Collective Bargaining Highlights

Data for the months of March, June, September and December include quarterly information

AGREEMENTS SETTLED IN MAY

- ▶ In May, 48 collective agreements were ratified, each covering 200 or more employees. These agreements covered a total of 21,635 employees, 60% of whom were in the public sector (13,088), with the majority in health and social services (5,430), followed by education and related services (4,782).
- The overall average annual increase in base wage rates in May was 2.9%, a slight decrease from 3% reported in the previous month. In the public sector, 32 agreements were settled for an average annual wage increase of 3.1%, also down from 3.2% last month. In the private sector, 16 agreements were settled with an average annual wage increase of 2.7%, an increase from 2.4% in the previous month.
- Major settlements in May included a three-year agreement between Inco Ltd. and the United Steelworkers, covering 3,132 employees, for an average annual wage increase of 3.4%, including COLA. The City of London and CUPE settled a four-year agreement providing 550 outside employees with an average annual wage increase of 3%. The Metro Toronto Convention Centre and Labourers reached a four-year agreement for 753 employees for an average annual wage increase of 3.2%. Trillium Lakelands DSB ratified two threeyear agreements with CUPE and a 48-month agreement with the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario. The agreements provide

236 custodian/maintenance, 781 office and educational assistants, and 400 elementary occasional teachers with average annual wage increases ranging from 2.4% to 2.5%. Durham DSB and ETFO representing 965 occasional teachers settled a 48-month agreement, for an average annual wage increase of 4.3%. In the health care sector, 10 agreements covering 3,362 employees were reached as part of the settlement between Participating Hospitals and OPSEU.The centrally negotiated settlement provided an average annual wage increase of 3.1%.

Selected settlement summaries*

Inco Ltd. and United Steel, Paper and Forestry, Rubber, Manufacturing, Energy, Allied Industrial and Service Workers International Union, Local 6500 (3,132 employees)

three-year renewal agreement effective June 1, 2006, expiring May 31, 2009

- wages increases include \$0.60 in the first year, \$0.20 in each of the second and third years, in addition to annual COLA roll-ins, and a signing bonus of \$4,000 for eligible employees
- expanded bereavement and improved pension and vacation leave provisions
- increases in life, accidental death and dismemberment, and weekly indemnity insurance plans, as well as pre-72 widows' annual payments
- guaranteed no layoffs provision
- Language Review Committee to be established to review and upate current language in the collective agreement
- an Integration Appendix has been established to set out principles for resolving issues that may arise during integration and intermingling, should Inco acquire Falconbridge Ltd.

The Corporation of the City of London and Canadian Union of Public Employees, Local 107 (550 outside employees)

a four-year renewal agreement effective January 1, 2006, expiring December 31, 2009

- general wage increases of 3% in each year
- increases in life insurance and health care benefits coverage
- · improvements to early retiree benefits

Participating Hospitals and Ontario Public Service Employees Union, various locals

10 agreements covering 3,362 paramedical and professional employees included in a jointly bargained Memorandum of Settlement for 43 hospitals (involving a total of 45 three-year renewal agreements covering 6,588 paramedical and professional employees) effective April 1, 2006, expiring March 31, 2009

- general wage increases of 3% in both the first and second years, and 3.25% in the final year; retention payments for eligible Dietitians
- increases in shift and weekend premiums and vacation leave for eligible employees
- improvements to health care benefits, job security provisions and various leaves

Metro Toronto Convention Centre Corporation and Labourers' International Union of North America, Local 506 (753 outside employees)

a four-year renewal agreement effective January 1, 2006, expiring December 31, 2009

- general wage increases of 3.4% in the first year and 3.2% in each of the second, third and fourth years; Event Services will receive an additional \$0.25 an hour
- modification to number of hours of work required to achieve full-time or part-time status
- improvements to health care benefits, and bereavement and vacation leave provisions
- increases in night shift and other premiums' rates, meals, uniforms, safety, and seasonal shoe allowances
