In this Canadian novel, Travis lives with his aunt and uncle in a trailer court while his mother, a country-and-western singer, travels. Travis loves to sew, and he is often bullied because he is different than the other boys. Junior High is better than Elementary School for Travis and his best friend, a physically challenged girl named Chantelle, because they are encouraged by two teachers to accept new challenges that foster their creativity. The bullying, however, reaches a deplorable level. Your child will be challenged to consider the impact of bullying.

This Canadian novel tells the story of "one loser's" attempt to break free of his label. Fifteen-year-old Alex Sherwood starts the 'Losers' Club to help him and his friends deal with the bullying they face at McLuhan High. Instead of letting their self-esteem fall, the youth who are bullied support and encourage each other. The story builds up to an unusual duel when Alex challenges the school bully to enter into the local Christmas lights competition.
