SUMMARY

VIDEO IMAGE BOOKING SYSTEM (VIBS)

A pilot project began in May 1992, with O.C.S. Technologies Ltd. and the Richmond, B.C. Detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, which culminated in the development of a computerized system to replace traditional prisoner booking methods. The system is based on technology that enables one to capture a photographic image with a video camera and to then attach this image to a data file. The system thus permits law enforcement agencies to place digitized "mug shots" on forms used by the criminal justice community.

The traditional method of taking prisoner photographs (35 mm photography) and the manual collection of relevant personal data is becoming outdated. Photography is a labour intensive and expensive process. Camera failure, photographer error and the delay while the film is being processed all contribute to inefficiencies. Handwritten completion (and subsequent typing) of data forms also contribute the overall unsuitability of the traditional system. The VIBS computerized system fully overcomes all the shortcomings of traditional manual prisoner booking methods.

The system's data input screens are fully bilingual. The system contains a practice mode for training purposes. The VIBS presently has the following main features:

PRISONER/SUSPECT PHOTOGRAPHY:

The system allows a police officer to capture and store a video image of the suspect or prisoner. Prints of the image are immediately available for examination to ensure the image is suitable. Copies of the image can be duplicated at any time and in any quantity. The slow, costly and environmentally damaging process of film development is eliminated.

PREPARATION AND STORAGE OF FORMS:

VIBS prepares and updates a multitude of forms. The forms are completed at the time of initial booking and become a permanent record of the suspect or accused person. Additional forms can be added to the system at any future time and in any customized format. The forms currently used include fingerprint and palm print records, criminal history forms, prisoner booking and release forms, appearance notices, recognizances, reports to Crown council, and subject profile forms. Additional forms are available for non-criminal matters such as employee profiles, ID cards and Information Bulletins (eg. missing persons or property).

LINE-UPS AND WITNESS VIEWING:

Suspect "line ups" can be quickly prepared. V.I.B.S. permits retrieval by physical descriptors of images of persons who resemble each other. These images form the line up. Images used in such a line-up can be printed in black and white or colour for record purposes. Using this method, eliminates the need for a line-up of human volunteers.

IMAGE AND DATA TRANSMISSION:

The VIBS can send and receive digitized images and data from remote locations via photophones.

SECURITY AND AUDIT FUNCTIONS:

Several security features and audit functions have been included in order ensure secure and reliable operation of the system. The system meets of the requirements of the Identification of Criminals Act, Access to Information Act, Privacy Act and the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

RÉSUMÉ

SYSTEME DE MISE EN DÉTENTION A IMAGES VIDÉO (VIBS)

Un projet pllote commencé en mai 1992, conjotnternent avec O.C.S. Technologies et b détachement de b Gendarmerb royale du Canada à Richmond, en C.-B., a abouti au développement d'un système informatisé qui doit remplacer les méthodes classiques da mbe en détention. Le système est basé sur une technologie qui permet de sabir une image photographilue avec une camera vidéo et d'annexer cette image à un triafrir de données. Grâce à ce système, les organismes d'application de la bi peuvent intégrer des photos signalétiques numérasées des formubires utilises par b communauté de b justii pénale.

La méthode classique de prendre des photos de prisonniers (au moyen de films de 35 mm) et l'enregistrement manuel des données personnslbs psrtinentes commencent à être démodés. La photographie est un processus cooteuxahaute intensits de main-d'oeuvre. Ce processus est inefficace à cause des défaillances appareils photo, des erreurs du photographe et du retard de développement du film. De plus, b remplissage manuel (et b dactybgrsphb subséquente) de formubires récluit encore l'efficacité du système classique. Le systems informatisé VIBS remédie entbrement aux défauts des méthodes classiques de mbe sn détention.

Lea écrans d'entrée des données du système sont entilement bilinguea. En outre, b système comprend un mode d'exercice aux fins de formatii. Actuellement, le VIBS offre be caractéristiques princips et avantages suivants :

IMAGE NUMÉRISÉE DU PRISONNIER/SUSPECT

Le système permet à l'agent de police de saiair et de stocker une image vidéo du suspect ou du prisonnier. Des imprimés de rirnage sont immédiatement diiibbs, ce qui permet de vérifier si l'image est convenable. L'image peut être reproduite à volonté. Le processus de développement du film, qui est bnt, coûteux et nublbb à renvironnement, est ainsi éliminé.

