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## Preface

This publication was first published in 1987 with an analysis of 1985 data. Originally, the intent was to present an overview of the co-operative system in Canada to a wide and diverse audience. However since 1995, this publication was transformed and replaces “Co-operation in Canada,” which had been our main publication for more than 60 years.

Data on co-operatives are presented by group. Non-financial co-operatives are divided by membership: i.e. producers, consumers and workers. Credit unions and *caisses populaires* are looked at separately even if their membership is made up of consumers.

### Methodology

The statistics used in this publication are based on two sources:

- reporting by non-financial co-operatives to the Canadian Annual Survey on Co-operatives
- similar information collected by provincial governments.

Because it is not realistic to collect information on 100 percent of the non-financial co-operatives, estimates are used for non-reporting co-operatives deemed to be still active. However estimates were made only for those co-operatives for which data were collected within the past five years.

# CO-OPERATIVES IN CANADA

## SITUATION - 2000

The 2000 statistics are based on data received from 5,824 non-financial co-operatives representing 4.8 million members, \$30.2 billion total revenues and \$17.4 billion in assets. These co-operatives employed almost 80,000 people of which 75 per cent were full-time employees. Of these co-operatives 933 have an agricultural base, and represent 468,000 memberships and employ nearly 37,000 individuals with total revenues of \$19.6 billion and assets of \$6.9 billion. This includes data provided by wholesale co-operatives and federations.

The number of non-financial co-operatives reporting was up 3.1 per cent from 1999, however total membership was down 6.3 per cent mostly due to removal of over 439 thousand inactive memberships in the Québec student supply co-operatives. Volume of business was up 4.9 per cent while assets were virtually unchanged. The number of employees was down slightly (0.2 per cent).

The number of agricultural co-operatives reporting was down 1.0 per cent, and active membership was up 2.7 per cent. Volume of business was up 3.2 per cent and assets decreased 4.2 per cent. The total employees of agricultural co-operatives was up slightly (1.3 per cent).

### PRODUCER CO-OPERATIVES

Co-operatives play a crucial role in the agricultural sector of the Canadian economy, especially in farm supply and in the processing and marketing of grains and oilseeds, dairy products, poultry, fruits, vegetables, livestock, honey and maple products.

**Agricultural marketing** co-operatives are, for the most part, modern enterprises that use the latest technology and are involved in processing and value added. A few large co-operatives make up the largest part of total revenues including Agropur in dairy, Saskatchewan Wheat Pool in grains and oilseeds, Lilydale in poultry and Coopérative Fédérée de Québec in meat and poultry processing. The 174 marketing co-operatives reporting represent a major economic force with a combined business volume of more than \$15.7 billion and assets of \$5.3 billion. In 2000, they marketed over \$12.7 billion in agricultural products in Canada and abroad, (See Table 4).

Market share of agricultural marketing co-operatives is strongest in three areas, dairy 59

per cent, poultry and eggs 49 per cent and grains and oilseeds 47 per cent. In farm supply the strongest areas are fertilizers and chemicals 57 per cent, petroleum 31 per cent and feed supplies 25 per cent. (see Appendix F).

In **farm supply**, co-operatives play an indispensable role in the provision of farm inputs. They provide member co-operatives and producers with a broad range of farm inputs including fertilizers and chemicals, animal feed, seed, building materials and petroleum products. The 242 supply co-operatives reported total revenues of \$3.3 billion, up 3.1 per cent from 1999.

Seven of the Top 10 agricultural co-operatives in Canada are marketing organizations and three supply co-operatives round out the Top 10. (See Appendix I).

There were 57 **fishery** co-operatives responding to the survey, four more than in 1999. They reported \$225.5 million in revenues, a 25.6 per cent increase over 1999. Assets increased 3.7 per cent to \$75.9 million. (See Tables 10 and 11).

**Production** co-operatives include **feeder, grazing, agricultural machinery, animal reproduction, forestry and handicraft** co-operatives. The 598 production co-operatives responding to the survey reported a combined volume of business of \$1.1 billion, virtually unchanged over 1999. Production co-operatives in Québec and Alberta accounted for 77 per cent of the total volume of business. In Québec, revenues were derived primarily from the sale of forest products, while in Alberta livestock (cattle and hogs) was the primary activity. Saskatchewan has the largest number of production co-operatives, with 215 organizations reporting. Management of grazing operations and farm feeder operations were the two main activities of production co-operatives, with 152 and 144 enterprises respectively, accounting for 52 per cent of all production co-operatives, (See Tables 12 and 13 and Appendix B).

## CONSUMER CO-OPERATIVES

At the local level, **consumer** co-operatives vary in size and sophistication, from small buying clubs, to large supermarket organizations and wholesalers. At these “conventional stores”, sales are made in the usual manner and any “surplus” is returned at year’s end based on patronage. Revenues from the consumer group amounted to \$8.3 billion, with food products accounting for nearly 50 per cent of the total. Petroleum products, dry goods and home hardware were the other main types of products sold, (See Table 6).

The 299 member co-operatives of Federated Co-operatives Limited and 35 associate members had total revenues of \$3.1 billion, giving them the strongest presence in any region in Canada. Calgary Co-op Association Ltd. is the largest consumer retail co-operative in North America, with nearly 40 per cent of the local retail market. Sales include food products, hardware, clothing, furnishings, petroleum products and building materials, as well as travel services and pharmaceuticals. Mountain Equipment Co-op (MEC), headquartered in Vancouver, British Columbia, specializes in the sale of equipment for outdoor activities. It provides a catalogue sales service and operates four stores outside British Columbia, in Toronto, Ottawa, Calgary and in Halifax. MEC listed over 1.4 million members across Canada.

The 168 member co-operatives of Co-op Atlantic had revenues of \$1.4 billion including 26 co-op “basics” stores that have formed together and as a result they are now the leading discount format in Atlantic Canada. These 26 co-op basic stores consolidated in 2000 and a new federally registered co-operative was formed Consumers Community Co-operative (CCC). These and other major changes to be introduced in 2001 will continue to consolidate and strengthen local member ownership within the consumer co-operative network in Atlantic Canada.

Although not as large or influential, Québec and Ontario consumer co-operatives are strong organizations, however, they have little penetration in large urban areas.

A diminishing number of consumer co-operatives operate as “**direct charge**” co-operatives. In 2000, 30 of these co-ops reported to the survey, most of them located in Québec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. They reported revenues of \$176 million with 30,570 active members. The concept of the “direct charge” system is that goods are provided to members at cost and a weekly service fee is charged to cover operating costs. Some add a surcharge to build capital for the development of the co-operative. In the past year a number of these type in the Atlantic region have amalgamated into the “basics” store concept under the Consumers Community Co-operative .

**Student supply** co-operatives have gained a strong foothold, especially in Québec, where 94 are active. These co-operatives reported a volume of business of nearly \$121 million with 522 thousand members. They provide the various goods students may require, from stationery to textbooks. Several student supply co-operatives operate cafeterias and offer driver education courses. (See Appendix A).

**Service** co-operatives make up the largest number of co-operatives in Canada and 4,198 responded to the survey, accounting for 72 per cent of all non-financial co-operatives. They reported a volume of business of \$1.6 billion, up 7.8 per cent from 1999.

The largest single area of co-operative activity in the service sector is **housing** co-operatives where 2,114 housing co-operatives reported with assets

of nearly \$5.7 billion and 111,000 members. There are other types of co-operatives involved in housing activities and 66 of these other housing co-operatives reported to the survey. Most of them are co-operative housing resource groups involved with development of emerging housing co-operatives. The concept of equity housing co-operatives which are involved with the management of common assets, exists only in British Columbia at present (See Appendix E).

There are two types of **child care** co-operatives: **daycare** and **nursery school** co-operatives. Daycare co-operatives are formed by parents to provide daytime care for their children while the parents are at work. Nursery school co-operatives are formed with an emphasis on education and social interaction but also provide the parents with time for other pursuits. Child care co-operatives are found in greatest numbers in Ontario, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. We find 418 daycare and nursery school co-operatives reporting revenues of \$56.8 million with 26,213 members. Salaries and wages accounted for 66 per cent of revenues earned.

**Health care** co-operatives play an important role in a number of communities across Canada and 73 health care co-operatives reported to the survey with nearly 32,478 members and revenues of \$88.5 million. The number of home care co-operatives increased dramatically in 2000 almost doubling from 1999. This increase took place in Québec where many incorporations of this type have taken place in the past few years. The home care concept is as its name suggests providing care to mostly elderly people in the home environment.

**Community development** co-operatives foster local leadership skills and grassroots participation in innovation and solving social and economic problems. These co-operatives are found throughout Canada but most are in Saskatchewan. There were 231 development co-operatives reporting with 15,116 members, assets of \$21.3 million and revenues of \$26.5 million, an increase of over 54 per cent.

**Funeral** co-operatives are located mostly in Québec, although they have made some in-roads in the Maritimes particularly in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick. Fifty-seven funeral co-operatives reported assets of \$96.6 million, an

increase from 1999 of 6.7 per cent.

**Water supply** co-operatives are found mainly in Alberta, Manitoba and Québec and 183 responded to the survey with 7,254 members and \$5.7 million in revenues and \$53.0 million in assets.

**Natural gas and rural electric** co-operatives are found almost exclusively in Alberta where 152 of these co-operatives reported to the survey down 16 from 1999 mainly due to amalgamations in the area of rural electric co-operatives. These 152 co-operatives reported memberships of 119,441 and assets of \$462.1 million and revenues of \$174.3 million up 7.5 per cent from 1999.

Although **recreational** co-operatives are found in most provinces, they are most prevalent in the West, particularly in Saskatchewan. The 300 recreational co-operatives reporting were engaged in various activities, including the management of community centres, skating and curling rinks, golf courses, campgrounds and swimming pools.

