandatory settlement conferences and automatic dismissal timelines. It is anticipated that the Subcommittee will submit its final proposal for new *Small Claims Court Rules* to the Civil Rules Committee in 2005 and that the new rules will come into effect in 2006.

National Conference on Civil Justice Reform

In May 2006, the Canadian Forum on Civil Justice will be hosting a national conference in Montreal titled *Into The Future: The Agenda for Civil Justice Reform.* The conference will provide a national update on civil justice reform initiatives, an opportunity to evaluate these initiatives and forums for discussing potential new reforms and barriers to change. Debra Paulseth, Assistant Deputy Attorney General, Court Services Division, is Chair of the Conference Committee and the Division is working to develop the conference program.

The Family Courts

Expansion of the Family Law Rules

The Family Rules Committee is a statutory committee composed of representatives of the judiciary, the bar and the Ministry of the Attorney General, with jurisdiction to make rules regarding procedure in Ontario's family courts.

In 2004/05, the Committee supported the expansion of the *Family Law Rules* to all family law cases in the Superior Court of Justice. The expansion of the rules took effect on July 1, 2004, and has resulted in a single set of court rules for all trial level courts that hear family cases. The rules promote a consistent approach to family law cases across the province.

In order to implement the new rules, CSD developed instructional materials and delivered training sessions to court staff across the province. Divisional staff also developed educational materials, participated in province-wide training programs for the bar and law clerks and created user-friendly guides for members of the public involved in family disputes.

Expansion of Family Law Information Centres

Family Law Information Centres provide free public information, publications, videos and other resource materials on issues related to separation, divorce and other family matters. In 2004, CSD expanded the Centres province-wide to coincide with the expansion of the *Family Law Rules*. The majority of new sites are located in the northern regions.

Family Court Judicial Leadership

At the end of 2004, the Honourable Madam Justice Mary Lou Benotto resigned from her positions as Senior Judge of the Family Court and chair of the Family Rules Committee. Justice Benotto's strong and effective leadership and clear vision for the Family Court will be missed. The Honourable Mr. Justice David Aston has been appointed as Senior Judge of the Family Court, and the Honourable Madam Justice Janet Simmons of the Ontario Court of Appeal has been appointed as the chair of the Family Rules Committee.

Client Satisfaction with Services

Client satisfaction surveys for 2004/05 indicate a 99.75 percent satisfaction rate with family mediation services, a 100 percent satisfaction rate with parent information sessions and a 98.75 percent satisfaction rate with Family Law Information Centres.

Child Protection Backlog Steering Committee

The Child Protection Backlog Steering Committee was formed following the 2002 Justice Summit to address delays in child protection cases. (For more information on the Justice Summit, see page 20.)

In 2004/05, the Child Protection Backlog Steering Committee's Northern Issues Working Group completed its report on child protection issues in satellite and remote courts in Northern Ontario. Implementation of the recommendations, including increased use of video conferencing, is underway.

The Steering Committee also created two new working groups on child protection mediation and education. The Child Protection Mediation Working Group conducted research and prepared recommendations on the use of mediation in child protection cases to divert cases from the courts. The Education Working Group organized two conferences in spring 2004 on child protection issues for parents' counsel through the Law Society of Upper Canada. The conferences were held in Toronto to an audience of over 300 each, and were available provincewide through an interactive learning network. In the fall of 2004, the Education Working Group also held joint training sessions on child protection for Legal Aid Ontario supervisory duty counsel, Office of the Children's Lawyer panel lawyers and counsel from children's aid societies.

In September 2004, the Steering Committee was renamed the Family Courts Steering Committee and began focusing its efforts on the issue of assessments under section 54 of the *Child and Family Services Act*. An Assessments Working Group is being established to identify issues and develop recommendations on measures to reduce delay.

