Scope and Application

1.1 Purpose

(1) As signatory to the Standards of Training Certification and Watchkeeping (STCW) Convention of 1978 as amended in 1995, Canada is obliged to ensure that seafarers responsible to provide medical first aid and medical care on board Canadian ships, are suitably trained and qualified to render such assistance.

1.2 Scope

(1) The STCW78 Convention as amended in 1995 by regulation VI/1, VI/4 and sections A-VI/1, A-VI/4 of the mandatory Code specify the requirements of minimum standards of competence in medical first aid and medical care.

1.3 Effective date

(1) The training program as outlined in this Transport Canada, Marine Safety Publication (TP 13008) received Canadian Marine Advisory Council (CMAC) approval in May, 1997 and its contents became effective with the coming into force of the *Marine Certification Regulations* on July 30, 1997.

1.4 Authority

(1) The *Marine Certification Regulations* Section 6 (SOR/97-391) made pursuant to the *Canada Shipping Act* (R.S.AC.1985, c.s-9) as amended.

1.5 Documents replaced

(1) This document replaces Ship Safety Bulletin 3/94, dated March 8, 1994.

General Criteria

2.1 Course approval conditions

- (1) National organizations seeking Transport Canada (TC), Marine Safety approval to conduct courses in Marine Basic First Aid and Advanced First Aid and Marine Medical Care must meet the following conditions:
- Organizations presently holding authorization from Labour Canada (0SH) to deliver Basic First Aid (8 hours) and Advanced (Standard) First Aid (16 hours) will receive Transport Canada (TC), Marine Safety (MS) approval to deliver courses as contained in this document on submission of an application together with course curriculum and current authorization. To obtain TC, Marine Safety approval for delivering Marine Medical Care training as contained in this document, organizations shall be required to submit to Marine Safety the course curriculum for review before approval may be granted.
- (3) Comply with the program as outlined in this document.
- (4) Provide commitment that program will be available in major centres where applicable with marine colleges as a focal point.
- (5) Instructors delivering programs must be qualified and accredited by the organization requesting approval.
- (6) Organization to supply TC, Marine Safety with copies of their certificates indicating the period of validity of the certificate.
- On-going approval from TC, Marine Safety must be obtained by the organization before 31 August of each year.

Marine Medical Care

5.1 General

(1) This level of training may be presented supplementary to the Marine Advanced program, or as a combined program facilitating the training of any individual to the level of Marine Medical Care without prerequisite requirements. A combined program will include content of both courses for a total of 66 hours.

5.2 Number of trainees in a course

(1) The number of trainees in a course must not exceed 12 when under the supervision of one accredited instructor.

5.3 Course goal

(1) Every seafarer who is designated to apply medical care in the event of an accident or illness on board to demonstrate competence to undertake the tasks, duties and responsibilities described in the subjects listed below.