PRÉPARATION ET STOCKAGE DES FORMULAIRES

Le VIBS prepare et met à jour une pléthore de formubires. Ces formubires aont remplii au mornent de b mbe en détention initiale et ils devbnnent un dossbr permanent du suspect ou de l'accusé. D'autres formubires peuvent être ajoutés au système n'importe quand et en tout format adapté aux besoins. Les formulaires utilisés à Pheure actuelle comprennent enregistrements dempreintes digii et palmeires, dossiers judiiires, formubires de mbs en détention at de mbe en liberté, citations à comparaitre, engagements, rapports destinés au procureur de b Couronne et formubires de profil de détenu D'autres formulaires sont disponibbs pour des affaires non judiciaires telbs que profils d'emoloyé, cartes citations d'information (p. ex. sur be personnes ou objets disparus).

ALIGNEMENTS DE SUSPECTS POTENTIELS ET SÉANCES D'IDENTIFICATION

Les alignements da suspects potentiils pe uvent être préparés rapidement. Le VIBS permet l'extraction d'après des caractéristiques physiques des images de personnes qui se ressembbnt. Ce sont ces images qui constiiusnt l'alignement de suspects potentiels. Les images utilisées pour un tel aliinement pewent être imprimées en noir et blanc ou en couleur pour mise en dossier. Ce système élimine donc le bessoin d'un alignement da volontaires.

TRANSMISSION DES IMAGES ET DES DONNÉES

Le VIBS peut transmistre et recevoir des images et données numérisées à partir d'emplacements éloignés au moyen de photophones.

SÉCURITÉ ET FONCTIONS DE VÉRIFICATION

Diverses caractéristiques de sécurité st fonctii de vérification ont été incorporées au systsme afin den assurer b fonctionnement sécuritaire et fbbb. Le système répond aux exigences de b Loi sur l'identification des criminels, de la Loi sur laccès à l'information, de la Loi sur la protection des renseignements personnels et de b Charte canadienne des droits et ibertés..

VIDEO IMAGE BOOKING SYSTEM (V.I.B.S.I

The V.I.B.S. is a complete Prisoner Booking and Witness Viewing System that was developed by O.C.S. Technologies Ltd. and the Richmond, B.C. Detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

The following report is a compilation of information provided by staff of "E" Division, Royal Canadian Mounted Police. **Part One** of the Report is a description of **Technical Specifications** for the Prisoner Video Image Booking System. The system developed by OCS Technologies Ltd. meets this specification. Future systems by other vendors would have to meet this specification (or future updates thereof) in order to be acceptable for RCMP use. Other police agencies are free to establish their own specifications. **Part Two** of this report contains sample Forms that are currently available with the V.I.B.S.

The system has been thoroughly tested and it efficiently meets or exceeds all of the operational and administrative requirements associated with prisoner information capture as well as additional functions. Over the past year V.I.B.S. has saved Richmond RCMP Detachment as estimated \$31,000. is person hour and supply costs in the following areas:

- personhours producing forms
- photodevelopment and printing costs
- personhours producting lineups
- line-up material/photo costs

I wish to extend a word of appreciation to Inspector Glen Wood, Officer in Charge, Forensic Identification Services, RCMP "E" Division and Corporal Roger Phillippe, of the Richmend RCMP Detachment for the dedication and leadership they gave to this project. I also wish to commend OCS Technologies Ltd. for their part in the development of a very valuable tool for the law enforcement community.

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0.0 **Introduction**

- O.1 This document describes the functional requirements and technical specifications of the PVIB system. The goal is to achieve a cost-effective system which will fit into existing RCMP LAN installations according to the RCMP ROSS/LAN standard or may be integrated at a later date if implemented as a stand-alone system initially.
- O.2 The system must be based on widely available industry standard hardware and software products with as few proprietary components as possible. This generally ensures minimum system costs.

1.0 Definitions

Occurrence Report Also known as the 2500 Report; the standard form used

by the RCMP for capturing occurrence related data.

