U-STUDY Online Library Services Handbook

University of Saskatchewan

The U-STUDY Online Handbook offers non-credit instruction on library research skills primarily via the web. Library orientation, bibliographic information, and Author-Title and Subject request forms are available electronically for off-campus students. A sequence of blended visual slides with voice-over narration demonstrates the basic steps for searching an automated catalogue or journal indexing services. These audiovisual materials are also available on a CD-ROM for students with slower Internet connections. Students forward comments, queries and reference questions via e-mail.

The program is designed to provide a generic orientation to university libraries and the basic research tools used by off-campus students for written essay assignments.

Although systems are in place for off-campus university students to search, request and receive library materials, direct access to a research librarian, bibliographic instruction, or instruction on researching essay assignments is not readily available. The U-STUDY Online Handbook enables students to develop these important library research skills without having to travel to the library on-campus.