Access to Justice

Court Accessibility for Persons with Disabilities During the 2005 Opening of Courts, Chief Justice McMurtry announced the creation of a joint committee, including members of the bench, bar and the Ministry of the Attorney General, to improve the accessibility of the justice system to persons with disabilities. The Court Services Division is an active participant on this committee and is committed to providing services that

support accessible justice for all members of the public,

In 2004/05, CSD improved the court address database on the Ministry of the Attorney General website, indicating barrier-free court locations and providing a contact number for court users to call at each location to receive assistance. The CSD Intranet system was upgraded and public forms, guides and brochures continued to be created in compliance with accessibility standards. The Ontario Realty Corporation developed and released new accessibility standards for government facilities, in consultation with persons living with disabilities. All current and future courthouse construction projects must comply with these standards and the standards must be considered for all lease renewals.

Fee Waiver

As of January 28, 2005, economically disadvantaged litigants can apply for a fee waiver for court and enforcement fees. The fee waiver applies to fees payable under the *Administration of Justice Act* for civil, small claims and family court matters, appeals and the enforcement of court or tribunal orders. The new fee waiver ensures that low-income Ontarian's are not denied access to justice due to their financial circumstances.

Video Conferencing

Northern Ontario's remote locations present many program delivery challenges. CSD has been using video technology to help meet these challenges and to ensure that court services are accessible. Video conferencing has been successfully used for bail remands, assessment hearings, sentencing hearings, child protection matters, case conferences and motions.

In 2004/05, the Division expanded the use of video conferencing by establishing linkages between the courts video network and a federal government/First Nations partnership using the high-speed Northern Ontario Network (KNET). This linkage allows individuals in remote and northern communities to participate in court hearings via video.

Jury Deliberation Rooms

CSD continues to renovate jury deliberation rooms in courthouses across the province, to provide improved accessibility services and an ergonomic and comfortable environment.

Courthouse Signage

CSD began replacing courthouse exterior signage to increase visibility. The new signs conform to CSD signage standards, Ontario Public Services visual identity requirements and government accessibility criteria. Where possible, the signs are illuminated.

Working with Our Justice Partners

Provincial Offences Support to Municipalities

The *Provincial Offences Act* (POA) governs non-*Criminal Code* offences, such as parking, traffic and liquor licence violations and offences under the *Ontario Health and Safety Act* and the *Environmental Protection Act*. Municipalities are responsible for administering POA offences and prosecuting selected POA offences. The province is responsible for prosecuting serious POA offences and for the quality of the justice system as a whole.

As part of its oversight and monitoring role, CSD conducts regularly scheduled audits of selected POA courts. In 2004/05, CSD audited 15 municipal POA courts across the province, including: Dryden, Fort Frances, Kawartha Lakes, Kenora, Kingston, London, L'Orignal, Napanee, Newmarket, Richmond Hill, Owen Sound, Peterborough, Sault Ste.Marie, St. Thomas and Woodstock.

CSD also reviews semi-annual financial and performance reports from all municipalities that administer POA courts. In 2004/05, the Division developed additional monitoring mechanisms in consultation with the municipal courts, including monthly reports of POA workload and financial data. The Division also established the POA Table with representation from the ministry, municipal courts and the judiciary to facilitate communication, collaboration and consultation.

Ontario Justice International

Ontario Justice International (OJI) is the Ministry of the Attorney General's international consulting service. By drawing upon the Ontario government's experience operating one of the largest justice systems in North America, OJI consults with foreign governments on the design and operation of impartial, accessible and efficient justice systems.

As part of OJI, CSD welcomed New Zealand's General Manager for Fine Collections for two days in January 2005. The visit focused on effective mechanisms for the enforcement of criminal fines, and was part of a larger international tour by New Zealand to learn best practices and understand the variables affecting collection rates.

Also in 2004/05, CSD met with international delegations from China, Jamaica and the Philippines, to provide information on the civil justice system in Ontario and to discuss Ontario's case management and mandatory mediation programs.

Justice Summit

The Deputy Attorney General and the Chief Justices of the Superior and Ontario Courts of Justice co-hosted annual Justice Summits in 2002, 2003 and 2004 to address growing backlogs in criminal and child protection cases.