Operating System A collection of routines, usually software or firmware,

used in overseeing the input and output processing of a computer's program. The tasks of an operating system include compilation, interpretation, debugging,

input/output, garbage collection, memory allotment and

file management.

Peripheral A device attached to the computer, such as a printer,

modem, disk drive or mouse.

Photophone A proprietary imagine system developed by the Image

Data Corporation that allows image and text data to be transmitted from one Photophone station to another

Photophone station via modem.

Pixel A dot of light that appears on the computer screen. A

collection of pixels forms characters and images on the screen. Generally a picxel is the smallest individually

addressable point on the screen.

PC Abbreviation for personal computer.

PIRS Abbreviation for Police Information Record System.

PVIBS Abbreviation for Prisoner Video Image Booking System.

RAM Acronym for Random Access Memory or memory.

Computer chips that supply the work space for computations and data manipulation. Memory is measured in megabytes (MB) or millions of characters.

Relational Database A database program that can retrieve and manipulate data

stored in two or more files. Common relational databases

include Oracle, dBase III Plus and Paradox.

RCMP Abbreviation for Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

RGB Abbreviation for Red Green Blue. Generally refers to the

type of video signal that produces colour images by

combining red, green and blue signals.

ROSS RCMP acronym for RCMP Office Support System. It

consists of a suite of applications running on a LAN to support activities such as word processing, electronic

mail and messaging, scheduling, etc.

ROSS/LAN RCMP LAN standard. It is based on widely available

industry standard products and consists of a LAN using Novell as the LAN operating system and ethernet

10baseT cabling.

RTCC Abbreviation for Report To Crown Counsel. A document

commonly used at the provincial level for recording data

for use in the court/prosecution process.

S-Video A widely used type of video signal commonly referred to

as Super VHS video signal.

SO Abbreviation for Structured Query Language. SQL is a

widely accepted, industry standard database query and programming sub language. Originally developed for IBM mainframe computers, SQL is an established set of statements used to add, delete, or update information in a table, or request information from one or more tables in

the form of a report.

SVGA Abbreviation for Super Virtual Graphics Array. VGA is

a video standard for the IBM and is defined by the

VGA's capabilities. SVGA is an enhanced version of this

standard.

UPS Abbreviation for Uninterrupted Power Supply. A battery

powered device that protects against power spikes and power outages. If the power goes out, the UPS continues supplying power to the computer so that users can

continue working or can safely turn off their computers

without losing any files.

UNIX A popular multitasking operating system originated by

American Telephone and Telegraph Co in the late 60's and early 70's. Now owned by UNIVEL, a subsidiary

of NOVELL.

User the operators/personnel who will use, run, operate or

manage the PVIB System.

abbreviation for alert codes commonly used by the RCMP:

Windows Application

software that incorporates windows standards. These include a GUI, standardized keystrokes and the ability to transfer data to other windows applications. Microsoft Windows is the most common operating environment providing windowing as one of its features.

2.0 Detail **Design Specification**

2.1 System Configuration

- 2.1.1 The PVIB system must be delivered using client/server architecture incorporating the major components described below. The minimum configuration includes a server component with a single capture/display workstation client. Additional capacity beyond the fully configured minimum configuration requires as a minimum expansion of the server ports to accommodate attachment of additional client stations.
- 2.1.2 The PVIB system includes application software that performs the following functions. All systems must be available in either the English or French language with Graphical User Interface (GUI) formats. The underlying database technology must be relational with industry standard SQL interface. With respect to all imaging functions, they must conform to JPEGG/CCITT-ANSI standards for compressed files and to TrueVision 2.0 file format version 2.0 for uncompressed files.
- Video Image Booking System: An application that records data respecting the arrest of a person. Associated with this data is a colour, still video image of the accused. Data entered for each accused is retained in a relational database for subsequent retrieval. The system must support a variety of administrative reports (with and without images) including but not limited to the RCMP C216, C13, 2500 Occurrence Report, and a Report To Crown Counsel.

