Introduction

Health Canada is committed to supporting the development of clinical practice guidelines, one of a number of activities comprising the Canadian Breast Cancer Initiative. To this end, a Steering Committee has been struck to oversee the development and implementation of a comprehensive set of clinical practice guidelines for the treatment of breast cancer and the care of breast cancer patients.

The following definition of guidelines has been adopted: Systematically developed statements to help physicians and patients make decisions about appropriate health care for specific clinical circumstances. Guidelines will assist the patient, her family, and the treatment team to arrive at the most clinically effective and personally acceptable care and treatment decisions.

The Steering Committee is also responsible for guideline dissemination and evaluation. Each guideline will be available in English and French and whenever necessary, a special "user-friendly," non-technical version will be developed.

Steering Committee

There are 20 Committee members representing women with breast cancer, health care professionals, educational and licensing bodies, government and non-government cancer agencies, the Federal/Provincial/Territorial Advisory Committee on Health Services (ACHS)^{*} and Health Canada. The Committee is chaired by Dr. Maurice McGregor. A membership list is enclosed.

Process for Guideline Development

Each guideline is being developed by designated authors who are recognized experts in the field. Guidelines will, as far as possible, be evidence-based and the quality of the evidence will be evaluated. Where evidence is not available, guidelines will, of necessity, depend on expert opinion. Draft guidelines will be submitted to external reviewers and circulated widely to external critics (e.g., provincial cancer agencies, patient associations) in an extensive consultation process.

Topics for Guideline Development

At its initial meeting in November 1994, the Steering Committee selected the first 10 topics for guideline development. Additional topics are being considered. Following are details of the 10 topics selected:

Topic 1: Management of the Lump

Objectives:	Guidelines will address how to determine the nature of the "dominant lump" and the necessary investigations to establish a diagnosis.

Topic 2: Indications for Adjuvant Systemic Therapy for Women With Pathologically Established Node-Negative Breast Cancer

Guideline Task Force:	Drs. Cantin, Levine, Little
Objectives:	Guidelines will address the essential pathologic information necessary for deciding on adjuvant systemic therapy for node- negative breast cancer, and the indications for chemotherapy, tamoxifen, and ovarian ablation.

Topic 3: Ductal Carcinoma In-Situ (DCIS)

Guideline Task Force:	Drs. Nolan, Lees, Aitken
Objectives:	Guidelines will address the clinical radiologic and pathologic information necessary for management decisions for the patient with DCIS; indications for mastectomy for DCIS; indications for excision, radiation therapy or tamoxifen for women who choose breast conservation; and whether axillary dissection should be carried out.

Topic 4: Pain Management for Breast Cancer Patients

Objectives:	Guidelines will consider the different kinds of pain that may be encountered; the most effective medications, routes of administration, and dosage levels; the principal side-effects of medications and how they can be minimized; and whether there are guidelines concerning psychological, social, or spiritual help.

Topic 5: Breast Conservation or Mastectomy

Guideline Task Force:	Drs. Nolan, Levine, Thain
Objectives:	Guidelines will address the indications for mastectomy, the essential requirements for the pathologic assessment of a lumpectomy specimen, specific health gains to be expected from each option, and therapeutic consequences of each option such as the need for radiation.

Topic 6: Axillary Dissection

Objectives:	Guidelines will address the indications for axillary dissection, the recommended technique, the essential requirements for pathologic assessment of an axillary dissection specimen, the health benefits and adverse health effects of each option considered, and indications for axillary radiation.

Topic 7: Follow-Up

Guideline Task Force:	Drs. Bowman, Lees, Hugi, Graydon
Objectives:	Guidelines will address who should be principally responsible for follow-up, frequency of follow-up, types of examinations or tests, special features that require more frequent follow-up, and health benefits.

Topic 8: Indications for Radiotherapy After Breast Conservation Surgery

Guideline Task Force:	Drs. Thain, Olivotto, Firth
Objectives:	Guidelines will consider the indications for radiation therapy following breast conservation surgery; the recommended/acceptable, time/dose fractions; the indications for boost to the primary site; and appropriateness of omitting radiation therapy.

Topic 9: Mammographically Detected Lesions

Objectives:	Guidelines will address the steps to be taken to verify radiological diagnosis, indications for stereotactic biopsy, preferable method of fine wire or other localization techniques, handling of the specimen, and requirements for the pathology report of biopsy specimens.

Topic 10: Indications for Adjuvant Systemic Therapy for Women With Pathologically Demonstrated Node-Positive Breast Cancer

Objectives:	Guidelines will address the indications for chemotherapy, tamoxifen, and ovarian ablation; what is considered "standard" therapy; probable benefits of each recommended option; and probable/possible adverse effects of each option.
