## **Re:** Financial Action Task Force (FATF) Removes Burma From its List of Non-Cooperative Countries and Territories (NCCTs)

On Friday, October 13, 2006, the FATF, of which Canada is a member, removed Burma (Myanmar) from the NCCT list. The FATF's statement says, "The FATF has determined that Myanmar has made good progress in implementing its anti-money laundering system. The FATF will continue to monitor Myanmar during the coming year to ensure it makes further progress. In particular the FATF has advised Myanmar to enhance regulation of the financial sector, including the securities industry, and to ensure that dealers in precious metals and precious stones follow anti-money laundering requirements." The Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade advises that Canada has taken a number of economic measures against Burma, and continues to discourage Canadian companies from doing business with or investing in Burma due to the Burmese government's human rights record.