As a result of these meetings, committees have been established to investigate and report on:

- Bail and remand issues
- Criminal case scheduling improvements
- · Initiatives to address child protection backlogs

The committees have been central to the development of best practices to improve the efficiency of bail and remand, the Criminal Case Management Protocol (see page 16), recommendations to address child protection matters in remote northern locations, research on the use of mediation in child protection cases and training and educational conferences on child protection law (see page 18).

The Division will continue working within the Ministry and with the judiciary to support the ongoing work of these committees and host future Justice Summit meetings.

Customer Service

Client Satisfaction Survey

In 2004, CSD developed and implemented an annual client satisfaction survey for use in the courts across Ontario to fulfill one of the commitments under our Five-Year Plan.


The survey focused on client satisfaction with court counter services for the civil, family and Small Claims Court practice areas. It did not pertain to criminal court services.

One large, one medium and one small court location were chosen from each of the seven CSD regions for participation in the survey (see note below for a list of locations).

The surveys were administered by interview after clients had accessed services at the court counters. For questions 1 through 7, clients were asked to rank their agreement with the statement, on a scale of 1 (strongly disagree) to 5 (strongly agree). Clients were also asked to rank the importance of each aspect of service delivery on a scale of 1 (not at all important) to 5 (very important). For questions 8 through 10, clients were asked to rank their satisfaction on a scale of 1 (very dissatisfied) to 5 (very satisfied). Clients were also asked if, in the end, they got what they needed.

In total, 3,667 surveys were collected from across the province. The survey results consistently indicated high levels of client satisfaction across the province for all practice areas and locations. Respondents ranked fair treatment, knowledgeable and competent staff and professional and courteous staff as the most important aspects of service delivery. These aspects also received the highest scores for client satisfaction.





Note: Surveys were conducted in Thunder Bay, Kenora, Sudbury, North Bay, Gore Bay, Ottawa, Belleville, Perth, Newmarket, Oshawa, Lindsay, 393 University and 47 Sheppard in Toronto, Hamilton, Welland, Simcoe, London, Chatham and St. Thomas. There was no court location in the Northwest Region that qualified as large, and there was no court location in the Toronto Region that qualified as small.

Managing Court Facilities

Since 1996, Ontario has committed \$269M to the courts construction program, which focuses on the consolidation of Superior and Ontario Courts of Justice. New courthouses have been constructed in Brampton, Cornwall, Hamilton, Owen Sound, Toronto (Civil/Family), Welland, Windsor, Brockville and Chatham. The planned Pembroke court consolidation project remains a Ministry priority in the 2005/06 Infrastructure Plan.

The Division works in partnership with the Ministry's Facilities Management Branch to manage courthouse facilities across the province. The Facilities Management Branch is responsible for major infrastructure planning and controllership, leasing administration and coordination services, including project planning, tendering, design and construction. Since 2002, CSD has managed courthouse renovation projects under \$50,000. CSD facilitates consultation with the judiciary, Crowns, police and other courthouse users during project planning and implementation, to ensure that the needs of stakeholders are addressed.

New Courthouses

Durham: On March 31, 2005, the Ontario Realty Corporation issued a new Request for Qualifications to identify potential bidders to construct a consolidated courthouse in Durham by using an alternative financing model. The courthouse will consist of 38 judicial hearing rooms, will be approximately 350,000 square feet and is expected to be completed by winter 2008/09.

Pembroke: The Ontario and Superior Courts of Justice in Pembroke will be consolidated and moved into a newly constructed courthouse consisting of six courtrooms. The estimated cost of this project is \$23M and it is expected to be completed by summer 2007. In December 2004, the Pembroke Ontario Court of Justice was relocated to an interim site on Agnes Street. The estimated cost for the interim building is \$2.2M.

Brockville: The government invested \$15.1M to consolidate the Ontario Court of Justice with the historic Superior Court of Justice courthouse. The renovated and expanded five-courtroom heritage courthouse began operations on August 23, 2004.

