Did you know?

- Our fiscal year runs from April 1 to March 31
- There are approximately 2,200 employees in the Department of Community Resources making it one of the largest departments in the provincial government.
- Staff in the department's Contact Centre answer over 20,000 calls each month.
- Since Building Independence started in 1997, 7,800 families and more than 17,000 children no longer rely on social assistance.
- On any given day, there are about 1,500 children and youth in the care of the department.
- Since the release of the Disability Action Plan in 2001, the Saskatchewan government has invested more than \$37 million, including \$12 million this year, in new funding to support people with disabilities.
- The Saskatchewan Housing Corporation manages about \$2.7 billion in public housing assets.
- Most of the department's programs are delivered locally through five regional offices and service centres located in 22 communities across the province.

Budget Highlights 2006-2007 – Community Resources total budget for 2006-2007 is \$603 million.

Income Support Programs

- \$40/month increase to the Saskatchewan Assistance Plan adult basic allowance
- \$1.5 million for Transitional Employment Allowance utility rate allowance increase

- \$50/month increase to Transitional Employment Allowance general living allowance
- \$1.15 million to enhance the Saskatchewan Employment Supplement
- Saskatchewan Rental Housing Supplement rate increase and inclusion of people with cognitive disabilities
- \$3.6 million increase to child care subsidies

Child and Family Services

- \$6 million increase for children requiring care outside the home, including cost of living adjustment for foster care and assisted adoption
- \$600,000 to support drug addicted youth
- \$700,000 increase for First Nations Child and Family Services

Housing

- \$53.4 million for over 900 new affordable housing units, including more than 90 in the North
- \$13.4 million for rental repair and renovation programs for 1,300 qualifying homeowners and landlords