A number **transportation and communication** co-operatives are found throughout Canada. Of the 74 transportation co-ops reporting most were freight co-ops and taxi co-ops. They had revenues of \$8.5 million and assets of \$41.3 million. Recently auto (car-sharing) co-operatives have been formed in large urban centres including Vancouver and Toronto, supplying their members with shared vehicles on a needs basis and saving members the high costs of owning an automobile (\$9,000 average per year), reducing congestion and in turn reducing pollution. Most of the 77 communication co-ops reporting were of the radio TV/cable and editing and publishing type. They reported 61,529 members, revenues of \$80.3 million and assets of \$116.1 million (For other service co-operatives, see Appendix C).

## **WORKERS' CO-OPERATIVES**

Most **workers'** co-operatives are located in the province of Québec, and 299 reported with a total of 17,221 members and revenues of \$621.3 million, assets of \$410.1 million and 7,274 employees, with 79 per cent working on a full-time basis. These co-operatives operate in a wide variety of fields, as the following examples show.

Founded in 1960, the *Coopérative Laterrière* is the largest forestry co-operative in Québec and also the largest workers' co-operative in Canada, this co-operative was the first workers' co-operative to be listed in the "Top 50 co-operatives in Canada". The *Coopérative Laterrière* operates a sawmill and tree nursery and exports part of its production, primarily to England. It is owned by its 861 members and employs a total of 710 .

**Forestry co-operatives** accounted for 70 per cent of the overall volume of business of workers' co-operatives in Canada, a total of \$435.2 million, (See Appendix D).

The *Coop des inséminateurs du Québec* (The Québec Artificial Insemination Co-operative) generated the most revenues among non-forestry workers' co-operatives in Canada.

In recent years, a new type of workers' co-operative has been developed in Québec, the **worker/shareholder co-operative**. Employees can form a co-operative to buy shares in an existing business. This enables them to have a voice at the board of directors level. Over 80 of these co-operatives are now active in Québec. The increasing interest in workers' co-operatives reflects the shortage of jobs and the determination of educated and informed people in having more control over their jobs and, consequently, their lives and communities.

Another type of co-operative gaining in popularity in Québec is, the **multi-stakeholder** or **solidarity co-operative**. Membership is made up of different categories of partners: service users, employees and community organizations. Almost non-existent a few years ago, in Québec 149 multi-stakeholder co-operatives were incorporated by 2000. Many provide home care services to seniors and people with minor health problems.

## FINANCIAL CO-OPERATIVES

### CREDIT UNIONS AND CAISSES POPULAIRES

**Credit unions** and *caisses populaires* are in all the provinces. They reported assets of \$122.0 billion, an increase of 6.7 per cent over 1999. Québec accounts for nearly 50 per cent of this figure. (For more details, see appendices G and H.

## INSURANCE AND OTHER FINANCIAL CO-OPERATIVES

**Insurance co-operatives** rank with the largest companies of their type in Canada. Eight co-operative insurance companies have over \$16 billion in assets and provide service to over 10 million policy holders.

Two **trust co-operatives** exist in Canada and they administer over \$143 billion in assets.

