It is suggested that The Election Act be amended to provide:

- (a) Proxy Voting for;
 - (i) persons' absence from the polling division in the course of his employment as a fisherman or salesman; or
 - (ii) illness or physical incapacity; or
 - (iii) absence from the polling division while a full-time student duly registered at a recognized educational institution during an academic term;
- (b) modification of the procedures pertaining to voting by incapacitated persons, i.e., blind persons;
- (c) for the appointment of a Deputy Chief Electoral Officer having the same authority as the Chief Electoral Officer in his absence due to illness or other causes;
- (d) where it is necessary to hold a by-election within 12 months of a General Provincial Election that the voters' lists used in that General Provincial Election be used as the voters' lists in the by-election.

It has also become quite apparent that a major revision of the polling divisions must be carried out at an early date. Over the years, both the Federal and Provincial Election Officials have been accepting the descriptions of the other. During this period, printing errors have occurred in proper names, roads have been renamed or rerouted, farms have changed ownership and movement of population have all manifested the need for a major revision.

It would appear that the most efficient manner of creating changes would be to follow more permanent, natural and manmade physical boundaries, regardless of the number of voters in a polling division. Polling divisions, where necessary, could be divided into polling stations of from 250 to 325 voters.

It is suggested that such a revision be carried out with the co-operation of the Federal Chief Electoral Officer and his officials.
