Introduction

This report on statistics is published annually as a complement to the operational and financial reviews covered in the annual report of WorkSafeBC (the Workers' Compensation Board of B.C.)

WorkSafeBC Statistics 2006 contains statistics on three key areas of operation: claims, assessments, and prevention. This information provides both a general overview of the workers' compensation system and trends of key statistical indicators. To allow for valid comparisons, the format of the tables and exhibits has been kept as consistent as possible with that used in previous editions of this report.

In February 2000, WorkSafeBC revised the system it uses to classify employers into classes and subclasses of industry. For administrative purposes, the revised classes are now known as sectors, and the revised subclasses are now known as subsectors. When the new classification structure was introduced, historical records were converted to the new structure. It is therefore possible in *WorkSafeBC Statistics 2006* to publish statistical time series on a subsector basis.

The Classes of Industry section, starting on page 50, lists the types of industrial activities that make up each subsector.

Since the introduction of the new classification system, a number of employers have been reclassified into new subsectors. In *WorkSafeBC Statistics 2006*, the experience of these employers prior to their reclassification is tabulated in the subsectors the employers were originally assigned to, and the experience of these employers following their reclassifications is tabulated in the subsectors they have been reclassified into. The exceptions to this are Table A-1, Number of Fatalities, and the injury rates in Table B-2. These statistics have been re-stated and put on the reclassified basis for all years. The impact of the reclassifications is very minor at the subsector level.

The method used to calculate claim duration by subsector in Table B-2 was revised in 2003. Durations for all years shown in Table B-2 have been put on the new basis.

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Claim Statistics

Reported Claims

The number of claims reported to WorkSafeBC in 2006 was 173,014 — a 5.3 percent increase from the 164,312 claims reported in 2005.

First payment was made for 160 occupational deaths in 2006. Twenty-one of the 160 cases were pensioners who died from causes related to their compensable injuries or diseases. The 160 fatal claims first paid in 2006 cannot be compared to the 274 fatalities in the above chart because some of the fatalities first paid in 2006 occurred in and were reported in a prior year, and because some of the reported fatalities are not compensable. The 274 fatal claims tabulated in the above chart are broken down in the table on the opposite page. The 160 fatal claims first paid in 2006 are broken down by subsector in Table A-1. The counts of "new injuries reported" have been revised for years 1997–2005 because of claim consolidations.

Number and Costs of Claims

During the year 2006, 131,118 claims were paid for the first time. Of those:

- 67,508 were health-care-only claims (formerly called medical-aid-only claims)
- 58,727 were short-term disability claims (formerly called wage-loss claims)
- 4,723 were long-term disability claims (formerly called permanent disability claims)
- 160 were fatal claims

In 2006, WorkSafeBC set aside \$1,172,769 in capitalized values of pension awards for long-term disability benefits on hearing-loss claims.

Compensation costs totalled \$846,993,132 in 2006, compared to \$877,281,055 in 2005. The figures include health care benefits, vocational rehabilitation benefits, short-term disability benefits, and capitalized values of pension awards, which are reserves set aside for present and future payments of long-term disability benefits and survivor benefits. The 2006 figure excludes the \$142,400 increase in widows' pension entitlement as ruled by the B.C. Supreme Court, and the 2005 figure excludes the \$315,726 decrease in widows' pension entitlement. The benefit liabilities figures shown in Note 7 of WorkSafeBC's 2006 annual report are calculated on a different basis and are not comparable to these total compensation costs.





The numbers of total work injuries reported may be revised in the future due to consolidations of claims reported.


Compensation Cost by Type of Benefit

Key Indicators in WorkSafeBC Statistics 2006

This series of charts of 10-year trends of statistical indicators first appeared in the *WCB 1992 Statistics* report. Although none of the indicators have changed dramatically from one year to the next, over the last 10 years there have been some significant trends.

The first chart shows claim duration as measured in days per claim. Five components of duration are shown in the chart: days paid per claim in the injury year, and days paid per claim in each of the four years following the injury year. This is the Association of Workers' Compensation Boards of Canada (AWCBC) recommended method of showing duration that Canadian compensation systems have adopted as a standard. The chart indicates that duration peaked in 1999 and has been declining since that year.

The durations in the first chart are based solely on shortterm disability (STD) days for each of the years in the 1997–2006 period. In *Statistics 2003* and prior publications, the durations shown in this chart were based on STD days and some vocational rehabilitation days.


The second chart shows that one of WorkSafeBC's most important statistical indicators, the injury rate, has been relatively unchanged since 2003 after declining steadily since 1997. The injury rate is the number of claims per 100 person-years of covered employment (100 personyears is equivalent to 100 full-time employees). For the purpose of the injury rate calculation, the number of claims is the number of claims accepted for short-term disability, long-term disability, or survivor benefits either in the year of injury or in the first quarter of the following year. The estimates of person-years are based on gross payrolls that covered employers report to WorkSafeBC.

The third indicator — the fatality rate — is related to the second indicator. The fatality rate is the number of accepted fatal claims per 100 person-years of covered employment. The fatality rate has been relatively unchanged over the last 10 years.

The fourth chart shows the percentage of short-term disability claims represented by claimants whose injuries were back strains. Back strains have accounted for approximately 25 percent of all short-term disability claims over the past 10 years, but the percentage has been slowly declining since 2001. Back strains are the type of injury WorkSafeBC sees most often.

The last two charts reflect shifts in the population of covered workers. The fifth chart shows that the percentage of female claimants has increased from 26 percent in 1997 to 30 percent in 2006. The sixth chart shows that the percentage of claimants younger than 25 years of age decreased from 1997 to 2002, but has increased since 2002.

Number of days paid per claim




─**■**─ Days paid per claim in the injury year

-O-Days paid per claim in the first year after the injury year


- ----- Days paid per claim in the second year after the injury year

Injury rate (number of claims per 100 person-years of WorkSafeBCcovered employment)











Percentage of claimants with back strains

Days Lost From Work

There were 2,695,008 days lost from work during 2006 due to occupational injuries and diseases. The "days lost" in 2006 are the days paid in 2006 on current year and prior-years' injuries. Of the 2,695,008 days paid in 2006, 55.9 percent resulted from injuries and diseases that occurred in 2006, 28.1 percent resulted from injuries and diseases that occurred in 2005, and 16.0 percent resulted from injuries and diseases that occurred in 2005, and prior years.

The following is an analysis by sector and subsector of the days lost in the 2002–2006 period. The sectors and subsectors are described in "Classes of Industry" on page 50.

The first payment of short-term disability, long-term disability, or survivor benefits was made on 63,610 claims during the year 2006, an increase of 2.3 percent from the number made in 2005. Of these claimants, 70 percent were men and 30 percent were women.






