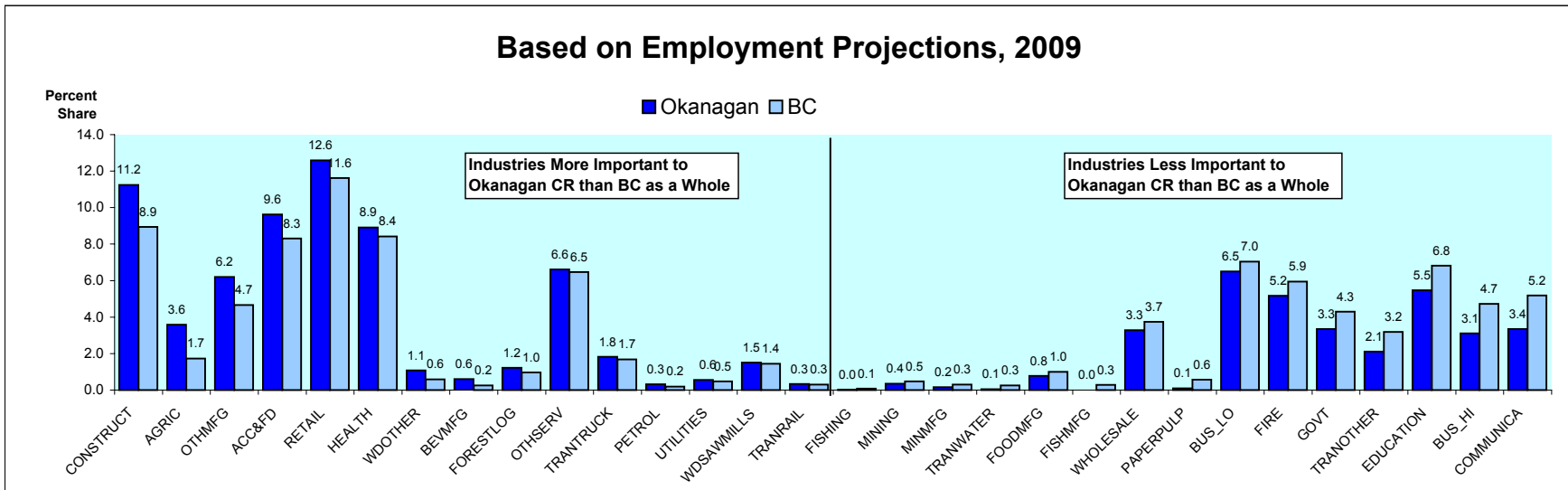
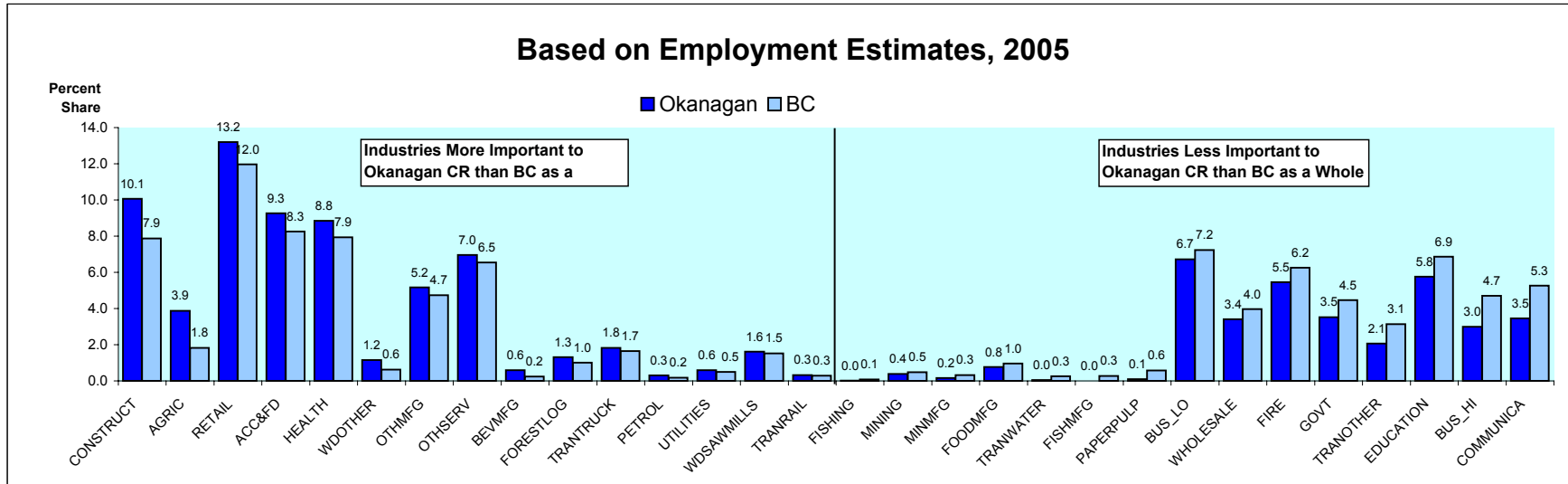

