- Eighty-three per cent of British Columbia's children who are under the age of fifteen live in two-parent families.


## One in Seven Children Live in Lone Parent Families

- The distribution of children between two-parent and single-parent families has remained basically unchanged since 1986.
- While the number of children who live with non-relatives is comparatively small, it grew significantly--by 58 per cent--during the five year period between 1986 and 1991. This compares to an overall increase of 12 per cent in the size of the under-fifteen population in British Columbia.
- The growing incidence of children who live with non-relatives merits further study. Although the number of children in care does not seem to have increased since 1986, the fact that more and more children are choosing--or are forced--to live apart from their families suggests that problems within families may be becoming more severe over time.
