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Part 1 – Overview

The British Columbia Ministry of Education established the Provincial Satisfaction Survey as part of ongoing efforts to make the education system more accountable, and to increase the existing information that districts and schools use to evaluate their performance. The Satisfaction Surveys were designed to provide schools, districts, and the public with measures of student, parent, and staff satisfaction in areas such as achievement, human and social development, and safety.

Seven questionnaires were finalized for the 2003 provincial satisfaction survey – one for each respondent group including grades 3, 4, 7, 10, 12, parents and staff; copies of the final questionnaires can be found in Appendix II. Results of the satisfaction surveys were reported on three levels: the provincial, district, and school levels (complete reports can be found on the Ministry of Education website at www.bced.gov.bc.ca/sat_survey/).

The purpose of this report is to document the technical characteristics of the 2003 Provincial Satisfaction Survey.

Part 2 – Changes from Previous Surveys

- 2.1 Changes Made for the 2003 Survey
 - The survey population was expanded to include grade three students if a school did not enroll grade four students
 - Electronic surveying was implemented in twenty-four school districts (see section 2.2 for more information about electronic surveying)
 - Three new questions were added to the student questionnaires:
 - o "Do adults in the school treat all students fairly?"
 - o "Can you do just about anything you really set your mind to?"
 - o "Are you of Aboriginal ancestry (First Nations, Inuit, Metis)?" ¹
 - Elementary and secondary parent surveys were combined into one instrument
 - Parent surveys were translated into fourteen languages; these translated surveys could be downloaded from the Ministry of Education website²
 - Two new questions were added to the parent questionnaires:
 - o "Are you satisfied that staff treat all students fairly at school?"
 - o "Are you of Aboriginal ancestry (First Nations, Inuit, Metis)?"
 - One new question was added to the staff questionnaires:
 - o "Can students at your school do just about anything they really set their mind to?"

2.2 – Electronic Surveying

During the fall of 2002, five school districts participated in a pilot project to test the effectiveness of electronic surveying: Cowichan Valley, Langley, Peace River North, Quesnel, and Vancouver. These districts were chosen due to variability in their technological environment and their geographic diversity. Districts were given some financial resources to cover costs associated with the electronic survey administration. Students in grades 3, 6, 9, and 11, their parents, and staff from schools in these districts participated in the pilot study.

The objective of the pilot was to determine if electronic surveying could be easily and efficiently implemented and managed by school districts. It showed that, given an appropriate level of technology present at the school site, electronic surveying was quick and efficient. Based on these results, the Ministry affirmed that electronic surveying was a viable method of data collection, and electronic surveying was incorporated into the 2003 survey process.

In 2003, participation in the electronic survey option was voluntary, and was offered at the district level, although schools within districts that opted for electronic surveying were able to receive print copies if they preferred. In all, twenty-four school districts opted to participate in electronic surveying; however, schools within these districts participated in electronic surveying to varying degrees. Eight districts chose to use electronic surveying with students and staff only, opting to provide paper copies for parents to fill out and return. Six districts administered electronic surveying to all response groups, and the remaining ten districts employed a combination of electronic and printed materials that varied from school to school.

Sixteen districts chose to go with the A. Willock Information Systems survey system. Other survey systems used included Raosoft, Problem Free, and First Class, as well as several inhouse designs. Schools that opted to use electronic surveying returned their survey responses directly to the Ministry of Education in the form of electronic text files. All electronic data was returned by March 5, 2003, as most were completed well within the survey dates recommended by the Ministry of Education.

Part 3 – Response Rates

In total, 410,722 individual surveys were distributed (in electronic and paper formats) and 234,374 surveys were completed, returned, and included in the analysis. Provincial participation

rates ranged from 16% for secondary parents to 90% for grade 3/4³ students (see Table 1). The average participation rate across all respondent groups for the province was 57%.

Part 4 – Technical Characteristics

4.1 - Summary Statistics

The average mean on each questionnaire ranged from 3.347 to 4.300 out of a possible 5. Table 2 presents the average mean and standard deviation on each survey instrument.

4.2 - Reliability

The internal consistency of questionnaires or tests is an index of the extent to which the items *hold together* in the sense that if a participant responds in one way to a particular item, they would also tend to respond similarly to other items in the instrument. Internal consistency, or reliability, can be estimated by determining the correlations among survey responses (see

Table 3). The conventional index of reliability is termed alpha (α) and can vary in value from a minimum of 0.0 to a maximum of 1.0.

In classical test theory, it is characteristic that alpha is related to the number of items in an instrument, and this is the case with these data with the 19-item Grade 3/4 instruments having slightly lower alphas than the lengthier questionnaires.

For the purposes of reporting to schools and districts, similar questions were grouped and analyzed in the categories of achievement, human and social development, school environment, safety, and preparation for the future. The reliability for each category is presented in Table 4. Two other categories were reported from single questions (computers and physical activity), therefore no reliability statistics were necessary or feasible.

