Cooperation on Forestry Management

Forest Resources and Agrifoods Minister Kevin Aylward and Innu Nation President Peter Penashue recently signed an agreement on forestry management and development in Labrador. The agreement provides for full participation by the Innu Nation in management planning, designing practices and prescriptions for ongoing operations, and exploring models for co-management of resources.

"Government is aware of the strong bond the Innu people have with the land," said the minister.

"Accordingly, any development of forest resources must use an ecosystem-based approach which recognizes all of the values within the forest ecosystem."

Activities under the agreement include completing a forest management plan, guiding forestry operations in the interim, and negotiating a long-term co-management agreement between government and the Innu Nation. The province will commit over \$520,000 during the next 12 months to conclude the forest management plan and advance the Labrador forest industry. Public meetings in the near future will provide stakeholders an opportunity to have input into the plan before it is finalized.

Continued Funding For REDAS Program

Premier Beaton Tulk and Industry Minister Brian Tobin announced that the Regional and Economic Development and Schools (REDAS) program will continue to receive federal and provincial government funding. REDAS is designed to teach young people about the economic opportunities available in the province.

Since its inception in 1999, REDAS has developed 36 learning modules in provincial schools focusing on such topics as tourism, fine arts and mining. "The learning modules will give students the skills they need to identify economic opportunities at both their local and regional levels. This is an important step in making the school learning environment more relevant to students, and in enhancing the role of education in regional economic development," said Premier Tulk.
