FROM THE DESK OF PAT BELL

July was a busy month, with some good news and some bad. The hail storm in early July caused damage to many crops in Okanaganarea orchards. While this was an unfortunate event, our production insurance program is in place to help growers and I have committed to putting more staff in place so insurance claims can be processed quickly. I am also aware of, and keeping an eye on, the drought situation in the province, which is very difficult for farmers.

Two recent cases of BSE in Manitoba and Alberta were also a concern, but I am confident that this doesn't signal a worsening problem and that the controls we have in place are sound. The federal government also recently announced an enhanced feed ban and this is a step in the right direction that will give the international community confidence in Canada's beef supply.

Busy summer for Extension Assistants

The ministry's 10 Summer Extension Assistants have been busy! Here is a brief update on some of their activities so far.

Jacqueline Dennett in Dawson Creek jumped right into insect monitoring in her first week and has also worked with data from ICBC on animalrelated accident trends over the last 10 years.

Daichi Shinozaki in Smithers has been developing displays for farmers' markets and fall fairs and has already attended the local farmers' market to promote ministry programs.

In Prince George, Kimberly Will and Cameron Quesnel have been working on cereal and forage crop trials. Cameron has taken the lead on the Variety Trial Program along Highway 16, which will help to determine what forage crops are viable. Kimberly has also been helping producers enter data in the age verification program.

Adrienne Montgomery is busy in 100 Mile House working with the Industrial Hemp Pilot Project. Her work has involved helping farmers with application forms, record keeping and releasing hemp seed to growers.

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We have a strong beef industry in B.C. and we are committed to supporting our cattle industry so it stays that way.

I recently announced provincial funding to help ensure youth have the opportunity to be involved in agriculture.

Government provides \$95,000 to 4-H on an annual basis and has also given a one-time grant of \$75,000 to support youth in agriculture, for a total of \$170,000. Agriculture is vital to B.C.'s economy and our aging population means that we have to start now to bridge the age gap and develop a new generation of agricultural leaders. 4-H is a great vehicle to help do that and we're proud to support them.

Throughout August, my wife and I plan to be tourists in our own province, which is without a doubt the best place on Earth. I hope you have a chance to do the same. Who knows, we may even bump into you!

Matt Masi's main responsibilities in the Kootenay region involve developing an agricultural history report for the Columbia Valley and surveying agricultural activities on lands within the Agricultural Land Reserve.

In the Kamloops area, Tara Dempster is becoming an expert in moisture monitoring. She has also been working on a potential direct farm marketing guide for the Thompson Nicola Regional District.

Aquaculture Innovation from the Hub City
