GROUND SEARCH AND RESCUE VOLUNTEER SERVICES ANNUAL REPORT 2004/2005

British Columbia, Canada's third largest province, is one of the most scenic. Citizens and visitors alike routinely enjoy the great outdoor opportunities presented. The beauty, enhanced by the rugged geography, combine in a recreational attraction resulting in the province having more search and rescue incidents on land and inland waters than the rest of Canada combined. Tourism in B.C. contributes between \$9 and \$11 billion to the B.C. economy annually with ecotourism being the fastest growing segment.

Search and Rescue is one of 5 Public Safety Lifeline Volunteer services in B.C., with appropriately 13,000 volunteers registered. The Public Safety Lifeline also includes;

- Emergency Social Services (ESS)
- Road Rescue
- PEP Air
- Amateur Radio

Although the 5 Public Safety Lifeline disciplines each have their primary mandates there is often mutual assistance provided during large scale responses and civil emergencies.

The approximately 4,700 registered volunteers who are organized into 93 provincial Search and Rescue (SAR) teams, and 7 Initial Response Teams (IRT), are called upon to assist and support the following agencies;

- police in searching for lost persons
- BC Ambulance Service in accessing and transporting injured persons where specialized skills and equipment are required
- Coroner's Office with the recovery of the deceased if specialized skills and equipment are required
- Department of National Defence and Canadian Coast Guard in their mandate of Air and Marine Search and Rescue.
- Local governments during civil emergencies

The Provincial Emergency Program (PEP) provides core training for SAR volunteers through the Justice Institute of B.C., WCB and liability coverage for volunteers during training, and support for the Provincial SAR Advisory Committee. During SAR responses PEP provides WCB and liability coverage, re-imbursement of expenses, extraordinary operation costs, and coordination support for SAR volunteers.

Search and Rescue Volunteer Representation

The Provincial Search and Rescue Advisory Committee and the B.C. Search and Rescue Association share common memberships, with distinct mandates that support SAR volunteers in the province;

Provincial Search and Rescue Advisory Committee:

- Advise the Provincial Emergency Program on Search and Rescue policy, legislation, standards, resources, training, and related priorities;
- Provide channels of communication among participating SAR teams as well as between agencies and the Provincial emergency Program;
- Facilitate the establishment of a standards and assessment group to ensure one standard of SAR is adopted for the province and to assess the quality of delivery of the service.

The B.C. Search and Rescue Association (BCSARA);

- provide public education prevention programs, create awareness of ground and inland water SAR, and promote safe outdoor activity;
- provide health and safety support and programs to volunteer SAR groups and other volunteers:
- liaise and interact with SAR organizations in other provinces, countries and at federal/national levels; and
- Solicit, receive, administer and distribute funds and gifts.

Based on the results of a survey of SAR groups, and other feedback, the Advisory and the Association are formulating plans for melding of functions, while increasing the level of participation of SAR groups and members.

SAR Service Requirements

Following a small decrease in the number of SAR incidents in 2003/04, attributed to backcountry closures due to the wildfire hazard, the number has increased again this year. In addition to the record number of SAR incidents there were an unusual number of large and extended operations that additionally taxed resources. For example;

Alexis Creek; missing female mushroom picker Search lasted 8 days Whistler; over due male hiker Search lasted 5 days 100 Mile; 2 overdue male prospectors Search lasted 5 days Kelly Lake (Dawson Creek); missing 83 yr old female Search lasted 9 days Fraser Lake, Missing elderly female Search lasted 5 days Ft. St. James, 2 missing youths on snowmobile Search lasted 42 days (initial ground search and under ice search support)

The contribution of SAR volunteers in response to other emergencies was substantial again this year. An early start to the forest fire season resulted in several potential interface situations requiring residences to be placed on evacuation alert and/or orders. Although the scope of these fire events were substantially smaller than 2003 additional challenges were encountered due to the remoteness requiring extensive travel. SAR volunteers in several communities also assisted local governments and the police during ice jams and flooding events in January/February.

SAR Management Information

The B.C. Search and Rescue Information System (BCSARIS) became operationally functional April 01, 2004. BCSARIS is a web based system through which volunteer SAR Managers or delegates enter data from completed SAR tasks. Once completed the SAR Manager can print off Task Reports that are submitted along with other required documentation. BCSARIS collects additional information, such as distance subject's travel, to assist in further development of search techniques.

Civil Emergency Response

The 'Firestorm' events of 2003 in B.C. saw the largest integrated response of emergency agencies in the history of the Province, the fire season in 2004 initially exceeded the number of fires in 2003 however by late July the fire hazard dropped considerably due to rains. Several areas were evacuated or placed on evacuation alert, with Police receiving support from SAR volunteers. The remoteness of these areas provided additional challenges for personnel in locating and advising residents and visitors.

SAR volunteers responded in a number of communities during ice jams and flooding events in January 2005. Volunteers assisted in notifying and evacuating residents, monitoring river flows and ice activity, and other duties. While substantial infrastructure damage occurred no lives were lost during these events.

SAR Training

PEP financially supports core training through the PEP Academy of the Justice Institute of BC and at the regional level. The Justice Institute provides two full time instructors/Coordinators and administrative support. Courses and workshops offered include:

- ground search and rescue;
- ground search team leader;
- search and rescue management;
- rope rescue;
- tracking;

- swift water rescue; and
- Avalanche awareness.

Teams also routinely practice their skills through additional training exercises and simulations.

PEP provides annual contract funding in the amount of \$250,000, this is supplemented by \$95,000 from the RCMP for SAR Management training, SAR Management Recurrence training, and volunteer travel.

Regional training budgets fund SAR skill specific training courses in the amount of approximately \$15,000 which amounted to appropriately 25 per cent of the total regional budgets.

The Justice Institute delivered 94 training courses for 882 students for a total of 4,612 student training days in 2004/05.

SAR PREVENTION (PUBLIC EDUCATION AND AWARENESS)

"AdventureSmart"

The "AdventureSmart" project was approved for New Initiatives Fund (NIF) funding through the National Search and Rescue Secretariat (NSS) with a start date of April 01, 2004. With funding from NIF and the B.C. Search and Rescue Association over 3 years 'AdventureSmart' objective is to reduce the number and severity of SAR incidents in the province.

"AdventureSmart" provides a banner under which coordination and resources are provided to support a variety of education and awareness programs. A consistent message of the benefits of participating in outdoor activities while making smart choices on safety crosses through all supported programs. Since the approval of funding the following work has been undertaken:

- Hiring of a Project Manager at PEP to oversee all aspects of the programs
- Formation of a steering committee with representation from stakeholders
- Development of a communication plan, leading to official launch in October 2004

- Establishing a contract with developers of Youth Safe Outdoors to coordinate review and amending of YouthSafe for B.C. Schools for fall 2005 implementation
- Formalizing process for supply of Hug A Tree and Survive materials for access by SAR volunteer presenters
- Development and printing of information cards, promotional materials and displays for 'AdventureSmart'
- Arranging for 'AdventureSmart' Youth Teams, including vehicles and display units, for summer 2005.
- Establishing a website, <u>www.adventuresmart.ca</u>
- Review and edit completed on the Snow Safety Education Program




