


Issue 3: Lone Parent Families

• 107,385 British Columbians, or 410 out of every 10,000 adults,¹ were single parents in 1991, up from 78,725 ten years earlier.



The Percentage of Never Married Lone Parents Doubled Between 1981 & 1991

- Census '91 suggests that the upward trend in the incidence of single parent families is not caused by an increase in family breakdown. Instead, the trend is rooted in a growing tendency for children to be born out of wedlock. Relative to the total population, the number of previously-married lone parents changed only marginally during the last decade. At the same time, the number of never-married lone parents more than doubled, from 32 out of every 10,000 adults in 1981 to 66 per 10,000 in 1991.
- Among young adults, never-married lone parents now outnumber those who had previously been married. In 1981, five in every eleven lone parents aged 15-24 had never married; by 1991, the share had risen to five out of seven. Similar increases can be seen in the 25-34 year age group, where never-married lone parents now account for 32 per cent of the total.
- As might be expected, in the 55 and over age group, the increases were more moderate. Single parents in this age group would probably have had their children at a time when births out of wedlock were relatively infrequent.

¹ Adults are defined here to include all individuals who are at least 15 years old.

- Female single parents are less likely to have been married than males. In 1991, 18 per cent of all single mothers, and 72 per cent of those aged 15-24, had never been married, compared to only 9 and 57 per cent, respectively, of single fathers.
- The growing trend toward single parenthood among those who have never married is likely to result in greater demands on welfare and other social support systems, as the legal obligations of an estranged spouse or partner to support children will apply to a diminishing number of families.