Investment in Existing Courthouses

Justice Delay Reduction Initiative: As part of the Ministry's Justice Delay Reduction Initiative (JDRI) to reduce the number of criminal cases in the Ontario courts, the Ministry invested \$12.0M in 2004/05 to provide additional space in various court locations. The additional space will include new courtrooms, holding cells and facilities to accommodate the judiciary, Crowns, support staff, victim services, duty counsel and court administration staff.

Orangeville: The expansion of the Orangeville courthouse within the adjacent county building is underway to accommodate caseload growth and changes in program delivery. The Ministry has identified this facility as a priority project for infrastructure funding, involving the acquisition of over 7,500 square feet to build two additional courtrooms and ancillary space. By the end of construction, the Ministry expects to have invested a total of \$6.55M, plus an additional \$730,000 that was invested in 2004/05 as part of the JDRI initiative. Estimated completion is for fall 2005/06.

Holding Cell Initiative: In order to comply with the Youth Criminal Justice Act and to address overcrowding and health and safety issues, the Ministry invested \$2.5M in 2004/05 to improve holding cells and related areas for in-custody persons in courthouses across the province. The Ministry intends to continue improvements to holding cells in 2005/06.

Ongoing Repair and Rehabilitation

In addition to these projects, the Ministry allocated \$8.6M in 2004/05 for the ongoing repair and rehabilitation of facilities to manage health, safety and security issues.

Modernizing Service Delivery

Civil/Family Court Case Tracking System

CSD has developed an automated court case tracking system to more effectively manage civil, family, Small Claims Court, Divisional Court and Superior Court criminal cases. The system provides extensive user-friendly features including electronic scheduling and time standard tracking. Version 1 was rolled-out to the final 55 sites this year, completing implementation province-wide to 83 total sites.

WRITS System

The WRITS System is used in 49 enforcement offices across the province to maintain an index of writs of execution, in accordance with the *Executions Act.* The system captures data pertaining to the creation, updating, withdrawal and re-filing of writs.

In 2004/05, with a private sector partner, the WRITS System was redeveloped to be accessible via the Internet. Pilot testing was successfully completed in three enforcement offices. Implementation is planned for 2005/06.

Estates System

The Estates System is a web-enabled application that allows estates office staff to enter and retrieve local estates court data and electronically submit applications. The Estates System is used in each of the 49 Superior Court of Justice locations across the province.

In 2004/05, a public access module of the application was developed and tested in the Toronto Region. This enhancement is expected to improve customer service by allowing the public to easily perform name searches without waiting in line. Implementation is planned for 2005/06.

Planning for the Future

Court Services Five-Year Plan

Following the initial development of a Five-Year Plan in 2002/03, CSD continues to focus on public service and innovation. CSD is in the process of establishing measures by which to judge its success in achieving its goals in consultation with staff, our justice sector partners, the judiciary and court users. See Appendix A of this report for the updated 2004/05 edition of the CSD Five-Year Plan.

Understanding Trends through Management Information

CSD statistics, collected by court staff across the province, comprise the largest source of statistical data used by the Ministry of the Attorney General. CSD continues to develop its management information systems to improve the accuracy and scope of court statistics and to support planning, decision-making and performance reporting. See Appendix B of this report for court statistics over the past five years.

The Division continues to work with the judiciary, court users and staff to explore and explain statistical trends in court activity. CSD has developed a new standard statistical report to increase the accessibility of court statistics and the transparency of the justice system. CSD plans to post the reports quarterly on the Ministry of the Attorney General Internet site.





Mission and Business Goals

Mission

The Court Services Division mission is to provide a modern and professional court service that supports accessible, fair, timely and effective justice services.

Business Goals

Timely and Efficient Case Processing

- Court office resources and fully staffed, fully functional courtrooms are available as needed.
- Courtroom technology supports efficient case processing.
- Electronic case tracking permits continuous monitoring of case volumes, case flow and dispositions.
- Court filing and data entry are consistent, accurate and up-to-date at all court offices.
- Mediation services are available to promote early resolution of civil and domestic family cases.
- Court rules and procedures promote timely resolution of cases and reduce unnecessary appearances and costs.
- The Division works collaboratively with the judiciary, the bar and justice sector partners to eliminate case backlogs.

