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Call of By-Election

Pursuant to subsection 35(a) of *The Legislative Assembly and Executive Council Act, 1979*, Mr. William R. Boyd, The Saskatchewan Party, vacated his seat in the constituency of Kindersley on April 4, 2002. On September 5, 2002, pursuant to an Order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, a Writ of Election was issued by the Chief Electoral Officer to Ms. Dorothy Arthurs, constituency returning officer. The Writ ordered that the by-election be held on Friday, October 4, 2002. An Election Calendar for the Kindersley by-election is included on the last page of the Official Report.

Prior to the October 4, 2002 by-election, standing in the Legislative Assembly included: 29 New Democrat, 25 Saskatchewan Party, 3 Independent and 1 vacant.

Constituency Boundaries

The Kindersley constituency boundary was enacted in 1994 under *The Representation Act, 1994*, on the recommendation of the Constituency Boundaries Commission, 1993, as established under *The Constituency Boundaries Act, 1993*. Polling divisions for purposes of the Kindersley by-election included forty-eight (48) regular polls and four (4) personal care facilities. The Kindersley constituency polling subdivision map and Directory of Communities are set out in Appendices I and V, respectively.

Registered Political Party and Candidate Nomination

At the time of the Kindersley by-election, the Office recognized the existence of six (6) political parties in the Register of Political Parties, as maintained pursuant to section 231 of *The Election Act, 1996* (the "Act"). On September 18, 2002, nomination of candidates concluded. At close of nomination, only three (3) of the Province's registered political parties nominated candidates, as follows:

Enumeration

From the 5th of September through to the 14th of September, enumeration of eligible electors was conducted for the constituency's fifty-two polling divisions. Pursuant to section 26 of the Act, constituency enumerators sat on September 30, 2002 to make necessary revisions to the voters' lists. As a result of these efforts, 9,641 Kindersley residents were declared eligible to vote, as established on the revised voters' list. In addition, pursuant to section 68 of the Act, eligible electors not included on the revised voters' list were entitled to vote by declaration.

Polling

On the 28th, 29th, 30th of September and 1st and 2nd days of October, three (3) advance polls were conducted in the Kindersley constituency. To facilitate electorate participation, special polling stations were established in two (2) hospitals. Regular polling stations were open from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. CST on October 4, 2002, enabling the constituency's 9,641 eligible voters the opportunity to exercise their democratic franchise. Eligible voters unable to attend either a regular, special or advance poll were entitled to vote by absentee ballot.

Electoral Results

Unofficial electoral results were announced on the evening of October 4, 2002, resulting in Mr. Jason Dearborn, Saskatchewan Party, being declared Member-elect. Deposits were forfeited by the Liberal and New Democratic Party candidates, pursuant to section 47 of the Act, for not obtaining at least one half of the total number of valid votes cast for the candidate elected.

On October 16, 2002, the constituency returning officer tabulated the results of votes cast in the advance polls, special provision polls and by absentee ballot. These figures were then reflected in the constituency results concluding the final count. Upon completion of the final count, on October 28, 2002, the constituency returning officer made a Return to the Writ of Election. On November 8, 2002, the Office published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* (Vol. 98, No. 45) notice of receipt of the Return to the Writ and the name of the candidate elected.

Registered Political Party and Candidate Financial Reporting

Pursuant to section 251 of the Act, audited Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses, Form E-524, were required to be filed with the Chief Electoral Officer within six (6) months of polling day (April 5, 2003). Under section 261 of the Act, candidates were required to file an audited Candidate's Return of Election Expenses, Form E-412, with the constituency returning officer, for subsequent forwarding to the Chief Electoral Officer, within three (3) months of the candidate returned being declared elected (January 16, 2003). Pursuant to the Act, the constituency returning officer published, in prescribed form, a summary of all returns respecting candidate election expenses prior to February 14, 2003.

i) Registered Political Parties

As a southern constituency, the maximum amount of money that could be spent by a registered political party in the Kindersley by-election, as set out in section 243 of the Act, was (a) the sum of \$35,977.00 or (b) the sum obtained by multiplying the number of voters in the constituency (9,641) by \$2.88, whichever sum was larger. A registered political party that endorsed a candidate who obtained fifteen (15) percent or more of all valid votes cast in the by-election and whose chief official agent filed a Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses,² pursuant to section 264 of the Act, was entitled to receive a reimbursement of a portion of its election expenses from the Province's General Revenue Fund. The amount reimbursed to a qualifying political party was the lesser of either (a) \$11,992.33 or (b) one third of its election expenses.

All participating parties in the Kindersley by-election filed their duly audited Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses on or before April 5, 2003. Contributions made to political parties are not listed in the Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses but are set out in each party's fiscal period return, filed in accordance with section 250 of the Act. Appendix II sets out a summary of eligible expenses incurred by the registered political parties in Kindersley and the amounts paid in respect of each party who qualified for reimbursement.

ii) Candidates

Candidates seeking election in Kindersley were limited in the amount of money that they could expend. Again, as a southern constituency, a candidate seeking election was entitled to spend, pursuant to section 252 of the Act, either (a) the sum of \$43,173.00 or (b) the sum obtained by multiplying the number of eligible voters in the constituency by \$2.88, whichever sum was larger. A candidate who obtained fifteen (15) percent or more of all valid votes cast in Kindersley and whose business manager filed with the constituency returning officer a Candidate's Return of Election Expenses,³ pursuant to section 265 of the Act, was entitled to reimbursement of a portion of their eligible election expenses. The amount reimbursed to a qualifying candidate was an amount equal to one half of the candidate's election expenses to a maximum of \$21,586.50.

