Chairperson's Message

The Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) was created by the Government of Saskatchewan to distribute a portion of casino profits to benefit Saskatchewan's people and communities. Each year the CIF receives 25 per cent less two million dollars of net profits of the Saskatchewan Gaming Corporation, generated from the Regina and Moose Jaw casinos. The government appointed Board of Trustees manages and administers the fund. The Board consists of eight representatives who have a long history of volunteering their time and efforts to benefit Saskatchewan's people.

In 2005-06, the Trustees worked closely with the Department of Culture, Youth and Recreation to review the CIF. Through a written consultation process, all Saskatchewan municipalities and CIF delivery partners were invited to provide comments. Based on the consultation and input from the Trustees, a purpose statement for the CIF was approved by the government in March 2006. The renewed CIF will be sustainable into the future and will focus on responding to community based projects that enhance human development and community vitality.

Throughout 2005-06, the CIF supported many excellent activities to create centennial legacies in communities throughout the province. Centennial initiatives were supported in areas of aboriginal participation in sport, culture and recreation, physical activity, and community centennial projects.

Centennial grants included homecoming, heritage commemoration, facilities and grants to encourage intercultural understanding. Aboriginal participation and leadership development opportunities were created through Northern, provincial and urban initiatives. The *Saskatchewan in motion* campaign helped increase the level of physical activity of Saskatchewan people.

The Trustees were pleased to continue to offer the Community Grant Program with the assistance of the Regional Intersectoral Committees. This program has operated since 1997 and continues to support community projects that benefit children, youth and families.



The successful delivery of CIF programs is due to the excellent work done by our delivery partners who help us to offer these programs at the regional and local level. We also appreciate the administrative services that are provided to us by Sask Sport.

I would like to thank all of the volunteers who sat on adjudication committees over the past few years. The work required to get through the large volume of grant applications by each deadline is often a daunting task, but the knowledge, expertise and time commitment provided by the volunteers is very much appreciated. I would also like to extend my sincerest thank you to the other individuals who continue to volunteer their services to the Board of Trustees – Randy Goulden, Cheryl Bauer Hyde, Don McDougall, Joe McKay, Audra Young, Kevin Scott and Guy Tourigny.

CIF in Action

The CIF supported 680 grants during the past year. Although we have only highlighted a few success stories in the following section, we would like to commend all of the organizations who provided community programming, as well as those that organized Centennial projects that left ongoing legacies throughout the province.

2005 Doukhobor Centennial Choir – High Performance Tour

CIF provided the 2005 Doukhobor Centennial Choir with a grant for the choir's High Performance Tour through the Centennial Celebrating Community grant. Over 40 members from eight different Doukhobor Societies joined to form the choir and produce a CD. During its tours, the choir performed in front of approximately 2,000 people.

When Her Honour The Honorable Dr. Haverstock presided over the ceremony that designated the Doukhobor Dugout house as a heritage site, the 2005 Doukhobor Centennial Choir performed and presented Her Honor with a copy of their CD.

The choir sang at the Blaine Lake Celebrations, the Centennial Homecoming at Langham and participated in the opening of the Doukhobor Heritage Village Museum in Verigin. Later in the summer, the choir performed at the 2005 Doukhobor Homecoming, which was attended by participants from Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia.

The 2005 Doukhobor Centennial Choir's High Performance Tour was successful in providing tributes to the province during its centennial year.

“Prairie Roots” Prince Albert Youth Hip Hop Music Collaboration Project

This musical project received funding from the Community Grant program to have professional performing artists link with youth from various backgrounds. The hands-on, music-based program was available without charge to youth of any background. The project involved over 850 participants and received strong support from both the community and media.

Through the mediums of Hip-Hop music and rap-poetry, the youth developed new artistic skills while learning from affirmative role models, including Aboriginal artists and leaders. The artists focused on lyrics with upbeat messages and encouraged the youth to develop a positive self-image. Participants were taught songwriting, physical conditioning, production and confidence.

