




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stand on the ocean floor—literally.


time may stand still, but you won't.

walk in Viking footsteps no headgear required.



For 40 years now, this headline event has been a vast sounding board for musical trends from around the world, as well as an entertaining showcase for mimes, buskers and other street performers.












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the cars may be going 220 mph, but you can set your own pace.






maybe the diamonds won't be the highlight of this adventure.


