### Adopt-A-Highway Volunteer Information Session 2005



More than 30 volunteers and representatives gathered at AgriTech Park in Bible Hill for the second annual Adopt-A-Highway Volunteer Information Session on March 5th.

Our thanks to the RRFB Nova Scotia, NS Department of Transportation and Public Works and the CVI Nova Scotia for making this session possible.



Alanna Nelson, Education Officer with the RRFB Nova Scotia, gave a presentation on the many programs offered through the RRFB such as the Used Tire Management Program; Paint Recycling Program; Education and Awareness Programs; and so much more. She also showed

a winning video developed by students of Richmond Academy that was entered into the RRFB's *Nova Scotia Recycles Contest*. It is hoped the video will be shown later this year on local TV stations. You can view the video at:

Cathy Trafford, Program Coordinator, Clean Nova Scotia, shared the story of how a community cleaned up an illegal dumping area. Upper Governor Road connects the communities of North and East Preston and is known locally as the "Connector Road" because it provides a "connection" between the two communities. Because the road is uninhabited and isolated, it has been an illegal dumping ground for decades.



Clean Nova Scotia decided to tackle the problem. With the help of the HRM, RRFB Nova Scotia, Nova Scotia Youth Corps, Transportation and Public Work and the Halifax Regional Water Commission, the job was completed. Debris along the road and hidden in the woods totaled 164 tonnes of materials which were collected and either recycled or sent to disposal. The materials recycled included 125 tires, 23 abandoned cars, and 75 large appliances. Ongoing education and awareness as well as enforcement of illegal dumping regulations will keep Upper Governor Road from becoming a dumping ground again.



Paula Putnam, Inspector Specialist, Department of Environment and Labour, presented information on illegal dumping and the processes that her department must take to enforce penalties.

Presentations on reporting procedures and safety guidelines were given along with information kits and t-shirts to each participant. (Nancy Veinot, Lions Club Representative, pictured.)

The importance of submitting a completed permit to the Adopt-A-Highway office was stressed. The office uses the permit information to track the amounts of litter and the number of volunteers participating. Also it was discussed that you must have a permit, signed by a Transportation and Public Works (TPW) representative on hand, **before** starting your clean-up.



During the afternoon, a round table discussion on volunteer age restrictions took place. Some participants wondered if the age restriction was lowered, would be easier to get volunteers?

Currently, all participants who take part in a clean-up on a secondary highway, must be 12 years of age or older. Every six participants aged 12-17 require one adult supervisor (18 years of age or older).

All participants who take part in an Interchange clean-up at a 100-series highway exit area must be 16 years of age or older. Every six participants aged 16-18 require one adult supervisor (19 years of age or older).

At the March 24<sup>th</sup> Adopt-A-Highway committee meeting, this issue was discussed. It was felt that these regulations have been set in place for legal and above all, safety reasons. Working along a highway is dangerous and the rules in place for children would not be changed at this time. It was suggested that younger children wanting to participate could do other jobs the day of the clean-up. Possibly there is a local community hall or park area that needs a bit of care and cleaning. Younger children can work safely in these areas with proper adult supervision and feel that they too are making a contribution.

## What Are the Effects of Litter?

Litter can cause a whole range of problems for everyone in the community. Litter discarded



along our road can even travel to our rivers and oceans, where it can cause harm to wildlife.

- ➊ Litter costs money. Removing litter from the environment costs Nova Scotia taxpayers thousands of dollars each year.
- ➋ Litter is a threat to public health. Litter attracts vermin and is a breeding ground for bacteria. Items such as broken glass and syringes can be a health hazard in public places.
- ➌ Litter can be a fire hazard. Accumulated litter and carelessly discarded cigarette butts are potential fire hazards.
- ➍ Litter looks bad. Litter negatively affects the image of places, especially tourist locations.
- ➎ Litter attracts litter. Litter sends out a message that people do not care for the environment and that it is acceptable to litter.
- ➏ Litter can harm or kill wildlife. Plastic litter can choke or suffocate birds and marine life. Carelessly discarded containers can trap small mammals.

### The Grand Total – Fall 2004:

A grand total of 1840 bags of garbage and recyclables were collected during the Fall 2004 clean-ups.

Many groups reported that the early snowstorm in November made it difficult to perform their clean-ups.



Total amount of kilometers cleaned was 258.5 km along with five Interchange/Exit areas. A total of 743 volunteers donated a grand total of 2369 volunteer hours.

The total weight of the garbage collected is 27,600 kg or 60,720 pounds. This equals 30.36 tonnes of garbage and recyclables collected from Nova Scotia's highway during the Fall 2004 clean-ups.

Another excellent effort from Nova Scotia's Adopt-A-Highway volunteers!
