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Overview of the BC Arts Council

The British Columbia Arts Council is an independent agency established by the Province of British Columbia to support the arts and cultural community and its contributions to the growth and well being of the province.

The vision for the British Columbia Arts Council is:

All British Columbians fully participating in a healthy arts and cultural community that is recognized for its excellence.

In keeping with this higher-level strategic direction, this is our mission:

The British Columbia Arts Council supports the arts and cultural community to enable it to achieve its creative, social and economic potential by providing financial assistance, advocacy and public education.

We have a set of fundamental beliefs that underlie all that we do. Our involvement with arts and culture is governed by:

- > The belief that a vibrant arts and cultural community is essential to a healthy society;
- > The belief in artistic excellence;
- > The belief in inclusiveness; and
- > The belief in diversity of artistic practice in all art forms.

As a Council, we are governed by:

- > Our desire to embrace the future while seeking to preserve our past;
- > Our belief in transparency and accountability; and
- > Our adherence to the principles of equality, merit and independence.

Through the British Columbia Arts Council, the Province exercises its responsibility to support programs that assist artistic and cultural activity. These programs support community and professional arts and cultural organizations and individual artists, as well as encourage greater access to cultural and artistic experiences throughout the province.

In performing its duties, the British Columbia Arts Council must:

- > Consult with artists, arts and cultural organizations, governments and other interested communities;
- > Allocate money appropriated annually for the Council by the Legislature; and
- > Support arts and culture through the following:
 - Public education, research and advocacy;
 - · Awarding grants; and





 Produce and distribute information on the Council and arts and culture in British Columbia.

The Council consists of up to fifteen (15) members who are broadly representative of

the regions, cultural diversity and artistic communities of British Columbia. The Lieutenant Governor in Council designates the chair and vice-chair of the Council as well as appointing members.

REPORT OF THE CHAIR



On March 31, 2002, the BC Arts Council completed six years as an independent agency mandated by provincial statute to provide encouragement and support to the arts and cultural community. The importance that the provincial government places on the value of arts and culture as a means for improving our economic and social well-being was affirmed this year.

Although it is an independent agency, the BC Arts Council relies on the government for its annual appropriation. Therefore, the Council was encouraged when the Province announced its commitment "to increase funding to

the British Columbia Arts Council to promote and support BC arts, music, artists and culture," and is working closely with the government to help it realize this commitment.

Over the past year the provincial government also undertook a core services review to identify activities that were central to its mandate. The BC Arts Council was included as part of this process and was pleased when government reaffirmed that support for the Council is a continuing "core activity" of the Ministry of Community, Aboriginal and Women's Services. I would like to thank the Minister, the Honourable George Abbott, for his continuing support of the BC Arts Council.

This past year has been further defined by dramatic changes in the political, economic and social fabric of our lives, not just within the province of British Columbia but also globally as individuals and governments struggle to adjust to a post 9/11 world. In this

challenging year, artists and arts organizations have produced individual and collective works that speak to the heart and mind. No matter whether the artists that the BC Arts Council supports are working in rural, urban or suburban communities, they are all dedicated to the creation of works that help us to reflect upon the demographic, social and economic challenges that are part of the everyday fabric of our lives. British Columbians can be proud of the vibrant arts and culture community that flourishes all over the province and contributes to the richness and diversity of our lives.

I would like to thank my colleagues on the Council and the juries, advisory committees and staff whose dedication enables us to deliver our programs and to fulfil our mandate.

Finally, I want express my appreciation to the artists and the arts and cultural organizations throughout British Columbia. British Columbia is a stronger, more productive and more creative community because of your dedication. On behalf of the BC Arts Council, thank you.

The Year in Review

As an independent, provincially funded agency, the British Columbia Arts Council has the responsibility to serve the people of British Columbia by supporting the province's arts and cultural community.

As with the rest of society, the arts and cultural community is subject to forces of change. The global economy has continued to transform from one based primarily on the manufacturing and exchange of goods to one dominated by the provision of less tangible services, particularly the exchange of information. This has resulted in opportunities for artists to play central roles, building from their strengths and capabilities as communicators and creators.