The youth used Hip-Hop to speak about the social and cultural issues relevant to them. In more advanced workshops, they created music and worked toward producing their own CDs.

Local performance nights gave the youth opportunities to showcase their performances within schools and the community, as well as to perform before an audience of 1,200 at the Youth Arts Festival.

Living Artfully

Through Aboriginal Arts and Cultural Leadership, funding was provided for a major project in Saskatoon called “Living Artfully,” which was administered by the Saskatchewan Arts Board. “Living Artfully” taught at-risk and transient Aboriginal youth how to use art to achieve social change.

Professional artist, Adrian Stimpson, was hired, and a studio was rented for the program. Students became involved in eco-art experiences that were used with First Nations spiritual understanding. Due to the beliefs that every person has an artistic spirit and art can be made by anyone, every level of artistic talent and interest was welcomed. The students were also shown that art is not only found in museums and galleries.

The students used self-exploration and the appreciation of the local natural environment to create contemporary art. Several artistic mediums were used, including photography, welding, carpentry and painting. Two of the projects that the students were involved in required looking for patterns in nature. Then the youth photographed and video taped those patterns.

The culmination of “Living Artfully” was a major outdoor festival and exhibition called “Live Life” held at the Mendel Art Gallery in June.

100 Years of Harvest Tour

The Lastiwka Ukrainian Choir and Orchestra received funding from the Centennial Celebrating Community grant program to commemorate the Ukrainian settlers through the 100 Years of Harvest Tour. Lastiwka Choir is a 60 voice Ukrainian choral ensemble and seven piece orchestra that has a 20 year performance legacy. Members of the choir include citizens of Ukrainian descent from across Saskatchewan between the ages of 14 and 40 years, with the majority being high school and university students.

The choir returned to the settlements where Ukrainian immigrants first settled in Saskatchewan and, in remembrance of the harvest season that sustained these people, performed concerts with music and harvest folk songs just as they were performed 100 years ago. Over a period of two weeks, they performed at North Battleford, Hafford, Prince Albert, Cudworth, Humboldt, Foam

Lake, Yorkton and Ituna. The 100 Years of Harvest Tour rejuvenated the traditions of the Ukrainian ancestors who brought their music to this province.

RISK IT ALL Camp-In

The Saskatchewan Science Centre developed a program to include 1,000 students in an overnight risk-taking adventure. Funding for the program was granted through the Problem Gambling component of CIE, which brought classes of 20-40 youth to the Science Centre for an evening of programming. The students ranged in age from Grades 7 to 12 and represented under-served, at-risk and rural youth. The RISK IT ALL Camp-In used facts, fun and interaction to educate youth about risks, odds and luck versus skill.

The camp-in program began with *Risk n’ Roll*, an activity where one of 100 balls is chosen from a bucket to demonstrate the odds of probability. Then, the group discussed other chance-based activities, such as rolling a die. Since gambling involves risk-taking, the *Climbing Wall* activity introduced students to the idea of evaluating the degree of risk. The thrills the students experienced while climbing, resembled the “thrill of winning,” which is the highest-ranked reason as to why Canadians choose to gamble. The students were shown that just as they protected themselves in a climb, they could also protect themselves by setting limits in gambling.

Risk Jeopardy was an interactive game show contest played with a computer and SMART Board. Teams of students competed to answer questions in a number of categories. This game tested their understanding of probability and gambling from a sociological perspective. *Risk It All Toss* was an activity that was very effective for discovering the risk behavior of individuals – whether individuals choose to take large or small risks. It also illustrated the effect that peer pressure can have on decision making.

The students who participated in the RISK IT ALL Camp-In said that they learned that there is a huge difference between playing games of skill and games of chance. Letters from teachers expressed thanks to the Camp-In for using math, in a fun and safe environment, to explain gambling risks.

