Sunday, June 10, 2007 "Canadian Rivers Day" on the Margaree Margaree - Lake Ainslie Canadian Heritage River, Inverness County

1:00 PM to 4:00 PM: Join the Nova Scotia Department of Environment and Labour -Protected Areas Branch to celebrate "Canadian Rivers Day", by canoeing/kayaking down one of Nova Scotia's two Canadian Heritage Rivers - the beautiful Margaree. We will put in at Margaree Forks and finish up at the bridge at Margaree Harbour. Although this 13 km section of the river is generally slow moving, some paddling experience is recommended. Participants are required to bring their own boats and all required safety equipment including sufficient paddles, PFD's, floating throw-ropes, painters, bailers and signalling devices. River Inhabitants Nature Reserve, Inverness County

NOON to 5:30 PM: Join Nova Scotia Environment and Labour's Protected Areas Branch on a paddle down River Inhabitants to see one of the province's newest and most spectacular nature reserves. River Inhabitants Nature Reserve was designated in July 2006 with the consent of the landowner, Stora Enso Port Hawkesbury. The area boasts a rich variety of wetland habitats, including freshwater fens, marshes, oxbow ponds, alder thickets, sand bars, and estuarine marshes. It is also home to the rare Wood Turtle and several rare plants. Participants must supply their own canoes, paddles and safety equipment. Bring a lunch, water, fly repellent, and sunscreen, and be prepared to walk your canoe through shallow parts of the river. Enrollment is limited. Saturday, October 13, 2007 Rain forest lichens

Terence Bay Wilderness Area, Halifax County 9:00 AM: Join Robert Cameron of the Nova Scotia Department of Environment and Labour to spend the morning in a narrow band of coniferous dominated forest along the Atlantic coast, which constitutes Nova Scotia's rain forest. We will hike an old trail with short forays into adjacent wetlands (treed bogs) of Terence Bay Wilderness Area. This forest is rich in lichens, mosses and liverworts. Some of the rarest lichens in North America inhabit the rain forest. Some time will be spent learning how to identify some common lichens and we will also get a peek at some of the rarities. Terrain is rugged in places and wet in others. Appropriate footwear and clothing is necessary, a hand lens would be helpful to bring. Light rain is ideal for viewing lichens, so only a deluge will require moving to the rain date of Sunday, October 14. Pre-registration is required.