- 2.1.2.2 Witness Suspect **Viewing System: This** system is an inquiry and search application for supporting witness viewing and electronic image line ups of suspects.
- 2.1.2.3 Personnel System: An application for recording of basic personnel data for RCMP members civilian employees and visitors. The system must support capture of a colour, still video image of the person. The primary purpose of the system is the production of Personal Profile reports and identification badges.
- 2.1.2.4 **Security System: An** application for enrolling user identifiers and related passwords with associated levels of access to system functions.
- 2.1.2.5 Administration System: An application for set up and maintenance of language of use in the system, lists of values for data entry fields and edit logic of data entry functions.
- 2.1.2.6 Training System: An application which mirrors the functionality of each of the products permitting users to study system functions without risk of corrupting production data.
- 2.1.2.7 Bulletins/Posters System: An application for producing bulletins and posters using images in the Booking database and images from external sources.
- 2.1.2.8 The above applications must include a report facility for the production of statistical and audit reports that monitor access and use of applications.
- 2.1.2.9 The system must accommodate use of both a mouse and keyboard for accessing applications and system functions.

2.1.3 The Server

2.1.3.1 The PVIB system must use standard client/server architecture with an Intel 486 processor, or better, as the minimum server technology. The function of the server is to store and retrieve all data, including images, sourced and requested by client workstations. The server is configured with a minimum 1 gigabyte of hard disk which will provide sufficient storage for 30,000 offender records with an image associated with each record. The server must also be configured with a 9600 bps modem or better, 16Mb RAM, DAT drive for back-up, 3% inch diskette drive, Novell Netware 3.11 operating system (or the current version supported by the RCMP).

2.1.4 Capture/Display Client Workstation

- A capture/display or display only workstation must be configured using an Intel 486 processor, 50mhz or better. The workstation must have at least an 80MB hard drive, one 3% inch diskette, SVGA color monitor, keyboard and mouse. Capture stations shall include an image capture board such as the TrueVision Targa + 16 or TrueVision Bravado board, or equivalent functionality, for capture and display of images, and an S-video, live action, colour, video camera. The display workstation shall use a SVGA board rather than the image capture board and no camera is required.
- 2.1.5 Additional Components
- 2.1.5.1 The PVIB system must allow the user to choose from a variety of monochrome and colour plain paper printers and colour video printers.
- 2.1.5.2 The system must interface with the Photophone system allowing images to be input from the Photophone to the PVIB system and from the PVIB system to the Photophone system.
- 2.1.5.3 Where required, the system must be configured with an uninterruptible power source (UPS) device capable of supplying power to the server in the event of a power outage for a period of not less than 15 minutes.
- 2.1.5.4 Where required, the system must be configured with a power distribution unit (PDU) designed to prevent spikes, sags and surges from reaching the server equipment.
- 2.2 Functionality, Capabilities and Performance
- 2.2.1 Data Storage Capacity
- 2.2.1.1 Must be capable of storing at least 30,000 arrest records with a single image per record on-line.
- 2.2.1.2 The system must allow for expansion of storage facilities as required.
- 2.2.2 Performance
- 2.2.2.1 The system must allow for multiple on-line inquiry and update functions simultaneously with no apparent degradation in system performance.

- 2.2.2.2 The time to capture, compress and save an image to disk must be 10 seconds or less.
- 2.2.2.3 The time to retrieve, expand and display an image on screen must be 10 seconds or less.
- 2.2.2.4 The following times represent maximum allowable times for print production of selected monochrome forms on a Hewlett Packard HP4 Laser Jet printer or equivalent:

2.2.2.5 The following times represent maximum allowable times for print production of selected colour forms on a Hewlett Packard HP Colour Jet XL300 Printer or equivalent:

2.2.2.6 The following times represent maximum allowable times for print production of selected colour forms on a Kodak 6600 Video Printer or equivalent:

2.2.3 **Booking System**

- The Booking System must allow for a search of existing records using an offender's name, occurrence number or booking officer's regimental number. Name searches must include booking names as well as all alias names. Alias names shall be displayed in the resulting search list with an identifier (for example, an 'A') following the name. Any one of the three types of searches must also allow for search on partial values. The user must be able to select a record from a search and directly open the related booking record.
- A new offender record shall be created by selection of a NEW option on the booking file menu. A new offender record must have entered the offender's last name, given name(s), date of birth, place of birth, occurrence number and the booking officer's regimental number before it can be saved.
- 2.2.3.3 The booking file menu must include a SAVE function which allows the user to add data to or commit changes to an offender record. When the user selects the SAVE function, the system must display a message advising the user that the SAVE was successful.
- 2.2.3.4 The booking file menu must include a SAVE AS function which allows an officer to duplicate an existing record using a second occurrence number and booking officer's regimental number. Creating a record through use of the SAVE AS function must allow for capture of a new offender image(s) and entry of current charge data.
- 2.2.3.5 The Booking System must allow any number of facial images (for example, front, profile, without glasses, etc.) to be captured as part of an offender record. Each facial image must be date and time stamped and must be tagged with a unique, sequential, system generated, numerical identifier. This number must be prefixed with the year (for example, 93-12345).

