

DID YOU KNOW...

Approximately 220 white-tailed deer were imported to Anticosti Island by Henri Menier in 1896 and 1897? Today, the population is estimated at 166,000.

Henri Menier, an avid Atlantic salmon fisherman, hated black flies and mosquitoes? To help fight these biting insects, Menier introduced leopard frogs, which now inhabit the entire island.

The last official report of a black bear on Anticosti dates back to 1996? The population is believed to be in rapid decline and extinction is almost inevitable. Each meter of stratified rock on Anticosti represents approximately 15,000 years of marine deposits?

Vauréal Falls features a 76 meter drop, or 22 meters more than Niagara Falls? While the waterflow is lower, it is the second highest waterfall in Québec after Montmorency Falls and one of the island's main attractions.

Patate Cave, discovered in 1981, is one of the longest caves in Québec with a total length of 625 meters, nearly 580 m of which have been explored? Anticosti's foxes come in many different colors but are all a single species, the red fox? Just as humans can have red, blond, brown, or black hair, red foxes can have coats of various shades.

Several years ago, one of our guides, Mr. Trefflé Jennis, pointed out a stand of cedars, an unusual species on Anticosti? In upcoming years, we will work to ensure its protection.

With a view to achieving harmonious development at the cultural, social, economic and regional levels, Parcs Québec is responsible for the conservation and development of territories that are representative of Québec's 43 natural regions or exceptional sites. while ensuring that they are accessible for educational and outdoor use.

All of Québec's national parks were created in accordance with World Conservation Union standards. The criteria are defined as follows:

- A relatively vast area that represents one or more ecosystems that are moderately or not at all transformed by exploitation;
- Where animal and plant species, geomorphological sites and habitats are of particular interest from a scientific, educational or recreational viewpoint, and that offers scenery of great beauty;
- In which the highest competent authority of the country has taken measures to eliminate exploitation and to instil respect for the ecological, geomorphological or aesthetic aspects, on the whole;
- Where a visit is authorized, under certain conditions, for educational, cultural or recreational purposes.

Genesis of the Show

Birth of a masterpiece

A work in progress for over 430 million years, Anticosti Island and its 572 km² of scenic wonders were not designated a national conservation park until April 2001. Parc national d'Anticosti is a series of spectacular landscapes and unusual natural features including canyons, coastal cliffs, caves, fossils, and more. With its wide open spaces and crystal-clear lakes, rivers, and sea, the park puts on a natural performance like none other. Divided, this park has three distinct entities. The first one with a surface of 3,5 km² includes the Patate Cave area. The second, the canyon of the Observation River, has a surface area of 11.4 km². Finally, the last one covers a surface area of 557 km² and includes, a maritime frontage of more than 26 km, the Vaureal Canyon and the Chicotte Canyon.

Punctuated by breathtaking vistas, a network of short, medium, and long hiking trails threads through the park, offering 45 kilometers of pure enchantment. Visitors won't want to miss the opportunity to kayak along the base of towering cliffs for a chance to hear whales blowing and seals splashing. While Vauréal Falls is undoubtedly Anticosti's leading attraction, the park has much more to offer... See for vourself!

Prelude...

Since 1985, Sépag Anticosti has welcomed visitors and offered vacation activities. The advent of Parc national d'Anticosti has bolstered the education and environmental protection initiatives begun nearly twenty years ago. You will probably be staying outside the park during your visit. But you can still count on the same top notch service and warm welcome.

Feeding the animals may seem like a kind gesture. Quite the contrary! Animals can become dependent on humans and will have a harder time finding their regular food in winter. The kindest thing you can do for a wild animal is to observe and appreciate it in its natural habitat!

Keep it clean

You can help protect Anticosti from the ravages of civilization by packing out your trash, including cigarette butts, peels, tissues, cans, and plastic bags. Although some items may be biodegradable, they create visual pollution for other hikers. Trash cans are available near entrance kiosks and lodging sites. Thank you for your cooperation!

An island to share! When vou visit Parc national d'Anticosti, you'll meet other people who have come to enjoy the island's nature, charm, and scenic beauty. Be respectful of others, who also have a right to enjoy nature at its best.

Make sure to leave areas as they were when you arrived. That way, the next visitors can enjoy a show just as spectacular as the one you just saw!



Cans are recycled on Anticosti Island. Recycling bins are available at the various inn buildings. For returnable bottles, we ask that you bring them to the village and leave them in the designated areas. Thank you for doing your part to help protect the environment!

Drinking water

On Anticosti Island, drinking water is available in all inn buildings. At other sites, cabins and campgrounds, you'll need to bring enough water bottles to last your entire stay.


Fire danger index







Fossils of Anticosti Island




While hiking on the trails or in the canyons, you will certainly see different types of fossils. Anticosti Island is essentially made up of fossilised limestone rocks. This type of sedimentary rock comes from 415 to 500 million years of sediment accumulation. On the Island, we find seven geological formations. The oldest of these is the Vauréal and the youngest is the Chicotte. More than 600 fossilised species have been found to date. Here are some examples:


Crinoids are marine organisms in the Echinoderm family which lived in shallow ocean waters several million years ago. These animals have been found in large quantities in the Chicotte geological formation. What we notice the most often is the more or less complete stem of the crinoid.