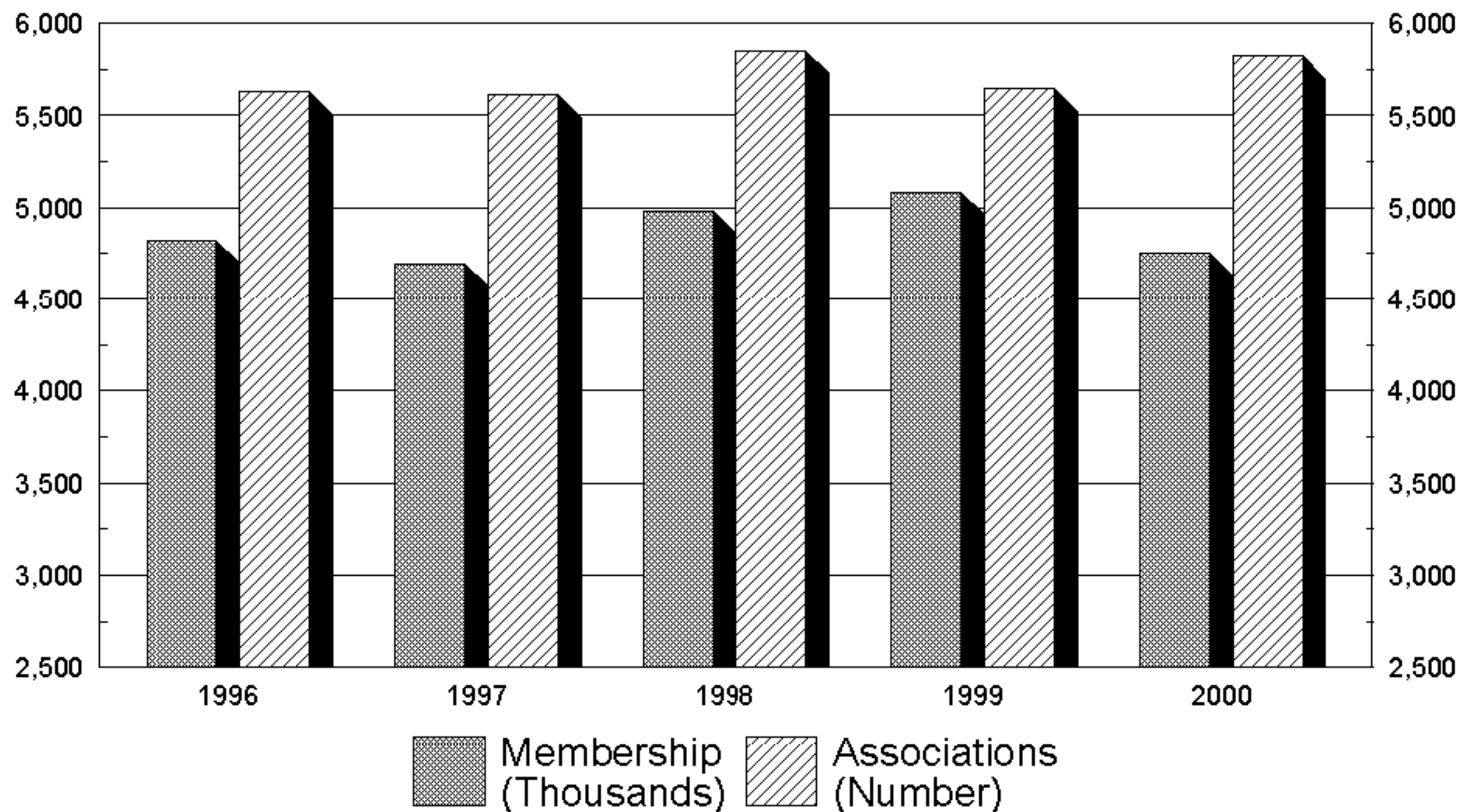

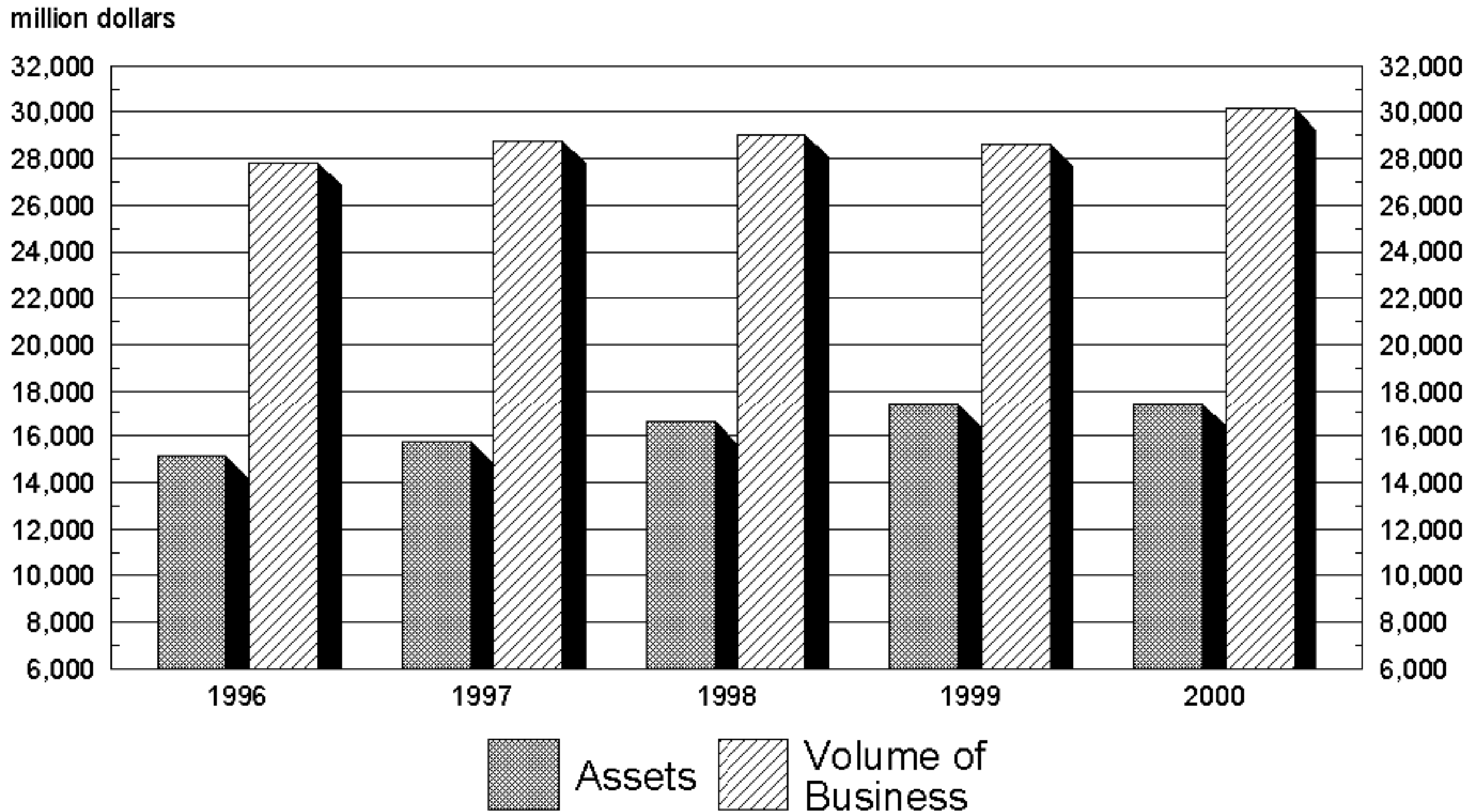

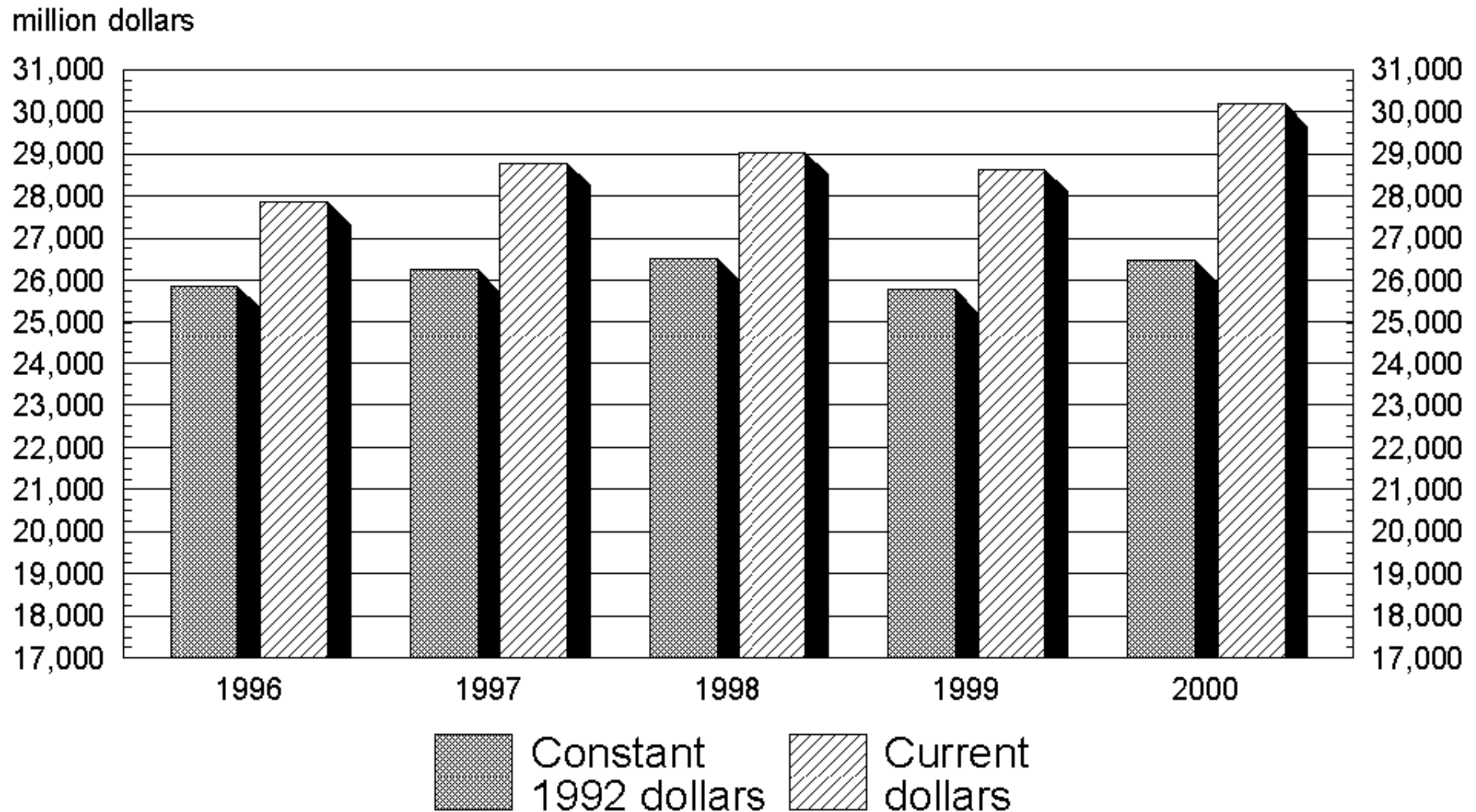
# Figure 1: Number and Membership of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000