Ranked by the Percentage Point Difference in the Industry Share in the College Region Compared with BC



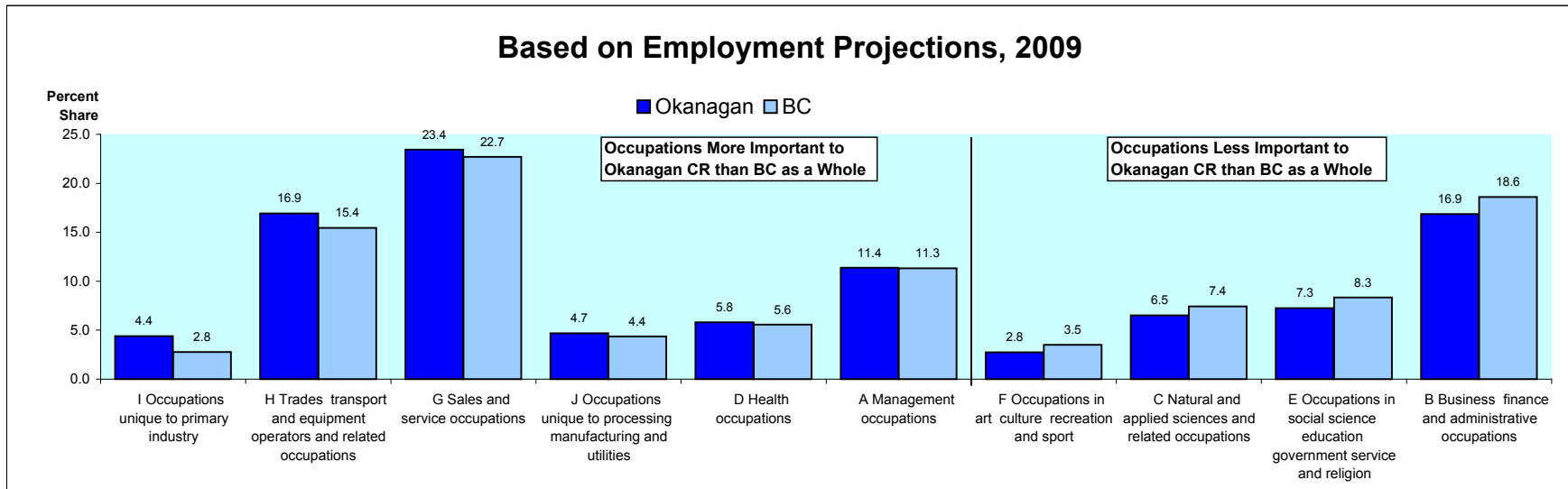
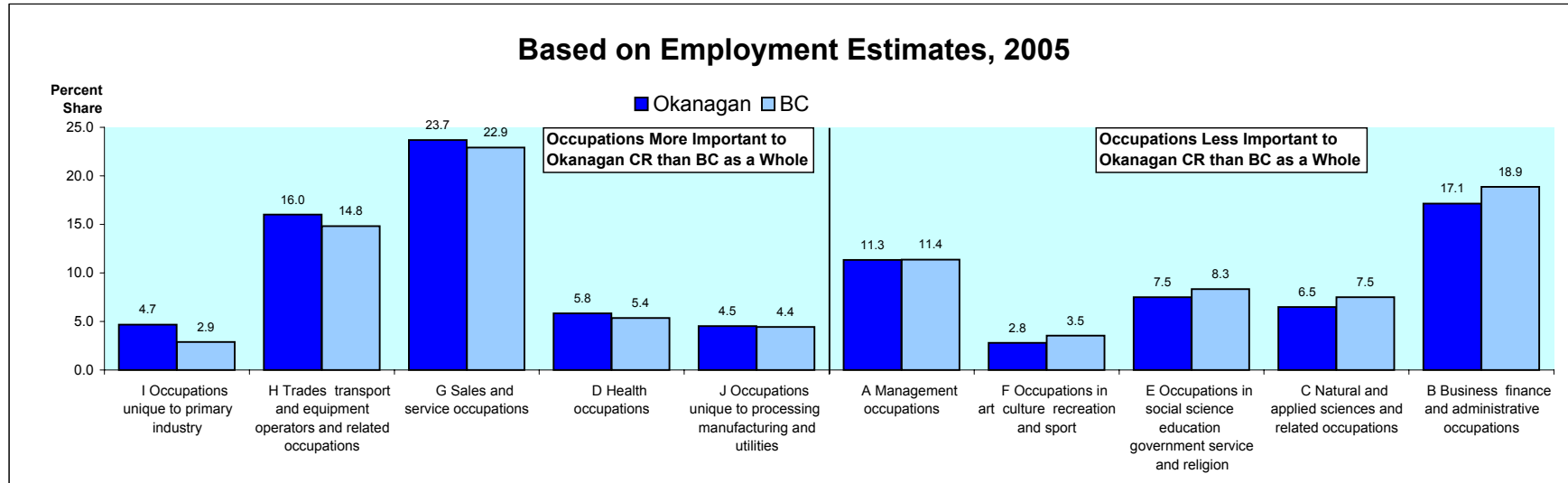

