With some of the works, like with Chinaman's Peak, I take, particularly in the context of Canada, where the ritual, ancestral worship has become very much a private practise within Chinese homes, I take that private practise and put it on public display...so that there is no longer, private within the Chinese home, that in itself is sharing a cultural practise and taking it out of isolation. Some people may disagree with that, saying that those things should be private. But I believe that, in many cases, people want to retain things in private, also have other reasons why they are doing that...it's called power. And for me, power is not...retaining the knowledge that I have learned, but sharing that pain... or that idea or that vision.