# Figure 2: Volume of Business & Assets of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000

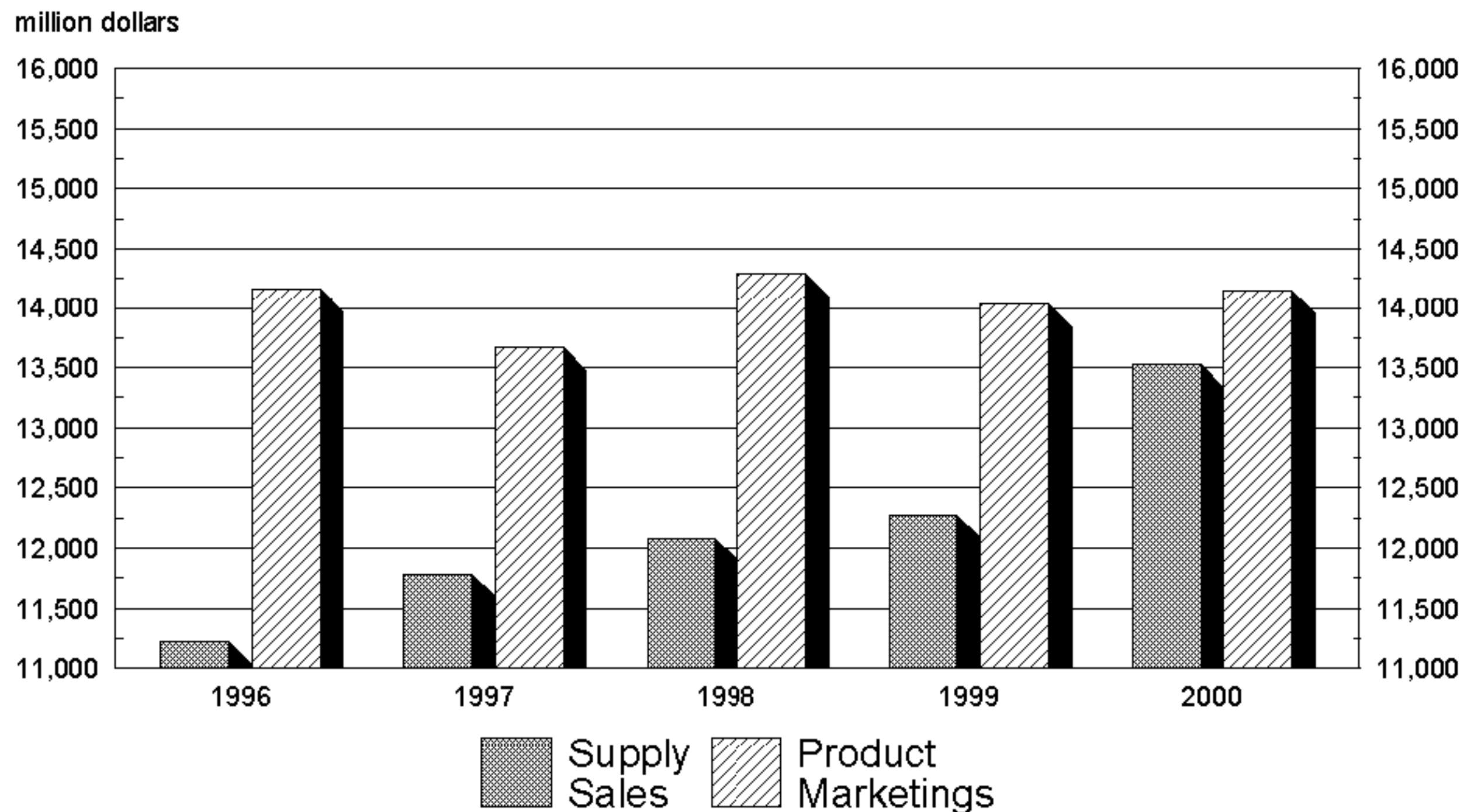


# Figure 3: Volume of Business of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000

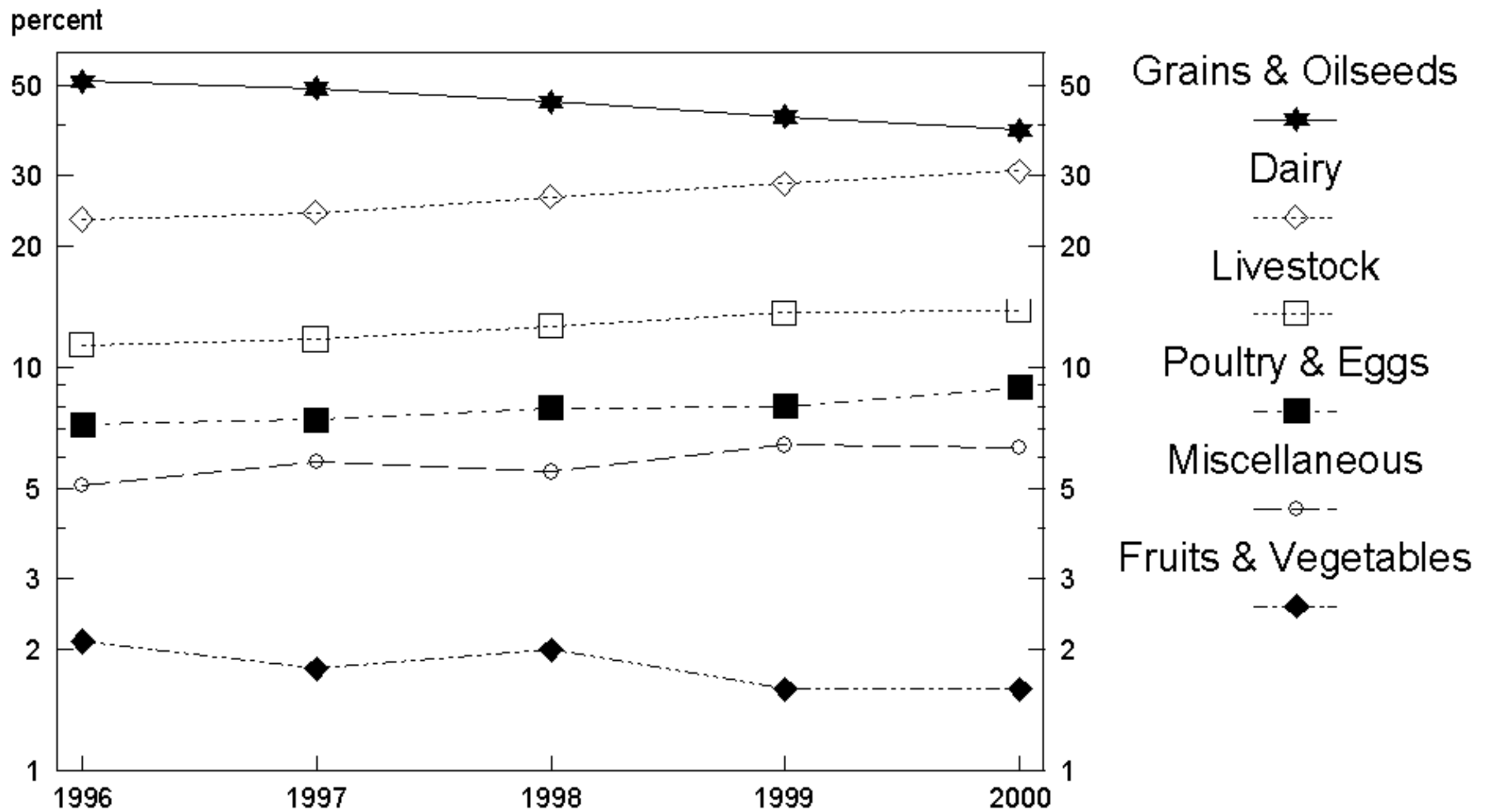

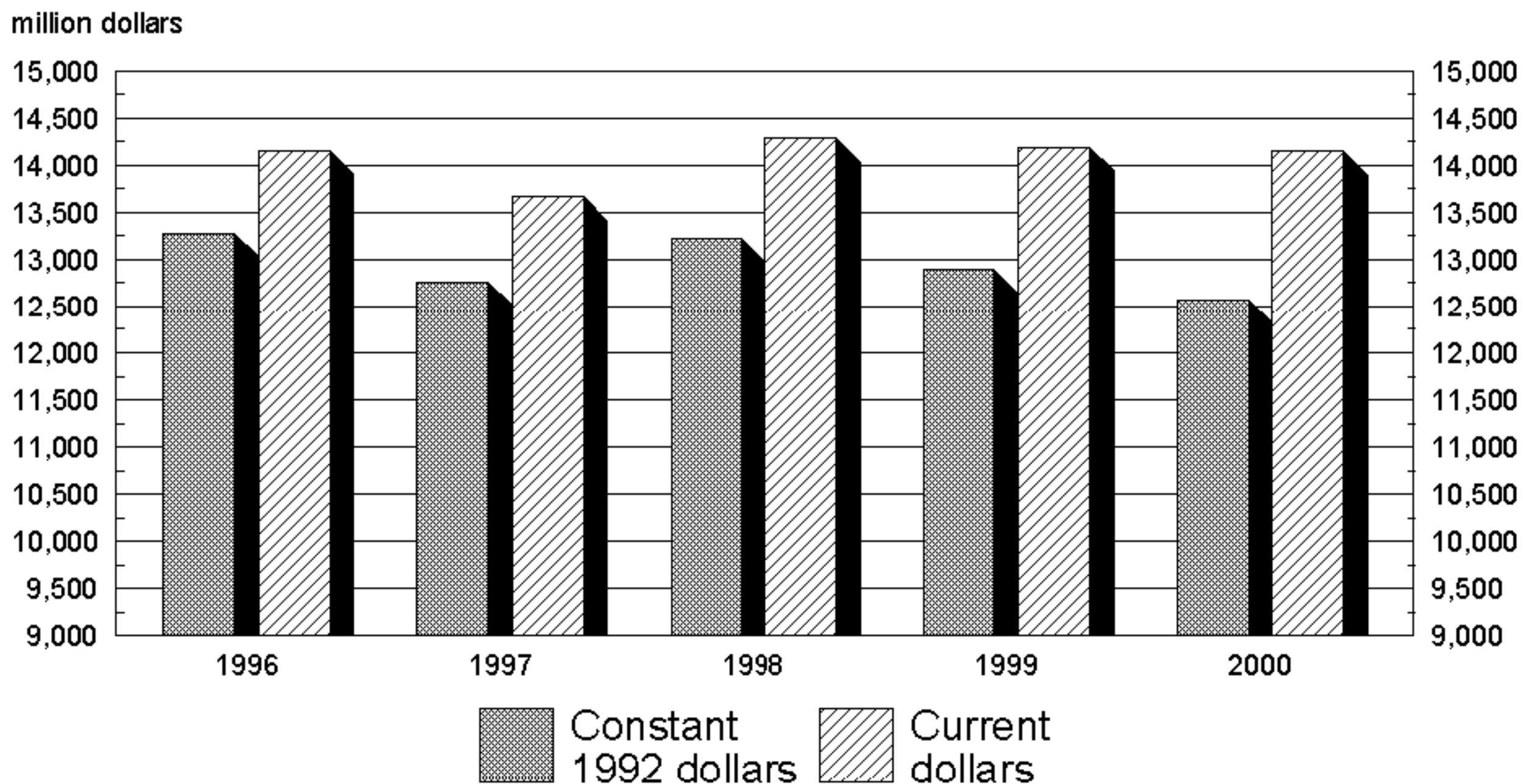
# Figure 4: Product Marketings & Supply Sales of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000



# Figure 5: Products Marketed as a Percentage of Total Marketings by Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000