Appendix 1

Summary of Methodology for the British Columbia Regional Employment Projection Model (REPM)

The methodology used in the model has come largely from previous work on community dependencies carried out earlier by BC STATS. The fundamental premise is that the economy of a region can be represented by income flows that can be classified as “basic” (or driver) and “non-basic” (or support) depending on the source of the income.

The model calculates indirect employment effects from employment changes in the basic sectors using multipliers based in inter-industry linkages from the British Columbia Input-Output Model. Similarly, non-basic, or induced effects are calculated using an income-to-non-basic-jobs ratio.

The current version of the model is benchmarked to the 2001 Census employment by Regional District, and is projected forward up to the most up-to-date annual employment data from the Labour Force Survey. The growth rates from the Labour Force Survey (LFS) at the provincial level for the basic industries are used to project growth down to the Regional District level. The model then calculates the indirect jobs based on the Regional District specific multipliers. The direct and indirect employment levels are then used to calculate the wages and salaries earned in the basic industries which in turn are converted to employment in the non-basic industries through the income to support-industry job multipliers. As well, transfer payments and investment income are also converted to employment in the non-basic industries using the same multipliers. The output from the model is then benchmarked to the LFS industry numbers at the BC level as well as to the LFS regional employment numbers for the Development Regions and the Capital and Greater Vancouver Regional Districts. In the current version of the model, the employment numbers are reconciled up to the 2005 annual averages from the LFS.

Once the model is brought up to the most current employment levels, then the forecast is carried out for five to ten years further. The industrial employment projections from the Canadian Occupational Projection System (COPS) are now used as the source data for the industrial growth, both in determining the growth rates in the direct employment and then as a benchmark on which to reconcile the industrial employment generated by the model.

While the total employment is forced to the COPS employment levels, there is leeway to adjust growth rates by industry across the sub-provincial regions. There are some standard variables that are used to differentiate the outlook for

the regions. For example, the growth in the education sector is dictated by the projected K-12 and post-secondary population growth in the relevant age groups. Government Services is projected in line with the total population projections for the Regional Districts. Employment in the Health Sector is so often governed by the growth in the senior's population as are the transfer payments flowing in. (CPP and OAS is a large component of transfer payments). As well, pensions from private pension plans are considered investment income meaning seniors receive a high proportion of the total investment income in a region.

An important determining factor of growth by region is the major projects coming on stream in the outlook timeframe. Firstly they impact construction employment and secondly many will impact specific industries once they move into the production phase. In BC, we are dealing with the preparations for the 2010 Winter Games so many of the construction occupations will be in short supply.

The intent is to update the REPM annually, based on another year of LFS data plus a new COPS forecast. Currently, there is a demand for economic forecasts by occupation at the college region level. College Regions are aggregations of sub-sets of Regional Districts. Occupational forecasts are being produced at the college region level. In the appendix there is a conversion table which outlines which Regional District belongs to which College Region.

The model is only as good as the input data assumptions. Our reliance on good quality data from COPS is very important.
