

Alberta's new royalty framework



Meeting the needs of Albertans now and into the future

Earlier this year, I promised Albertans—as owners of the province's non-renewable energy resources—a fair share from the development of these resources.

I made a commitment and I delivered. I am proud to share *The New Royalty Framework* with Albertans. I know it is the right plan to secure Alberta's future.

The New Royalty Framework gives future generations of Albertans a fair share from the development of their resources. It gives stability and predictability to the oil and gas industry.

And it assures investors that Alberta will remain an internationally competitive and stable place to do business.

We project these changes will bring in \$1.4 billion in additional royalties in 2010 for Albertans—an increase of 20 per cent over revenues forecast for that year under the current regime.

The New Royalty Framework furthers my plan for Alberta's future—a plan to build communities, green our growth and create opportunity.

The New Royalty Framework is based on input from the public, industry, international experts as well as the report of the Alberta Royalty Review Panel established earlier this year. Here are highlights of Alberta's new royalty regime, which will take effect January 1, 2009.

- A royalty rate structure for conventional oil and gas that operates on a sliding scale determined by commodity price and well productivity. The formula will eliminate the need for rate tiers and many royalty exemption programs.
- A sliding scale for oil sands royalty rates ranging from one to nine per cent pre-payout, depending on the price of oil. Post payout the net royalty will start at 25 per cent and increase for every dollar that oil prices rise above \$55 per barrel to 40 per cent when the world oil is priced at \$120 or higher.
- The province will also exercise, where appropriate, its right to receive raw bitumen in-lieu of royalties, which can be used to promote value-added upgrading and refining projects in Alberta.

Resource royalties support sustainable economic development that contributes to a high quality of life for all Albertans now and into the future. Royalties are only one of the ways Albertans benefit from energy development. Economic activity, jobs, and tax revenue generated from the energy sector are also important and are part of the broader considerations government has taken into account in developing the new royalty framework.

One-third of any additional revenues generated by Alberta's New Royalty Framework will be put into savings and invested for future generations of Albertans, while two-thirds will be committed to capital-spending projects that meet the needs of our growing economy.

Building communities

As our population grows and becomes more diverse, supporting strong communities is key to ensuring that our high quality of life is sustained and enhanced. Our province will continue to be the best place in North America to live and to raise a family. And all Albertans must share in the benefits of prosperity. We'll enhance and better co-ordinate the wide range of services already available to support the well-being of our children, seniors, and those most in need. High quality childcare, world-class education opportunities, long-term care for the elderly—these are the true measures of a compassionate society.

Investment in infrastructure

Alberta is currently working on a long-term capital plan, one of the most aggressive programs of investment in public infrastructure in Alberta's history. It will respond to immediate pressures, and ensure that longer-term needs are anticipated and addressed, with a clear commitment to keep pace with a changing Alberta. This includes transportation systems, health and seniors facilities, schools and universities, affordable housing, water and wastewater management, and recreation and cultural opportunities that a growing province needs.

Crime strategy

Albertans deserve to feel safe in their communities. Alberta's new crime strategy, to be announced in the near future, will aim to reduce crime and bolster law enforcement. Equally important, we must address the factors that give rise to crime, such as drug and alcohol abuse.



Community spirit

The dedicated work of community groups and volunteer organizations contributes greatly to our quality of life. To help increase giving, Alberta has enhanced its charitable tax credit. Starting this year, Albertans will receive a combined federal and provincial tax credit of 50-cents for every dollar donated over 200 dollars.

Greening our growth

As we grow the economy, we're also growing our green agenda – already the strongest in Canada. Albertans place a high value on clear air, clean water and wide open spaces. Alberta will forge a sound, practical and achievable environmental vision, and take bold action to combine development with a strong environmental ethic. Finding the balance between development and conservation is a great challenge of our time, and that balance starts with a practical plan that encourages innovation and sets realistic goals for industry. We're updating our groundbreaking Water for Life Strategy and producing a comprehensive Landuse Framework that will help balance the competing demands on Alberta's landscape.

Climate change

Alberta's record shows we take climate change seriously.

