

Parent Satisfaction Survey

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Executive Summary

Purpose

In order to more fully understand British Columbia parents' satisfaction with the education system in this province, the Ministry of Education (the ministry) requested a random sample telephone survey. While a paper survey had been distributed to stakeholders (parents, students, teachers and non-teaching staff), a projectable study was also required to provide a valid province-wide overview. Of particular importance was including the impressions of parents of all public school grades, whereas the paper survey focused on grades four, seven, 10 and 12.¹

This research is part of the ministry's ongoing efforts to help guide provincial and local improvements to learning opportunities and student achievements.

This research was designed to enable schools, school boards and the ministry to monitor parents' satisfaction with aspects of the public education system. It will also support public school improvements that will ultimately lead to better learning opportunities for higher student achievement.

Methodology

In total, 1445 surveys were completed among a random sample of parents of BC's school-age children. All parents of school-age children were eligible for this research. The research was designed to examine the experience of a representative sample of school-age children. Therefore, in addition to the usual randomization techniques already in place, the child to be discussed in each household was also randomized on the "birthday" basis.

This study employed a "disproportionate" sampling plan, which ensured that each region of the province was represented with enough interviews to allow separate analysis on a regional basis. The table following outlines the actual and final weighted sample distribution.

A pure random sample of 1445 carries tolerance limits of +/-2.6 percentage points 19 in 20 times that the study is repeated, in the most conservative case. In other words, a finding of 50% would fall within 47.4% and 52.6% most of the time. Accuracy increases as results near 0% and 100%. For example, a finding of 5% carries tolerance of +/-1.1 percentage points. The regional subsamples of approximately 205 and 414 carry tolerances of +/-6.8 and +/-4.8 percentage points respectively.

The questionnaire was developed in consultation with the Ministry and the Public Affairs Bureau, addressing the original and final research objectives. The final questionnaire was approximately 12 minutes in length.

Summary of findings

Overall satisfaction with child's education

A majority of BC parents (77%) is satisfied with their child's education. Notably, fully one-third are "very" satisfied. Just over one-in-five (22%) are dissatisfied, with 10% "very" and 12% "somewhat" dissatisfied.

A similar satisfaction question was asked later in the survey. Once parents have considered various aspects of their child's education (as presented in the lines of questioning in our survey), satisfaction does increase (to 82%). Note that most of this growth is in the "very" satisfied category.

Satisfaction is driven largely by parents' appreciation of their children's teacher. Following at some distance, secondary reasons for parent satisfaction centre on the child's enjoyment of school and accomplishments so far.

Dissatisfaction emanates from several areas: concerns that children are not learning the basics, large class sizes and poor quality teachers (each mentioned by 8-9% of all parents). The teacher job action as well as concerns over government funding also appear to have some impact in driving satisfaction downward (each mentioned by 5% of parents).

Satisfaction with specific aspects of a child's education

A strong majority of BC parents is satisfied with their children's education, with respect to the "basics": learning reading, writing and mathematics skills. Parents are similarly, if slightly less, satisfied with program choices for their child. Even the anti-bullying learning program, at the bottom of the list, receives relatively high satisfaction marks. Note that this program also has the highest degree of uncertainty—that is, parents who cannot respond to this question. Each of the aspects of learning evaluated in this study receives relatively strong satisfaction, with the proportion "very" satisfied ranging from one-third to one-half of all parents.

Development of reading skills at school

Parents' impressions of teachers' caring

The vast majority of parents (87%) feel that teachers care about their children. Note that this level varies across the subgroups of interest: By grade level, this sense that teachers care is highest among parents of children in the youngest grades, ranging from 96% in K-2 to 75% among parents of grades 11 and 12 students. Regionally, this level is lowest in the North. Note also that this sense of teachers' caring is meaningfully linked with parents' overall satisfaction with the public education system, echoing the drivers of overall satisfaction expressed in parents' verbatim comments. Goal setting and preparing for the future

A vast majority of parents (82%) is involved in setting learning goals for their child, this level highest among parents of students in grades eight to 10. (See computer tabulations for F6.)

Among parents of secondary-school students, 62% feel that school is preparing these children for a career. Somewhat more parents (72%) feel that school is preparing these children for a post-secondary education, this level increasing...

- in the Okanagan
- among parents of female students
- among parents of younger secondary students (grades 8-10)

Notably, both of these issues are linked meaningfully to parents' satisfaction with their child's education.

Meeting parents' expectations

Parents were asked a series of questions about specific aspects of their own and their child's experience at school. Parents were asked to rate how frequently each activity occurs.

The results below are presented in highest-to-lowest frequency order, in three "tiers". Activities in tier one can reasonably be considered to be meeting parents' expectations. Similarly, tier two activities are occurring with relative frequency, based on parents' expectations. Tier three activities are meeting fewer parents' expectations, revealing some opportunity to grow performance in these specific areas and, possibly, overall satisfaction with the education system.

Tier One:

Do you feel welcome at this child's school?

- "all" or "most" of the time: 90%

Does this child feel safe at school?

"all" or "most" of the time: 89%

Tier Two:

Are the rules about behaviour enforced at this child's school?

- "all" or "most" of the time: 79%

Does this child work hard at his/her studies?

"all" or "most" of the time: 77%

Do you think personal differences are respected at school? Clarify if necessary: These differences might be cultural, ethnic, social or physical, among others.

- "all" or "most" of the time: 76%

Tier Three:

Does the school include you in decisions that affect this child's education?

- "all" or "most" of the time: 68%

Does this child's teacher help with schoolwork when needed?

- "all" or "most" of the time: 66%

Student opportunities and needs

Parents were asked a series of questions examining the frequency of certain activities and needs in their and their child's experience with public education in BC. The results below are presented in order of most frequent to least frequent within two categories: Opportunities and Issues/Needs. Note that bullying and teasing are at the bottom of the list, in terms of frequency.