4.3 - Validity

A principal components analysis (PCA) was used to determine whether the survey instruments could be empirically identified as measuring a common "satisfaction" factor. The unrotated PCA resulted in fairly significant dominant factors with a significant proportion of the

variance (27.51% to 39.51%) accounted for by a single factor (see Table 5). The scree plots revealed a single dominant factor in all cases.⁴

Most items in the surveys for each grade loaded significantly on factor one, suggesting that they are measuring a single construct. There were three questions that did not load on factor one: "At school, are you bullied, teased, or picked on?" did not load on any of the factor analyses; "At school, do you get exercise?" did not load on factor one for the grade 12 questionnaire; and "Do you volunteer at your child's school" did not load for either elementary or secondary parents.

4.4 – Item Mean Scores

The questionnaires were analyzed using conventional item analysis. The item mean scores are summarized in this section. The full output for the item analysis for each item by each respondent group are attached in Appendix III.

Tables 6, 7, and 8 list the item mean scores for each respondent group. The item mean score is the average value of all responses made to that particular item. The maximum value (except where otherwise noted) is 5; the respondent interprets this as representing a positive view of satisfaction. The closer the item mean score is to 5, the more positive are the overall responses for that group. A value of 3 could be considered as the midpoint of the scale.

APPENDICES

Appendix I. Instructions

Instructions for Principals

The primary objective of the Satisfaction Survey is to provide information that will support discussions about improving student achievement at each school. The survey gathers perceptions from students, parents, and staff on areas including achievement, human and social development, and safety. The information collected by the survey will help schools, school districts, and the Ministry set goals and establish priorities for future school years.

Please encourage the fullest possible participation in the survey. The more completely your school is represented, the more useful the information will be. Your local PAC can help you achieve this goal.

If your school is completing paper surveys, **please keep the box** the survey materials came in. You will need to package and return the completed surveys to BC Mail Plus using the courier return waybill supplied to you.

Paper-based Administration:

Parent Surveys:

- Surveys are to be sent home with students in Grades 4, 7, 10, and 12.
- Schools with no Grade 4 students will send the survey home with Grade 3 students.
- Parents must return the survey to the school **NO LATER THAN February 14, 2003.**
- Translations are available in 14 languages on the Internet at: www.bced.gov.bc.ca/sat_survey/

Student Surveys:

- Surveys are to be completed by all Grade 4, 7, 10, and 12 students. Schools with no Grade 4 students will administer the survey to Grade 3 students.
- Students will take approximately 5 to 10 minutes to complete the survey. Students should not collaborate with others or discuss their responses during administration of the survey.
- Instructions to be read to the Grade 3 or 4 students (and higher grades at the discretion of administrators) are included. In field tests, it was found that instructions are generally not necessary after Grade 4.
- In the interest of confidentiality, someone other than students' regular teacher should administer the surveys. At a minimum a student should collect the completed surveys.

Staff Surveys:

- Please ask each staff member to complete the survey.
- Please ask CUPE and BCTF staff to return their surveys to a staff representative.
- The staff representative should seal returned surveys into the envelope provided and place it in the return box provided (this is the same box to be used for parent and student surveys).

The Ministry must receive all completed paper surveys NO LATER THAN February 21, 2003.

Electronic Administration:

- If your district opted for electronic surveying, your district office will have received administration instructions.
- In the interest of confidentiality, someone other than students' regular teacher should administer surveys (for example, a lab instructor).
- Students should not collaborate with others or discuss their responses during survey administration.
- The use of student Personal Education Numbers (PENs) as IDs or passwords diminishes the anonymous nature of the survey and is not recommended by the Ministry.

The Ministry must receive compiled survey data NO LATER THAN March 5, 2003.

Instructions for Administering the Survey

Instructions for Administrators (Electronic Survey):

The Satisfaction Surveys consist of between 21 and 25 questions. The surveys take about 5 to 10 minutes to complete. Thank you for helping your students to complete these surveys.

In the interest of confidentiality, someone other than students' regular teacher should administer surveys (for example, a lab instructor). Students should not collaborate with others or discuss their responses during survey administration.

Instructions for Students in Grade 3 and 4 (and higher at the discretion of administrators):

Please read each question aloud while the students follow along and select their answers on the computer screen.

Script:

Can anyone tell me what a survey is? A survey is a group of questions to find out what you think. It's NOT like a test because there are no right or wrong answers. When answering this survey, I want you to look only at your own computer screen. The best answer is how YOU feel. It is really important that you think about the questions and give honest answers.

Now I would like you to look at the survey.

Let's talk about the choices you have. To the right of each sample question you'll see a set of dots that you can select to answer each survey question. Look for the sets of words "All of the time", "Many times", "Some times", "Few times", and "At no time" at the top of the survey. Do you see them? The answer dots are lined up underneath each set of words.

There is also a shaded bar with each set of words. Above "All of the time" is a fully shaded bar, sort of like a full glass of juice. This would be the response you would choose for something that you have done every day at school this year.