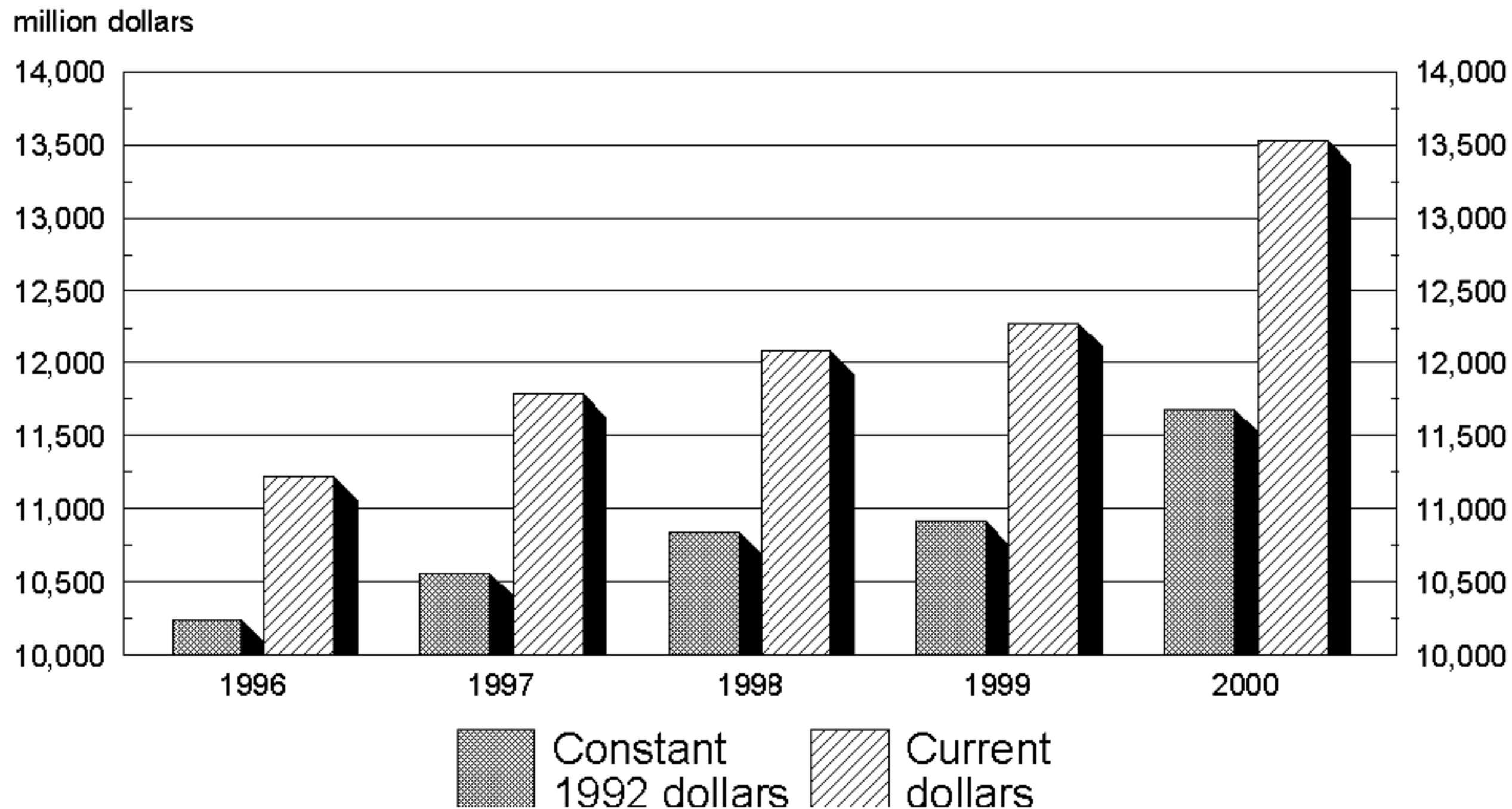


# Figure 6: Product Marketings of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000



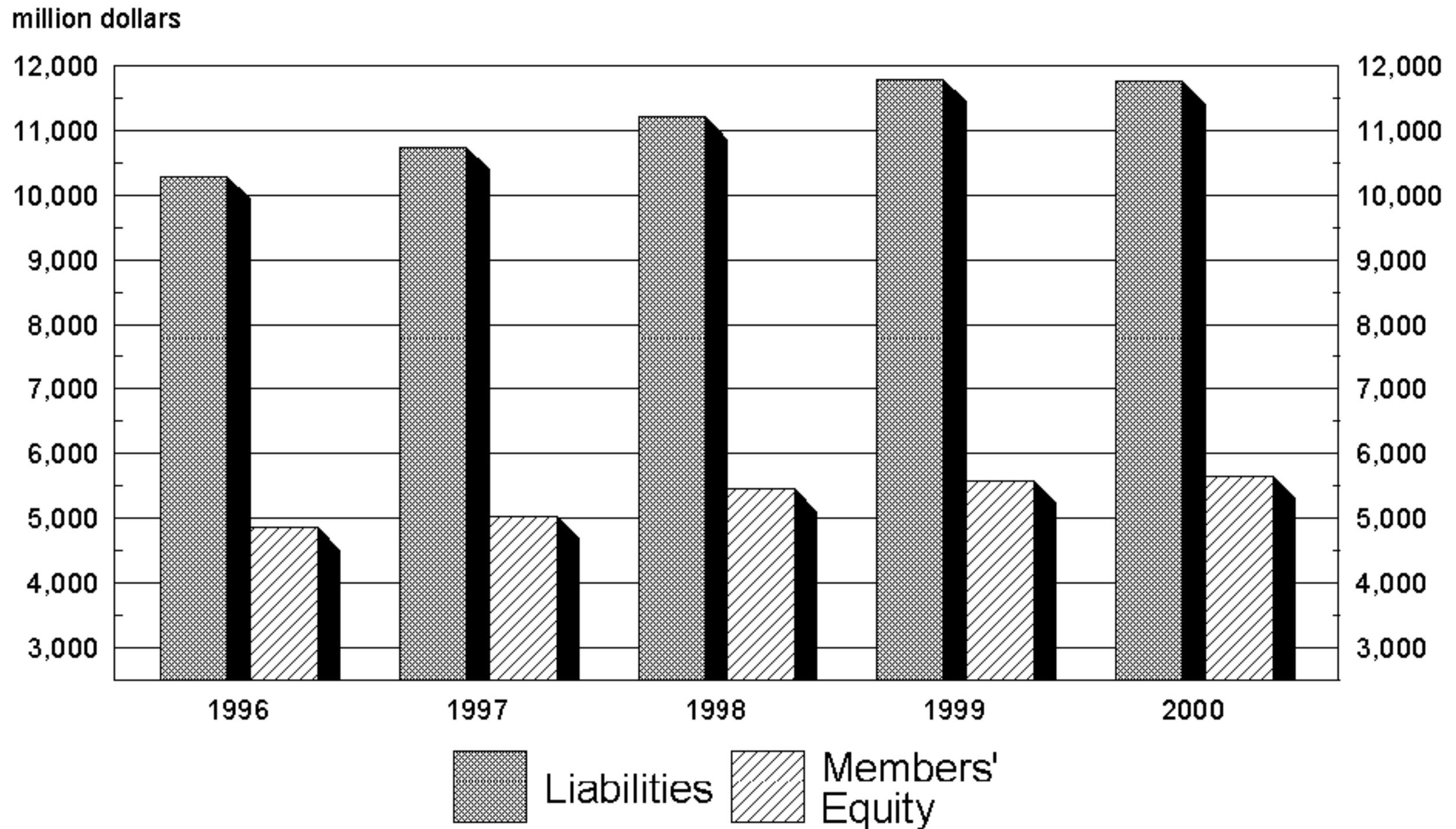

# Figure 7: Consumer and Supply Sales of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000



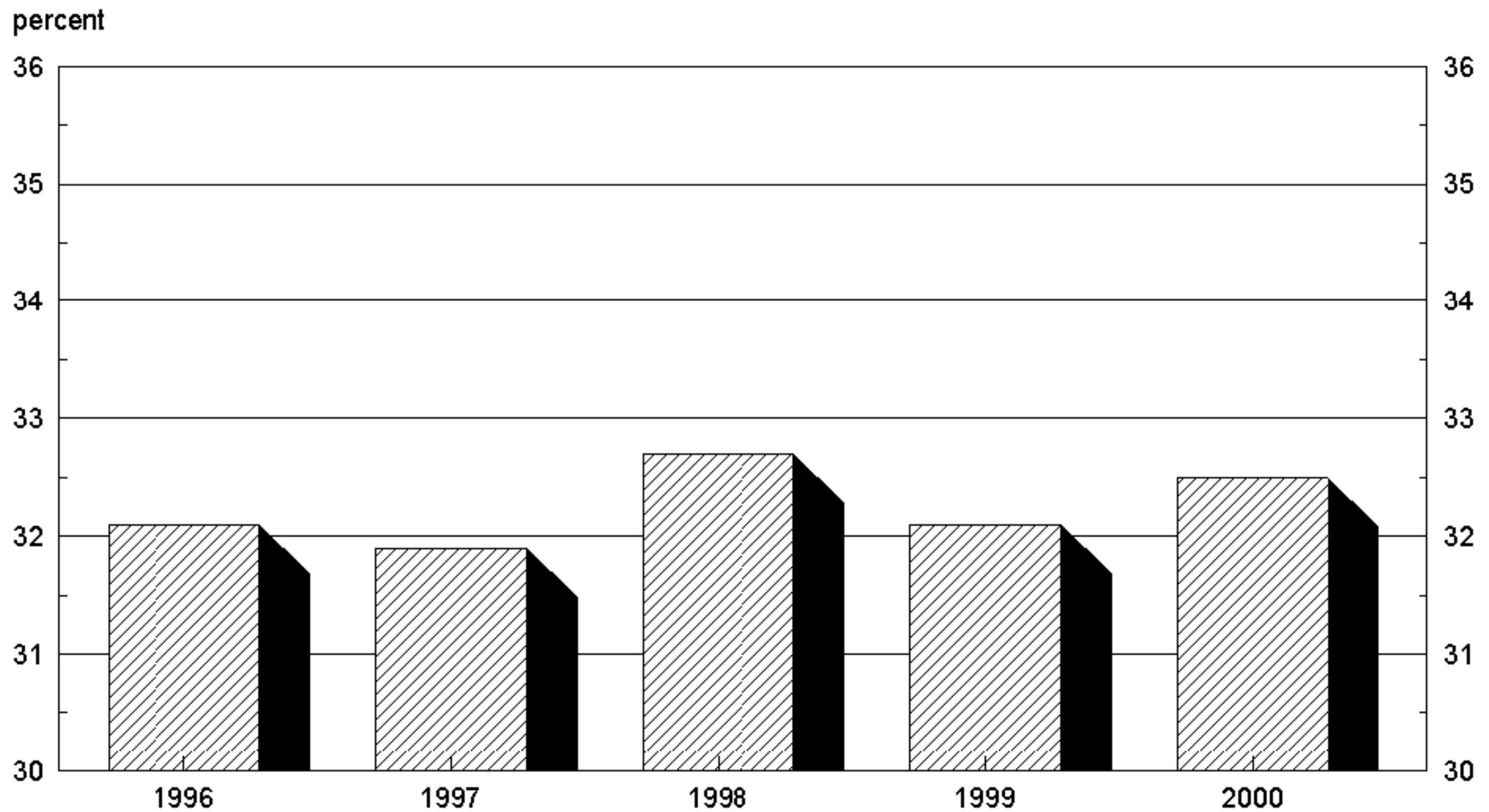

# Figure 8: Liabilities and Members' Equity of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000

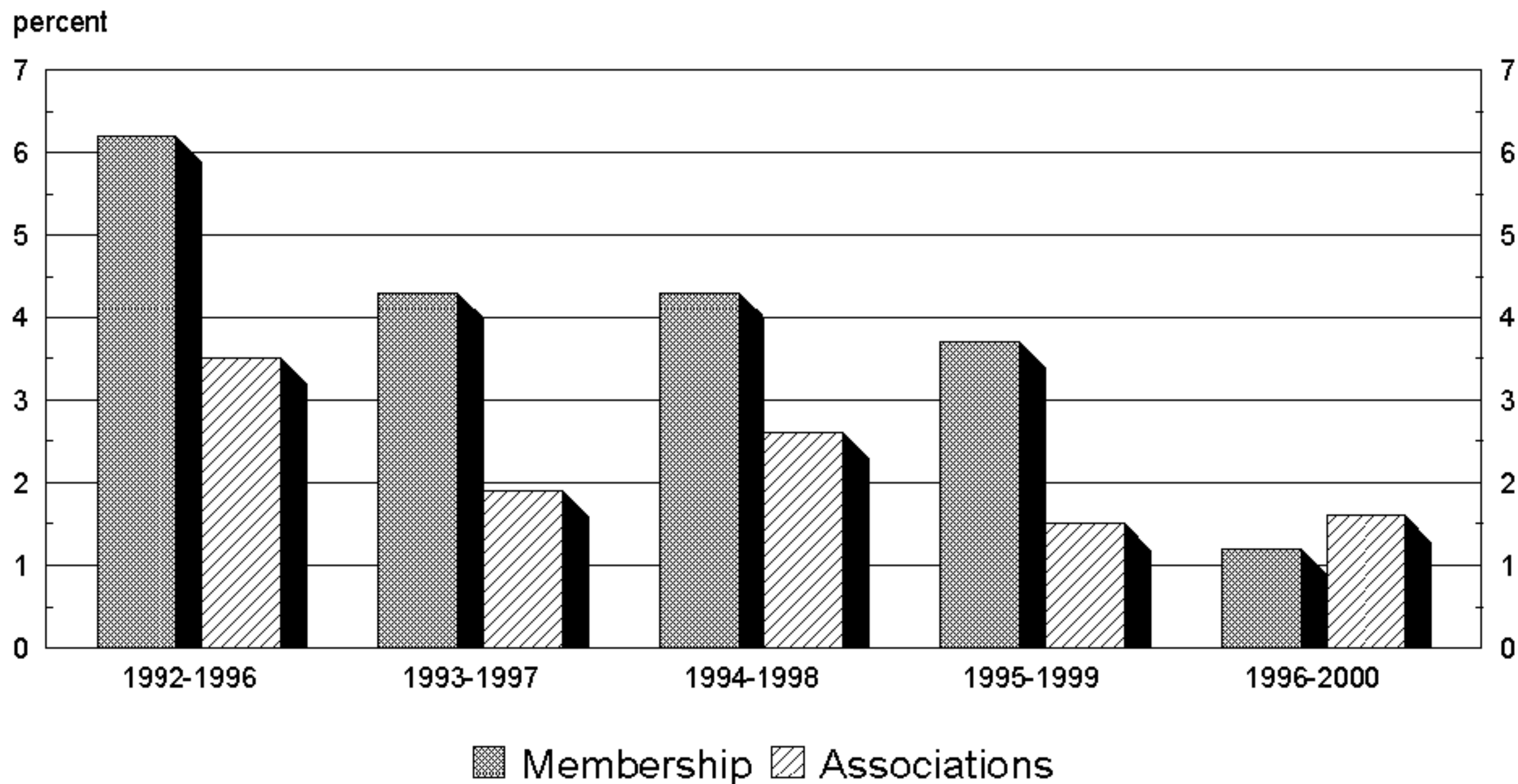