Signage for the Fort Walsh Wood Mountain Trail

Descriptive and bilingual plaques were placed in the Wood Mountain Post Provincial Historic Park to mark the location of the important historic trail that runs between Wood Mountain and Fort Walsh. The markers describe the value and necessity of the trail when it was in use as well as the purpose of the posts.

Funding through CIF was contributed to the Centennial Heritage Commemoration Program for Identifying the Fort Walsh – Wood Mountain Trail. This trail covers a distance of approximately 305 kilometers and has a rich history. The Métis made Wood Mountain their summer headquarters where they hunted buffalo. The pelts were then transported by Red River Cart along the trail where wagon ruts can still be seen today. Sitting Bull used the trail to travel to Fort Walsh to negotiate with the American soldiers. This route was also used extensively by the North West Mounted Police in the late 1800s in order to transport supplies, troops and dispatches between Fort Walsh and their outpost at Wood Mountain.

A few years ago, the exact location of the trail was determined and 260 white concrete posts were erected along the way. However, due to the curiosity of visitors concerning the markers, it became obvious that signage was necessary to explain the trail and its markers. The unveiling of the plaques took place on August 27, 2005 by Her Honour The Honourable Dr. Lynda Haverstock.

Super Saturdays

Receiving funding from the Urban Aboriginal Community Grant Program, “Super Saturdays” entered its tenth successful year as an educational program committed to providing First Nations youth with hands-on exposure in the fields of science, mathematics and medicine. Professions in these fields have traditionally experienced little involvement from First Nations people. The program provided students with “real life” career experiences and guided them towards post-secondary opportunities. This past year over 1,200 students in Grades 4 to 12 became involved in Saturday workshops taught by volunteer mentors between the ages of 16 and 25.

Day camps were held ten times during the school year. The days began with a pipe ceremony, and then the students broke into two groups. One sample lesson involved engineering where students worked together to build bridges and geodesic domes. The domes were built much like the traditional sweat lodges, and an elder explained the significance of the sweat lodges. In this way, the students became familiar with what is taught in university engineering classes.

During “Super Saturdays,” the students were excited to recognize their particular talents and be directed towards a university education that would incorporate these talents.

Community Centre Upgraded

The Turtleford and District Agricultural Society received funding under the Centennial Facility grant program to upgrade their arena. A new concrete floor was installed in the arena, turning the facility into a multi-purpose, year-round recreational facility. Prior to this improvement, the arena was unusable for seven months of the year, limiting many community events and hampering general facility maintenance.

Other renovations included a new storage room for the Zamboni as well as new piping, upgraded boards and bleachers. The result of this upgrade is a year-round venue for community groups and a place that district youth can enjoy.

Set Me Free

St. Mary's School in North Battleford received funding through the Community component to run the "Set Me Free" program. The program was successful in motivating previously non-participating parents of Grade 1 students to become involved in the school. The parents were of Métis and First Nations ancestry who – due to abuse, poverty and their own negative backgrounds within the school system – lacked the confidence to attend school activities with their children. Through "Set Me Free," these parents and caregivers began volunteering for field trips, attending parent/teacher interviews and reading with their children at home.

CIF funding was primarily used to purchase numerous books and reading incentives for the students such as skipping ropes, pencils, erasers and toothbrushes. "Set Me Free" also provided the parents with both transportation to the school and childcare after they arrived.

During the "Set Me Free" program, every time a student's parent came to the school, the student had the opportunity to choose a new book for themselves. When it became apparent that a reason for some parents' unwillingness to take part in the "Set Me Free" program was their own inability to read, a literacy program was established for them.

Families & Schools Together

CIF provided funding for the Families & Schools Together program in Yorkton. The program targeted elementary school children who were having problems at home and/or at school. The program involves both the community and the families, and ran one night a week for eight weeks, involving up to 13 students and their families. Volunteers for the program included an addictions counselor, a member of the RCMP, a member of the Society for the Involvement of Good Neighbours (SIGN), high school students (who provided care for the preschoolers) and two parents who were active in the school.

