Starting Up and Running an Export Business

If you are thinking of exporting but don't know where to start, check out Small Business BC at **www.smallbusinessbc.ca/iep**.

This section of the Small Business BC site provides a questionnaire to help you determine if your company is ready and able to export, alongside a FAQ that will answer many of your questions about exporting goods to other countries. The website also provides access to the Exporting Business Sourcing Guide for your most basic questions on exporting and includes: the Export Source for a comprehensive listing of export information, the Trade Commissioner Service Abroad for market reports and services abroad, as well as Export Information for the International Housing Industry. There is also current information on export regulations and sources for export financing and government assistance. In addition to these web-based tools, Small Business BC also offers one-on-one coaching, where you can meet (by appointment) with a member of the Business Service Society Export Team to discuss your exporting idea.

Team Canada Inc (TCI) is a network of more than 20 federal departments and agencies working together with the provinces, territories and other partners to help Canadian businesses succeed in world markets.

TCI's exportsource.ca provides advice about getting started in the export business, developing your export plan, identifying your target market and planning your export

financing. The site also provides a free service to registered businesses called Trade Map, created by the International Trade Centre in Geneva to enable exporters and trade professionals to easily access important international trade data.

Trade Team BC — one of 10 Regional Trade Networks (RTN) across Canada — is a network of 25 export-service organizations in British Columbia and the Yukon that focus on helping Canadian exporters.

Network members will provide one-on-one coaching and help you prepare you to enter the export market. They also offer contacts in foreign markets along with information about international markets and industries, financial assistance and trade missions. The network's site also includes a calendar of upcoming events and workshops.

For years, businesses across the country have called for governments at all levels to work together and reduce red tape. The OneStop Business Registry does exactly that.

Through the OneStop Business Registry, businesses in British Columbia can apply to a number of different public agencies for such things as a Provincial Sales Tax number (Ministry of Small Business and Revenue), a Good and Services Tax number (Canada Revenue Agency) and a municipal business licence quickly and easily.

There are a number of services available to help you find new export opportunities and promote your export services internationally, including:

Canadian Company Capabilities Database www.strategis.ic.gc.ca/cdncc

Register with Industry Canada's Canadian Company Capabilities Database to make sure buyers in Canada and around the world know about your products and services. The database profiles more than 50,000 Canadian companies. Over 500,000 domestic and international companies browse the database every month looking for Canadian businesses. You can register your business with the database quickly and easily through the OneStop Business Registry: **www.bcbusinessregistry.ca** (choose number 5).

Virtual Trade Commissioner www.infoexport.gc.ca

The Virtual Trade Commissioner (VTC) is the online arm of the Canadian Trade Commissioner Service. By registering with the VTC, you will gain access to market information and international business leads and news. Your business information will also be passed on to Canada's Trade Commissioners working in locations throughout the world. Over 30,000 Canadian exporters of goods and services are currently registered with the VTC.