Technological change, particularly digitalization, has also had an impact on the cultural sector, including the means of production, the products and their distribution channels. Developing technological opportunities, however, remains a continuing challenge for arts and cultural organizations. In order to respond to this need, the Arts Council developed the BC Digital Collections program to assist public galleries and museums make their collections more publicly accessible.

As British Columbia becomes an increasingly urban province, greater economic difficulties are being experienced by resource-based rural communities. This presents a significant challenge to the Council as it attempts to balance the growing

needs demonstrated by urban-based organizations and the desire to insure that cultural opportunities are available throughout the province.

The demographic composition of British Columbia is changing dramatically. This has enriched the province and provided us with the opportunities to experience the art and traditions of many different cultures. It has also presented the Council with the challenge of incorporating within its programs the flexibility to respond to different forms of artistic expression.

Cultural vitality is largely a function of the ability to invest in creative projects and activities. Although limited by resources, the cultural community remains committed to the creation of new works. Whether represented through the hundreds of new books published each year, by the original productions presented at the province's "Fringe Festivals," or by a single work conceived and created by an individual artist, new creative work remains at the heart of our culture and at the centre of the Council's mandate.

Over the past year, Council has continued to note the contributions of client activities in their communities. There are many examples from which to choose, including the Vancouver Opera's community outreach program run in conjunction with the Opera, "Of Mice and Men"; Green Thumb's production of Joan MacLeod's

"Shape of a Girl," which examines teen bullying; the publication by Douglas and McIntyre of Terry Reksten's, "The Illustrated History of British Columbia," and the Victoria Symphony's annual "Symphony Splash." Throughout the province, there are thousands of other examples of cultural programming that contributes to the richness and diversity of BC communities.

A number of opportunities and challenges face both the sector and the Council. There is considerable potential for growth in cultural tourism, which, if developed, will benefit the cultural community and the overall economy of the province. Forging partnerships between culture and tourism will bring benefits to both.

As a result of technological change and the influence of different cultural traditions, the means of artistic production is changing rapidly. The acquisition and upgrading of professional skills is seen as a priority for artists, but educational, professional development and mentoring opportunities are limited. Addressing this issue will be important if British Columbia is to capitalize on the opportunities presented by these changes.

The BC Arts Council has a broad mandate and offers a variety of programs. Although Council maintains an ongoing process of program evaluation, it has not undertaken a comprehensive program priority review to assess its overall priorities since its establishment in 1996. Over the past year, the Council decided to begin this process. It is expected that the review will take two

years and will provide Council with the information it needs to set budget and program priorities in the coming years.

Although the Council is an independent agency, it is directly affected by trends and priorities within the provincial government.

The provincial government's renewed commitment toward ensuring accountability and demonstrating results has informed the Arts Council's efforts over the past year. The Council continues to ensure that its programs are administered in a manner that forges linkages with other organizations and demonstrates value to the artistic and cultural sector.

It is within this context that the British Columbia Arts Council has:

- > achieved its performance targets and provided for the distribution of almost \$11 million in awards across the province in response to more than 1500 applications;
- carried out program reviews and related assessments for regional initiatives, assistance for dance organizations, professional theatre projects and annual assistance for dance, among others;
- > created a program in support of the digitalization of public collections and digital recording of First Nation languages;



- > assisted thirteen organizations and artists to participate in international cultural events and international markets;
- > assisted over 100 arts students pursue post secondary studies at institutions throughout the world;
- > organized a province-wide Arts and Culture Week designed to increase the awareness of the contribution made by cultural activity;
- > provided program information and advice to clients and to the public through individual consultations, attendance at conferences and workshops and by means of the BC Arts Council web site;
- > maintained working relationships and program partnerships with similar agencies at the federal, provincial and municipal levels;
- > conducted more than 100 days of advisory consultation.

The primary responsibility of the Council is to assist the arts and cultural community to produce creative and relevant programming that serves the people of British Columbia. The Council's programming assists in meeting this objective, but the credit goes to the arts and cultural community that continues to maintain its creativity, its dedication to excellence and its commitment to serving the people of our province.



There are six goals that describe the results to be achieved by the BC Arts Council, and for which supporting objectives, targets, strategies and performance measures have been established. Given their specific nature, targets could not be established for all goals and objectives, and in some cases, more qualitative measures of performance were appropriate.

GOAL

Artistic excellence, expression and innovation recognized and encouraged.

