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#### Call of By-Election

On February 24, 2000, D.F. (Yogi) Huyghebaert, The Saskatchewan Party, pursuant to subsection 26(1) of *The Controverted Elections Act*, filed a petition in the Saskatchewan Court of Queen’s Bench (the “Court”) seeking to set aside the electoral result pertaining to the judicial recount for the constituency of Wood River. On May 15, 2000, prior to appearing in Court, Mr. Glen McPherson, Saskatchewan Liberal Association, filed an Admission of Undue Election. As a result, the Wood River electoral result was declared null and void and was set aside on May 17, 2000 by Order of McLellan J. of the Court. On May 29, 2000, pursuant to an Order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, a Writ of Election was issued by the Chief Electoral Officer to Ms. Hazel Benison, constituency returning officer. The Writ ordered that the by-election be held on Monday, June 26, 2000. An Election Calendar for the Wood River by-election is included on the last page of the Official Report.

Prior to the June 26, 2000 by-election, standing in the Legislative Assembly included: 29 New Democrat, 25 Saskatchewan Party, 3 Liberal and 1 vacant.

#### Constituency Boundaries

The Wood River constituency boundary was enacted in 1994 under *The Representation Act, 1994*, on the recommendation of the Constituency Boundaries Commission, 1993, as established under *The Constituency Boundaries Act, 1993*. Polling divisions for purposes of the Wood River by-election included: fifty (50) regular polls and eight (8) personal care facilities. The Wood River constituency polling subdivision map and Directory of Communities are set out in Appendices I and VI, respectively.

#### Registered Political Party and Candidate Nomination

At the time of the Wood River by-election, the Office recognized the existence of five (5) political parties in the Register of Political Parties, as maintained pursuant to section 231 of *The Election Act, 1996* (the “Act”). On June 10, 2000, nomination of candidates concluded. At close of nomination, only four (4) of the Province’s registered political parties nominated candidates, as follows:

#### Enumeration

From the 29th of May through to the 7th of June, enumeration of eligible electors was conducted for the constituency's fifty-eight (58) polling divisions. Pursuant to section 26 of the Act, constituency enumerators sat on June 22, 2000 to make necessary revisions to the voters' lists. As a result of these efforts, 10,496 Wood River residents were declared eligible to vote, as established on the revised voters' list. In addition, pursuant to section 68 of the Act, eligible electors not included on the revised voters' list were entitled to vote by declaration.

#### Polling

On the 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd and 24th days of June, five (5) advance polls were conducted in the Wood River constituency. To facilitate electorate participation, special polling stations were established in two (2) hospitals. Regular polling stations were open from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. CST on June 26, 2000, enabling the constituency's 10,496 eligible voters the opportunity to exercise their democratic franchise. Eligible voters unable to attend either a regular, special or advance poll were entitled to vote by absentee ballot.

#### Electoral Results

Unofficial electoral results were announced on the evening of June 26, 2000, resulting in Mr. D.F. (Yogi) Huyghebaert, Saskatchewan Party, being declared member elect. Deposits were forfeited by the Liberal, New Green Alliance and New Democratic Party candidates, pursuant to section 47 of the Act, for not obtaining at least one half of the total number of valid votes cast for the candidate elected.

On July 8, 2000, the constituency returning officer tabulated the results of votes cast in the advance polls, special provision polls and by absentee ballot. These figures were then reflected in the constituency results concluding the final count. Upon completion of the final count, on July 19, 2000, the constituency returning officer made a Return



to the Writ of Election. On August 4, 2000, the Office published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* (Vol. 96, No. 31) notice of receipt of the Return to the Writ and the name of the candidate elected.

#### Registered Political Party and Candidate Financial Reporting

Pursuant to section 251 of the Act, audited Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses, Form E-524, were required to be filed with the Chief Electoral Officer within six (6) months of polling day (December 27, 2000). Under section 261 of the Act, candidates were required to file an audited Candidate's Return of Election Expenses, Form E-412, with the constituency returning officer, for subsequent forwarding to the Chief Electoral Officer, within three (3) months of the candidate returned being declared elected (October 9, 2000). Pursuant to the Act, the constituency returning officer published, in prescribed form, a summary of all returns respecting candidate election expenses prior to November 8, 2000.

