## Issue 26: Work Activity of Young Adults

- Six out of every ten British Columbians between the ages of 15 and 19, and nine out of ten young adults aged 20 to 24, had full-time ${ }^{1}$ or part-time jobs in 1990.
- As the chart below illustrates, the percentage of British Columbians with some work activity remained quite stable between 1980 and 1990.
- However, proportionally fewer young workers were employed full-time in 1990. The percentage of young adults (aged 15 to 19) who worked full-time fell from 26 to 18 per cent between 1980 and 1990 .

While the proportion of young adults who have full-time jobs has declined since 1980, part-time employment has increased.


- Most of the decline in full-time employment was compensated for by growth in part-time work. In 1980, 35 per cent of those between the ages of 15 and 19 had part-time work; by 1990, the share had increased to 44 per cent.
- Part-time employment also accounts for a growing share of workers between the ages of 20 and 24. In 1990, one in five individuals in this age group had a parttime job, up from one in six ten years earlier.
- The difficulty that inexperienced workers have finding good-paying, full-time jobs may have caused a growing number of young British Columbians to opt for part-time work combined with further training. In 1981, two in three individuals aged 15 to 19 were in school; by 1991, the share had risen to four in five.