OBJECTIVES

- > An adjudication process that identifies and supports artistic excellence.
- > Opportunities and resources for artists and creators to train, experiment and create, and reach an audience.


STRATEGIES

KEY CONSIDERATIONS:


In considering this measure, it should be noted that a growing awareness of the limited resources and funds available to the BC Arts Council has served to temper the number of applications for support received.

The success rate of applicants.




KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

The data in support of this measure was drawn from a subset of Council programs.

Applicants under operating and project assistance are generally clients who have established a continuing relationship with the Council and whose annual program of public activity is partially supported by Council funding.

Arts Awards for Individuals provide funding to artists to assist with professional development activities or to undertake creative projects. Applications are assessed on the specific merit of the proposed project.

Demand continues to exceed available resources and it is important to note that the success rate does not indicate that clients have received the level of funding requested.



Healthy, sustainable arts and cultural organizations.

OBJECTIVES

- > A funding process that recognizes and supports arts and cultural organizations' potential to contribute to the province's arts and cultural development.
- > An adequate funding base for arts and cultural organizations.
- > Supportive public policies and programs for the arts and culture in BC.

TARGETS

- > Assessments do not show a decline over time.
- > Collectively, the sector is at least at a break-even state.

STRATEGIES

- > Provide an independent, professional adjudication process.
- > Provide timely, reliable and sustainable funding for organizations.
- > Design Council programs and policies that reflect organizations' needs.
- > Influence provincial policies that affect BC Arts Council organizations.

PERFORMANCE MEASURE

Sectoral assessments of organizations based on the professional opinion of BC Arts Council adjudicators.


KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

As part of the adjudication process, advisory committee members are asked to identify and consider issues particular to an arts and cultural sector(s) on an annual basis. In addition to this means of evaluation, the BC Arts Council is committed to carrying out comprehensive program reviews that will provide a context for addressing sectoral issues. This process will become more formalized in future years in keeping with the commitment to provide for such assessments over a five-year cycle.





Financial health of arts and cultural organizations—Change in total net financial position for sampled organizations.



KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

This measure recognizes the financial health of arts and cultural organizations and reflects their net position based on reported revenues and expenditures. A sample of twenty-five major organizations from across the province that have received funding was selected, with the data in support of this performance measure being drawn from the financial reports submitted by these organizations. Some of the data for fiscal 2001/02 reflects the most current estimates and projections, with actual results not being known until the Fall of 2002. As a result, the information and analysis presented for this measure carries a degree of risk and could differ from actual financial results.


Geographic distribution of awards.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

The level of engagement has been defined as the number of professionals from each region that are included in the awards process. A more detailed listing of jurors is provided in Appendix B. In reviewing the selection and involvement of adjudicators by region, it should be noted that where residency is not considered to be an added benefit, the BC Arts Council will engage professional advisors of high quality at the lowest cost.



Increasing diversity in cultural traditions recognized and supported and new art forms encouraged.

OBJECTIVES

- > Broader and diversified cultural traditions and artistic practise available to the public.
- > Opportunities for artists to interpret, explore and create using new technologies and art forms.

STRATEGIES

- $\,>\,$ Ensure the adjudication processes, funding and program guidelines:
 - a) encourage participation by artists of different cultural traditions
 - b) reflect evolving creative practices.

PERFORMANCE MEASURE

A summary of the range of cultural communities included in the adjudication process.

The first priority of adjudication is to draw on the expertise of qualified artists to insure the integrity of the process. The British Columbia Arts Council does provide for the participation of individuals knowledgeable in diverse cultural traditions and who can represent specific ethno-cultural communities when dealing with forms of art and media that require such an understanding. An example is the Aboriginal Arts Development Awards, a program that supports creative and professional development projects undertaken by Aboriginal artists and arts and cultural organizations, and that is delivered in partnership with the First Peoples' Heritage, Language and Cultural Council.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

The BC Arts Council is limited by the legal and ethical complexities inherent to statistical reporting on the representation and involvement of ethno-cultural communities as part of an assessment and adjudication process.





A summary of evolving creative practices included in the adjudication process.

