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Call of By-Election

Pursuant to subsection 35(b) of *The Legislative Assembly and Executive Council Act, 1979*, Mr. Chris Axworthy, New Democratic Party, Sask. Section, vacated his seat in the constituency of Saskatoon Fairview on February 10, 2003. On February 17, 2003, pursuant to an Order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, a Writ of Election was issued by the Chief Electoral Officer to Ms. Danita Hingston, constituency returning officer. The Writ ordered that the by-election be held on Monday, March 17, 2003. An Election Calendar for the Saskatoon Fairview by-election is included on the last page of the Official Report.

Prior to the March 17, 2003 by-election, standing in the Legislative Assembly included: 28 New Democrat, 24 Saskatchewan Party, 3 Independent and 3 vacant.

Constituency Boundaries

The Saskatoon Fairview constituency boundary was enacted in 1994 under *The Representation Act, 1994*, on the recommendation of the Constituency Boundaries Commission, 1993, as established under *The Constituency Boundaries Act, 1993*. Polling divisions for purposes of the Saskatoon Fairview by-election included thirty-one (31) regular polls and one (1) personal care facility. The Saskatoon Fairview constituency polling subdivision map and Directory of Communities are set out in Appendices I and V, respectively.

Registered Political Party and Candidate Nomination

At the time of the Saskatoon Fairview by-election, the Office recognized the existence of six (6) political parties in the Register of Political Parties, as maintained pursuant to section 231 of *The Election Act, 1996* (the "Act"). On March 1, 2003, nomination of candidates concluded. At close of nomination, only four (4) of the Province's registered political parties nominated candidates, as follows:

Enumeration

From the 17th of February through to the 26th of February, enumeration of eligible electors was conducted for the constituency's thirty-two polling divisions. Pursuant to section 26 of the Act, constituency enumerators sat on March 13, 2003 to make necessary revisions to the voters' lists. As a result of these efforts, 7,711 Saskatoon Fairview residents were declared eligible to vote, as established on the revised voters' list. In addition, pursuant to section 68 of the Act, eligible electors not included on the revised voters' list were entitled to vote by declaration.

Polling

To facilitate the electorate's participation in the Saskatoon Fairview by-election, an advance poll was conducted on the 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th of March. Regular polling stations were open from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. CST on March 17, 2003, enabling the constituency's 7,711 eligible voters the opportunity to exercise their democratic franchise. Eligible voters unable to attend either a regular or advance poll were entitled to vote by absentee ballot.

Electoral Results

Unofficial electoral results were announced on the evening of March 17, 2003, resulting in Mr. Andy Iwanchuk, New Democrat, being declared Member-elect. The New Green Alliance candidate forfeited his deposit, pursuant to section 47 of the Act, for not obtaining at least one half of the total number of valid votes cast for the candidate elected.

On March 29, 2003, the constituency returning officer tabulated the results of votes cast by way of advance poll and absentee ballot. These figures were then reflected in the constituency results concluding the final count. Upon completion of the final count, on April 9, 2003, the constituency returning officer made a Return to the Writ of Election. On April 25, 2003, the Office published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* (Vol. 99, No. 17) notice of receipt of the Return to the Writ and the name of the candidate elected.

Registered Political Party and Candidate Financial Reporting

Pursuant to section 251 of the Act, audited Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses, Form E-524, were required to be filed with the Chief Electoral Officer within six (6) months of polling day (September 18, 2003). Under section 261 of the Act, candidates were required to file an audited Candidate's Return of Election Expenses, Form E-412, with the constituency returning officer, for subsequent forwarding to the Chief Electoral Officer, within three (3) months of the candidate returned being declared elected (June 29, 2003). Pursuant to the Act, the constituency returning officer published, in prescribed form, a summary of all returns respecting candidate election expenses prior to July 28, 2003.

i) Registered Political Parties

As a southern constituency, the maximum amount of money that could be spent by a registered political party in the Saskatoon Fairview by-election, as set out in section 243 of the Act, was (a) the sum of \$36,994.00 or (b) the sum obtained by multiplying the number of voters in the constituency (7,711) by \$2.96, whichever sum was larger. A registered political party that endorsed a candidate who obtained fifteen (15) percent or more of all valid votes cast in the by-election and whose chief official agent filed a Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses,² pursuant to section 264 of the Act, was entitled to receive a reimbursement of a portion of its election expenses from the Province's General Revenue Fund. The amount reimbursed to a qualifying political party was the lesser of either (a) \$12,331.33 or (b) one third of its election expenses.

All participating parties in the Saskatoon Fairview by-election filed their duly audited Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses on or before September 18, 2003. Contributions made to political parties are not listed in the Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses but are set out in each party's fiscal period return, filed in accordance with section 250 of the Act. Appendix II sets out a summary of eligible expenses incurred by the registered political parties in Saskatoon Fairview and the amounts paid in respect of each party who qualified for reimbursement.

ii) Candidates

Candidates seeking election in Saskatoon Fairview were limited in the amount of money that they could expend. Again, as a southern constituency, a candidate seeking election was entitled to spend, pursuant to section 252 of the Act, either (a) the sum of \$44,393.00 or (b) the sum obtained by multiplying the number of eligible voters in the constituency by \$2.96, whichever sum was larger. A candidate who obtained fifteen (15) percent or more of all valid votes cast in Saskatoon Fairview and whose business manager filed with the constituency returning officer a Candidate's Return of Election Expenses,³ pursuant to section 265 of the Act, was entitled to reimbursement of a portion of their eligible election expenses. The amount reimbursed to a qualifying candidate was an amount equal to one half of the candidate's election expenses to a maximum of \$22,196.50.

