BUDGET 2003

Building Our Future Together

Finance Minister and President of Treasury Board Joan Marie Aylward delivered Budget 2003 on Thursday, March 27, which outlined expenditures of approximately \$4 billion.

"This year's budget will demonstrate once again that any commitment made by this government to the people of the province will be a commitment kept. Over our term we have made commitments to enhance education and youth opportunities, to better health care and to help those most in need. We continue to honour those commitments.

"This budget reflects many of the social and economic priorities we heard during our pre-budget public consultations. In every consultation session, we were told repeatedly to target strategic areas for expenditures, to be disciplined financial managers, and to achieve deficit reduction over the longer term so that we do not jeopardize the strong economic growth this province is experiencing. We are responding to that challenge and the strong direction we were given not to have a 'slash and burn' deficit reduction program that would result in layoffs in the public service and reductions to existing government programs and services.

"Our priority is to ensure that our economic and employment growth continues. We are striking a balance between being disciplined in our expenditures and directing our resources to initiatives that will build on the strong economic and social foundations we have already established." Minister Aylward said the province continues to experience economic and employment growth.

Budget 2003 initiatives focus on youth and education

The 2003 Budget committed that government will invest heavily in education and youth service initiatives throughout the province. This includes retaining 218 teaching positions in 2003-04, representing a \$12 million additional investment in the education system. Over the next two years, government will contribute \$5 million towards a federal-provincial Broadband project in the province, with \$2.5 million in funding being allocated in Budget 2003.

Government is allocating \$2.5 million towards phasing in the implementation of recommendations in the Warren Report respecting secretarial and janitorial/maintenance staff services in the school system. Budget 2003 also allocates \$6.2 million for curriculum development, including \$1.7 million toward

implementing a portion of the curriculum-related recommendations in the Sparkes - Williams Report bringing the total expenditure on implementing the curriculum recommendations of the report to more than \$5.1 million over the past three years. In addition government is continuing funding for the Community Access Program (CAP), with new funding of \$1.8 million in Budget 2003.

Government has invested a total of \$45 million from consolidations into the school system, in addition to \$176.8 million for new capital construction and school maintenance and repair. Including the \$8.5 million for 2003 -04, this represents a total investment by government of \$230 million into the system since reorganization in 1997.
