

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New Investigator Forum 2007

Background

Researchers, clinicians and decision makers share a common interest in the health of Canadians and a responsibility related to research. The CIHR Institute of Infection and Immunity recognizes that the ongoing development of new researchers is fundamental to a strong and innovative health research capacity within the Institute's mandate. Initiatives such as the CIHR Strategic Training Initiative in Health Research and the New Emerging Teams program have sought to expand the resources available for development of new Canadian researchers. The New Investigators Forum seeks to initiate a dialogue with infection and immunity related investigators in the early stages of their research careers and provide additional information and tools to enhance their success.

In the fall of 2006, a request was sent out to relevant chairs of departments in the area of infection and immunity in Canada requesting nominations of new investigators who were within the first five years of their first research appointment. Those nominees provided the list to which formal invitations were sent out in December 2007.



Meeting Overview

Purpose

- To provide an opportunity for new investigators in the disciplines and themes in infection and immunity to interact with their peers across Canada.
- To develop skills relating to planning and supporting a research career.
- To inform the Institute of potential opportunities for strategic programs relating to new investigators.

Objectives

- To celebrate and promote Canadian new investigators in the infection and immunity research community in a "retreat-like" setting.
- To learn about current infection and immunity research activity in Canada and elsewhere.
- To facilitate interaction, learning, sharing of knowledge, collaboration and networking.
- To provide an opportunity for new investigators to present their research programs.
- To participate in workshops that cover a range of skills required to establish and maintain a research career.

- To foster an interdisciplinary environment which includes all aspects of research.

Participants

Meeting participants represented all CIHR themes (basic science, clinical science, population health and health services) and included 72 researchers within 5 years of their first research appointment. The meeting also brought together a cross section of experts working on various aspects of research in infection and immunity. These expert researchers enriched the program by facilitating sessions and conducting workshops on a diverse range of topics. The list of participants is found in Appendix 2.



Format

The Forum was held at the Kingbridge Centre in King City, Ontario on April 13-15, 2007. The format of the Forum included plenary sessions, panel discussions and workshops allowing for optimal interactions among new investigators and workshop leaders. Workshop topics included multidisciplinary research, research commercialization, grant writing and peer review, research management and career development. In addition, all new investigators submitted an abstract on their research program and participated in poster sessions to facilitate networking between participants.

Workshops & Speakers

The Forum program consisted of five workshop and 4 plenary talks which are summarized below.

Research Management Workshop

The Research Management workshop provided new investigators with insight into running their personal research program. Tips on how to hire good employees, mentoring graduate students, dealing with budget issues, prioritizing tasks and keeping track of multiple research projects was discussed. Table discussions using supplied case studies were facilitated by members of the organizing committee and provided graphic examples of situations that may be encountered by Forum

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participants in their own programs. Case studies focused on an array of research management issues including plagiarism of manuscripts, laboratory disagreements, employee benefits and fairness.

Multidisciplinary Research Workshop



The Multidisciplinary Research workshop illustrated some of the issues inherent in creating multi-disciplinary research groups of investigators working in a variety of research areas. Using supplied scenarios, small groups developed an outline for a mock Request for Applications (RFA) as well as responded with a Letter of Intent (LOI) using the expertise in their group. Each group had an opportunity to present their LOI to the Forum participants. The goal of this workshop was to encourage researchers to look beyond their own labs/departments for collaborators as well as to introduce participants to the process of RFA development.

Grant Writing and Peer Review Workshop

This workshop provided valuable information to new investigators on successful grant writing and the peer review system. A brief presentation on the principles of grant writing covered the basics of grant preparation and the mechanisms of peer review, and included reference to the unique aspects of personnel grant applications. This introduction was followed by a breakout session where participants were divided into small groups to act as members of "Mock Grant Review Panels". Each panel reviewed 2-3 grants with participants functioning as reviewers and/or readers and the panels were chaired by past or current chairs of CIHR peer review committees (PRC). A plenary Q&A wrap-up explored themes in grant preparation and review with a panel composed of the PRC chairs.



Career Development Workshop

The Career Development workshop focused on the issues faced by new investigators in managing their research career. The session drew upon the knowledge and insight of senior researchers who have experienced a wide variety of career development trajectories and have been actively involved in the management and mentorship of new investigators throughout their own careers. The emphasis was on providing practical career management advice in areas such as mentorship strategies, the importance of leadership roles, balancing work and personal life, preparation and application for tenure and effective management of administrative/clinical/teaching responsibilities.

From Bench to Boardroom – What You Need to Know About Commercializing your Research

Sponsored by the International Centre for Infectious Diseases (www.cid.com)

This workshop introduced the 'how-tos' of commercializing research breakthroughs. The speakers drew on their respective experiences to discuss:

- ◆ How to recognize the commercial potential of an invention and what to do about it – how to protect, when to publish, when to seek assistance
- ◆ How to commercialize a technology or product – what to patent, how to identify a market, convert a technology to a product, obtain resources, grow a company



The session concluded with a mock funding panel modeled on the popular CBC television program "Dragons' Den," featuring pitches by pre-selected Forum participants. The audience was enlisted to decide the fate of their peers' fictional ventures.

Lessons Learned as a New Investigator

Eric Brown (McMaster University) and Marina Klein (McGill University) spoke at the Forum as mentors in the infection and immunity research community who are not too far removed from being a "new investigator". They provided their insight for our "Lessons Learned as a New Investigator" seminar where they provided their "Top 10 Lessons Learned" to provide tips and advice on building a successful career as a research scientist.

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Saturday Evening Speaker

André Picard, public health reporter for The Globe and Mail provided some insight to the participants on interacting with the media and how the media choose their stories. He emphasized that the ability to communicate science in a brief and effective way to the public is essential in being able to tell your story.

CIHR Speakers


Dr. Bhagirath Singh, Scientific Director of the Institute of Infection and Immunity spoke on "Sustaining Excellence and Increasing Capacity in Infection and Immunity Research in Canada". He described the role of III in terms of championing research, supporting strategic initiatives, engaging the research community, partners and stakeholders, and developing partnerships to support research in strategic priority areas. Dr. Singh also described some of the accomplishments of III and the new III Strategic Plan 2007-2012.



Dr. Alan Bernstein, President of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research spoke to the participants about the current state of CIHR and the future of research in Canada. He emphasized that he believes this is an excellent time to be working in science and answered questions from the new investigators about their concerns with the current funding situation.

Poster Session

The posters session took place on April 13 and April 14 where the new investigators presented their overall research program. Since participants were from various research areas in infection and immunity they were encouraged to focus their poster on their research program as opposed to specific research projects to enable interactions with their peers from other disciplines. This proved to be an excellent networking opportunity to meet with their peers from across Canada.



Evaluation

At the conclusion of the Forum, 58 participants completed an evaluation to assess the program elements and make recommendations for future meetings. The evaluation showed that all of the respondents felt that the Forum was a good venue to make connections with new colleagues. As a result of attending the Forum three quarters of respondents are more likely to explore or engage in interdisciplinary research while just over half are planning new research collaborations as a result of attending this Forum. In conclusion, all of the respondents agree that the Forum workshops will be helpful to them when they return to their own research environment and all recommended that III hold a similar Forum in the future.

Next Steps

Overall the Forum proved to be an excellent opportunity for new investigators to exchange ideas and discuss common issues that they are facing at this point in their careers. Based on the results of the Forum evaluation there is no doubt that the III New Investigator Forum should be repeated in the future.