- In 1999, Alberta established Climate Change Central, a public-private partnership that helps Albertans reduce their greenhouse gas emissions. The partnership sponsors a program that rewards people for getting their older, high-polluting cars permanently off the road. In 2006, Car Heaven prevented the release of 26,910 tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions across Canada.
- In 2002, Alberta was the first in Canada with a comprehensive climate change plan.
- In 2004, Alberta was the first in Canada to require large facilities to report their greenhouse gas emissions.
- In 2007, Alberta became the first jurisdiction in North America to put in place regulations requiring large industrial facilities to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions intensity.

This spring we consulted with Albertans, stakeholders and international experts to help renew our climate change action plan. This input will help us build a new strategy to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and prepare Albertans to deal with a changing climate.

Creating opportunity

Alberta must capitalize on new opportunities if we are to continue growing our economy, building strong communities, and securing long term prosperity—for all Albertans.

To sustain a strong economy, we're working hard to expand our value-added sectors and build on our traditional strengths in energy, agriculture, forestry, tourism and health sciences. The diversification of our economy will be driven by the creativity and innovation of Albertans. We'll support them by encouraging investment and research that transforms new technologies such as life sciences, material engineering, and nanotechnology into commercial successes.

Leading-edge technology

Alberta is moving quickly to establish the capacity to develop and commercialize leadingedge technology. We continue to focus our research on priority areas of energy, life sciences, information and communications technology as well as nanotechnology — the 'science of small.' Just this fall, Alberta committed an additional \$100 million (for a total of \$220 million this year) to accelerate nanotechnology innovation here in the province. Strategic investments in our post-secondary education system across Alberta and in our innovation capacity are positioning Albertans - leaders and learners, entrepreneurs and employees alike – to be the agents of change who will take our province forward as a strong competitor in increasingly global industries.

Progress already made on the plan

When he first arrived in office, Premier Ed Stelmach outlined a number of key actions to address existing challenges and move Alberta forward. Since December of last year, significant progress has been made in the priority areas of:

- · governing with integrity and transparency;
- · managing growth pressures;
- · improving Albertans' quality of life;
- · building a stronger Alberta; and,
- · providing safe and secure communities.

Key work completed includes introducing legislation for a lobbyist registry; creating a Land-use Framework; launching the most aggressive-ever investment in public infrastructure and establishing an \$11-billion funding arrangement with municipalities.

How does the province determine funding for municipalities?

Roads and bridges, buses and emergency vehicles, cultural and recreation facilities—these are just some of the types of new municipal infrastructure construction and upgrade projects that the Alberta government is financially supporting over the next 10 years with \$11.3 billion in new funding for municipalities.

Details of the Municipal Sustainability Initiative (MSI) were recently announced by Premier Ed Stelmach and Municipal Affairs and Housing Minister Ray Danyluk following extensive consultations this past summer with more than 450 mayors, reeves, councillors and senior administrators on the parameters of the funding.

It's a simple, fair funding formula that gives Alberta's municipalities maximum flexibility to respond to local needs and priorities. How much your community receives depends on population, education property taxes paid to the province and kilometres of local roads. This initiative also includes appropriate reporting requirements to ensure accountability for the expenditure of taxpayers' dollars, and recognizes that MSI allotments may need to be adjusted if provincial revenues decline.

Beginning this year, municipalities will see \$400 million in 2007-08, \$500 million in 2008-09, and \$600 million in 2009-10 before ramping up to \$1.4 billion annually in 2010-11.

For the 24 municipalities within the Edmonton capital region, this means \$3.1 billion in additional funding over the next 10 years. For Calgary, it means \$3.3 billion. For Alberta's 265 other cities, towns and villages, it's \$2.4 billion over 10 years, and for the province's counties, municipal districts and other rural municipalities, it's \$2.5 billion.

This new funding is unprecedented in Canada, and comes on top of programs like our gasoline tax rebate for major cities, the Rural Transportation Grant for rural municipalities, the Streets Improvement Program for towns and villages, and numerous other provincial initiatives in support of municipal infrastructure. All in all, we're leading the country with our financial support to local governments.

Already the government's 359 municipal partners are benefiting from the recently detailed Municipal Sustainability Initiative. Long-term plans are being drawn up across the province for major initiatives like new overpasses, skating arenas, and numerous other infrastructure projects that enhance the quality of life for Albertans.
