

National Arts Centre Foundation EXCEEDS campaign goal!

Philanthropic giving to Canada's National Arts Centre has been on the rise over the past few years and the NAC Foundation is thrilled that you, as donors, continue to increase your support.

For the second consecutive year, the Donors' Circle campaign has exceeded its goal by over \$200,000. Your response to our ambitious campaign resulted in contributions totaling \$1.4 million. Thank you!

Thanks to this generosity, the National Arts Centre has been able to expand its Youth and Education programs, including the Young Artists and Conductors' Programme, the new and very popular educational Web site, Arts Alive.ca and Live Rush – the NAC's student discount ticket program now headed for Calgary. (We plan to bring this innovative programme to cities across Canada.) And if that isn't enough, your support has also helped us to make the Fourth Stage a popular venue for local artists.

Following on the heels of this very successful campaign, the NAC Foundation is rolling up its sleeves for an even more ambitious and exciting 2003 Annual Fund drive.

The National Arts Centre is poised for significant artistic expansion and innovation over the next several years. To make this growth possible, our donors will be asked to support local and national initiatives which will help us to focus on artistic excellence on all four stages and to nurture and support young talent in our youth and education programs.

Our exciting season will open on September 18 with our very own Pinchas Zukerman, along with Grammy Award winning soprano Renée Fleming as they light

Three years ago, Laine Cooper and her husband Barry joined the National Arts Centre's Donors' Circle as their way of "Giving the Arts a Hand." Last year, we asked them to consider increasing their annual support to create scholarships for two talented Canadian musicians in Maestro Zukerman's Young Artists Programme. Laine and Barry readily agreed that this would be a wise investment and they have continued to champion the programme again this year. We had a chance to chat with Laine about her keen interest in the National Arts Centre and what it means to be a donor.

NAC - You and Barry have a history of giving to the arts, so I'm sure you are approached by many important charities. How do you decide where your support should go?

L.C. - Good question. It is difficult to decide but we try to keep a balance and support what is most important to us. We give regularly to the Mission – feeding the hungry is a priority – and we support the Children's Hospital. For the past 20 years we have sponsored children through World Vision. Children and youth are very important to us, and so is charitable giving...it's part of who we are.

Laine, what is it specifically about the performing arts that excites you? Everything! I love seeing plays and I really enjoy the music of our Orchestra.

Why do you feel it is important to support and nurture the careers of our young artists?

Well, we have so many talented young Canadians who will go elsewhere if we don't support them. It's up to us to nurture our own. If we are going to enjoy the arts, we should support them too.

You have two children, Karolyn and Dan. Are they involved in music, dance or theatre?

Barry and I have exposed them to a lot of different things and I think we have cultivated a deep appreciation for music in them. Dan has at least six guitars and he likes to play regularly. Karolyn enjoys listening to music.

Do you think your kids will learn from your example of being charitable?

Yes, definitely. They see us supporting the arts and I am sure when they are in a position to do so, they will get into the habit of giving also.

Do you have a favourite NAC memory? I have several! The presentation of the Phantom of the Opera was the best thing ever – better than the one in Toronto. I really enjoy the variety shows at the NAC – Showboat was another highlight. And more recently, Barry and I still think about Opera Lyra's Salome – it was beautiful.

We would like to express our warmest thanks to Barry and Laine Cooper for their continued investment in young musicians. We hope the experience has proven to be as rewarding to them as it has for the young artists they sponsor each year. Bravo!

Making the most of your generosity

Like most people, you're probably bombarded with different requests for your financial support each day – through phone calls, direct mail and door-to-door calls. So many requests can tire and confuse even the most generous among us. There are ways, however, to revive the pleasure found in helping others! This process needn't be looked upon as work and in fact, can take less than an hour. Here's how:

- 1. Determine your values. If you were to ask your closest friends or loved-ones to name the principles by which you live, what might they say? By thinking about the experiences, people and organizations that have mattered most in your life, you will likely find the answer to where to direct your philanthropic efforts.
- 2. Concentrate your efforts. From your list of values, determine a few organizations or causes of greatest importance to you. This may require a little homework to learn where you can make the greatest difference.
- **3.** Think close to your heart and home. Usually the nearer you are emotionally, and sometimes geographically, to the charities you support, the more satisfying your efforts will be.
- **4. Make a personal plan.** Decide how much time and money you can devote to charity. Don't let limited resources intimidate you. Even a few hours or a few dollars can have a meaningful impact.
- 5. Look before you leap. Be as prudent when offering your time and money as you would be with any other investment. Make a site visit, attend a public board meeting do whatever it takes for you to understand and feel comfortable with the charities in which you plan to invest.