All candidates filed their returns respecting contributions received and election expenses incurred in the course of the by-election, duly audited, on or before January 16, 2003. On the 11th of April, 2003, the Office published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* (Vol. 99, No. 15) a summary of candidate contributions received and expenditures incurred in Kindersley, as well as the amounts paid in respect of each candidate who qualified for reimbursement.

² Pursuant to subsection 267(3) of the Act, auditing services rendered in respect of preparation of a report pertaining to a Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses is eligible for a maximum reimbursable allowance of \$2,210.00.

³ Pursuant to subsection 267(6) of the Act, auditing services rendered in respect of preparation of a report pertaining to a Candidate's Return of Election Expenses is eligible for a maximum reimbursable allowance of \$717.00.

Elections Saskatchewan Expenditures

The total cost of conducting the October 4, 2002 by-election in Kindersley was \$150,458.26. This figure is inclusive of, and reported by, administrative and constituency expenditure. See Appendix IV for an itemization of particular expenditures incurred in each of these two categories. Should further constituency expenditure specifics be required, refer to the Detail of Expenditures *The Election Act, 1996* Provincial Constituencies Fiscal Year 2002-2003, tabled in the Legislative Assembly on December 12, 2003.

Documentation

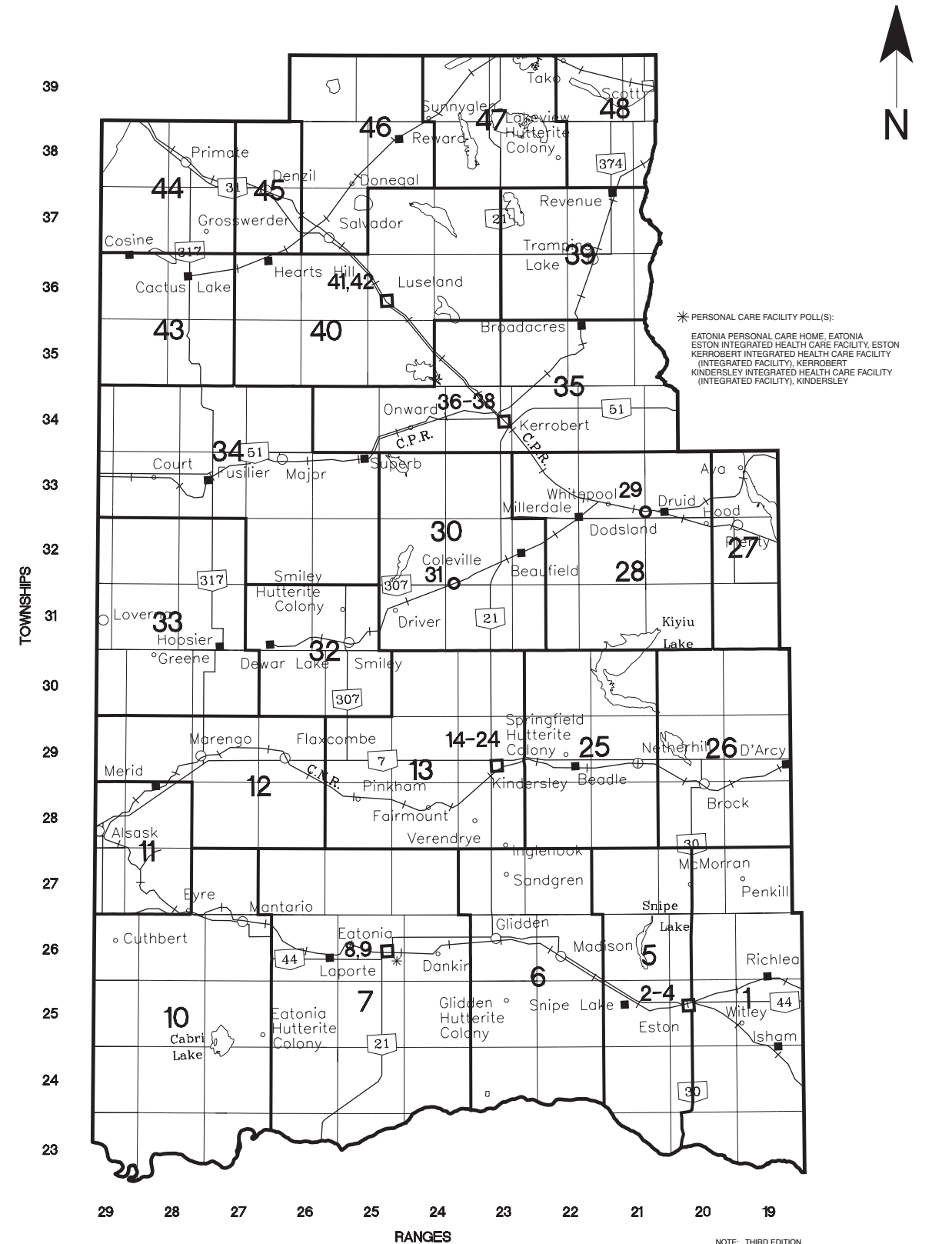
Pursuant to section 232 of the Act, the Chief Electoral Officer is obliged to hold, in addition to the information contained in the Register of Political Parties, all original financial particulars concerning registered political parties' fiscal period and election expenses documentation for the purposes of public inspection. Also held are the returns and the original financial documentation regarding individual candidate election expenses, pursuant to section 262 of the Act. Such information is available for public inspection during regular office hours at Elections Saskatchewan.
