









The Grand tour of Québec's National Parks

As an Introduction

The mission of Parcs Québec

With a view to achieving harmonious development at the cultural, social, economic and regional levels, Parcs Québec is responsible for the conservation and development of territories that are representative of Québec's 43 natural regions or exceptional sites, while ensuring that they are accessible for educational and outdoor use.

All of Québec's national parks were created in accordance with World Conservation Union standards. The criteria are defined as follows:

- A relatively vast area that represents one or more ecosystems that are moderately or not at all transformed by exploitation;
- Where animal and plant species, geomorphological sites and habitats are of particular interest from a scientific, educational or recreational viewpoint, and that offers scenery of great beauty;
- In which the highest competent authority of the country has taken measures to eliminate exploitation and to instil respect for the ecological, geomorphological or aesthetic aspects, on the whole;
- Where a visit is authorized, under certain conditions, for educational, cultural or recreational purposes.

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Word from the Director

On behalf of our entire team, I would like to welcome you to Parc national de la Jacques-Cartier.

Striking a balance between access to the territory and its conservation is our top priority. For this reason, an ecological integrity monitoring programme was initiated three years ago to provide regular bills of health for the park. In addition, we are seeking your invaluable help so that together, we may accomplish our mission. Every little move counts in the ecological balance.

Each and every one of our actions is guided by sustainable development. For instance, this year to reduce greenhouse gas emissions related to the climate change problem, wood-burning stoves and fireplaces in our cabins will be replaced with EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) certified equipment. By using these devices, wood consumption can be reduced by 30% and polluting emissions, by 90%. Result: much cleaner combustion.

Regarding our discovery activities, do not miss our latest attraction on the L'Éperon trail! We will be inaugurating an all-new self-interpretation circuit featuring seven panels, including two panels with an audio option.

Lastly, in a continuing effort to provide greater access to the Jacques-Cartier River to newcomers and families, the park now offers new equipment. A fleet of inflatable canoes, mini-rafts and air tubes are available at the rental centre.

The entire team at Parc national de la Jacques-Cartier wishes you an enjoyable visit!



Moose, the proud symbol of Parc national de la Jacques-Cartier, are members of the deer family that includes white-tailed deer and caribou, also found at the park.

Moose are usually more active at dawn and dusk and move about at night. These mammals feed on the leaves and branches of trees and shrubs and are prey to wolves and bears. Moose are frequently seen eating water plants dur-



ing warm, sunny summer afternoons alongside the Jacques-Cartier river. They come to the river to cool down and get away from stinging insects. Many visitors to the park are excited at the prospect of seeing moose. To observe moose freely without jeopardizing their survival, a safe distance of 50 metres must be maintained at all times.

Fall is a very busy period for the moose. During the breeding season, males seek out females that attract them with bawling moans. Open spaces alongside lakes provide a perfect setting for the moose to meet. In the following spring, the females give birth to one or two calves in a sheltered location. Offspring follow their mother for an entire year.

In the 17th century, Jesuit Fathers on a mission in the area recorded in their historical narratives that the moose did not represent the largest animal population in the primarily coniferous

local forest. Moose were found further south, in the St. Lawrence valley, the Appalachian area and as far away as New England.

With industrialization in early 20th century and the efforts of colonization north of Québec City, the Laurentides mountainous landscape changed. Logging companies decimated extensive coniferous forests and introduced forest renewal with broad-leaved trees and fir.

New mixed forests provided an excellent habitat for moose populations to increase in the area. Presently, the moose density in the park is 3.7 per 10 Km² with an estimated population of 250 individuals. To learn more about the moose, the park offers discovery activities. - Downsizing and rationalization of the vehicle fleet
- Reduction in drinking water consumption in campgrounds thanks to water meters in showers
- A waste management program
- Progressive discontinuation of the use of plastic bags for consumers
- Promotion tools printed on 100% postconsumer paper
- Biodegradable household products
- Natural or neon lighting

These actions are proof of our commitment to help improve the use of resources and preserve the land for the benefit of current and future generations.