# Figure 9: Members' Equity as a Percentage of Total Assets of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000

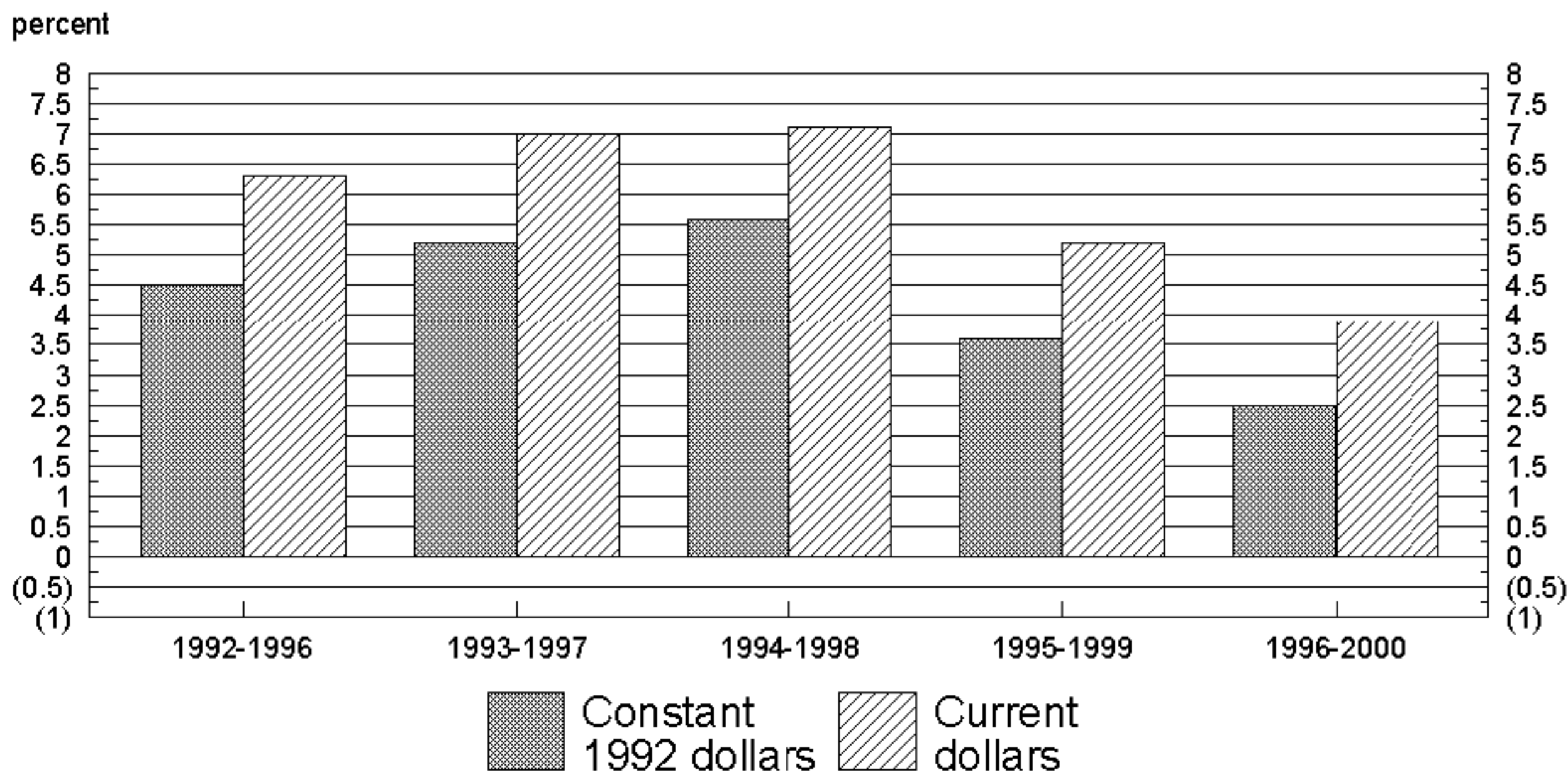


# Figure 10: Five Year Growth Trends, Number & Memberships of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1992 - 2000\*

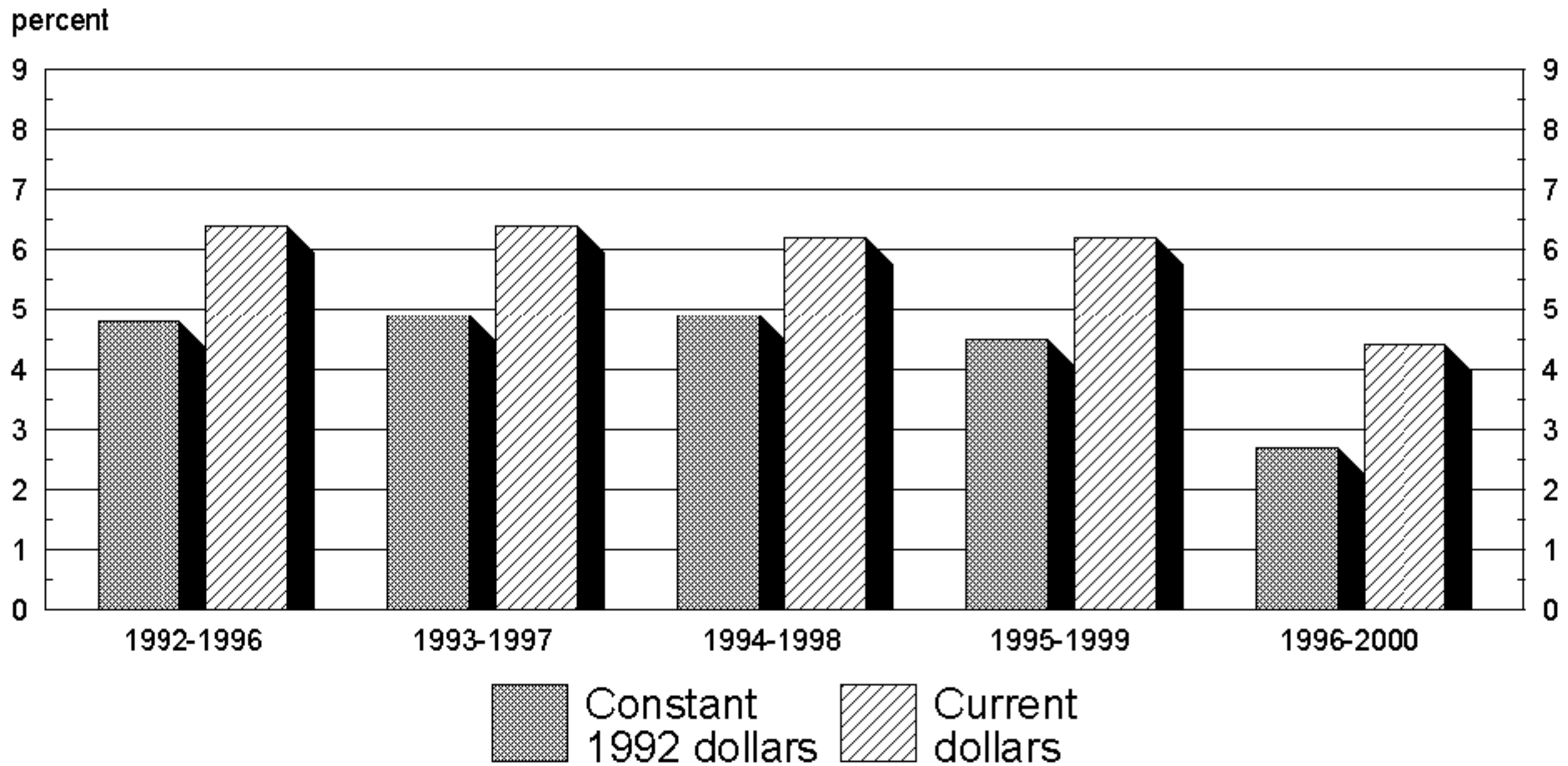
# Figure 11: Five Year Growth Trends, Volume of Business of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1992 - 2000\*