Accessible Services

- Barriers to court are identified and reduced or eliminated.
- Information services are easily available to the public.
- Self-help information to support unrepresented litigants is provided to enable access to Family Court and Small Claims Court.
- Technology enables improved access to court information, files and schedules and remote court appearances by parties and witnesses.
- Access to court documents, files and databases is governed by a legal and policy framework.
- An effective communications strategy is in place to inform court users of changes in policies and practices.

Consistent High-Quality Services

- A professional, trained court workforce provides consistent, knowledgeable, courteous services at court counters and offices, high quality courtroom and administrative support to the judiciary and effective enforcement services.
- Specialized court services are provided where appropriate.
- Electronic links between information systems support justice sector goals.
- The Division has effective partnerships with the business communities and other external agencies for the delivery of some services.
- The Division participates in projects to provide justice services and expertise to the international community.
- Head Office and regional staff collaborate on the development and implementation of new programs and policies.
- Collaborative working relationships exist with municipalities, the judiciary and the bar, Justice Sector partners, other ministries, agencies and other Ministry of the Attorney General divisions.
- The Division has a Federal/ Provincial/ Territorial strategy in place.
- The Division has links with external agencies to identify emerging issues and best practices and to improve the analysis of court data.
- Efficient file and record management practices are in place at all court offices.
- Jury process and accommodations encourage participation in juries.
- The Division participates in broader legislative and policy reviews aimed at improving court services and processes.
- Enforcement services are effective and timely.

Accountable and Effective Decision-Making

- The Division's Five-Year Plan provides multi-year strategic direction on Divisional priorities.
- Client satisfaction with services is continuously monitored through public complaints protocols and client satisfaction surveys.
- The Division meets all Quality Service Standards.
- The Division has quality assurance standards and practices in place.
- Local practices and programs, pilot programs, and test pilots are evaluated and assessed for province-wide application.
- Provincial support, monitoring and oversight ensures that municipal courts deliver Provincial Offences Act court services in accordance with legal requirements, Ministry standards and the terms of the POA Transfer Agreement.
- An Operational Plan is published at the beginning of each fiscal year to assess upcoming challenges, risks, and the financial outlook, and to identify and track program commitments throughout the year.
- Management information reports are available to the Division, MAG, the judiciary and the public, to support ongoing program reviews and the analysis of case processing trends, resource allocation decisions, client satisfaction with services.
- An Annual Report is published at the end of each fiscal year to report on case trends, Divisional achievements, and other developments affecting the courts.
- All programs are regularly evaluated.

Efficient Resource Management

- Resource models provide an objective basis for assessing courtroom and court office staffing needs, the judicial and justice of the peace complement for the Ontario Court of Justice, regional allocations and private/public costs of litigation.
- Divisional finances are managed according to Management Board standards and policies, and are tracked monthly to ensure the Division operates within its allocation.
- Operational and financial risks are identified early and are effectively managed.
- Strategies are in place to review fees on a regular basis, and to generate new fee revenue where appropriate.
- Policies are in place to support effective collection of unpaid fines and estreated bail.
- The Division works with the Facilities Management Branch to effectively manage court facilities and to develop a multi-year infrastructure strategy plan for future courthouse projects.
- The Division maintains an effective document management system.

Meeting our Goals

Performance Measures

The Division has been working in consultation with the judiciary and court users to develop measures by which to judge its success in meeting its goals. Measures developed to date are:

Timely and Efficient Case Processing

- Percent of customers whose default judgments were issued within 5 business days (civil and SCC). (Monthly audit instituted December 1, 2004. Results to be reported in 2005/06.)
- Percent of customers whose certificates of appointment of estate trustee were issued within 15 business days. (Monthly audit instituted December 1, 2004. Results to be reported in 2005/06.)
- 40% of civil cases settled (full and partial) through the mediation process. (50% full and partial settlement rate achieved.)
- 60% of family cases settled (full and partial) through the mediation process. (79% full and partial settlement rate achieved.)