- 1. A bridge where, in the past, campers at the Héron campground used to sit and eat at picnic tables away from black flies This name was given to a picnic site located at Km 18.
- 2. This word means "major burn" in Montagnais and implies that a forest fire occurred there in the past. Today this area is used as a canoe launch point.
- 3. A salmon river whose name in Montagnais means "the river with trees that cry" It is also the name of a hiking and cycling trail.
- 4. Sediments carried along a watercourse and accumulated in a triangular shape at its mouth It is also the name of a new group campsite located at the forks of the Sautauriski and Jacques-Cartier rivers. (inverted word)
- **5.** The area where two rivers join It is also the name of a trail located where the Sautauriski and Jacques-Cartier rivers meet.
- 6. It is given this name because of the dominant species, the yellow birch, found in the forest stand where the campsite is located. Its name comes from the Latin word *Betula*.

- 7. When logs were no longer driven on the river in the '60s, trees cut on area plateaus were transported in trucks and cast into the Jacques-Cartier River at Kilometre 27. It is now the name of a canoe launch point.
- **8.** A primitive campsite with the name of a tall wading bird sometimes seen in the bays of the Jacques-Cartier River
- 9. A trail whose name, pronounced *escatara* in Montagnais, means *forked road* and refers to the intersection of the winter and summer roads used by Amerindians to travel to Lac Saint-Jean.
- 10. Deposits comprised mainly of sand and gravel transported by the river waters It is also the name of a campsite.
- 11. A river whose name in Montagnais, *Lackdaweole*, means "the river that comes from afar".

- KEEP TO THE TRAILS... And do your part to preserve habitats and species, because trampling can harm the integrity of natural habitats.



Fishing

For more than 150 years, fishing enthusiasts have been coming to Parc national de la Jacques-Cartier to angle fish. Come and tease brook trout too! The Valley sector features more than 30 km of river along which to cast your line from riverbanks or a cance

Please note that a Quebec fishing license and fishing authorization are mandatory. You may obtain them at the interpretation and visitors centre.

The catch and possession quota for brook trout is 10 fish per person. You must record your catch at the end of each day of fishing and drop this information in the boxes provided at the interpretation and visitors centre or gatehouse.

Salmon Express

Since 2001, the Corporation du bassin versant de la Jacques-Cartier has been transporting salmon from the Cap-Santé fishway (on the banks of the St. Lawrence River) to Parc national de la Jacques-Cartier. This way, salmon gain access to the best spawning grounds and avoid several challenging dams. In 2006, it took 49 trips to bring 219 salmon to the river.

Trout or Parr?

We would like to remind you that salmon fishing is prohibited in the park and that returning it to water is mandatory.

Rustic Shelter

THE GREAT OUTDOORS AND CONSERVATION - THE 7 PRINCIPLES OF Leave No Trace Canada

Because its role encompasses more than conservation alone, Parcs Québec wants to use every possible occasion to foster support among visitors to its national parks for the adoption of ecologically responsible practices in outdoor activities. This is the reason Parcs Québec is proud to have chosen to promote the principles of *Sans trace*, the french version of the popular American *Leave No Trace* program. This code of outdoor ethics is based on the following seven principles:

- Plan Ahead and Prepare
- Travel and Camp on Durable Surfaces
- Dispose of Waste Properly
- Leave What You Find
- Minimise Campfire Impacts
- Respect Wildlife
- Be Considerate of Other Visitors



These principles are of course inherent in the regulatory framework that governs our national parks.

At the same time, awareness and application of *Leave No Trace* values in every single one of our outdoor activities, even the most unnoteworthy among them, can help reduce their impact on our natural environment.

Please Do Not Wreak Havoc!

Winter is a critical season for members of the deer family. They live on reserves accumulated during the summer and must limit moving about in order to survive. This is why they gather in a specific area in the forest called a deer (or moose) yard, where they can find food and shelter. During your trek, you might come across trails used by these animals. It could be fatal for these animals if people travel these trails. The animals might be forced to leave their yards and fall victim to exhaustion, predation or road accidents. It is strictly forbidden to enter a moose or deer yard.