Cnidaria are corals of soft-bodied marine animals living in rigid cups which they secrete. They are found in colonies or individually. On Anticosti, we find two groups of these animals; the rugosa and the tabulata corals.

Brachiopods are marine invertebrates having two asymmetrical shells. They are the most abundant of the fossils found in the Island's Paleozoic rocks.



Conserving for all humanity



Our green approach to the daily management of national parks

Sépag thinks and acts green in managing the national parks under its care. It knows how important national parks are to the success of sustainable development and lets this guide every environmental decision it makes. Concrete measures include:

- An ecological integrity program to monitor the state of health of parks
- More and more buildings powered by solar energy
- Public transportation in the Hautes-Gorges-de-la-Rivière-Malbaie, Gaspésie, Jacques-Cartier and Oka national parks
- Electric vehicles in the Oka and Îles-de-Boucherville national parks
- Downsizing and rationalization of the vehicle fleet
- Reduction in drinking water consumption in campgrounds thanks to water meters in showers
- A waste management program
- Progressive discontinuation of the use of plastic bags for consumers

Northern Sector

Patate Cave

Have you ever experienced total darkness? Well, here's your chance! Plunge into the depths of one of Québec's longest underground cavities, with a total length of 625 meters/2050 ft. Enter Anticosti's underground world and discover the park's buried treasure.

Important

- Danger of falling rocks. Helmets and headlamps available at McDonald Visitors Center.
- Trail includes two ford crossings and river level may vary. Inquire about conditions before you go!

Vauréal Falls

The area around Vauréal Falls is dotted with breathtaking viewpoints so you can admire the waterfall in all its splendor. Why not grab the opportunity to truly experience this island landmark?

Observation River Canyon

Located near the Transanticostienne road, the Observation River Canyon is worth the trip, whether it's for a hike or simply to admire the landscape. The two trails in the sector lead to spectacular views of the canyon.

Baie de la Tour

Vauréal Canyon

Access to this canyon is made possible by a trail which leads to the Vauréal River. Taking this trail, you will walk along both sides of the river at the foot of rocky cliffs more than 90 meters tall. Each bend in the river gives you a new and more amazing view. The highlight of this hike comes when you reach the foot of the 76-meter high Vauréal Falls. The view from here is what Anticosti Island is all about.

Brick canyon

The island subsoil holds a rich fossil past. Look beneath your feet and you're bound to find fossilized brachiopods, gastropods, corals, sponges, and-if you're lucky-trilobites. By the way, how do we know that these fossils are 430 million years old?



This sector offers a breathtaking landscape with immense cliffs from one end of the bay to the other. What a wonderful place for watching the marine birds, some of which nest in the walls of the cliffs. At the east end of the bay, the magnificent Telegraph trail leads to the top of Pointe de la Tour. From here, you have a spectacular view of the shoreline and the marine environment.

Southern Sector

The Great Salt Lake

The Great Salt Lake is a remarkably well-preserved natural treasure. Now classified an ecological reserve, it is off limits to all but researchers. However, you can see the brackish lake (mixture of fresh and salt water) from a panoramic viewpoint. Our naturalist guide can tell you about the many characteristics of the lake and its fascinating inhabitants.

Southwestern Point

You'll love this area that's steeped in mystery. Built in 1831, the lighthouse on the Southwestern Point has witnessed numerous shipwrecks and bears testimony to a tumultuous past. It's very likely that, if the guardians of the lighthouse could join us again, they'd have many tales to tell about life on this enchanting point.

The Chicotte River Canyon

In contrast to the canyons of the Northern Sector, the Chicotte River Canvon is located at the head of a river. In this majestic canyon, where the cliffs are much less steep, you will find monoliths not yet completely detached from the cliffs.

Chicotte-la-Mer

This marvellous site, nearby the sea, offers a multitude of activities (horseback riding, hikes, swimming, etc). Near the Inn, you can take advantage of beautiful sunny days with a visit to the little Chicotte River canvon or a swim in the inviting little basins of turquoise water. In addition, a magnificent trail awaits you. On the 'haul-out trail', you can explore both the shoreline, to see the seals, and the forest, to observe the animals that are particular to Anticosti Island.

Le brûlé de 1955 Trail

An unspoiled view awaits at the Observation Canyon detour, including a magnificent multilevel waterfall and a highly unique geological phenomenon: sinking and resurgence. Also see how forest fires have affected Anticosti's vegetation. An excursion you won't want to miss!

Les Pins Blancs Trail

Ninety meters up, the Les Pins Blancs Trail snakes along the cliff, offering a magnificent view of Vauréal Falls and the canyon. And the loblolly pines bordering the trail are simply majestic, with some over 100 years old. You'll be all eyes.

THE GREAT OUTDOORS AND CONSERVATION - THE 7 PRINCIPLES OF Leave No Trace Canada

Because its role encompasses more than conservation alone, Parcs Québec wants to use every possible occasion to foster support among visitors to its national parks for the adoption of ecologically responsible practices in outdoor activities. This is the reason Parcs Québec is proud to have chosen to promote the principles of Sans trace, the french version of the popular American Leave No Trace program. This code of outdoor ethics is based on the following seven principles:

- Plan Ahead and Prepare
- Travel and Camp on Durable Surfaces
- Dispose of Waste Properly
- Leave What You Find
- Minimise Campfire Impacts
- Respect Wildlife
- Be Considerate of Other Visitors