Consistent, High Quality Services

- Percent of customers satisfied with the counter services (civil, SCC and family). (Survey implemented in 19 representative locations, collecting 3,667 responses. Positive results indicate high levels of satisfaction.)
- Percent of customers with single filings whose maximum waiting time for counter service is 20 minutes or less (civil, SCC and family). (Quarterly audit instituted December 1, 2004. Results to be reported in 2005/06.)
- 80% of customers satisfied with Family Mediation Services. (Satisfaction rate over 80%.)
- Comply 100% with telephone standards: staff answer telephone calls by 3rd ring; forward phones to voicemail when not available; return all calls within one business day; and do not redirect calls more than once. (Standards met.)
- Comply 100% with correspondence standards: staff reply to all correspondence within 15 business days. (Standards met.)

The Division initially intended to develop measures for each of its key goals. This approach mirrored that previously taken by the US National Center for State Courts (NCSC), an international leader in court innovation. The NCSC developed over 60 measures that were tested and demonstrated in 12 state courts. However, the results of the pilot projects were unsatisfactory. Many of the courts found that there were far too many indicators and that they were, consequently, unable to implement them. The NCSC therefore terminated the program.

NCSC Courtools

NCSC has now developed 10 Courtools by which to assess performance.

- Access and Fairness: Ratings of court users on the court's accessibility and its treatment of customers in terms of fairness, equality and respect.
- 2. **Time to Disposition**: Percent of cases resolved within established timeframes.
- 3. **Age of Active Pending Caseload:** Percent of cases pending for longer than established standard.
- Clearance Rates: The number of outgoing cases as a percentage of the number of incoming cases. Trial Date Certainty: number of trials held on first date they are scheduled.
- 5. **Trial Date Certainty:** The average number of times cases scheduled for trials are rescheduled before they are heard.
- Reliability and Integrity of Case Files: Percent of files that can be retrieved within established time standards and that meet established standards for completeness.
- Collection of Monetary Penalties: Percent of total fines, fees, restitution and costs payments collected and distributed within established timelines.
- 8. **Jury Yield and Utilization**: Percent of total prospective jurors selected and utilized.
- Court Workforce Strength: Rates knowledge, understanding, commitment, motivation and preparedness of court employees against established benchmarks.
- 10. **Cost per case:** Used as comparison within and between courts; rather than measurement, is a diagnostic tool.

CSD is reviewing the Courtools and the experience of the NCSC to determine whether our approach to developing measures should be re-thought.

Meeting our goals will also require that the Division put new and better services and processes in place. These improvements, to be implemented over the course of the Five-Year Plan, and our progress to date, are set out on the following pages.

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Appendix Glossary

ICON The Integrated Courts Offences Network (ICON) is an operational system that tracks criminal

charges filed at the Ontario Court of Justice.

CISS The Courts Input Statistics System (CISS) is a desktop computer system that reports monthly on

court activities in the Superior Court of Justice and family cases in the Ontario Court of Justice.

Criminal Criminal data includes all offences under the Criminal Code of Canada, Controlled Drugs and

Substances Act / Narcotics Control Act / Food and Drug Act and other federal offences by adults and young persons. Ontario Court of Justice criminal data is collected by charge, whereas Superior Court of Justice criminal data is collected by indictment. On average, over the last five years, there were approximately 3.6 charges on each Superior Court of Justice indictment.

Civil Civil data includes proceedings for all *Motor Vehicle Act*, *Construction Lien Act* and estates

proceedings and other civil proceedings in the Superior Court of Justice. It excludes small claims

and family matters.

Small Claims Small Claims data includes all cases which fall within the jurisdiction of the Small Claims Court

(i.e. civil claims of \$10,000 or less, excluding claims under the Construction Lien Act and any

other matter within the exclusive jurisdiction of the Superior Court of Justice).

Family Family data includes all Family Law Act, Children's Law Reform Act, Divorce Act, Child and

Family Services Act, Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Orders Act and other family cases.