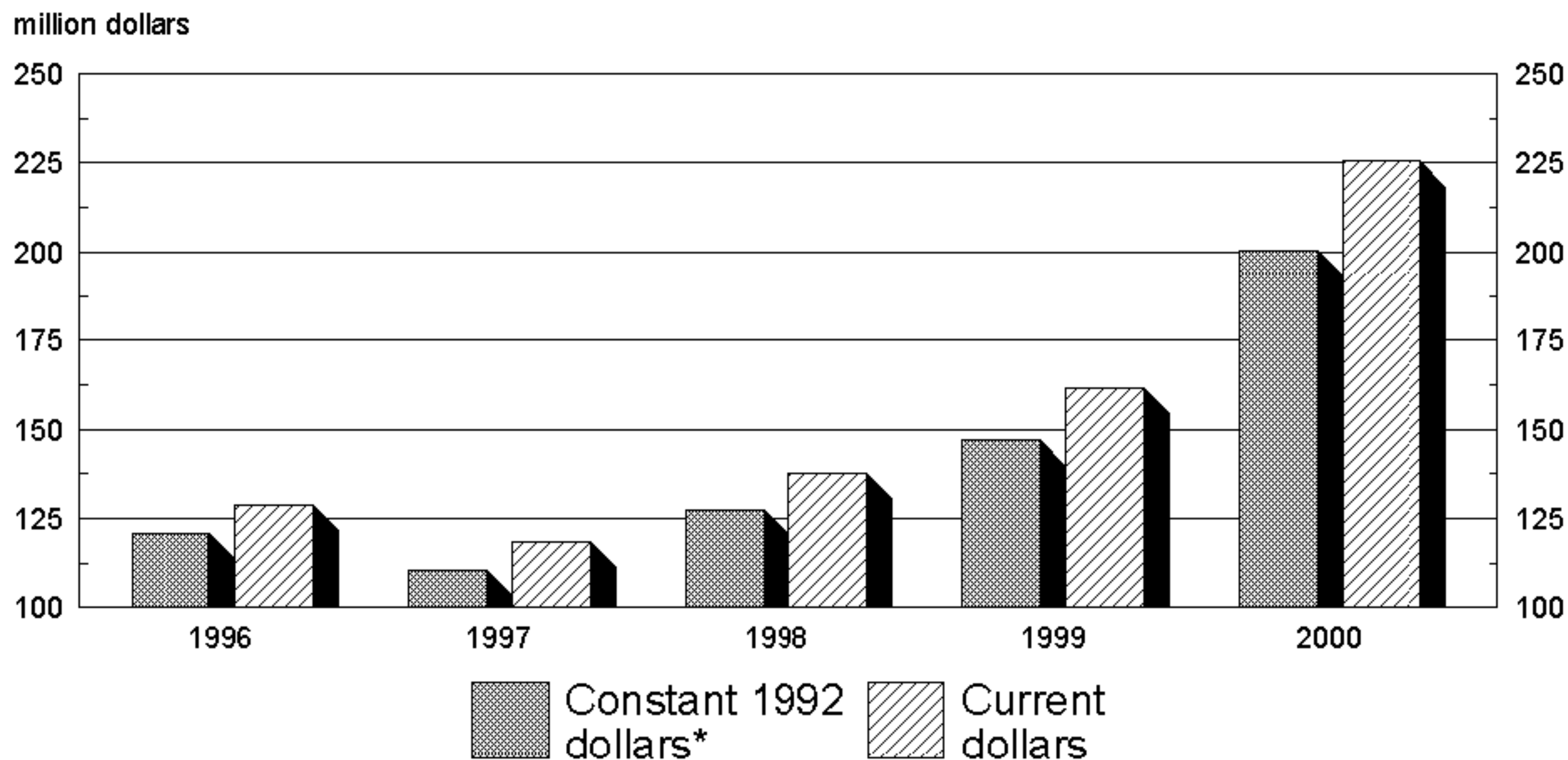
# Figure 12: Five Year Growth Trends, Assets of Non-Financial Co-operatives, 1992 - 2000\*

