Distance Learning: Tools and Strategies

University of Saskatchewan

This program provides multiple formats for a senior undergraduate and a graduate university-credit course in educational communications and technology (EDCMM 404.3 and 804.3). The print package and CD-ROM guide students through the instructional process and provide most of the course content. Interactive components include televised sessions, computer-mediated communication and teleconferencing.

EDCMM 404.3 examines issues, tools and strategies for developing, organizing and implementing distance education programs for elementary and secondary levels. It covers the historical and theoretical foundations of distance education from a provincial, national and international perspective. Students explore distance education systems, technology, instructional design and course design through presentation, demonstration and experimentation. The course compares distance education in Saskatchewan with similar systems across Canada.

EDCMM 804.3 includes program development, international education, research and theory.

Saskatchewan Education, Post-Secondary
Education and Skills Training, the Board of
Teacher Education, Saskatchewan Teachers'
Federation and Saskatchewan School Trustees
Association have identified distance education as a
priority for increasing access to education and
training across the province. Using multiple
formats helps students to combine theory with
hands-on experience in distance learning and
technology.