Progress towards supporting evolving creative practices can be demonstrated through the following:

- > Project Assistance for Creative Writers funds projects in many areas of writing and allows playwrights, for example, to explore new methods of play creation and presentation.
- > *Project Assistance for Media Artists* funds projects ranging from documentaries on the Afro-Canadian population of British Columbia to traditional animation works, as well as experimental video for installation in galleries or on the Internet.
- > Project Assistance for Visual Artists supports a range of initiatives and works from performance art in international centers to sculptural installation works on a human-sized scale and artists advancing traditional art forms.

A total of 95 artists were assisted to realize creative projects through these programs.

The efforts of the British Columbia Arts Council to ensure that its processes and practices are responsive to evolving creative practices is further evidenced in the creation of the BC Digital Collections program, that in partnership with the BC Museums Association supports the digitalization of public collections, documenting of First Nation languages, and the use of digital media in the development of creative projects. Finally, program guidelines and eligibility criteria are regularly reviewed and updated to ensure their ongoing relevance and responsiveness to evolving practices.

A summary of the Council's efforts to ensure program flexibility to accept innovation.

DANCE PROGRAMS

The BC Arts Council completed a two-year process of assessment of *Assistance for Professional Dance Organizations* (a multi-year program) and *Annual Assistance for Professional Dance*. Conducted by independent consultant Sheila Brown, this assessment indicated that these programs have been reasonably successful in rationalizing a structure for dance support. The resulting report was subsequently considered in a series of focus group discussions and distributed broadly to members of the dance community. In keeping with the noted recommendations for change, both programs were re-introduced with modifications in the spring of 2002.

REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The BC Arts Council completed a three-year assessment of the *Operating Assistance* for Regional Arts Councils program in fiscal 2001/2002. Since 1992, this program had provided ongoing support to regional art councils, primarily to facilitate cooperation, training and communications within the geographic regions of the province. Conducted by independent consultant Sheila Luey, the review included a preliminary survey questionnaire, site visits and regional meetings with stakeholders in six regions of the province and follow-up meetings with a number of stakeholders. The review indicated that although the program was a primary support for the activities of some regional art councils, it had not succeeded in enabling support structures in all areas of the province. Specifically, the program was considered to lack adequate flexibility to enable development activities in the Northwest Coast, the East Kootenay-Columbia and the Southwest-Mainland regions, as well as ensuring participation of First Nations and diverse communities. Numerous changes and amendments were considered to ensure that the program provided for a broader spectrum of regional development initiatives and participants, and was reintroduced as Regional Arts Development Assistance in the Spring of 2001.

PROFESSIONAL THEATRE PROJECTS

In fiscal 2001/02, the BC Arts Council introduced a revised program, *Project Assistance for Professional Theatre*, which was the result of two years of discussion with the Theatre Advisory Committee, the theatre community and other stakeholders. Programming changes included clarified objectives, the harmonization of program criteria with those applied to dance and tiered levels of support.



Maximize the contribution of arts and cultural activity to the economic growth of the province.


OBJECTIVES

- > Artists and arts (cultural) organizations assisted to reach new markets and develop new products and services.
- > National and international recognition of BC artists and arts and cultural organizations.

STRATEGIES

- > Support touring (market) development and attendance at international showcases.
- > Assist organizational strategic development.
- > Support arts in education and training and development of artists.

PERFORMANCE MEASURE



In fiscal 2001/02, the British Columbia Arts Council contributed \$69,000 to assist thirteen (13) professional arts organizations and artists in their participation in international cultural events and in the development of international markets. British Columbia artists receiving such assistance performed or exhibited in the United States, Europe, South America, Japan and South Africa during the past year.

Key highlights in this regard include:

- > Uzume Taiko's Northern European Tour.
- > Artist Stan Douglas representing Canada at the 25th Bienal de Sao Paulo.
- > Ken Lum, Jeff Wall and Stan Douglas representing Canada at the prestigious "Documenta 11" exhibition in Kassel, Germany.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

This funding is targeted to professionals, and often there is a requirement for provincial support in order for these artists and arts organizations to access federal funding. Further, there are resource constraints that limit the level of support that the BC Arts Council can provide.

Awards and recognition achieved by BC artists and cultural organizations.