² Pursuant to subsection 267(3) of the Act, auditing services rendered in respect of preparation of a report pertaining to a Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses is eligible for a maximum reimbursable allowance of \$2,272.00.

³ Pursuant to subsection 267(6) of the Act, auditing services rendered in respect of preparation of a report pertaining to a Candidate's Return of Election Expenses is eligible for a maximum reimbursable allowance of \$737.00.

All candidates filed their returns respecting contributions received and election expenses incurred in the course of the by-election, duly audited, on or before June 29, 2003. On the 19th of December, 2003, the Office published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* (Vol. 99, No. 51) a summary of candidate contributions received and expenditures incurred in Saskatoon Fairview, as well as the amounts paid in respect of each candidate who qualified for reimbursement. Such contributions, expenditures and reimbursements are reported in Appendix III.

Elections Saskatchewan Expenditures

The total cost of conducting the March 17, 2003 by-election in Saskatoon Fairview was \$114,275.24. This figure is inclusive of, and reported by, administrative and constituency expenditure. See Appendix V for an itemization of particular expenditures incurred in each of these two categories. Should further constituency expenditure specifics be required, refer to the Detail of Expenditures *The Election Act, 1996* Provincial Constituencies Fiscal Year 2002-2003, tabled in the Legislative Assembly on December 12, 2003.

Documentation

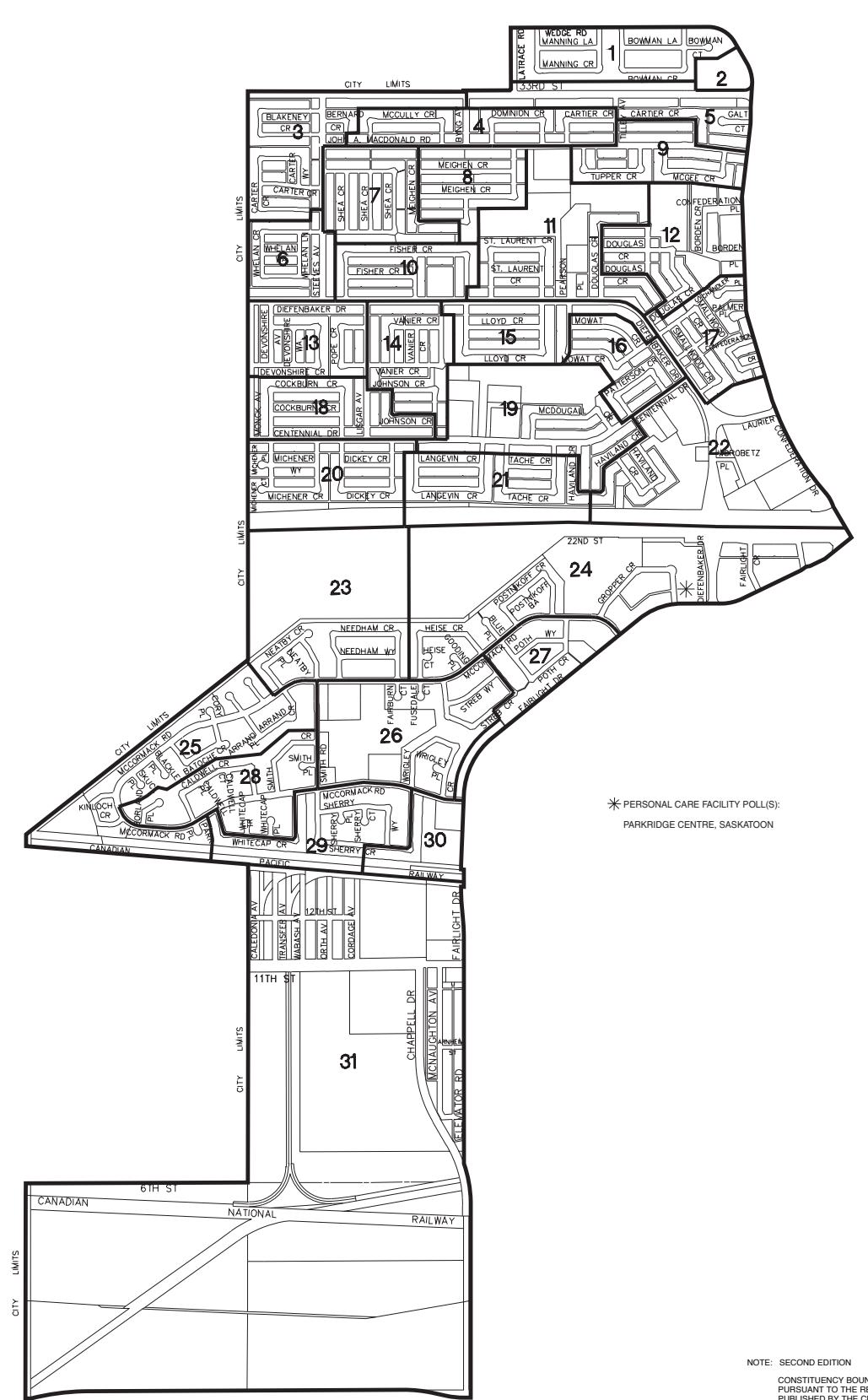
Pursuant to section 232 of the Act, the Chief Electoral Officer is obliged to hold, in addition to the information contained in the Register of Political Parties, all original financial particulars concerning registered political parties' fiscal period and election expenses documentation for the purposes of public inspection. Also held are the returns and the original financial documentation regarding individual candidate election expenses, pursuant to section 262 of the Act. Such information is available for public inspection during regular office hours at Elections Saskatchewan.
