# Staff Recognized for Contributions to Lheidli T'enneh Final Agreement

A landmark treaty initialled by the Province and the Lheidli T'enneh marks the end of over 13 years of negotiations. It also positions the 312-member northern B.C. band to be the first to reach a final agreement under the B.C. Treaty Commission process.

ILMB staff received a warm acknowledgement from Trevor Proverbs, Chief Provincial Negotiator of the Lheidli T'enneh final agreement, for their contributions to the first Final Agreement under the new process.

In a letter thanking the staff from all the agencies that assisted with the agreement, Trevor singled out several individuals from ILMB and the Ministry of Agriculture and Lands. Trevor concluded, "Please accept my sincere thanks for the role you each have played in helping us get to this stage. I look forward to working with many of you in the future as we continue our successes on the treaty front."

Project. The Britannia Water Treatment Plant won gold in the Infrastructure category from the Canadian Council of Public Private Partnerships. The province also won top honours at the 2006 Fraser Basin Council Sustainability Awards in the Caring for Ecosystems category for the overall remediation of the old mine site.

The FBC awards are presented biennially to honour individuals, businesses, government and community organizations who support social, economic and environmental sustainability throughout the Fraser Basin.

## Britannia Water Treatment Plant Wins National Award

The Britannia Mine Water Treatment Plant won the top award in the infrastructure category at the 2006 National Awards for Innovation and Excellence in Public-Private Partnerships in Toronto.

The winning team includes the Ministry of Agriculture and Lands as the client, Partnerships BC as the Public-Private Partnership facilitator, and EPCOR as the private partner. The award recognizes the Province and EPCOR for an innovative partnership that ends a century of heavy metal pollution in Howe Sound.

Previously, acid rock drainage flowed into Howe Sound untreated. Now, the water treatment plant captures and removes hundreds of tonnes of heavy metal contaminants from the historic Britannia Mine every year.

### Meet B.C.'s Man on the Ground at Britannia

Barry Azevedo, a senior program engineer with the Ministry of Agriculture and Lands' Crown contaminated sites branch, has been involved directly with the Britannia Mine Remediation Project for more than a decade.

Barry is a professional environmental engineer with 17 years experience in the field. He started working on the Britannia Mine file in 1996, initially as a regulator. After settlement discussions with the historical mine operators were initiated in 1998, his responsibility changed and he began representing the Province as the owner of the contaminated land. When the Crown contaminated sites branch assumed responsibility for the Britannia project, Barry became a part of the branch within the ministry.

Barry also project manages and provides senior technical direction on remediation work at Pacific Place and the Prince Rupert Skeena Cellulose Pulp Mill Site. Barry says he enjoys his job managing complex projects