##### i) Registered Political Parties

As a southern constituency, the maximum amount of money that could be spent by a registered political party in the Wood River by-election, as set out in section 243 of the Act, was, (a) the sum of \$34,003.00 or (b) the sum obtained by multiplying the number of voters in the constituency (10,496) by \$2.72, whichever sum was larger. A registered political party that endorsed a candidate who obtained fifteen (15) per cent or more of all valid votes cast in the by-election and whose chief official agent filed a Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses,<sup>2</sup> pursuant to section 264 of the Act, was entitled to receive a reimbursement of a portion of its election expenses from the Province's General Revenue Fund. The amount reimbursed to a qualifying political party was the lesser of either (a) \$11,344.34 or (b) one third of its election expenses.

All participating parties in the Wood River by-election filed their duly audited Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses on or before December 27, 2000. Contributions made to political parties are not listed in the Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses but are set out in each party's fiscal period return, filed in accordance with section 250 of the Act. Appendix II sets out a summary of eligible expenses incurred by the registered political parties in Wood River and the amounts paid in respect of each party who qualified for reimbursement.

##### ii) Candidates

Candidates seeking election in Wood River were limited in the amount of money that they could expend. Again, as a southern constituency, a candidate seeking election was entitled to spend, pursuant to section 252 of the Act, either (a) the sum of \$40,804.00 or (b) the sum obtained by multiplying the number of eligible voters in the constituency by \$2.72, whichever sum was larger. A candidate who obtained fifteen (15) per cent or more of all valid votes cast in Wood River and whose business manager filed with the constituency returning officer a Candidate's Return of Election Expenses,<sup>3</sup> pursuant to section 265 of the Act, was entitled to reimbursement of a portion of their eligible election expenses. The amount reimbursed to a qualifying candidate was an amount equal to one half of the candidate's election expenses to a maximum of \$20,402.00.

<sup>2</sup> Pursuant to subsection 267(3) of the Act, auditing services rendered in respect of preparation of a report pertaining to a Registered Political Party's Return of Election Expenses is eligible for a maximum reimbursable allowance of \$2,089.00.

<sup>3</sup> Pursuant to subsection 267(6) of the Act, auditing services rendered in respect of preparation of a report pertaining to a Candidate's Return of Election Expenses is eligible for a maximum reimbursable allowance of \$678.00.

All candidates filed their returns respecting contributions received and election expenses incurred in the course of the by-election, duly audited, on or before October 9, 2000. On the 29th of December, 2000, the Office published in *The Saskatchewan Gazette* (Vol. 96, No. 52) a summary of candidate contributions received and expenditures incurred in Wood River, as well as the amounts paid in respect of each candidate who qualified for reimbursement. Such contributions, expenditures and reimbursements are reported in Appendix III.

**Orders and Authorizations of the Chief Electoral Officer**

The Chief Electoral Officer may make exceptions to the Act's financial reporting provisions for election purposes for both registered political parties and candidates. In such instances, the Act under subsection 286(1), mandates that the Chief Electoral Officer report on the situation and events surrounding the order or authorization granted.

Pursuant to subsection 251(4) of the Act, the Chief Electoral Officer may, by order, grant relief to a registered political party whereby their election expenses return contained an error or omission. In this regard, on December 27, 2000, the Chief Electoral Officer granted such an order to the New Democratic Party, Sask. Section. Further to the Chief Electoral Officer's authority under subsection 262(7) of the Act, two authorizations were granted rectifying omissions to individual Candidate's Return of Election Expenses - Robert Anderson, New Democratic Party, Sask. Section and D.F. (Yogi) Huyghebaert, The Saskatchewan Party. See Appendix IV for the particulars regarding the aforementioned order and authorizations.

**Elections Saskatchewan Expenditures**

The total cost of conducting the June 26, 2000 by-election in Wood River was \$139,095.76. This figure is inclusive of, and reported by, administrative and constituency expenditure. See Appendix V for an itemization of particular expenditures incurred in each of these two categories. Should further constituency expenditure specifics be required, refer to the Detail of Expenditures *The Election Act, 1996* Provincial Constituencies Fiscal Year 2000-2001, tabled in the Legislative Assembly on November 15, 2001.

