You don't have to go very deep into the wilderness these days to spot our province's official mammal, the spirit bear. Spirit Bears are popping up in community's right across the province as part of the B.C. Lions' Society's Spirit Bears in the City fundraiser. The campaign provided the Province with an ideal opportunity to commemorate the historic Central and North Coast land-use decisions announced in February by asking three B.C. artists to paint Spirit Bears. The three resulting bears are a reminder that critical Spirit Bear habitat is now protected forever.

On June 19th the third United Nations' World Urban Forum opened in Vancouver with native dancing and

FrontCounter BC Victoria

FrontCounter BC services will soon be expanded to include Victoria. Offices are already open in Kamloops and Prince George, with Nanaimo and Surrey opening this summer, followed by Cranbrook, Williams Lake, Smithers and Fort St. John by the end of the year. Victoria will be a satellite office of FrontCounter BC Nanaimo since many of the support services will continue to be based in Nanaimo.

Evolution of Surrey's Green Timbers Site

On June 22nd Premier Gordon Campbell announced that a portion of the Green Timbers site in Surrey will house a new outpatient Hospital. The Surrey Outpatient Hospital will be located on a 5.8-acre site at the corner of 140th Street and the Fraser Highway that is currently Crown land owned by the Ministry of Agriculture and Lands. The land will be transferred to the Ministry of Health for approximately \$1 million. The Major Projects Branch of Crown Land Administration Division is coordinating the transfer. Construction on the new hospital is expected to begin in 2008 with completion in 2009.

Green Timbers was once one of the largest seedling nurseries in the province, pioneering seedling production research and growing technologies. It was also a Forest Service training school for decades, teaching firefighting, management and silviculture techniques. In recent years the Forest Service has ramped down its presence at Green Timbers, closing the training school and amalgamating nursery operations at the Surrey nursery.

Industry Innovation: Beautiful Blue-Stained Pine

There's an old adage, "when life gives you lemons, make lemonade." In the case of B.C.'s mountain pine beetle infestation some woodworkers are saying, when life gives you mountain pine beetle wood, showcase its unique appearance.

Pine beetles kill trees by burrowing into the layer between the bark and the wood. Lumber from a newly bug-killed tree is no different from a healthy tree when it comes to strength and durability. The main difference is in the colour of the wood. Wood from beetle-attacked trees has a slight blue/grey tinge which can make it hard to sell in some markets.

Some enterprising B.C. businesses are taking advantage of the unique appearance of the wood and producing blue-stained pine products meant for display, such as key chains, pictures frames, furniture and even log homes. The custom paneling for FrontCounter BC's reception desk was manufactured by PG Custom Woodworks in Prince George.

Blue Pine Products, also based out of Prince George, manufactures and sells a wide array of blue-stained pine products. In 2003, the company started out as a class project for 16 business students at the College of New Caledonia. One of the students, Kyle Roberts, bought out the company with his brother, Kerry, when the project was over. He and his brother now operate Blue Pine Products as a full-time business.

Other industry innovations include adding beetle-stained pine to an oriented-strand board (OSB) mixture. Because OSB has similar properties to plywood, but is uniform and costs less, it has begun to replace natural plywood in many environments. The most common uses are as sheathing in walls, floors, and roofs.