Each meeting began with a supper prepared at the school. On the first night the volunteer team cooked a meal for the families, however, during the following weeks the families took turns preparing supper for the others. Parent volunteers provided assistance in shopping and meal preparation. The remainder of the evening was spent in various activities that promoted communication and interaction between the students and their parents. One such activity was a game of charades where families learned for the first time how to express their feelings to each other.

The parents, who previously felt isolated, spent time together and formed community relationships. Parents and their children watched a video concerning drugs, which provided the parents an opportunity to discuss drug usage with their children. The final evening was a graduation ceremony. Each family was presented with a scrapbook of photos, the first time many of them had ever had a family photo. This program offers families an excellent opportunity to spend time together and allows them to grow as a family.

Notes to Financial Statements

1. Nature of operations:

The Community Initiatives Fund (the "Fund"), previously known as the Associated Entities Fund, was established on August 23, 1996 by The Saskatchewan Gaming Corporation Act. It is managed by a Board of Trustees consisting of eight people appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council. The Board of Trustees is responsible for managing and operating the Fund.

Pursuant to The Saskatchewan Gaming Corporation Act, and other agreements, the Government of Saskatchewan receives, into the General Revenue Fund, certain gaming revenues. The Minister of Finance transfers a portion of these gaming revenues to the Fund. The Trustees of the Fund grant these revenues to persons, organizations or associations in Saskatchewan for purposes prescribed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council upon application to the Board of Trustees.

The Fund has an agreement with Sask Sport Inc. to provide administrative services to the Fund. In 2006 Sask Sport Inc. was paid \$150,000 (2005 - \$230,000) for these services.

2. Significant accounting policies:

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

Grant expense:

Grants are recognized when a completed grant application is received from an eligible organization and approved by the Board of Trustees.

Grant returns:

Grant returns are recognized when a completed follow up report is received indicating funds were not fully utilized and approval is obtained from the Board of Trustees.

Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Differences are reflected in current earnings when identified.

Revenue Recognition:

Revenues are recognized in accordance with accounting principles applicable to non-profit organizations. Transfers from the General Revenue Fund are recognized when received or receivable. Interest revenue is recognized when earned.

3. Designated net assets:

Pursuant to directions given under the governing legislation, the Trustees of the Fund have designated net assets as follows:

- **Community Grants** to fund programs for vulnerable children, youth and families at the community level;
- **Community Cultural Facilities** to fund building or upgrading of community cultural facilities;
- **Problem Gambling** for initiatives to address problem gambling;
- **Regional Exhibition Associations;**
- **Fitness** to fund projects aimed at increasing physical activity.
- **Aboriginal Participation** to fund projects aimed at increasing aboriginal participation in sport, culture and recreation;
- **Centennial 2005** to fund projects surrounding Saskatchewan's Centennial in 2005.

These designated net assets are not available for other purposes without the approval of the Trustees. Changes, during the current year, to these designated net assets were as follows:

4. Financial instruments and risks:

Fair value:

The recorded value of receivable from Province of Saskatchewan – General Revenue Fund and grants payable approximates fair value due to the short term nature of these items.

Credit and interest rate risk:

The Fund is not subject to significant credit or interest rate risk.

5. Related party transactions:

These financial statements include transactions with related parties. The Fund is related to all Saskatchewan Crown agencies such as departments, corporations, boards and commissions under the common control of the Government of Saskatchewan. Also, the Fund is related to non-Crown enterprises that the Government jointly controls or significantly influences.

During the year, the Fund paid grants of \$151,386 (2005 - \$206,160) to certain Saskatchewan Regional Health Authorities for various initiatives.

Other transactions with related parties and amounts due to/from them are described separately in to financial statements and the notes thereto.