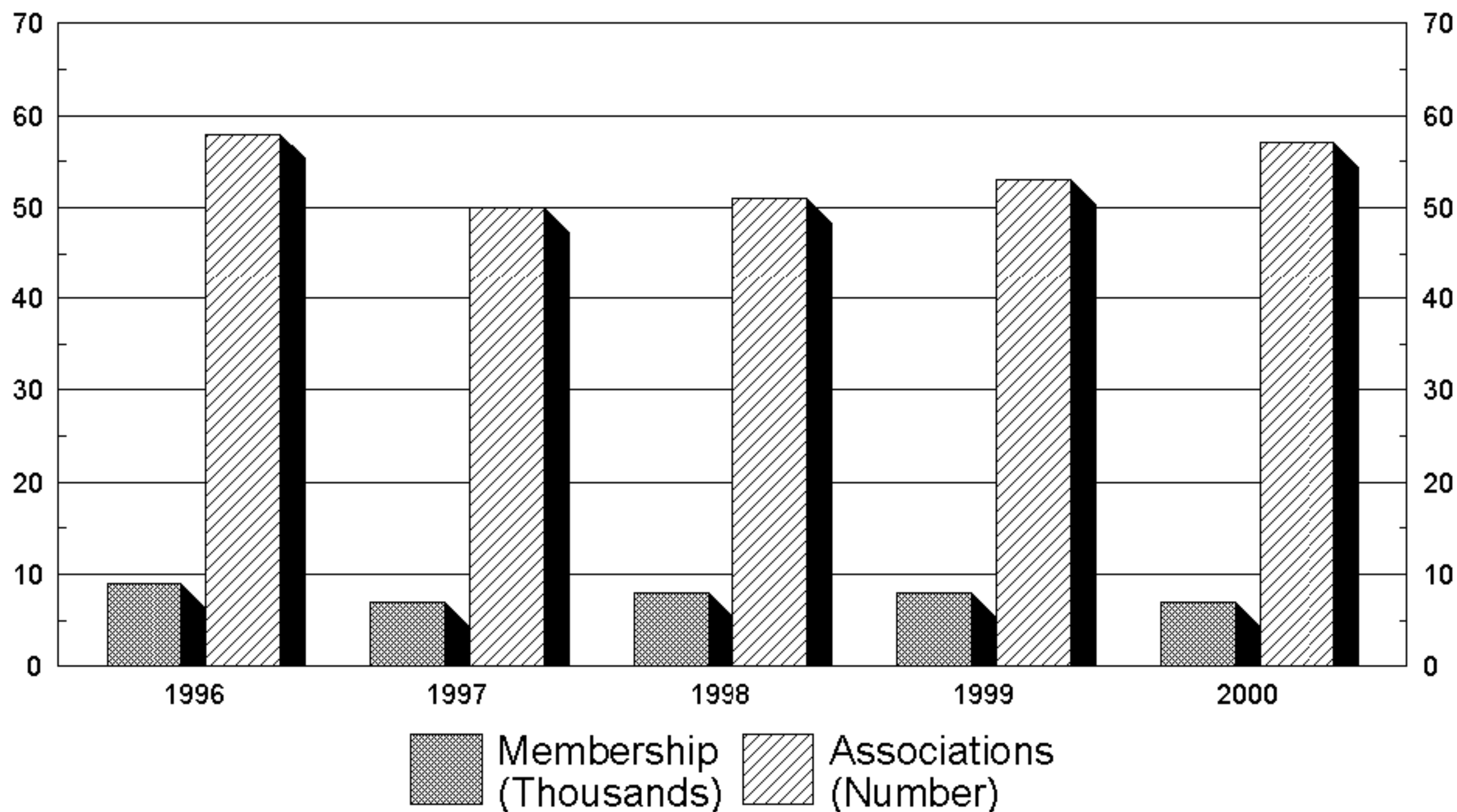

# Figure 13: Volume of business of Fishing Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000

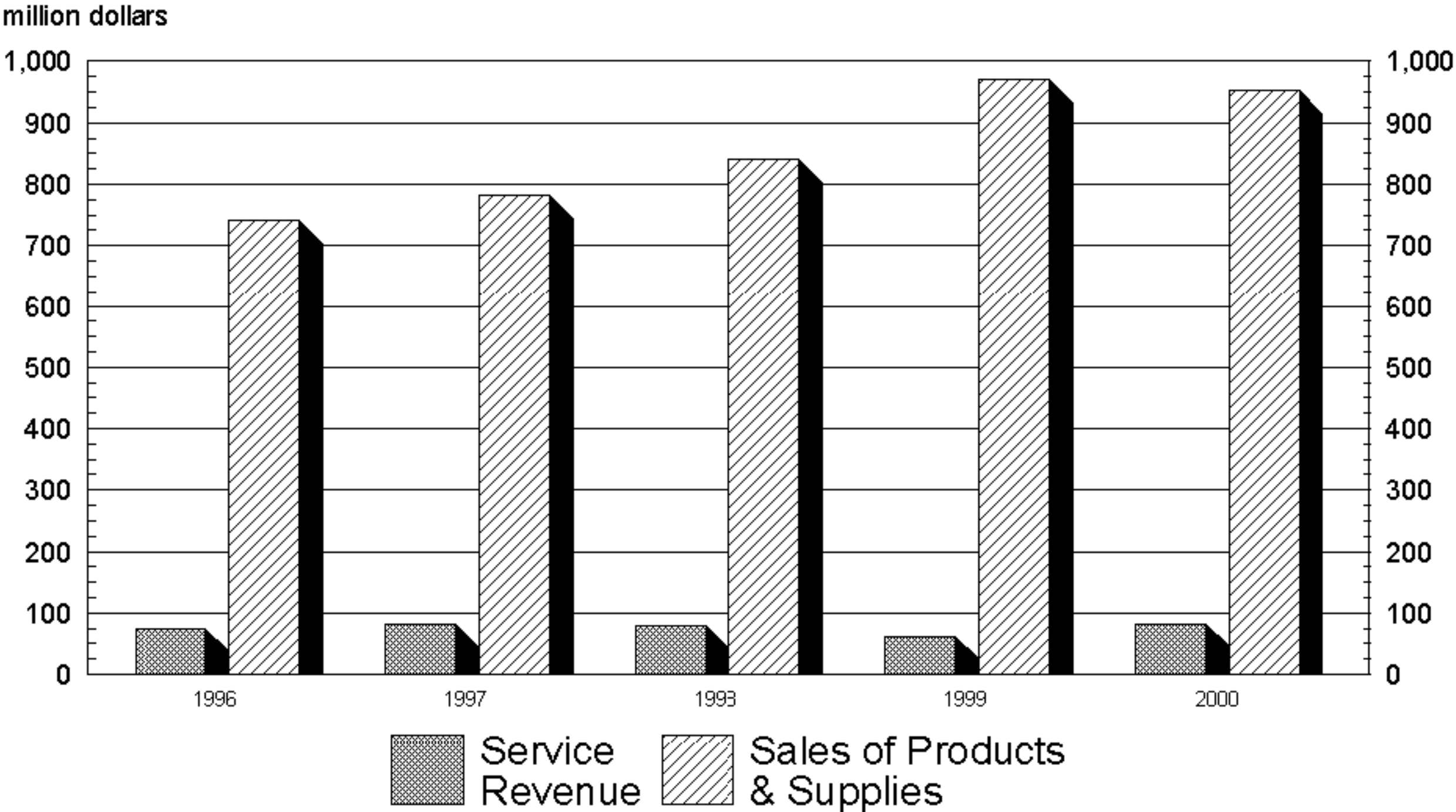

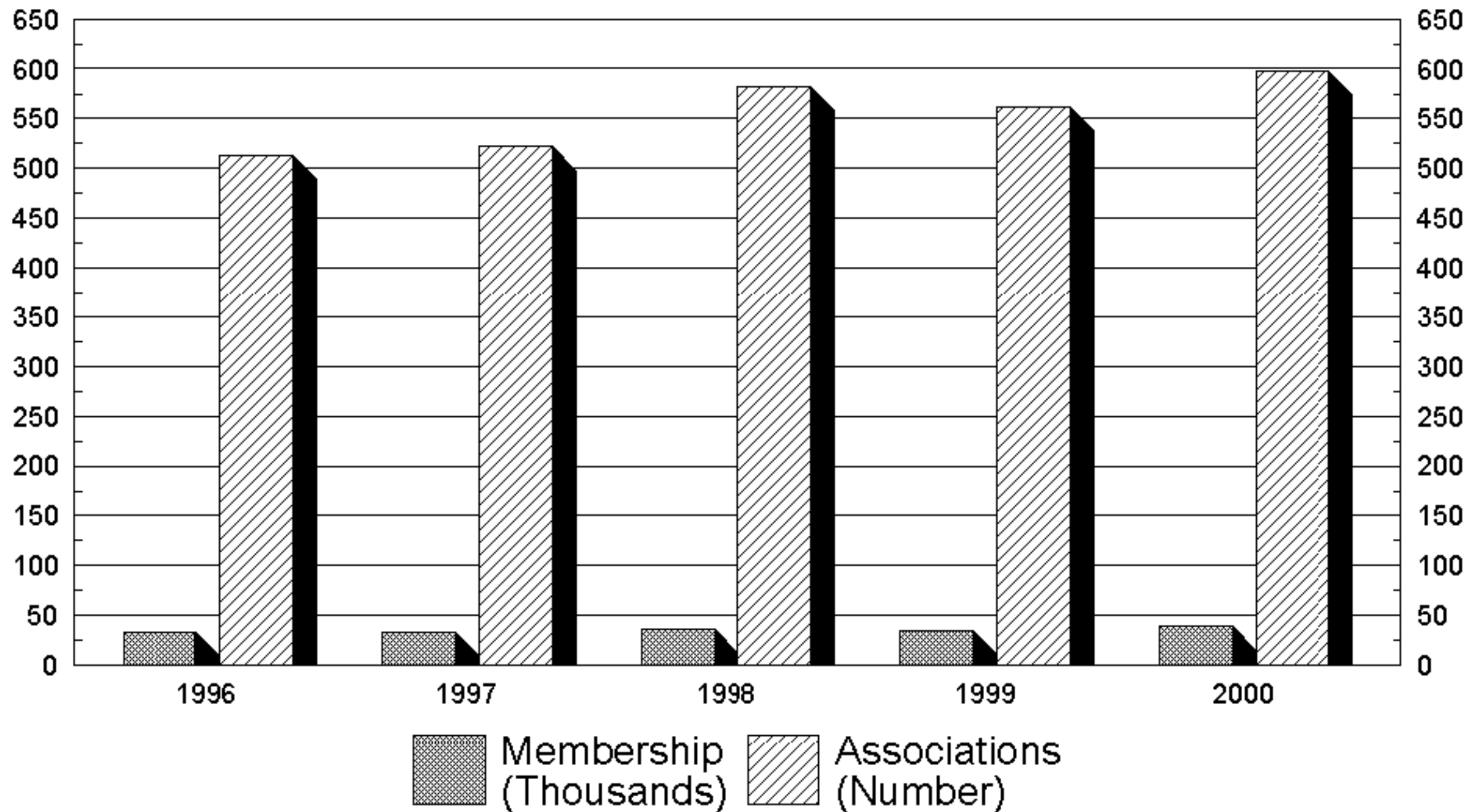
# Figure 14: Number and Membership of Fishing Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000



# Figure 15: Service Revenues and Sales of Production Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000

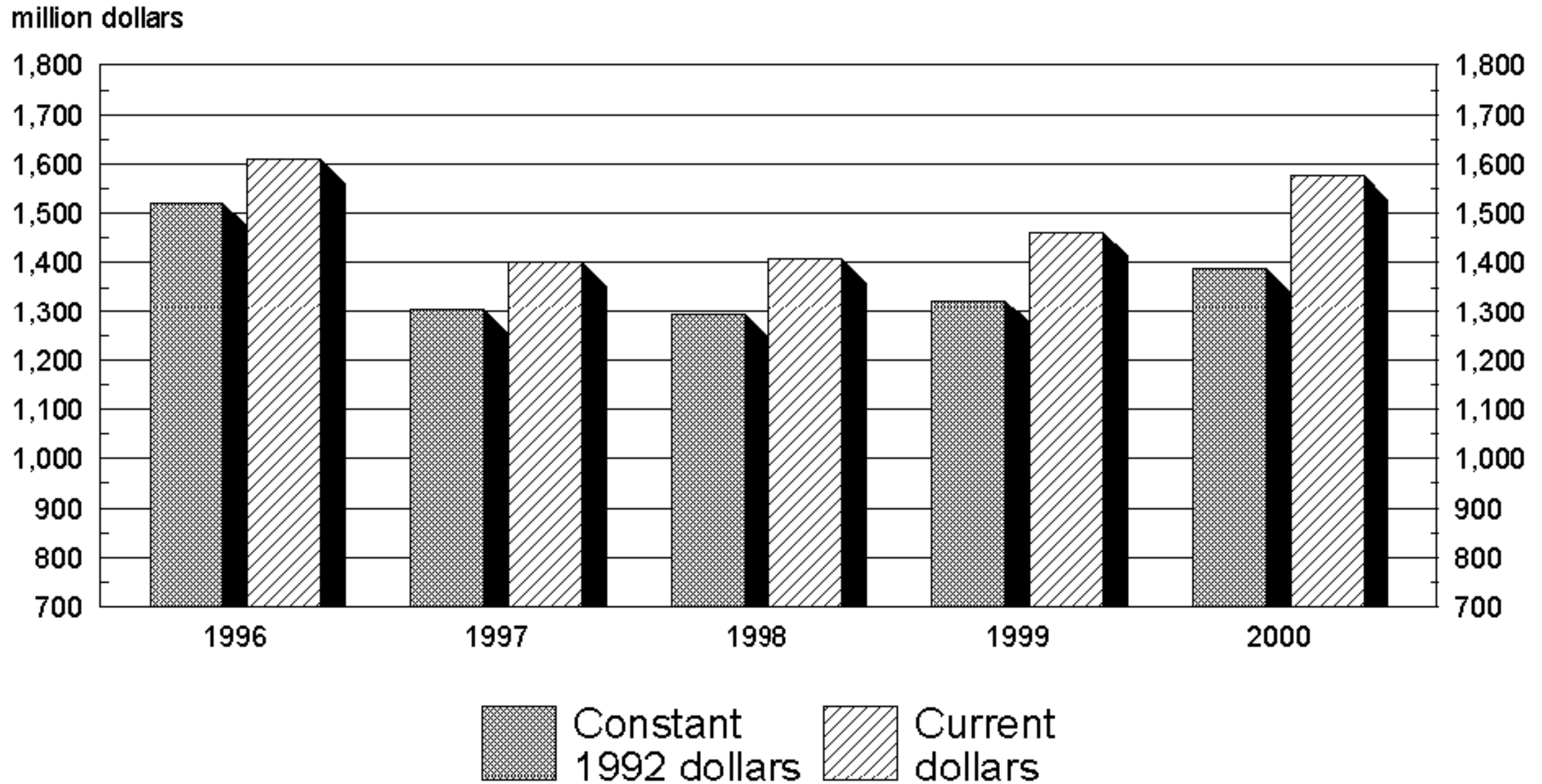


# Figure 16: Number and Membership of Production Co-operatives, 1996 - 2000