**Documentation**

Pursuant to section 232 of the Act, the Chief Electoral Officer is obliged to hold, in addition to the information contained in the Register of Political Parties, all original financial particulars concerning registered political parties' fiscal period and election expenses documentation for the purposes of public inspection. Also held are the returns and the original financial documentation regarding individual candidate election expenses, pursuant to section 262 of the Act. Such information is available for public inspection during regular office hours at Elections Saskatchewan.

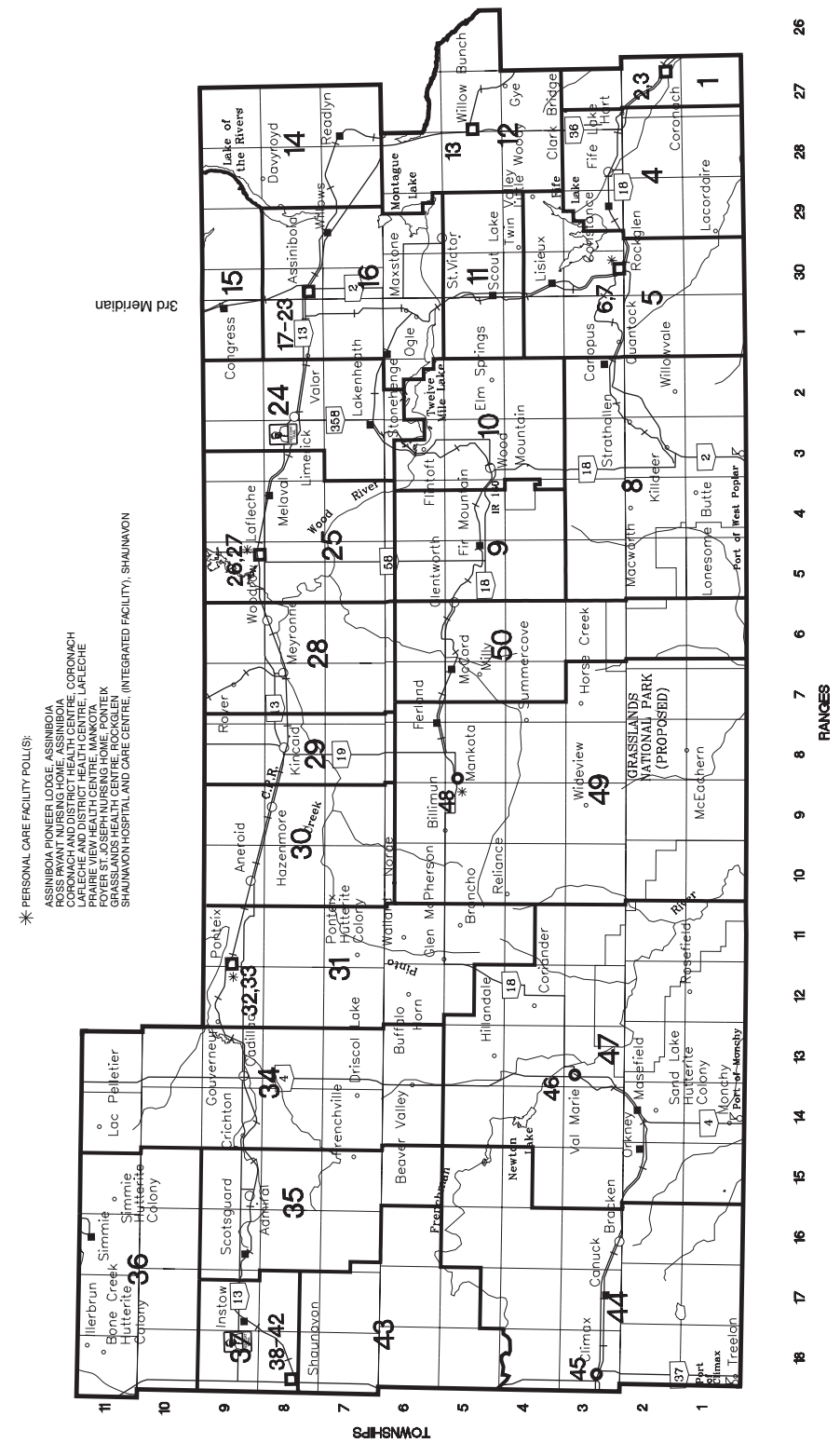