- 2.2.3.6 All image capture screens must utilize on-screen grid lines to assist users in correctly sizing images prior to saving them to disk.
- 2.2.3.7 All image capture screens must allow users to toggle between live and freeze modes until the desired image appears on the viewing monitor. The image can then be saved to disk.
- 2.2.3.8 The Booking System must contain fields that maintain the following physical descriptors:
 - 1. Height must include a metric/imperial conversion mechanism
 - 2. Weight must include a metric/imperial conversion mechanism
 - 3. Sex
 - 4. Race
 - 5. Hair colour
 - 6. Hair length
 - 7. Eye colour
 - 8. Eye wear
 - 9. Complexion
 - 10. Facial hair
- 2.2.3.9 The Booking System must allow for capture of additional data including the following fields:
 - 1. Principle residence data
 - 2. Next of kin data
 - 3. Young offender specification
 - 4. Gang affiliation
 - 5. Occupation
 - 6. Employer
 - 7. FPS number
 - 8. Driver's licence number
 - 9. Social Insurance number
 - 10. Citizenship including date of entry and port of entry
- 2.2.3.10 The Booking System must allow for capture and storage of charge related data, including date of offence, date charged, act, section, disposition and place charged. Users must not be restricted to the number of charges or charge related data that can be stored as part of an offender record in the system.
- 2.2.3.11 The Booking System must allow for capture and storage of identifying marks data, including mark type, location, description and an image of the mark. Users must not be restricted to the number of identifying marks, including images, that can be stored as part of an offender record in the system.

- 2.2.3.12 The Booking System must allow the recording of alias names for an offender. Users must not be restricted to the number of alias names that can be stored as part of an offender record in the system.
- 2.2.3.13 The Booking System must allow offender records to be tagged with any combination of security, medical and general alert codes. These codes must be site definable. When records with alert tags are reopened a flag must appear identifying the presence of the alert. A user must acknowledge the presence of the alert flag prior to gaining access to the record.
- 2.2.3.14 The Booking System must support functions for printing of documents consisting of any combination of data and images (including both facial images and identifying mark images) recorded as part of the booking process. These documents include but are not limited to the RCMP C216, RCMP C 13, RCMP Form 2500, and a Subject Profile report.

2.2.4 Witness Suspect Viewing System

- 2.2.4.1 **The** Witness Suspect Viewing System must permit the user to create and save a new offender list from a search of booking records or by identifying specific offender records to be included in the list. The system must have the capability to permit the user to add or delete offender records from the list.
- 2.2.4.2 The Witness Suspect Viewing System must permit the user to retrieve an offender list that was previously saved.
- 2.2.4.3 The Witness Suspect Viewing System must permit the user to use a SAVE AS function to make a second copy of an offender list in order that it may be edited and saved as a new list.
- 2.2.4.4 The Witness Suspect Viewing System must permit authorized user's to delete offender lists which are no longer required.
- 2.2.4.5 Each of the above functions must include a date and time stamp function to record when a list was created, edited or deleted. The user's name or user ID must also be included as part of the audit record.
- 2.2.4.6 The Image Display System must include a search function which allows the user to specify any number of search criteria, based on data elements included in an offender record. Once the criteria have been entered the system **must** retrieve all records that match the specified criteria and report to the user the number of records identified in the search.