- > The Modern Baroque Opera Company won the third annual Alcan Performing Arts Award. This \$50,000 production fund supported the creation of a new opera with music by Vancouver composer Peter Hannan titled, *120 Songs for the Marquis de Sade*, and was premiered at the Vancouver East Cultural Centre in March, 2002.
- > Joelle Ciona was invited to represent Canada at the inaugural triennial of contemporary art in Yokohama, Japan in August, 2001. As one of a hundred artists invited from around the world to participate in *MEGA WAVE Towards a New Synthesis*, Ciona also participated in a video screening at the Canadian Embassy in Tokyo.
- > Grain of Truth: The Ancient Lessons of Craft, a non-fiction book by Ross A. Laird of British Columbia, was nominated for the Governor General's Award in the Fall of 2001.
- > The Wolf of Gubbio, a children's book illustrated by Murray Kimber of British Columbia, and written by Michael Bedard was nominated for the Governor General's Award in the Fall of 2001 for Children's Literature Illustration. Kim LaFave's (British Columbia) illustration for We'll All Go Sailing was nominated in the same category.
- > Everything on a Waffle by Polly Horvath (British Columbia) was named in the annual Newbery Awards, 2002, which is awarded annually by the American Library Association for the most distinguished American children's book published the previous year.
- > Dana Claxton's film *The People Dance* had a screening at the Sundance Film Festival, in January 2002. Founded by Robert Redford and dedicated to the development of artists of independent vision and the exhibition of their new work, the Sundance Institute has presented an annual film festival in Utah since 1981.
- > Bowen Island playwright Joan MacLeod's *Shape of a Girl* has enjoyed an extensive national tour. The play examines teen bullying in general, and the death of Victoria teen Reena Virk specifically.
- > BC trained artists such as tenors Ben Heppner and Richard Margison, jazz artist, Diana Krall and popular artist Nelly Furtado achieved significant recognition in 2001/2002 and continue to build their international careers.
- > Six internationally respected BC artists were inducted into the Order of British Columbia: visual artist, Robert Bateman; children's performer, Raffi Cavoukian; First Nations carver, Simon Charlie; opera singer, Judith Forst; singer, Sarah McLaughlin; and visual artist, Myfanwy Pavelic.






Performances and residencies by artists in the public school system.

A total of 3,500 performance events and residencies in 57 school districts were supported in 2001/02.



KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

Through the Artists in Education program, awards are provided to secure School District participation in the presentation of professional arts events to young audiences. This program is delivered in partnership with the Vancouver Foundation and the ArtStarts in Schools Society, with the BC Arts Council having contributed a total of \$275,000 in fiscal 2001/02.



In keeping with this measure, *Professional Development Assistance for Individual Artists* provides assistance for short-term, concentrated periods of study, at an advanced level, for professional artists in many different disciplines. The program assists media artists to attend the Canadian Film Centre Residencies (for Directors, Editors and Writers) which "opens doors" in the world of Canadian film, as well as the Banff Centre's Women in the Director's Chair. It was also able to assist a number of artists to work with renowned vocal teacher, Richard Armstrong. Additionally, artists working in a variety of art forms such as traditional Quebecois step dance, traditional Chinese music and opera techniques, luthier (bow) making from a Master Luthier, and advanced weaving techniques have been assisted.

A total of 24 artists were supported in their efforts to improve their professional qualifications and skills through this program.

GOAL

Effective, respected and efficient administration and evaluative processes.

OBJECTIVES

- > An effective policy and program development process.
- > Cost effective program administration.
- > An equitable, transparent and accountable adjudication process.

TARGETS

> Administrative costs will remain below 10% of awards.

STRATEGIES

- > Continuously evaluate program benefits.
- > Consult with the public.
- > Provide an independent and merit-based evaluation process.
- > Control costs.

Acceptance of process by stakeholders.

Over the last three fiscal years, the following number of appeals have been made in relation to decisions rendered by the BC Arts Council and its advisory committees:

- > Two (2) appeals in 1999/2000.
- > Two (2) appeals in 2000/2001.
- > Two (2) appeals in 2001/2002.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

Appeals are considered to programs evaluated by advisory committees. Appeals are not accepted to juried programs given the impossibility of recreating the jury context.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

A proportion of the time and associated staff costs of the Cultural Services Branch within the Ministry of Community, Aboriginal and Women's Affairs is dedicated in support of the BC Arts Council, but is not reflected in the above figures. Further, in fiscal 2000/2001, the BC Arts Council was not operating with a full complement of directors, which had the effect of lowering the administrative costs for this year.



