



Taxes

Two taxes apply to most goods and services purchased in the Province of Québec: the federal Goods and Services Tax (GST) of 6% and the provincial sales tax (TVQ) of 7.5%, calculated on the total after GST. Visitors can reclaim the GST on certain items, including hotel rooms and goods being taken out of the country. Currency and Banking Facilities

Canadian currency is the dollar, which is divided into 100 cents. There are 5, 10, 20, 50, 100 and 1,000 dollar bills. One and two dollar bills have been replaced by coins often referred to as "loonies" (the bird on the \$1 coin is a loon) and "toonies", respectively. There is a foreign exchange booth at Pierre Elliott Trudeau International Airport and at Central Station, the city's major train depot. Banks and automatic teller machines (ATM) can be found throughout the city.

Tipping

A tipping rate of 15% is recommended in Canada for service in restaurants, taxis, hair salons, etc. It is customary to calculate the tip on the subtotal prior to applicable taxes.



Electricity Supply

The electrical voltage in Canada is 110 volts (60 cycles), the same as the United States. If you are travelling from Europe or elsewhere, you will need an adapter to use small appliances. Adapters can be found at most department and electrical stores near downtown hotels.

Information on Montréal

Canada is a vast country. Montréal, its second largest city, with a population of approximately 3.4 million, is located at 45°30' N / 73°36' W. Despite its size, Montréal has a friendly atmosphere, with its rich history and French culture. Easy to access by air, rail and road, Montréal is 257 km (160 mi.) from Québec City, 200 km (125 mi.) from Ottawa, 546 km (340 mi.) from Toronto, and 5200 km (3230 mi.) from Vancouver. Montréal is renowned for its numerous universities, medical and scientific research centres, as well as for its diverse and modern cultural and artistic life. The visual arts flourish here, too, at the Montréal Museum of Fine Arts, the Musée d'art contemporain, and hundreds of top-notch local galleries. In fact, Montréal has an international reputation for creative excellence, not just in the traditional arts, but in cutting-edge technology, multimedia, sound and film production. Montréal has numerous and varied excellent restaurants – it is the North American mecca of gastronomy and well-known for its art of living. 