- 2.2.4.7 The user must have the option of modifying the search criteria and reinitiating the search of records.
- 2.2.4.8 Search functionality must include a system default which may be changed by the user at the time of search and establishes a maximum number of records to be retrieved during a search.
- 2.2.4.9 The system must allow for the creation and display of an image line-up display consisting of 6 or 8 images.
- 2.2.4.10 The system must allow users to scroll through images individually, with and without display of corresponding biographical data.
- 2.2.4.11 The system must permit the system administrator to establish a set of default parameters for determining the attributes of the display. These attributes must include color, font size, image size and number of images (one or two) of each offender to be displayed.
- 2.2.4.12 The system must allow the user to display selected images with and without descriptive data.
- 2.2.4.13 The system must allow for display of any number of images and related data as permitted by the screen format and the requested data. For example, when images without text are displayed there is more available screen space and more images can be displayed than when these same images are displayed with text. Also, a greater number of smaller images with data can be displayed than larger images with data.
- 2.2.4.14 Individual images must be available for display in default formats: postage stamp (approximately 1" x 1.25 ") and booking format (approximately 3 " x 4") or in any size specified by the user in pixels. Aspect ratios of all displayed images are maintained constant by the system. The user must be able to change the type of images (for example front, profile, without glasses, etc.) and number of images (to a maximum of two) to be displayed for each offender.
- 2.2.4.15 The system must, at the user's choice, allow images to be displayed randomly or by data elements such as capture date, offender's age, last name, etc.
- 2.2.4.16 The system must allow the user or witness to individually identify suspect images as yes, no or indifferent. The wording for the indifferent identifier must be site definable.
- 2.2.4.17 The system must allow the user to access all offender information as an inquiry function within the Image Display System.

- 2.2.4.18 The Image Display System must support the logging of all activities by a user associated with the search of an image, the edition of offender lists and the display and printing of images and related reports. A log of all activities must be printable.
- 2.2.4.19 The Image Display System must support reporting functions for printing of single or multiple images, with or without related descriptive data. The user must be able to specify the printer to be used, thereby selecting color or monochrome output.
- When producing lineup documents, the system must support production of a separate descriptor sheet identifying the images printed as part of the lineup document.
- 2.2.4.21 Lineup documents must allow the option of producing a witness ballot as part of the document.

2.2.5 **Personnel System**

- 2.2.5.1 **The** Personnel System must provide for entry of a member's or civilian employee's biographical data, address, next of kin, regimental number, rank, division and service start date. It must also provide for capture of the member's image or civilian employee's image.
- 2.2.5.2 The Personnel System must support the production of reports, including identification cards and employee profiles, with the flexibility for defining report formats using the system's report production facility.
- 2.2.5.3 A system generated numbering system and a system audit function must be available to assist in tracking the production and dissemination of identification cards and related documents.
- 2.2.5.4 The Personnel System must be integrated with the Security module to permit sharing of data, including the member's image or civilian employee's image.
- 2.2.5.5 Access to the Personnel System must be restricted to the System Administrator security level or an equivalent level of security.

2.2.6 Security System

2.2.6.1 **The** Security System must allow for the following levels **of security** for each of the application systems:

view of data only

- view and update of data
- view, update and deletion of data
- system administrator
- 2.2.6.2 Access to the administration of system security must be through a separate icon and must be restricted to users with system administrator authority.
- 2.2.6.3 The Security System must allow the system administrator to enroll a member's name, user identifier, related password, and image.

Each member enrolled in the security system must be assigned a level of security for each of the installed applications.

- 2.2.6.4 User access to all installed applications must be through use of a login icon and login procedure.
- 2.2.6.5 The Security System must require the user to enter his/her user identifier and associated password. Three failed attempts to enter a valid identifier and matching password must return the user to the desk top while creating an entry in the security log of the failed attempt.
- 2.2.6.6 The Security System must allow the user to change his/her password at time of login by confirming the existing password and updating and confiig a new password.
- 2.2.6.7 With successful login the user's name and image shall be displayed with a welcoming message to the system.
- 2.2.6.8 The Security System must utilize a timed validation of user ID and password combinations such that failure of a valid user to use the system within a specified period of time will deactivate the user's ability to access the system. Reactivation of the user's ability to access the system must be restricted to the system administrator.
- 2.2.6.9 The Security System must incorporate a method of ensuring that users alter their passwords within specified time frames. For example, the system administrator may determine that users must change their passwords every three months, at a minimum. Failure of the user to follow this procedure will suspend the user's ability to access the system and will require intervention of the system administrator to gain access.
- 2.2.6.10 The Security System must include functions for tracking and logging of all log in accesses, including failed attempts and expired users, to a security log. The security log may be viewed or printed by a user with system administrator security level.