The BC Arts Council has met its budget allocations and targets. However, although a one-time funding allowance was granted in fiscal 2000/01, the resources that are

available to the BC Arts Council limit its ability to support the arts and cultural sector to realize its full potential.

- > Values: The principles of the BC Arts Council what it stands for and believes in.
- > Vision statement: A vision statement represents what the future should or can be as envisioned by the members of the BC Arts Council.

BRITISH COLUMBIA ARTS COUNCIL

The British Columbia Arts Council is an independent agency established by the Province of British Columbia to:

- 1. provide support for arts and culture in British Columbia,
- provide individuals and organizations with the opportunity to participate in the arts and culture in British Columbia, and
- provide an open, accountable, and neutrally administered process for managing funds for arts and culture in BC.

In performing its duties, the Arts Council must:


- 1. consult with artists, arts and cultural organizations, governments, and other interested communities,
- 2. allocate the money appropriated annually for the Council by the Legislature, and
- 3. support arts and culture in British Columbia through the following:

- > public education, research and advocacy,
- > awarding grants, and
- > the production and distribution of information on the Council and arts and culture in British Columbia.

THE ROLE OF THE CULTURAL SERVICES BRANCH

The Cultural Services Branch is responsible for:

- > ensuring the complete and orderly management of all BC Arts Council programs;
- > consulting with arts organizations, individuals and other government agencies to exchange information pertaining to programs, guidelines, and ministry policy;
- > preparing regular reports on the effectiveness of programs and policies, needs of the arts community, and administrative procedures; and



DEVELOPMENT OF PROGRAM GUIDELINES

The guidelines outlined in individual program descriptions have been developed through consultation with individuals and organizations in the arts and cultural community, along with recommendations from the BC Arts Council and its advisory committees. Program guidelines and eligibility criteria are regularly reviewed and updated. Programs are subject to revision, suspension or cancellation without notice.

While program guidelines are not intended to limit the applicant's creativity, they do indicate the general priorities and goals of the awards programs.

APPLICATION POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

APPLICATION PROCEDURE

- 1. All applicants must contact the appropriate program coordinator prior to making application.
- 2. Applications must be made on forms provided. Additional application requirements are specific to each program and must be submitted

- according to program guidelines, which are available from the branch. The branch is not responsible for the loss or damage of supporting materials submitted with applications.
- 3. Applications will not be accepted retroactively.
- 4. Any major changes in budgets and/or projects, after an application has been submitted, must be provided in writing and discussed with the appropriate program coordinator.
- 5. Applicant organizations may be required to submit an audited financial statement.
- 6. Applicants must allow staff, BC Arts Council members, advisors or authorized assessors reasonable access to view the applicants' facilities, work, program or project funded.

ASSESSMENT PROCESS

Each application received is first registered and then assigned to a program coordinator, who is responsible for ensuring that the application is complete and meets eligibility criteria for the program in question.

Following preparation by the program coordinator, each application is presented for adjudication to a minimum of one of the following bodies:

- > an independent peer jury
- >an advisory committee for the applicable discipline
- >the Management Committee
- > the British Columbia Arts Council.

Awards are considered by the British Columbia Arts Council at one of several meetings held annually.

AWARDS DECISIONS AND NOTIFICATION

Applicants are notified of decisions in writing following the review process, which may require 10 to 12 weeks or more after the deadline.

- 1. All applicants will be notified of the award decisions by letter. Applicants receiving an award must fulfil any terms or conditions determined during the adjudication process. The BC Arts Council will notify applicants of any terms and conditions related to award payment schedules. Awards may not necessarily be at the maximum level of support available.
- 2. Operating award decisions may be appealed. Notice of appeal must be filed with the BC Arts Council within 30 days of the decision announcement. Appeals must be based on significant new information which was unavailable at the time of the

original evaluation. Juried arts awards decisions are not subject to appeal.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF AWARDS

Recipients are informed that as a condition of funding, the BC Arts Council requires that award recipients acknowledge the support of the British Columbia Arts Council in all promotional materials. This includes media releases, advertisements, posters, programs and other promotional materials.

The logo must be used on posters, brochures, print ads and programs and used where possible on media releases and signage related to the funded project.