2.2.6.11 All passwords must be encrypted to a cryptologically secure format. The DES and RSA formats are examples of acceptable standards.

2.2.7 **Administration System**

- 2.2.7.1 **The** Administration System must allow for maintenance of all lists of value tables for all installed applications and their related training modules. Additionally, it must allow for the selection of French or English to be used as the language for the implementation.
- 2.2.7.2 List of value functions in the Administration System must permit for addition, update and deletion of the values. The number of values that may be added to a list must be unlimited. All values within a list must be displayed to the user in alphabetical order.

2.2.8 **Training System**

- 2.2.8.1 **The** Training System must provide for identical functionality as found in each of the application systems Video Image Booking, Witness Suspect Viewing System and Posters with separation of training data from data created in the production systems. The separation of data includes a separate list of values for production and training environments.
- 2.2.8.2 A Training System may, at the RCMP's discretion, be implemented with any configuration of reporting available in the equivalent production systems.
- 2.2.8.3 The Training System must incorporate a system based, interactive tutorial mechanism for the training of new users or users that require additional training on system functionality.

2.2.9 **Bulletins/Posters Module**

- 2.2.9.1 **The** system must allow images residing in the Booking System to be used in the creation of ad hoc bulletins or posters. These reports will include Wanted Posters, Missing Person Bulletins and other general inquiry bulletins.
- 2.2.9.2 The system must allow for retrieval, capture and storage of images not currently residing in the Booking System. These images are used in the creation of bulletins and posters as identified in Section 2.2.9.1.
- 2.2.9.3 **The** system must allow all bulletins and posters to be saved and stored for future reference and retrieval.

- 2.2.9.4 The system must provide a mechanism for producing hard copy printouts of these documents in black and white or colour
- 2.2.9.5 The system must provide a mechanism for transferring these documents to other PVIBS sites via modem and to non-PVIBS sites via fax communication.
- 2.2.10 Deleting/Purging **Records**
- 2.2.10.1 **The** system must allow for deleting of individual records by a user with delete authority.
- 2.2.10.2 The system must allow for flagging and subsequent purging of individual records or groups of records as specified by the system administrator or users with system administrator authority.
- 2.2.10.3 Purge criteria, for example records that are of a specific age and/or type, must be definable at the system administrator level.
- 2.2.10.4 A system generated purge report must list all records that meet specific purge criteria.
- 2.2.10.5 The system must allow for specified records to be off loaded to a storage medium (for example, magnetic tape) for the purpose of long term storage. The system must incorporate a process for reloading single stored records or groups of stored records back onto the server.

2.2.11 **Report Production**

- 2.2.11.1 **The** system must allow for production of statistical reports. At a minimum, these reports must include:
 - 1. Alpha list of all offenders on the system
 - 2. List of all offenders by occurrence number
 - 3. List of all offenders by photo number
 - 4. List of offenders booked into the system between specific dates
 - 5. List of offenders by gang affiliation
 - 6. List of offenders by charge
 - 7. List of offenders by alert
 - 8. List of all young offenders
 - 9. List of adult offender records to be purged
 - 10. List of young offender records to be purged

2.2.11.2	The system must allow for the design and implementation of additional statistical reports capable of extracting any other data captured on the system. For example, a list of all non-Canadian citizens booked during specific dates.
2.2.11.3	The system must allow all reports to be viewed on screen or printed.
2.2.12	Audit Functions
2.2.12.1	The system must automatically record significant application transactions and events in an audit log file for a period of time not less than 30 days. The application transactions recorded must include user name, unsuccessful log-on attempts, record key, type of function, date and time and pertinent action performed.
2.2.12.2	The system must allow this log to be viewed on screen or printed by a user with system administrator authority.
2.2.13	System Backups/Data Recovery
2.2.13.1	The PVIB System must have a procedure in place for system backup. When a backup of the system is initiated, all data (including images) and system software must be backed up, or alternatively, the user may specify that only the data or software is to be backed up.
2.2.13.2	System backups must be restricted to users with system administrator authority or an equivalent level of authority.
2.2.13.3	Backup sessions must be able to be scheduled to occur at non-peak times, or at the convenience of the PVIB System site.
2.2.13.4	Each PVIB System site must have the option of operating backups on an attended or unattended basis.
2.2.13.5	Backing up the system must not result in a noticeable degradation in system performance.
2.2.13.6	In the event that the system is scheduled to be down for any period of time, the system administrator must have a mechanism for relaying scheduled downtimes to users via the system.
2.2.13.7	When required, data captured during a backup session must be able to be reloaded on an individual record basis or in its entirety. System software backed up must also be able to be recovered from previous backup sessions.

2.2.14 **System** Reliability

2.2.14.1 The PVIB System will be subjected to continuous 24 hour use (24x7). Contingent upon full power and network availability, the general quantitative requirement is that the system must be available 99% of the time, excluding scheduled downtime for system backups, routine maintenance, etc. The system will be considered available only when supporting all of its major functions in fully automatic mode and meeting all of its response time and throughput requirements. Major functions include image capture, file updating, record retrieval, printing, searching, lineup creation and activity logging.

2.2.15 Interface Capabilities

- 2.2.15.1 The system must be able to import and export image data in common file formats such as TIFF and PCX file formats to external software applications.
- 2.2.15.2 The system must be capable of importing and exporting ASCII text data to third party data collection systems (for example, systems on the ROSS Network, including CPIC and PIRS).
- 2.2.15.3 The system must be capable of electronically transferring records from one PVIB System to another PVIB System. This may be achieved throug the use of a modem and a dial-up data line or a dedicated data line.
- 2.2.15.4 The system must be able to interface with existing live scan ten-print technologies for the sharing of common data elements.

3.0 **Hardware Configuration**

3.3 **Optional Components**

3.3.1 Printers

The dual tray system must support printing of 8½ x 11" documents, 8% x 14" documents and 8 x 14" documents (for example, the C2 16 Fingerprint form). Printing must use PCL5 or greater.

3.3.2 Additional Components

4.0 **Installation and Facility Plan**

The PVIB system must employ personal computer components which require no special installation when used in a conventional office environment. The one exception is the placement of a capture station which will be located in an area where offenders are normally booked. The equipment located in this area must be installed to a standard that will ensure that it is secure from possible damage by prisoners.

No special environmental control or electrical wiring shall be required for operation of the PVIBS equipment.

5.0 Implementation Plan

Each implementation of the PVIB system at an RCMP Detachment will vary as a result of the size of the detachment. Detachments with a larger volume of arrests are likely to require a larger configuration of equipment. As well, there will be additional users to train in larger Detachments. As a part of the service contract, an implementation plan must be prepared for each Detachment contracting to receive the system.

6.0 Training

- The primary purpose of the training requirement is to produce a group of RCMP members and civilian employees who will be competently and fully trained to enable such staff to assume full responsibility for the day to day operation of the system, including general use of the system, training of staff and in-house maintenance of the system.
- At a minimum, training must include:

- Training of all general users, or alternately, training of key trainers who will in turn be responsible for training of all general users.
- Training of users designated as a system administrators.
- Training of a technical support person. At some sites this will be the system administrator.
- Utilization of interactive, on-line training systems to assist in training new users and users that require supplemental training.
- Training must be flexible to accommodate rotating twenty-four hour schedules.

7.0 Manuals

- 7.1 A User's guide must be available for the PVIB system. This manual must be written in language that can be easily understood by users who do not possess computer knowledge or skills.
- 7.2 A System Administrator's guide must be available for the PVIB system. This manual must describe all features available to users with system administrator authority.
- 7.3 Help screens must be available as an on-line reference tool for users. These screens must cover all topics available in the User's guide.

8. 0 System Support

- Software support for the PVIB System must be available on a 24 hour per day, 7 days per week basis. Resolution of software problems must be accomplished within the specific times agreed to at the time of acquisition but generally a system outage due to software failure in excess of four hours is unacceptable. In most cases telephone support is adequate to deal with minor software problems.
- Hardware support must be available as specified by the client.
- Full system support, including all software and hardware support, must be available if specified by the client.








#1: 4x5 Kodak with Offender Information
